The VA will pay veterans up to \$130 a month (if single and they are full-time students more if they have dependents). Those attending adult evening school will be enrolled at half-

These payments will not reduce their college or on-the-job training benefits, Coker said. A number of colleges and universities have embarked on new programs for returning veterans who do not possess a diploma but do desire a higher education. However, such veterans must meet certain qualifications established by the institutions and the VA.

Upon discharge, veterans should file at the nearest VA office for certificates of eligibility even though they may not use them immediately. This will save time when they later apply for schooling or on-the-job
