Munday scored in the first, ba. second and third quarters of the game and three touchdowns were scored in the second quarter. Munday's only two point conversion came in the first quarter. Munday made 394 rushing yards, to Rochester's 163 yards. Munday had 14 first downs and Rochester, 8. Skip Lane threw two touchdown passes and carried four yards for a third tally in the Mogul victory. Tailbacks Terry Leflar and Bill Stewart, together netted over 300 yards, each accounting for another six points.

Rochester got its only move into Munday's end of the field, in the first half, when Buford Berryhill, who netted 88 yards in 14 carries, swept end and carried from his own 39 to the Mogul 26 and the time ran out for the half.
