There were also some capable entries from Rochester, although they didn't place. "The Five Dots and A Dash"



Santa Fe Railway

F. E. Hanlon, general passenger agent for Santa Fe Railway at Amarillo said that deductions. Santa Fe was not presently included in the Interstate Commerce Commission authority to boost passenger fares.

Hanlon said Santa Fe was one of the railroads that remained within the Texas statutory passenger fare limits of 3c per mile when other roads were permitted to increase rates to 3.183c per mile.

"Actually the Santa Railway, instead of raising fares at this time, has instituted a bargain traffic fare reauction for both first class and coaches which started January 10, and will be continued through April 30, of this year," he declared.

This reduction, he said, provides a fare cost of 140 percent of a one-way ticket for a round trip fare between two points on the Santa Fe with a limit of 30 days.
