
Kee Obtains Agency For New Nash Cars



Appurtenances for the use of water, such as windmills, stock trough storage tanks, bathroom fixtures (including minor house repairs), sinks pipe, towers, necessary labor, garden fences, windbreak tree planting, milk troughs, and so forth are also included."

It was emphasized however, that no irrigation ystem, other than the one acre maximum per farm unit, are authorized, except in the Rita Blanca Drainage, Coldwater Palo Duro Watershead and Mustang-Monument Seminole Area. Mr. Lilly said he expects scores of farm families in Terry County will improve their water facilities as a result of this program. Farmers and farm women interested in obtaining complete information about this program should immediately contact Mr. Lilly or Miss Whitney at the County Farm Security Administration office in the Brownfiield Building.


