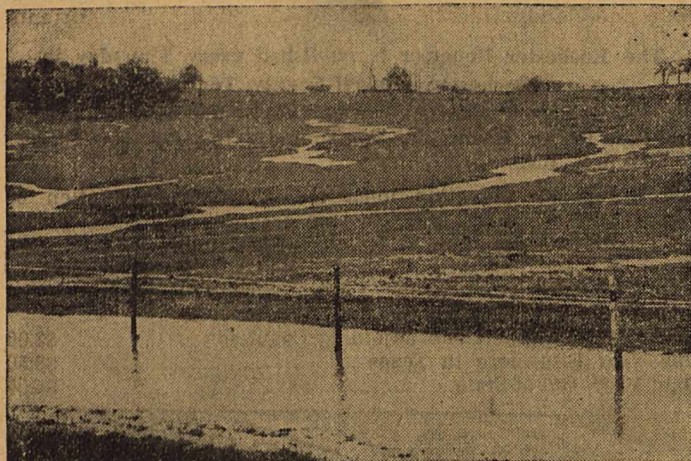

Importance Of Terracing Stressed By Knox City SCS

Will your field get a "Million-Dollar Rain" this year? A properly designed and installed terrace system on your land could mean the difference. Terraced fields cause runoff water to be held and spread over the field where the crops can use it. On unterraced fields runoff water is carried down the slopes to the turn rows. Only weeds and fence row trees can use it there. The "Million-Dollar Rain" is lost and it takes the soil with it.

"Pooling" Bill Now Before T. Legislature

Citizens of Haskell County, producer of some \$13.6 million worth of oil and gas a year, have a special interest in the "pooling" bill now before the Texas Legislature, James L. Sewell, Dallas, president of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, reported this week.

Although Haskell County has production, the oil man who operate here, as well as the landowners and governmental officials, are interested in securing maximum development," Sewell said. "A pooling law will encourage a more efficient and more equitable approach to development of our oil and gas resources."

its Brazos Soil Conservation District. Reducing the amount of runoff water by one inch can increase cotton yields by 20 pounds of lint cotton per acre, according to Arche Lieb, Work Unit Conservator for the SCS at Knox City. A 12-inch high terrace will hold nine times as much water as one four inches high. Low terraces can be raised with a regular disk plow or moldboard. Maintenance need not be an extra operation but part of regular tillage. Scoops and blades mounted on tool bar can be used for making end fills and patching breaks.

Each cropland field requires individual terrace design and layout due to differences in soil and slope. Vegetative outlets, natural drains, or rangeland, are necessary to provide outlets for most terrace systems because they are slightly graded and must have a place to empty excess water.

Parallel terrace systems are a necessity on cultivated land where terraces are needed to fit modern multi-row farm equipment. They eliminate point rows and unnecessary turning on crops as well as wasted time. They can be built where there is an even number of rows between each terrace.

Parallel terraces cost more than regular terraces to construct because more earth moving is involved to cut the high places and fill the low places to be certain they drain or can be drained of excess water. The extra cost is more than offset by the convenience and increase in production.

Texas High Speeders Have Dropped To 5.1% Since '63

Austin — Texas drivers "flirted" with excessive speeds after the speed limit was raised to 70 m.p.h. late in 1963.

But the affair went pffft, according to a speed survey made by the Texas Highway Department a year later, and Texans for the most part are now observing the speed limit.

Take passenger cars, for instance. The Highway Department radar-checked speeds of at least 25,000 of them in 30 locations scattered over the state.

In 1963, a fraction more than 11 percent of the motorists were clocked at more than 70 m.p.h. A year later — under the same highway conditions, and in the same

Continued From Page 1 down a year later, then? "The novelty wore off. At least that's all we can figure. It's admittedly just a guess."

The Highway Department's annual speed survey is a research study project used by highway engineers to help determine future highway design characteristics and traffic needs. The Highway Department designs, builds and

maintains Texas highways. It determines safe speeds, zones and signs highways, but does not have police or enforcing authority.

Last October and November the Highway Department surveyed vehicle driving practices of more than 25,000 motorists. Concealed radar units were set up at 30 locations on key highways during an eight hour period.

Average speed of all vehicles surveyed last autumn was 56.6 miles an hour. A year before, just after the new speed limits became effective, the average was 59.3 m.p.h. And just before the new speeds were posted, the average had been 56.5 m.p.h.

In all vehicle categories, speeds seem to be leveling off from highs recorded during the period of "flirtation." Of all vehicles surveyed only 3.6 percent were exceeding the 70 m.p.h. speed limit last fall. A year earlier, 8 percent of vehicles of all kinds were breaking 70.

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

**Annual Report Due
From Many Social
Security Claimants**

Early each year, many people who get social security payments must file an annual report of their earnings for the prior year.

This report in 1965 must be filed by every social security beneficiary who was under age 72 during any part of 1964 and had income of over \$1200 in wages or in profit

from his own business. One of the questions on this report is: "Do you expect to earn over \$1200 in 1965?" If so, you show your expected total earnings for 1965.

Many times the estimate shown in January or February is not high enough when a second look is taken in mid-year. If you then think your actual earnings will be more than you at first anticipated, you should get in touch with your social security office. Someone there will be glad to help you revise your estimate.

You may find that you have already received more benefits than you will be entitled to get for the year and are overpaid.

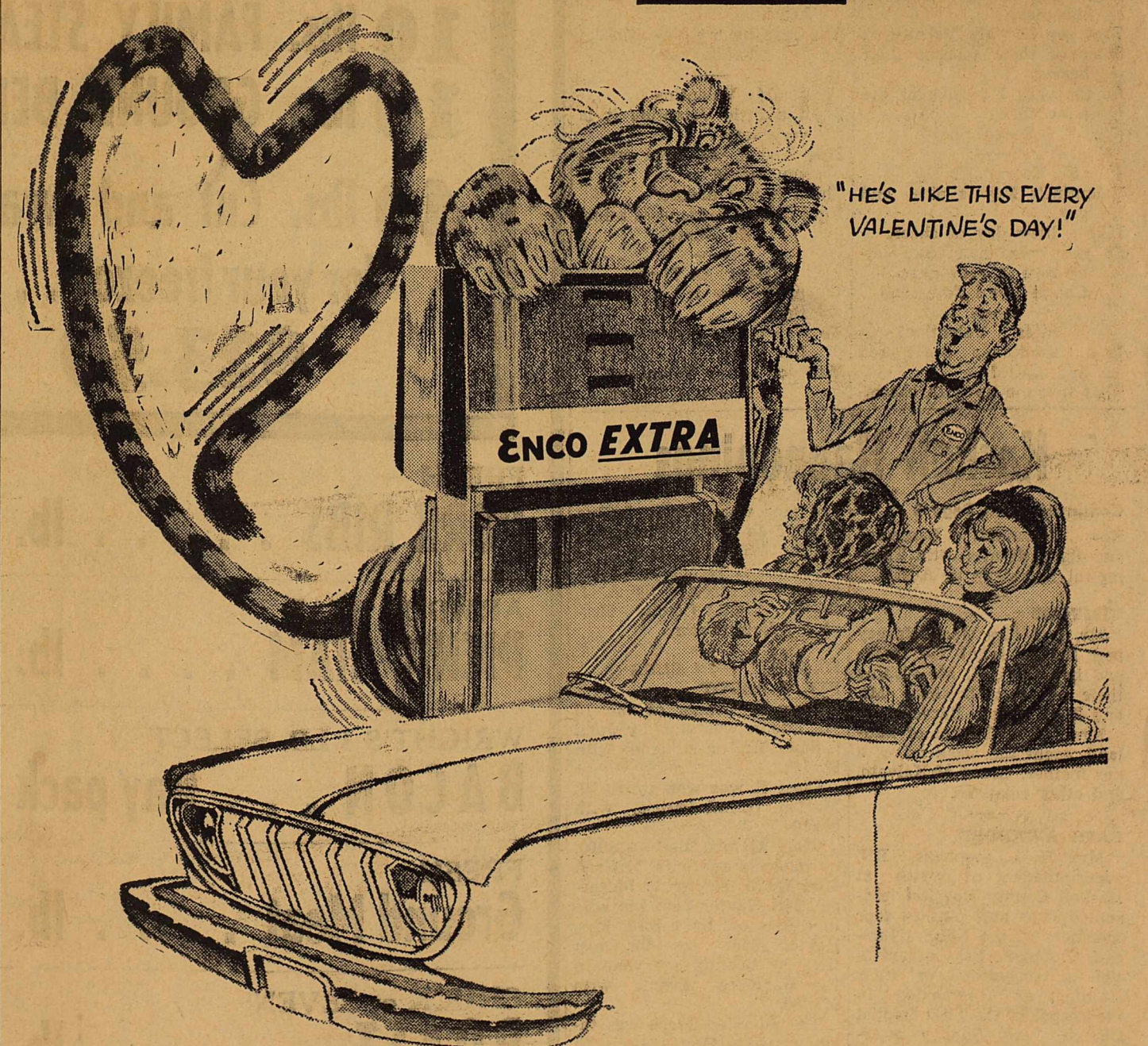

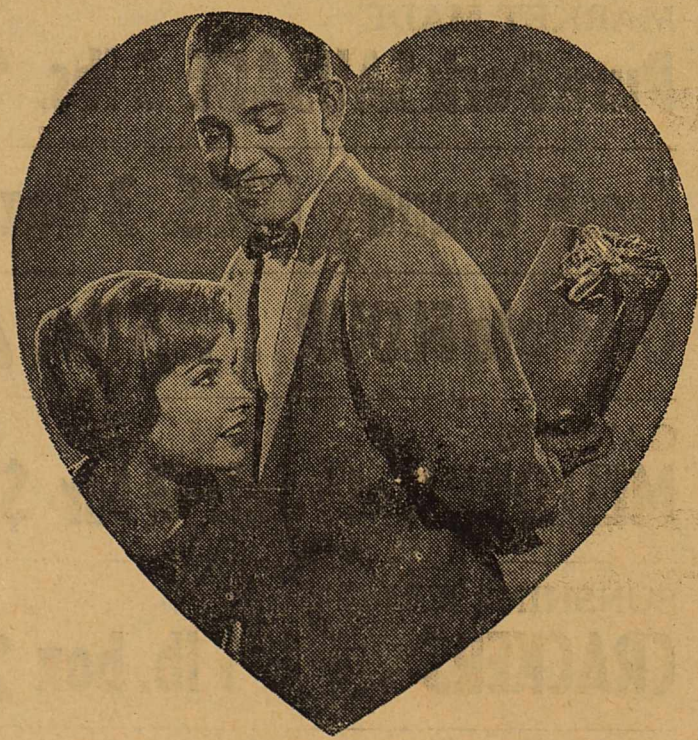
