





The Reporting Service also indicates that based on April 1 prospects, Texas wheat production is forecast at 60,423,000 bushels. If realized, this will be 17 percent below 1966 production of 72,652,000 bushels.

The major growing area has been hurt by the critical shortage of moisture. Reports of heavy abandonment on dryland acreage is reported. Green bug damage is also heavy, but apwhere a grain crop is expected.

Notaries Public Applications Is May 1-15, 1967

Hill announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1967 and ends June 1, 1969, must the required fee and file new application, oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1967 and May 15, 1967, inclus-

Mr. Hill emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the Application to the Secretary of State.

Each person applying for a commission as Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States and of Texas and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The required obtained from the County

Wind Causing Erosion Damage. In Haskell Co.

Dry weather has caused a large increase in the amount of Texas land damaged by windstorms, H. N. Smith, State Conservationist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service, reported this week.

During January and February of 1967, almost 400,000 acres were damaged, compared to some 180,000 acres damaged during the same period a year ago. "This is an increase of more than 200,000 acres of land damaged this period," Smith said.

Cropland represents 96% of the land damaged this season. More than two million acres are in a condition to blow, compared with 1.6 million acres a

year ago, according to Smith. "Surface moisture conditions are poor to very poor. Small grains have made very little growth because of the extremely dry weather and some are dying," Smith said. "Many acres more have been damaged during March and the first part of April," Yeary said, "And there doesn't seem to be too much promise at the present for the central and southern portions of the county." According to Yeary, every effort should be made during the remainder of the blow season to prevent as much land damage as possible. Precautions should be taken this cropping year to prevent such a recurring damage as resulted this year, by the use of any and all residue management practices and emergency tillage operations this coming fall and winter.
