## DOE sets '88 program

Fiscal 1988's proposed site characterization program will be the topic at Wednesday morning's deputy manager's meeting conducted by Robert Wunderlich of the Department of Energy in Hereford.

The meeting is open to the public and is scheduled to begin at 7:30 a.m. at the Battelle North offices located in the renovated La-Mart building on U.S. 385.

Because of budget constraints and pending legislation DOE is trying to optimize the program by focusing money on addressing key issues, Wunderlich said.

The '88 program, he said, will focus on proving or disproving assumptions made on the basis of regional data. Most of the data we have is regional data which was gathered from oil and gas wells drilled around the area, Wunderlich

said. The data DOE project personnel have prioritized for 1988 deals with gathering information from closer to the actual site in northern Deaf Smith County, one of three sites DOE is researching for high level nuclear waste repository.

DOE has named five issues to be addressed during the year.

The first issue is the need to check projections and predictions of uniformity of underground characteristics.

We will drill one of four planned stratigraphic boreholes to check actual findings against the predictions made on the basis of regional information, Wunderlich said. The borehole will also allow a core sample to be tested regarding strength of salt formations in terms of the second issue, which is constructability of an underground structure.

Uniformity of the area will also be confirmed or disproved through the

## TFB assails TRLA

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Texas farmers won't feel the full effect of the immigration reform law for about two years, but when they do, it'll be in the form of farm labor shortages, a national farm bureau official says.

At the Texas Farm Bureau convention Monday, Chuck Fields, assistant director of national affairs for the American Farm Bureau Federation, addressed such farm labor issues as immigration reform and labor law

violation lawsuits. Fields warned farmers that the immigration law, which includes a special legalization program for agricultural workers, will be enforced. Because that program has later deadlines, it may be up to two years before Texas feels its full brunt. But then, they're going to come out here and make examples of some of you and there are going to be pretty stiff penalties, both for not doing the paperwork and for each illegal

alien you employ for a day or more knowingly," Fields said. He also decried what he called the harassment of farmers by Legal Services Corp., which provides legal counsel to low-income rural residents under the auspices of Texas Rural Legal Aid Inc. "It's become one of the real thorns in the side of agriculture, particularly agriculture employers, in this country," he said. "They're in-

## Gorbachev

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev said his government is engaged in "Star Wars" research just as the United States is, but he insisted the Soviet Union will not deploy a space-based missile shield.

Gorbachev's comment came in a television interview broadcast by NBC News to American viewers Monday night, a week before his first trip to the United States for a summit meeting with President Reagan. The two leaders are expected to sign a treaty scrapping intermediate-range nuclear missiles.

Gorbachev's statement confirmed

a Reagan administration contention that the Soviets are working on their own space-defense program despite opposing America's Space Defense Initiative, known as SDI and the Star Wars project.

During a one-hour interview taped inside the Kremlin on Saturday, Gorbachev also spoke about emigration, the summit and long-range nuclear missiles. The interview is to be shown on Soviet television Tuesday night.

Commenting on restrictions on free emigration of Soviet citizens, Gorbachev said that was a matter of national security, and he accused the

United States of encouraging a "brain drain" from his country.

When asked if he talks about questions of policy with his wife Raisa, who will accompany him to Washington, he replied they "discuss everything."

The Communist Party chief said he is prepared to compromise to reach an accord for scrapping half of the U.S. and Soviet long-range nuclear missiles.

But referring to the Star Wars concept, he claimed U.S. defense planners think they can use their edge in computer technology to achieve superiority in "the militarization of

outer space."

The Soviet Union "is doing all that the United States is doing" to develop a defense against nuclear attack, Gorbachev said, but it will not build a space-defense system like that contemplated by Reagan.

"I guess we are engaged in research, basic research, which relates to these aspects which are covered by the SDI in the United States," he said.

But he added: "We will not build an SDI. We will not deploy SDI, and we call upon the United States to act likewise. If the Americans fail to

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## Reagan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan is trying to ease conservative qualms about the signing of a nuclear weapons reduction treaty by promising the toughest provisions ever to guard against Soviet cheating.

Reagan said Monday that the treaty he plans to sign at next week's superpower summit will provide for "effective verification" including on-site inspections before and during reductions, and short-notice inspections after.

In a speech intended to mute conservative criticism of the pact, Reagan also said the agreement will

require the Soviets to eliminate four times as many weapons as the United States.

Reagan planned to continue his promotion of the arms treaty today during an address to high school seniors in Jacksonville, Fla.

His remarks Monday to the Heritage Foundation coupled assurances about the arms agreement with other remarks designed to win support from his conservative audience.

At the opening of Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev's three-day summit next week, they are to sign an accord eliminating

intermediate-range nuclear missiles — the first pact to do away with an entire class of atomic weapons.

Reagan said Monday, however, that he won't be afraid to back away if the Dec. 8-10 meeting goes awry.

"I've waited six years to get an agreement that is both reliable and verifiable," Reagan said, adding that he'd "never be afraid to walk away from a bad deal — on that point there is no negotiation."

The president also took a swipe at Gorbachev's policy of "glasnost," or openness in Soviet society, calling it "a promise as yet unfulfilled." "Those of us who have lived

through the last 70 years remember earlier moments of promise in Soviet history — temporary thaws soon frozen over by the cold winds of oppression," he said.

The president also said he plans to talk tough with Gorbachev about Soviet military involvement in Afghanistan, Nicaragua and Angola.

The president defended his arms control pact with the Soviets by arguing that he will insist on strict anti-cheating measures.

Some of the president's conservative critics have voiced concern that the president is rushing into an

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## Atlanta Cubans turn over killer

ATLANTA (AP) — Cuban inmates holding 90 hostages handed over a double murderer considered the most dangerous person in the U.S. prison here, while the last of the Cuban prisoners involved in a Louisiana uprising have been removed.

Convicted killer Thomas Silverstein, who had been seen roaming inside the U.S. Penitentiary, was brought out in handcuffs and shackles and turned over to prison officials by the detainees Monday night.

"I believe they regarded him as a potential threat," said Patrick Korten, a U.S. Justice Department spokesman.

Most of the 1,116 Cubans want to release the hostages and end the 9-day-old siege, but about 100 radicals have talked them out of quitting, said prison officials and three Cuban exile leaders who met with inmate leaders Sunday night.

No formal negotiations were held Monday at the 85-year-old stone prison, although inmates talked with officials by telephone, Korten said.

"The radicals are pretty much in control of the situation," said Jorge Mas Canosa, president of the Cuban-American Foundation. "The rational leadership, the ones that they elected, they are fairly moderate. They want a solution."

The Atlanta riot followed an uprising Nov. 21 at the Federal Detention Center in Oakdale, La.

On Nov. 20, the government announced that 2,500 Cubans, mostly criminals or mentally ill, would be returned to their communist homeland. The inmates have demanded they be allowed to remain in the United States.

The Oakdale siege ended Sunday when the 950 inmates released all 26 hostages after the government promised individual reviews of their immigration status, pledged not to deport inmates approaching parole or hold them responsible for damage to the prison, which was nearly destroyed by fire.

On Monday evening, the last of the inmates were fingerprinted, searched and removed by bus.

The inmates were sent to 12 federal prisons around the country, federal officials said.

About 200 Cubans already approved for release to halfway houses and not actively involved in the riots were taken to Fort Polk, and the 38 U.S. inmates were sent to Fort Worth, Texas.

The approved Cubans probably will be released within 120 days, depending on space availability in halfway houses, said Jim Stevens, a Bureau of Prisons supervisor.

Silverstein had been considered the most dangerous of the inmates inside the Atlanta prison. He was sentenced to prison in 1975 for a California bank robbery, has been convicted of killing inmates at two prisons and a prison guard. One murder conviction was overturned, but he is serving life terms for the other slayings.

"We are glad to have Silverstein

back in federal custody, but it should be noted that it was also in the interest of the detainees to turn him over," Korten said.

"We want to re-emphasize the fact that the most important step for the detainees to take is the release of all the hostages they presently hold," he said.

Korten said the government has offered "a fair and reasonable settlement." He refused to describe the offer.

He echoed the exile leaders' statement that hard-liners were blocking a settlement. He said "a small but aggressive minority" had blocked the proposed release of 50 hostages on Thanksgiving.

Two inmates did surrender Monday, bringing the number of Cubans who have given up to 278, Korten said. Authorities have 176 U.S. inmates, including Silverstein, back in custody.

Some Cubans climbed onto the prison roof, raised a Cuban and an American flag and unfurled banners with messages for the outside world.

results of one or more shallow hydrologic holes which Wunderlich said will be drilled on the actual nine-square-mile site. "The hydrologic holes will be drilled above the salt level and will deal with the Ogalalla Aquifer and Dockum," Wunderlich said. "We have not determined exactly which of the planned holes we will drill. That will be determined, to a large degree, by the needs of the landowners at the time of drilling."

Dissolution of the salt formation is the third issue to be addressed by the '88 studies, according to Wunderlich. "Detailed studies will be conducted in and around one of the playa lakes to check for dissolution. If it doesn't occur at a playa the problem probably doesn't occur anywhere and these studies will give us an early indication of any problem with deep dissolution," he said.

Early indications of the need for possible design changes, or confirmation of the current plan, will be the fourth issue addressed.

"A combination of the hydrologic and stratigraphic information will allow DOE to make decisions concerning the final design of the proposed shaft," Wunderlich said.

"These studies will then allow others, outside DOE, to be able to get a complete picture of the design and then comment on any problems they foresee before the design is completed."

The fifth issue deals with proposed seismic studies which, under the original plan, Wunderlich said were "quite invasive" and of concern to the landowners. Under the current plan, some of the '88 money has been budgeted for literature search on existing seismic studies of the area.

"We will do this with the hope of minimizing future seismic activities," Wunderlich said.

Under the Mission Plan statement the program had sought \$170.7 million from Congress but received only 58 percent of that request. The salt characterization program of DOE has \$44.9 million in reserve from the fiscal 1987 budget and \$73 million added in the fiscal 1988 budget for a total of \$117.9 million for operations until Oct. 1, 1988. Of the \$117.9 million, Wunderlich said \$99.3 million will be spent for gathering hard data and the remainder will be used for grants and reserve funds.

Wunderlich said the fiscal '88 plan is a "good plan which, early on, addresses some of the issues which have been raised" and that this would be the chosen program regardless of pending legislation such as the Johnston-McClure Bill, which would focus site characterization activities on only one of the three sites at a time.

"Should the senate bill pass, this program will provide the information which would contribute to the process of choosing the first site for sequential characterization," Wunderlich said.

Environmental work and regional surveys will accompany the '88 field activity and Wunderlich said that additional hydrologic drilling will be the priority for any additional monies received from Congress during fiscal '88.

arms control agreement with the Soviets in order to salvage his presidency, troubled by the Iran-Contra affair.

Reagan pledged that "this treaty, and any treaty I agree to, will provide for effective verification... It will be the most stringent verification regime in the history of arms control negotiations. I would not ever settle for anything less."

The president also said he will not bargain away his Strategic Defense Initiative to obtain a follow-up treaty reducing strategic arms.

He warned that the Soviets "must stop holding strategic offensive missile reductions hostage to measures that would cripple our research and development" of SDI, also known as Star Wars.

Reagan said the Soviets have spent \$200 billion developing and deploying their own missile defense system and that it "dwarfs" Star Wars.

Gorbachev, in an interview broadcast by NBC News, acknowledged that the Soviet Union is engaged in "basic research" similar to the Star Wars program, but he said it will not build such a system unless necessary to counter U.S. actions.

heed that call, we will find a response."

"We have some steps that we could take to meet the American position half way" on strategic or long-range nuclear missiles, he said, but he added he is not going to Washington to negotiate on America's Star Wars program.

The Kremlin contends the 1972 antiballistic missile (ABM) treaty prohibits development of a Star Wars project beyond the research stage.

"Let America indulge in research insofar as SDI does not run counter to ABM," Gorbachev said. "That is not a subject for negotiations."

In the rare interview granted to Western journalists, he reacted sharply in an exchange on human rights issues.

Gorbachev, 56, was asked why the Soviet Union does not permit its citizens unrestricted international travel and emigration, and he said the government is primarily concerned with protecting itself from a "brain drain."

"We will never accept a condition when the people are being exorted from outside to leave their country," he said.

Gorbachev added, however, that the government "will continue in a spirit of humaneness to seek to resolve every individual case but within the framework of our own laws."

The Soviet leader claimed the only people still being refused to emigrate are "those who cannot leave because of state security reasons, and we will continue to act in that way."

Many Soviet Jews who have been refused permission to emigrate have been told their access to state secrets blocked them from leaving.

Rural Legal Aid lawyers file hundreds of lawsuits for labor law violations against farmers each year in an effort to force unionization among farm workers, Fields said.

He said the American Farm Bureau Federation supports efforts by Texas Sen. Phil Gramm to introduce legislation that would cut funding for many of the Rural Legal Aid support centers in rural areas.

Fields said that to avoid such suits, farmers need to become better informed about labor laws and should start a national clearinghouse for information about labor suits filed against agricultural employers.

The convention's approximately 1,300 delegates were scheduled to vote today on several resolutions for inclusion in the group's 1988 policy book, including a proposal that the state agriculture commissioner be appointed by the governor.

"A lot of our people feel as though the role of the agriculture commissioner is to carry out regulations and not initiate policy," said Texas Farm Bureau President S.M. True, a Plainview producer of cotton, grain sorghum, soybeans and wheat.

Policy-making functions should be left to groups such as the Farm Bureau, True said Monday.

The Texas Farm Bureau had originally supported the elected position of agriculture commissioner.

## B.H. KIRBY

Nov. 30, 1987

B.H. (Doc) Kirby, 80, died Monday afternoon at Deaf Smith County General Hospital. Funeral services will be conducted Wednesday at 10 a.m. at the Church of Nazarene.

Known primarily to his many friends as "Doc", he was a son of James Wright and Sadie Kirby who, in 1928 established a ranch and large farming operation in the Bippus community.

He was born May 23, 1907, at Marion Junction, Ala., finished high school at Selma, Ala., and moved with the family to Abilene, Texas, where he graduated from McMurray College in 1929.

His primary interest was in journalism, and he was employed shortly after graduation, as advertising manager of the Pampa Daily News. Unfortunately, however, this era marked the beginning of the "big depression," and "Doc" found himself in 1932, a teacher at the old Valentine School a one-room affair, located near the present Walcott community. He continued his endeavor through 1933, when he left to return to newspaper work at the Clovis Evening News Journal as advertising manager. His next move was once again to Pampa, where he held a similar position.

He married Dorothy Hammitt in 1934. The couple had two sons, Terry K. Kirby, born in 1935, and Geoffrey D. Kirby, who died in 1969.

In 1967, the Kirbys moved to Gateway, Ark., a retirement community, where Mrs. Kirby died in 1969.

In 1970, "Doc" married Vivia Pitzer and in 1971 they moved to Hereford, location at 118 Mimosa St., where they still resided at the time of his death.

Mr. Kirby is survived by his wife, a brother Jim Kirby, of Las Cruces, N.M., one son Terry Kirby, and a sister, Mrs. Carl Perrin of Hereford.

## CRP grass planting begins today

Today is the start of the grass planting season on Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) land.

Although optimum planting dates are from March 15 to May 15, the maximum range is from Dec. 1 to June 1. The most common approved grasses for Deaf Smith County are Yellow Bluestems, Plains WW Spar, Ganada, and Caucasian, Buffalo grass, Blue Grama and Sideoats Grama. Approved filler grasses are Green Sprangletop and Kleingrass. A small percentage of these may be used in the mix for quick cover.

All grass must be planted in an approved dead litter crop.

I have since taken the liberty of passing copies of that column to friends. One purchased his "some day" car, another went on a long-delayed trip. But "The Station" can also mean visiting a sick friend—and that "some day" should be now.

There is so much hurt in looking back and remembering those things we intended to do and didn't.

**DEAR IRV:** You were dear to let me know what "The Station" meant to your life. Here it is for all the others who haven't as yet learned that lesson:

The Station

Tucked away in our subconscious is an idyllic vision. We see ourselves on a long trip that spans the continent. We are traveling by train. Out the windows we drink in the passing scene of cars on nearby highways, of children waving at a crossing, of cattle grazing on a distant hillside, of smoke pouring from a power plant, of row upon row of corn and wheat, of flatlands and valleys, of mountains and rolling hillsides, of city skylines and village halls.

But uppermost in our minds is the final destination. On a certain day at

a certain hour we will pull into the station. Bands will be playing and flags waving. 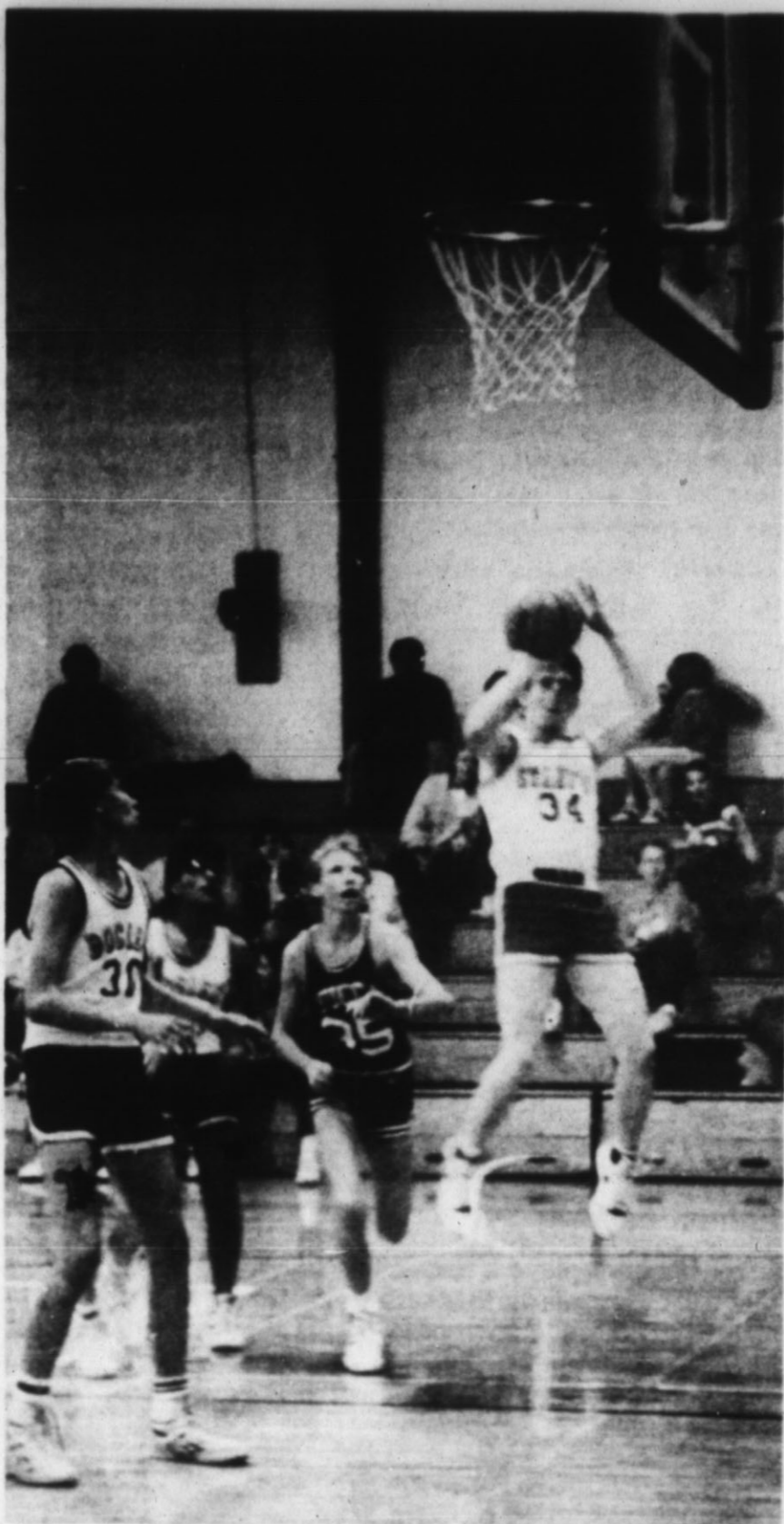

## Hints from Heloise

**DEAR HELOISE:**

I have recently purchased a microwave. I love the efficiency and the quick meals that can be prepared with it. However, I have found that many of the foods I cook in it are tough and dry.

What is causing this problem? Any help? — Viola Simkins, Oklahoma City, Okla.

**Help is on the way!** Microwaves are absolutely wonderful, but they do take a little getting used to because it is a different way of cooking. But well worth learning.

The problem that you are encountering can be caused by many different factors.

One factor may be that the temperature setting was too high. Always check the food at the minimum time and allow for standing time. Microwaved food continues to cook even after it has been taken out of the oven. This is an important fact to remember.

Another reason could be the food was too hot when put in the microwave. Microwave directions assume that the food is coming straight from the refrigerator. So, cooking time may need to be decreased if the food is warmer than normal.

If the food that you are cooking is a smaller amount than the directions state, cooking time again may need to be lowered.

Always remember, the directions are important. They have been tested for certain times, temperatures and amount.

Dear Heloise: I have an idea for moving toddlers out of cribs and into twin beds, so they don't fall out of bed and get hurt.

We put frames together as usual but left the legs off. We laid the slats on the floor and then the box spring and the mattress on top.

It is easy for them to climb in their own bed and they think they're big

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## Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have been diagnosed as having ulcerative colitis. I'm taking Azulfidine and iron tablets since I've become anemic. I'm to follow a bland diet and a low-residue diet. You mention to avoid milk and milk products. If these foods do not cause any problem, do they need to be avoided completely? Also fruits and vegetables — am I able to eat cooked ones? Do you have any other diet recommendations?

DEAR READER: One of your best guides to what you can eat is whether you have diarrhea or not. There is more to milk than just intolerance to milk sugar (lactose). Some people with ulcerative colitis have a milk allergy, which makes symptoms worse. You probably should avoid milk and all milk products, even if you do not have diarrhea.

Some authorities have recommended avoiding all physical and chemical irritants contained in fruits, vegetables, fruit juices, condiments, alcoholic beverages and excessively hot or cold foods or liquids. But if your diarrhea is under control, you should be able to eat cooked fruits and vegetables.

From years of observation I would also recommend avoiding all forms of coffee, chocolate and tea, and of course anything else that you find aggravates your condition. This is also good advice for people with diarrhea from other causes.

Incidentally, iron tablets may be irritating. That is why iron replacement must sometimes be given intravenously.

DEAR DR. LAMB: There has been a lot written about AIDS, but I am curious about whether you can get the AIDS virus from kissing someone who has AIDS. I don't mean just a smooch on the lips, but a French kiss. Is there a possibility of getting AIDS from French kissing? I'm sure lots of people are wondering the same thing.

DEAR READER: Different terms mean different things to different people. I understand the term French kissing to mean inserting one's tongue in another person's mouth or receiving another person's tongue. A somewhat less elegant description is "swapping spit." And that gets right down to the basics of your question. It is true that the AIDS virus has been found in saliva, but in very low numbers. To get infected you need to be exposed to a significant number of the virus, not just one virus.

In addition, the route of entry of the virus into the human body must be into the bloodstream. That can happen through using intravenous drugs, or entry through the sex organs or the rectum. There is no evidence that the AIDS virus can enter the body through the digestive system. I only know of one reported case that suggested that a woman had gotten AIDS from kissing, and that case might be subject to question. So it is not generally believed that you can get AIDS from a casual kiss, a French kiss or a soul kiss.

The body fluids that contain enough AIDS virus to allow transmission of the disease are seminal fluid or sexual secretions and blood.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have been using a tanning bed for six weeks — 30 minutes a day. There are a lot of other young people using these tanning beds every day, year-round. Are these tanning beds really safe?

I thought that tanning beds were safer than the sun and you couldn't get skin cancer from them until I read on one of the 16 fluorescent bulbs that they emit ultraviolet radiation. What came to mind is, I will either get cancer from the radiation or it will prevent cancer. What is your opinion?

DEAR READER: They certainly will not prevent cancer and they certainly may cause skin cancer. The sellers of tanning beds and booths have made a big point that they provide mostly ultraviolet A (UV-A) which does not cause sunburns. Ultraviolet B (UV-B) are the wavelengths of radiation that cause sunburn.

But UV-A is NOT harmless. It penetrates deep into the skin. While you may not be so likely to burn, that radiation may indeed damage the deeper layer of cells that become skin cancer. Also the damage may age the skin over time.

UV-A and UV-B are both part of normal sunshine. And sunshine is radiation. The effects are cumulative in causing radiation damage to the skin. The more exposure you have

over time, the greater the skin damage. With problems apparent from depletion of the ozone layer and other factors, I think everyone should protect themselves at least to a reasonable degree from both UV-A and UV-B.

# Raiders' Bo Jackson has 'fun' with 'hobby'

SEATTLE (AP) — Bo Jackson couldn't remember when he had more fun playing football, but his single-handed destruction of the Seattle Seahawks didn't persuade him to give up hitting home runs for scoring more touchdowns.

"I hadn't thought about it," Jackson said of his career plans after the Los Angeles Raiders routed the Seahawks 37-14 Monday night.

"Why should I think about it? I'm having too much fun," Jackson said outside the Raiders' locker room, sunglasses shading his eyes from the glare of television lights.

Fun, for Jackson, was 221 yards on 18 carries, the 13th best rushing performance in NFL history, in just his fifth game.

The best rushing day belongs to Walter Payton of the Chicago Bears who ran for 275 yards against Minnesota in 1977. O.J. Simpson is se-

cond and third at 273 and 250 yards.

Fun, for Jackson, was turning 25 while a national television audience watched the 4-7 Raiders break a seven-game losing streak.

"It was my birthday. I had a great time," Jackson said as he spoiled the day for the 7-4 Seahawks and their normally raucous Kingdome crowd.

Fun was accounting for 43 of the Raiders' 59 yards in a scoring drive that gave Los Angeles a 14-7 lead and helped Jackson atone for a first-quarter fumble that gave the Seahawks their only score of the half.

The most fun was a 91-yard touchdown gallop around left end which propelled him into the tunnel

leading to the Seahawks' locker room and propelled the Raiders into a 21-7 lead in the second quarter.

Jackson wasn't talking baseball after his three touchdowns kept the Seahawks from catching AFC West leader San Diego.

"I can't let them make Bo's decisions for him," Jackson said when asked about the football fans who wanted to see what the 1985 Heisman Trophy winner from Auburn could do with a full season.

"I have to do what I want," said

Jackson, who said too much has been made of his description of football as a "hobby" when he announced he would join the Raiders after the Kansas City Royals' baseball season ended.

The Seahawks must play on the road for three of their last four games, including a Sunday game in Pittsburgh. The Raiders are out of playoff contention.

Seattle capitalized quickly on Jackson's fumble, marching 64 yards on a drive capped by Dave Krieg hitting Daryl Turner with a 19-yard touchdown pass. The Raiders would score on their next seven possessions.

Marc Wilson hit James Lofton for a 46-yard touchdown for the Raiders' first score and then hit Jackson with a 14-yarder for the second.

Jackson's 91-yard run broke the game open in the second period before Chris Bahr kicked field goals of 23 and 47 yards for a 27-7 halftime lead. The run was the longest in Raiders history and helped him surpass the 200-yard single-game club record Clem Daniels set in 1963.

Jackson carried Brian Bosworth into the end zone on a 2-yard touchdown run for a 34-7 lead. Bahr's 23-yard field goal upped the margin to 37-7 before Krieg finished the scoring with a 3-yard touchdown pass to tight end Mike Tice.

## Oilers' coach has humor despite devastating loss

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston Coach Jerry Glanville unwittingly found a way to make Sunday's 51-27 loss to Indianapolis look good — at least on film.

Glanville was 10 minutes late for his regular Monday press conference and explained that he'd had a reaction to taking two medications for a cough.

He said the combined medication made him sleepy and that he hadn't been able to see all the films of Sunday's loss, the Oilers' worst since 1983.

"Unfortunately, I mixed the wrong thing with the wrong thing," Glanville said. "I took them together and things on film looked pretty good. I thought about dying, but I knew you people would think it was suicide. They just woke me up to come and visit with you."

In reality, the Oilers' loss on Monday was just as devastating as it was on Sunday.

The Oilers, 6-3 and challenging for the division lead only two weeks ago, have lost two straight and allowed 91 points and 11 turnovers in those two losses.

But Glanville says all it will take to regain the momentum is a repeat of last season's finish that included four victories in the final seven games, Glanville said.

"As a coach you worry when people aren't trying, hustling and hitting the enemy," Glanville said. "But I was able to watch the film and see hope for success. We just have to take care of the football and not give it away like we've been doing."

The Oilers wasted a good offensive performance that totaled 454 yards. Quarterback Warren Moon completed 24 of 44 passes for 327 yards, his 12th 300-yard game with the Oilers.

"It's the time when a lot of individuals have to grow up and decide what to do," Oiler tight end Jamie Williams said.

"It's a new thing for some guys. We have to understand the situation. Mistakes can't be made. We have to be man enough to come up with the plays when we need them."

Some Oiler players were angered that the Colts scored a touchdown in the final six seconds of the game, but Mike Rozier saw nothing wrong with the score.

"When you get the ball down there what are you supposed to do?" Rozier asked. "I probably would have done the same thing."

The Oilers return to the Astrodome Sunday to host the San Diego Chargers, 8-3, also losers in their last two games.
