

According to P. S. Bailey, division engineer of Amarillo, the plans and specifications will be ready to be presented at the meeting of the county commissioners' court at Lipscomb on Monday, July 13.

FAVORITE RECIPES

Buns

3 cups milk (part water may be used) 2 tablespoons lard, or other shortening

4 tablespoons sugar

2 teaspoons salt

1 cake Fleischmann's yeast, or

1 pint light bread sponge Scald the milk to melt the shortening; let cool, and add the sugar, salt and then the yeast or bread sponge. Stir in enough flour to make a stiff dough; let raise and roll out. Cut with biscuit cutter or other utensil. When very light bake about 15 minutes in moderate oven. Increase heat for a few moments to brown the buns. This recipe makes about two dozen. This can be varied by rolling the dough in rolls and sprinkling sugar and cinnamon and dotting with butter (best results are obtained by us- fourth. ing this dough as soft as possible).






