"As much information as possible will be coded—each class and each student will be given a code number prior to registration. In other words, it will automise what had previously been done by hand, thus increasing the speed and decreasing the chances for error.

CATTLE MAY NEED PHOSPHORUS

Under summer conditions, natural grazing may not provide beef cattle with needed nutrients. Cows fed phosphorus supplements, in areas where the deficiency occurs, may average as much as 200 pounds heavier than those not getting the supplement and calves may weigh as much as 50-70 pounds more at weaning age, says U. D. Thompson, Texas A&M University Extension animal husbandman. And, he adds, calf crops may be increased by

THE MAJOR COMMANDS OF GOD

AND THE MINOR COMMANDS There are some commands of the Bible that are stated to be more important than others. Love is described as greater than faith or hope (I Cor. 13:13). Jesus states that the greatest commandment is to love the Father. But the fact that one command is greater than another does not mean that the lesser is minor in sense that it is immaterial as to whether it is obeyed or not. The fact that love is greater than hope or faith certainly does not mean that

faith is not essential to salvation. Sometimes we make a distinction between the major and minor commands today in a different sense. We think that baptism, for instance, is a minor command while faith is a major command. In the first place, there is no Biblical foundation for such a statement, but even if it be true that faith is more important than baptism, this does not mean that baptism can be branded as non-essential, since the Bible makes it a specific command (Mark 16:16).

It is not man's place to decide which are the major commands and which are the minor commands. It is not man's place to decide which commands are essential and which are non-essential. In fact, all commands are essential, and to disobey any command of God, or to declare any statement of God as non-essential is to be guilty of open disobedience of the will of God.


