

Mayor H.L. Killion to Seek Re-Election

H.L. Killion would like to announce to the citizens of Rising Star that he is running for re-election for Mayor of Rising Star.

Citizens I have been Mayor for 2 years and was on the City Council for 2 years and have lived in the city of Rising Star for many years. Being aware of the many problems the city has had in the past with the Gas-Water-Sewer Systems, I have focused my attention on improving these systems to meet the Railroad Commission and the Health Department requirements that if all the repairs we have been doing in the past four years were not done the city of Rising Star would have had very serious problems.

There have been many-many small municipalities in the state of Texas due to the fact that they did not take the problems in hand and work with these problems. The city utilities were turned over to Major Corp. where no control could be forced on the prices of the utilities; therefore I feel that I have done my very best as Mayor to see that the city remained independent on itself.

The major problem now that all construction is near completion and the most asked about is the streets. I am at this time and have been focusing my attention to this serious problem. Daily I have been in contact with our engineer to work out a way that the city can afford to start repairs on the streets.

I am asking you as responsible citizens to take in mind that only due to the construction to the rehabilitation of our sewer system and new water system that this is the main reason our streets are in the

poor condition that they are in other than lack of maintenance in the past.

There is no way that the Federal government will make loans or even give grants on street repairs. Streets are a non-paying utility. I have done research on hopes that we could repair the streets at a minimum cost to the city. Citizens, there is no way that these streets can be repaired at no cost to the city or its citizens. This ideal must be someone's dream. I would hope that you would know that if the streets could be repaired at no cost that I would have already started these repairs.

As all citizens should know and be aware of that the City of Rising Star operates on a tight budget due to the great loss of gas we had in the past. In 1978 Ex-Mayor John Lee and council took this major problem in hand. We are still paying on this loss. Dynamic production of Dallas whom we buy our gas from have been very understanding to the fact that we were in poor financial condition. I have spent many hours on the phone and met with them several times on this problem.

I feel like I have done my very best at trying to improve and work out the many problems that the city is faced with daily.

Citizens I would like to be given the opportunity to be re-elected for a second term as Mayor. I personally feel that being familiar with all the construction due to the complexity of the contracts and F.M.H.A. Guidelines, I feel I would better represent the city than someone

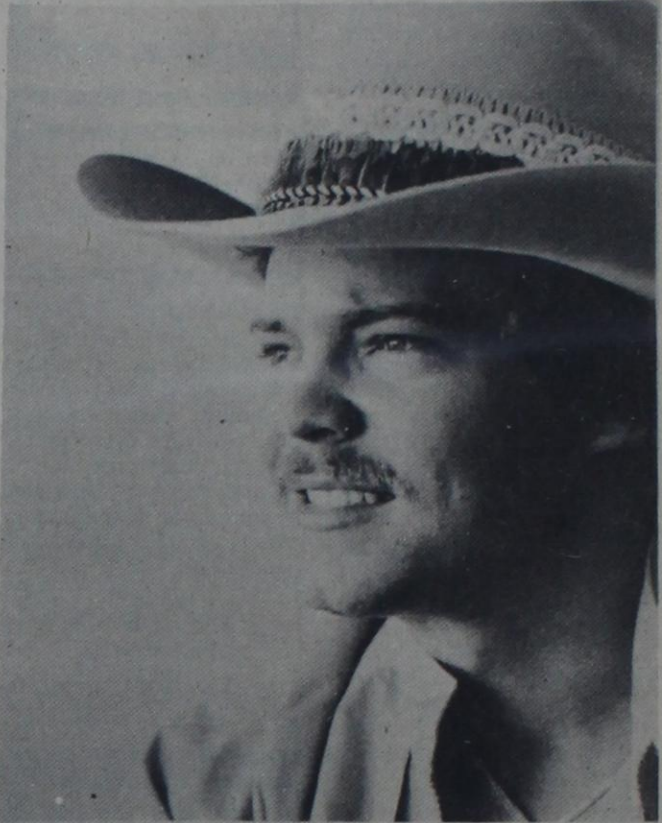

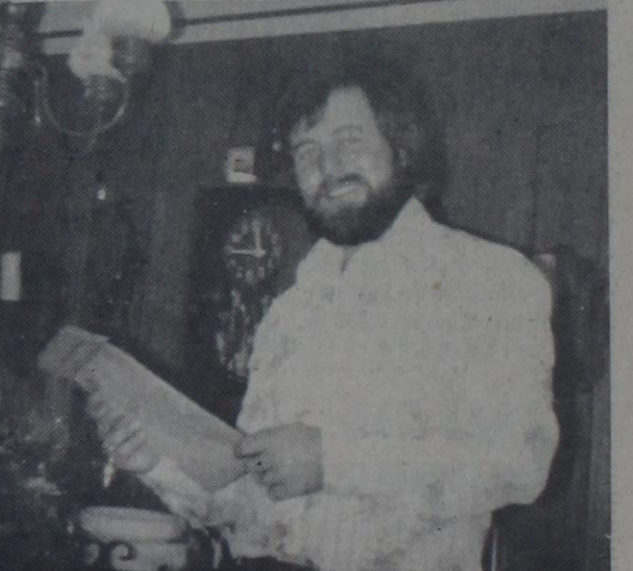

Houston Livestock Show

Houston--March 8, 1981--The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo closed out its most successful year ever with new records in every possible division of the world's largest livestock show and rodeo.

Show officials commented that "the support of the community is what made all of this possible. We were hoping for a good year, but this is just unbelievable. We had good weather, top competition, a great line-up of star entertainment and something for everyone in the entire family."

The 1981 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo drew more spectators than ever before. The total general attendance was 933,872, up some 3.36 per cent from the previous record high, set in 1980.

Rodeo attendance also broke record after record. Nine individual performance records were set on the way to the new total attendance figure of 604,339, including a new all-time record for indoor rodeo. Set Saturday night, March 7 by Charley Pride, Conway Twitty and Donna Fargo, the count was an unprecedented

46,877. This also marked the first time in Show history that the rodeo alone drew more than 600,000 spectators.

Most dramatic of all records broken were the prices paid for all junior market champion animals. The big new world's record price paid for the Grand Champion Steer. On Saturday, March 7, it was sold to long-time Show supporters Bill and Doris Williams for the phenomenal price of \$112,000. The previous high was \$110,000, paid last year in Houston.

Moments later the Reserve Grand Champion Steer sold for \$90,000, also a new world's record price. The total price paid for the 391 steers selling through the premium auction was \$1.68 million, all going to 4-H and FFA exhibitors. The Grand Champion Market Barrow sold for \$51,500, while the Reserve Grand Champion Barrow brought \$35,000, also a new world's record.

The Grand Champion Lamb brought \$60,000, a new world's record price, while the Reserve Grand Champion Lamb brought 141,000, also a new

world's record price. The Market Poultry Auction had started the entire cycle off to its new high peak, when the Grand Champion Pen of 5 Broilers brought \$33,000. The Reserve Pen of Broilers brought \$18,500.

The Grand Champion Turkey sold for \$20,000, and the Reserve Grand Champion Turkey brought \$18,000.

The preliminary total on all junior market auctions was \$2.88 million, up from \$2.2 million in 1980.

Once again, the Houston Livestock Show was the world's largest, drawing more than 29,000 livestock entries. Top competition filled the 22.3 acre livestock exhibition facilities for the run of the show.

During open show competition, independent breed associations held sales in conjunction with the Show. Their sales, plus the Show-sponsored Range Bull and Commercial Heifer Sale, brought \$3.2 million, slightly up from the 1980 totals.

With more than 900,000 spectators on the grounds during the run of the Show, the 300 plus commercial exhibitors and the Bill Hames Shows reported their best year ever.

Rodeo action helped to fill the Astrodome during the 15 performances of the Championship Rodeo. Some 836 professional rodeo cowboys and barrel racers pitted their skills against the clock and the rough stock supplied by the Cervi Championship Rodeo Company to give spectators the most exciting rodeo action in America today.

As has been already shown, commenting on chapters 38 and 39, he (Eze.) declared: This is Russia, Moscow and Tobolsk." Another important voice of the past is that Josephus. In his first book one chapter of his work? This Historian who lived almost two thousand years ago stated that the Scythians were called Magogites by the Greeks. Why is that important? The Scythians populated Russia. It is little wonder then that the weight of prophetic scholarship has gone with the conclusion that Russia is the chief aggressor named by

Ezekiel in this end-time war with Israel. The allies of Russia in that fierce conflict will be Persia (Iran and Iraq), Ethiopia, Libya, Gomer (Eastern Germany and Slovakia), and Togarmah (Turkey). Daniel added Egypt to the names of nations that will come against Israel and the final world dictator, so that the invasion includes attacks from the north and the south, as well as the prospect of trouble from the east (see Daniel 11: 40-44). Ezekiel explained: After many days thou shalt be visited: in the latter years thou shalt come into the land that is brought back from the sword, and is gathered out of many people, against the mountains of Israel, which have been always waste: but it is brought forth out of the nations, and they shall dwell safely all of them (Ezekiel 38:8). What a clear and up to date picture of Israel. She is without a doubt the land that is brought back from the sword-gathered out of many people-- a former wasteland--brought forth out of the nations. The ones to invade Israel will come with immense power from the air: "Thou shalt ascend and come like a storm, thou shalt be like a cloud to cover the land, thou and all thy bands, and many people with thee" (Ezek. 38:9). They will have full confidence of victory. And thou shalt say, I will go up to the land of unwallled villages; I will go to

them that are at rest, that dwell safely, all of them dwelling without walls, and having neither bars nor gates, To take a spoil, and to take a prey; to turn thine hand upon the desolate places that are now inhabited, and upon the people that are gathered out of the nations, which have gotten cattle and goods, that dwell in the midst of the land (Ezek. 38: 11, 12). More next week.

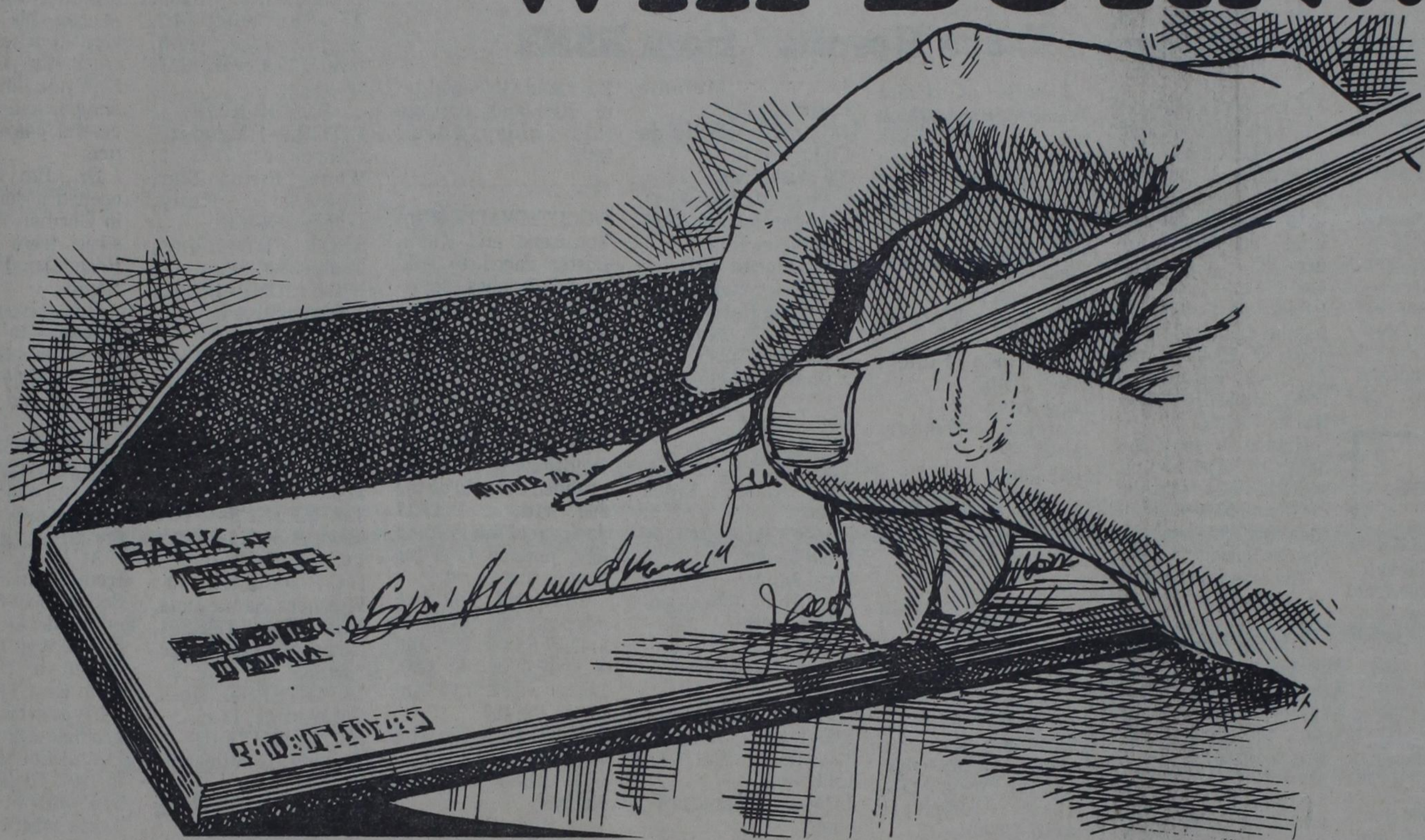

The venture is RAW Energy Corp., Weatherford, No.1 King-Humphrey, located on a 168-acre lease.

Drillsite is 660 feet from the south and east lines of Section 19, Block 13, H&TC Survey.

Tonk Valley Production Co., Graham, No.1-D Robertson is a planned 3,700-foot venture for the Desdemona, North (Conglomerate) Field eight miles northeast

of Gorman. Location is on a 20-acre unit, spotting 400 feet from the south and 720 feet from the east lines of Lot 21, League 1, McLennan CSL Survey.
