With this additional source of income, the family will be able to raise their level of living from \$1,200 per year to approximately \$2,000 per year after the business is in operation. This will amount to a 50 percent increase in their gross income from all sources.

The State Director of the Farmers Home Administration in Texas stated that all personnel are enlisting the assistance of rural agricultural and business leaders, school ily necessities. teachers, ministers, welfare workers, charitable organizations and others to assist this agency in informing low-income rural families of the opportunities available to them in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

According to Mr. Cappleman, "The 1960 Agricultural Census showed approximately 375,000 rural families, both farm and non-farm, living in the country and in communities of less than 2,500 population, receive a gross income of \$3,000 a year or less from all sources. This means we have a real challenge in Texas in providing opportunities for these families to improve their level of living."

All of the loans bear a 4 1-8 percent interest. Economic Opportunity Loans may be made in amounts up to \$2,500 to finance small family businesses, trades, services, and farming enterprises.



I'VE GOT A SECRET FOR THE HOLIDAYS: I like to give homemade candies as gifts -hostess gifts, holiday gifts, or as a small remembrance for shut-ins. Now don't say, "But candy-making is too hard and takes too much time." Candies can be made without much muss, fuss, or bother. Here's how I do it.

The most versatile candy of all starts with a package (8 squares) semi-sweet chocolate partially melted over hot water. partially melted over hot water. Remove from water and stir rapidly until entirely melted. Stir in 1½ cups of any one of the following: coarsely chopped salted pecans, salted peanuts, or raisins. I have even added 3 cups coarsely crushed peanut brittle—yummy! Stir until all pieces are coated; drop by pieces are coated; drop by spoonfuls onto wax paper. Let stand until firm.

Cereals add crunch to no-cook candy in another favorite recipe. Combine ½ cup light corn syrup, dash of salt, and ¼ cup confectioners' sugar in a large bowl. Add 4½ cups honey-flavored puffed wheat and 1 cup chopped peanuts; stir until coated. Spread in 11x7 inch pan. Chill 2 to 3 hours. Cut into 24 squares. Store in refrigerator.

I like coconut candies—add chocolate and a bit of rum—irresistible! Cream 2 tablespoons softened butter; blend in 1 egg yolk. Gradually blend in 1/4 cup unsifted confectioners' sugar. Then add 1 package (4 oz.) sweet cooking chocolate, grated, 1/4 cup fine-grated coconut. and ½ cup fine-grated coconut, and 1 tablespoon rum. Form into 24 small balls and roll in addi-tional coconut; place on wax paper, chill several hours.

Wrap candies individually in transparent saran, arrange on a gift platter or in a vase of brandy snifter. Wrap and tie with a bow—your gift is ready! What is most important, it shows that you cared enough to give something you took the give something you took the time to prepare.






