### Junior College Beauty School To Hold Open House Thursday

The new and modern BEAUTY SCHOOL at Cisco Junior College will hold open house on Thursday evening, Feb. 7, according to officials of the college. The format will be a come - and - go affair between 7:00 and 9:00 p.m.

The Beauty School, which began classes Nov. 1, is housed in the Cisco college's newest building, the Technical - Vocational Building Number 2, recently completed. The Beauty School, officially named the Cosmetology Department, has a spacious and well - furnished portion of the new facility. The modern cosmetology equipment includes, among other things, 13 styling stations, 12 hair dryers, 12 hydraulic chairs, 5 shampoo bowls with reclining chairs, 4

manicuring stations, locker space for 24 students, and 2 long mannequin tables. The school also is elaborately furnished with several mirrors at each teaching station.

Cosmetology instructors Roger Carlile and Ruth Hardy and student instructor Alta Dixon will all be present to greet visitors, and Beauty School students will also serve as hostesses. Refreshments will be served by the students, and door prizes will be given away. The prizes will consist of various free beauty services such as hair styles, manicures and permanent waves.

Officials of the Vocational - Technical Division of CJC stated that the open house at the Beauty School would have a two - fold purpose: first of all, to give the people of Cisco and the surrounding area which the CJC vocational programs serve an opportunity to come and see the new modern cosmetology school on the college campus, and secondly, to serve as an impetus to gain more students for the school. Instructors Carlile and Hardy have urged that anyone even remotely interested in taking one or more courses in cosmetology come to the open house and investigate the CJC program and facilities.

The instructors also stated that interested prospective students who can't attend the open house Thursday evening can contact them at any time for more information. They may be reached at the Vocational - Technical Building Number 2 weekdays, or may be telephoned at area 817, 442 - 2567, extension 51. Information about the Beauty School and other CJC vocational programs is also available through the Vocational - Technical Director's Office, they concluded.

"We hope everyone will come out, see our new modern Beauty School facilities, and have some refreshments with us," the teachers said. "We're tremendously proud of our fine school, and we want to share this elation with others," they concluded.

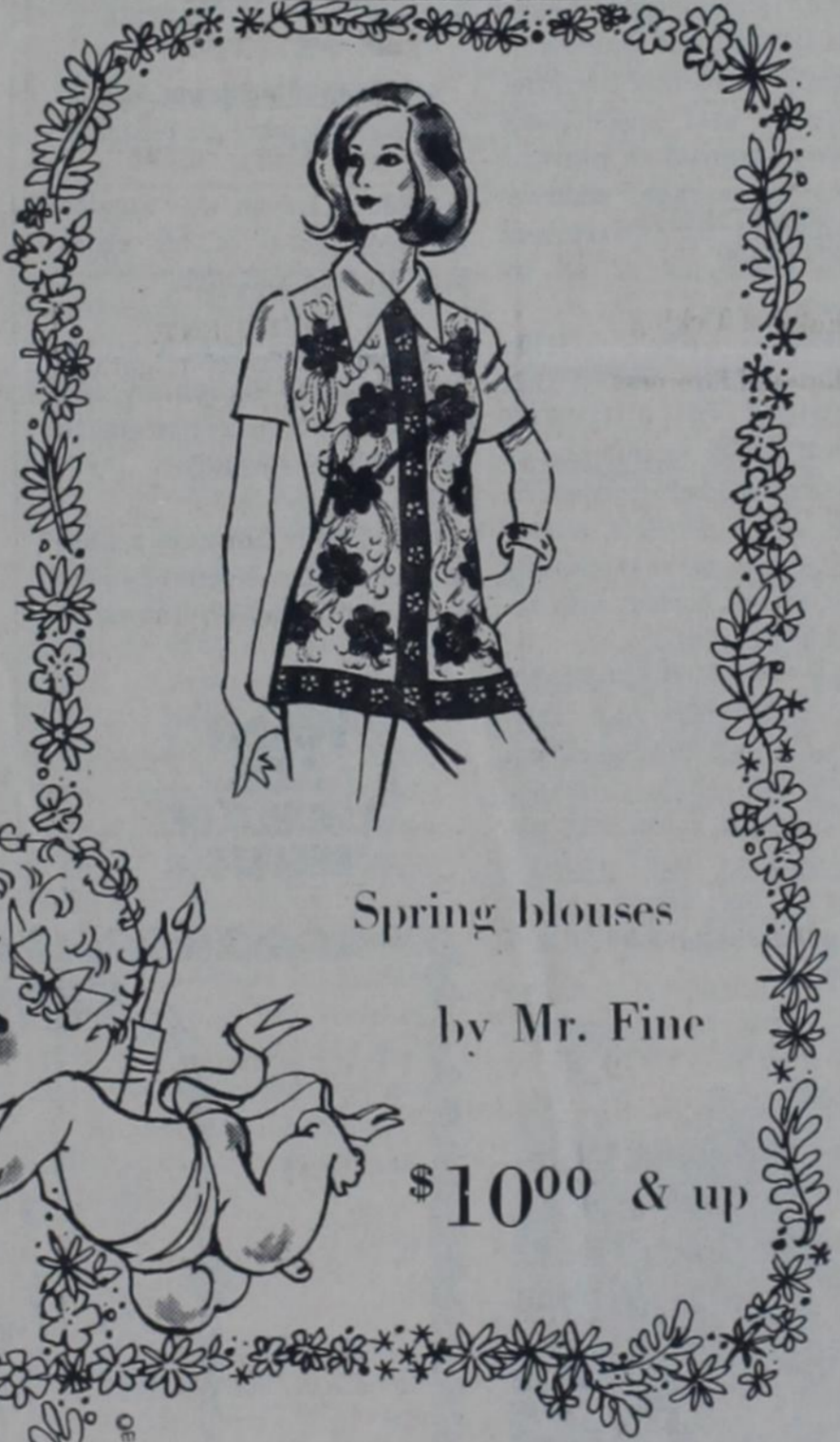

## Church of Christ Rising Star

In Acts of Apostles, chapter two, momentous events are chronicled in some detail by Luke, also the author of the third Gospel. Following the instructions of Jesus (Luke 24:44 - 49; Acts 1:4, 8) the apostles await, in Jerusalem, the special power and direction promised them (John 14:26; 15:26; 16:13; Acts 1:8). This arrives, according to the opening lines of chapter two, and through the power of the Holy Spirit, Peter, one of the twelve apostles, proceeds to explain the events to the Jewish audience and to lay before these Pentecost pilgrims an overwhelming array of proofs for the concluding statement of his sermon: "...God hath made him both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom ye crucified." (Acts 2:26) Moved by the agonizing recognition of the awful thing they had done, the convicted listeners cry out for a solution. God's answer is for them to change their minds and lives (repent) and to be baptized (immersed), with the assurance that their sins will be forgiven and they will receive the "gift of the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:38). About three thousand from the assembled crowd "received his word" and "were baptized" (Acts 2:41).

Luke continues by relating some of the actions and characteristics of this group of new disciples. "They continued steadfastly in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread and the prayers." (Acts 2:42) To meet the emergency caused by the presence of so many new converts from outside Jerusalem, all joined in to provide for the day-to-day needs of each one, even to the selling of "goods and possessions" (Acts 2:44 - 45). One thing is especially emphasized a number of times in the last paragraph of chapter two: the 'togetherness' of these first Christians (the name 'Christian' was to be applied a few years later at Antioch - Acts 11:26). See Acts 2:44, 46 and 47.

The events of Pentecost set the pace for the community of believers in the succeeding history of the New Testament. For the first time, in Acts 2:47, there is a distinctive grouping of disciples around the common conviction that Jesus was indeed the Christ, the Son of God: having been crucified for the sins of the world but raised from the dead and exalted to

the right hand of God. This grouping of believers is to be known as "the church" (Acts 2:47), "the churches of Christ" (Romans 16:16), "the church of God" (1 Corinthians 1:2; etc.), "the body of Christ" (Ephesians 1:22 - 23), "the house of God" (1 Timothy 3:15), "...the general assembly and church of the firstborn" (Hebrews 12:23). According to the pattern laid down in Acts 2, all who accept Jesus as Lord and Christ, all who change from the love of sin to the love of righteousness, and all who are immersed (baptized) (See Romans 6:1 - 11 for the meaning of this ceremonial washing), not only have the assurance from God that all past sins are pardoned and that His spirit comes to dwell in them, but that they are at that point "added" by the Lord to that same community of believers, the Church, over which Jesus is the head (Ephesians 1:22, 23) and of which He is the Savior (Ephesians 5:23).

Would you like to know more about what the Scriptures say concerning God's "called out ones"? Then join us in our periods of Bible study on Sunday at 9:30 a.m. and Wednesday at 7:00 p.m., as well as during the Assemblies on Sunday at 10:30 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. We would be happy to talk to you about this at any other time as well.

## WASHINGTON

"As it looks from here"

### OMAR BURLESON Congressman 17th District

Omar Burleson, M.C. WASHINGTON, D.C. -- "REFORM", "ETHICS", "RULES", "STANDARDS of Conduct", and so on - are all necessary in the conduct of our political processes, but all these will not automatically make statesmen out of mere politicians. There is a difference.

POLITICS HAS BEEN DEFINED AS THE ART of government. Politicians are the practitioners of politics, usually elected public officials, but not necessarily so. WHEN DOES A POLITICIAN BECOME A STATESMAN? THERE MAY NOT be an exact two - plus - two - equals - four answer. But there are some essential qualities if the politician is to be recognized as a statesman: On the way to becoming a statesman, there must be no doubt about his belief in our form of Government; that he is proud of our Country, despite its many weaknesses;

WHEN HE LOOKS OUT OVER THE HORIZON AND IS OPTIMISTIC ABOUT the great opportunities for everyone, knowing that there is much to be done, and that history remembers the builders rather than the wreckers; that he has confidence in the ability, integrity, and ingenuity of the American people to do what is right and solve any problem when they have the facts;

WHEN HE HAS FAITH IN THE SUPREME WORTH OF THE INDIVIDUAL and his right to the opportunity to earn a living; when all are treated equally with no thought that the Government owes anyone a living except to help the young, the unfortunate, the aged, and the handicapped;

WHEN HE RECOGNIZES HIS LIMITATION AS AN INDIVIDUAL AND, like Lincoln, relies on Divine Guidance and the advice of wise men; has faith that right will prevail if he looks intelligently towards that end;

WHEN HE RESPECTS THE OPINIONS OF OTHERS: WILL NOT PREJUDGE but study all proposals; work and vote his conscience and not compromise principle for expediency; shows tolerance and understanding for new ideas and judges them on merit

rather than have his opinions shaped by purely political considerations;

WHEN HE FINDS GOOD IN EVERY PERSON, REGARDLESS OF THEIR PERSONALITY, political stands, and treats them as individuals rather than symbols of something he does not like; does not condone the persecution and suffering of another; does not condemn an honest opinion, recognizing the opposite point of view; will not tolerate delays of investigation or charges based on suspicion, subscribing to the proposition that the individual is innocent until his guilt is established by legal and competent evidence;

WHEN HE CAN ADMIT ERROR IN JUDGMENT WITHOUT TRYING TO explain it away; concentrates and works diligently and expeditiously to correct mistakes of his and others instead of wasting time in placing blame;

WHEN NO THOUGHT OF DECEIT OR CONTENTION ENTERS HIS mind to distort his judgment and affect his actions on grave National issues; knows how to meet defeat without being defeated; make and keep friends from all walks of life, give of himself and forgive others, thus being true to himself and able to live in peace with all men, keeping faith with his associates and his Maker;

WHEN HE KEEPS INVIOLENT ANYTHING TOLD TO HIM IN confidence, unless fraud or National interest is involved; condemns untruths, insinuation and speculations that are designed to promote political advantage, destroys confidence in our Government or the character of an individual;

WHEN HE DIFFERENTIATES BETWEEN FREEDOM OR LIBERTY AND LICENSE to infringe on the rights of others; when he spends other people's money that is in his trust as carefully as that he has earned with his own hands or mind;

ONLY WHEN HISTORIANS HAVE WEIGHED ALL THE FACTS CAN OTHERS decide a person's true worth; whether he has always acted with absolute honesty and sincerity worthy of his office, as to whether he was a politician or a statesman.

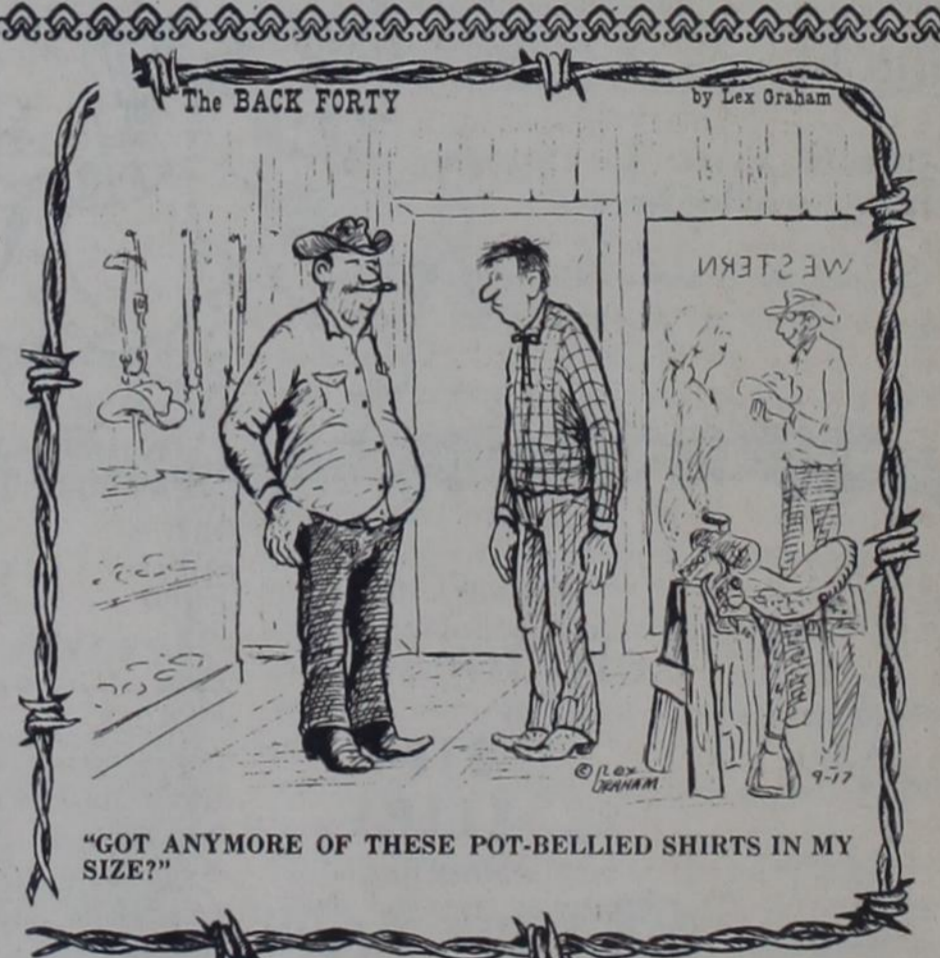
