





Ex-Oak waging battle against cancer

COLUSA-Henry "Cotton" Pippen can sit on his front porch at night and eavesdrop on the conversations of coyotes, muskrats or frogs.

But the sound that is sweetest to Pippen, and which has given him new peace with his country surroundings, is the beating of his own heart.

Four months ago, Pippen, 68, a 20-game winner for the Oakland Oaks in the 1940s, felt pain in his legs. His ankles swelled. Gout, he thought.

It wasn't gout. X-rays showed Pippen had a spot on each lung. Cancer.

My father is much more ill than he is willing to admit to anyone. He has been undergoing weekly chemical treatment for cancer for some time now, and from the looks of it, this will be continuing for a long period of time, God willing.

A letter from a concerned daughter, Jackie Pippen Lawrence of Napa. A call to Cotton. "Sure, come on up," he said.

The Capital Outing Club, a private gun club which Pippen manages but doesn't own, is on a dirt road off Highway 20, eight miles outside Colusa and seven miles from Williams. It's northwest of Sacramento, flat, marshy rice land set off against the distant Buttes.

'I've lost all my hair, bald-headed like a rat, from all that chemotherapy," said Pippen, lifting his cap, unashamedly.

Thick white hair once topped Pippen's handsome features, giving him a nickname for life. The cotton's not so rich these days. His head and ears are scarred from the chemotherapy. His face is as craggy as the land he maintains. His strength is down, so is his weight. But Cotton Pippen always was a survivor.

"I saw the doctor last week in Sacramento," said Cotton. "He said, 'I've got a surprise for both of us.' I said, 'What is it, am I going to die?'

'He showed me some new X-rays. The spot has completely gone from the left lung. He said he could see it (the therapy) working on the right lung, because it's scarred, a good sign.

'I'd about to wear this table out," added Pippen, knocking on a favorite wooden table.

In 1943, to reach 20 victories for the only time in his 16-year career, Cotton Pippin won five games over the final two weeks of the season. He finished 20-15 for the fifth-place Oaks.

This surprised teammates in one sense. They thought Pippen needed two weeks to finish one game. He was known in the trade as a methodical pitcher.

"I didn't have enough to get them out, so I'd worry them to death," he said. "My pitches were slow, slower and slowest.

The concessionaires loved it when I pitched. Do you remember big Otto? He sold at the park. He'd say, 'Cotton, it looks like a big crowd today. I'd tell him not to worry. I'd keep for about four hours.

time out for war. He was just one character on a colorful team, wonderfully nicknamed: Catfish. Two Gun, Spider, Pine Tar and Sheriff. Managed by Casey. Laughs by the inning at San Pablo Avenue and Park Street.

'I was batting one day, when a pitch hit in front of the plate. It was a foot outside besides, but the ump got blocked out and called it a strike," recalled Pippen.

The Oaks' players were just as zany as their manager, especially the H,0 Boys-Pippen and Ralph "Pine Tar" Buxton.

They got that nickname at the Orinda Country Club, which turned over the club to the Oaks one new mound-fixed it up pretty good too." day when the team wasn't playing.

'Come on in, come on in.' I look at Buck, he looks at me. We're wearing sport clothes. I do a flip and a half off the board, Buck does a swan dive.

People thought we'd been drinking. We hadn't. But we had a few once we got out.'

During World War II, for financial reasons, the Oaks fired their groundskeeper. Hugh Luby, a player, was given the added responsibility.

Pippen and Buxton pitched a doubleheader one day. Both came away with big sores on their ankles, from continually stepping into a hole on the mound.

'Buck and I were sitting at Bellini's that night," said Cotton. "We asked Bep Bellini, the owner, if he had a pick and shovel. He did. We already had a rope, so we headed for the park.

We looped a rope over a telephone pole spike and over the fence we went. We flattened the mound, threw away the pitching rubber. When Luby came out the next day, he knew who had done it. But he never said a thing. He fixed up a

Pippen loved the Emeryville park, baseball's

"I may not get up four times," Waner replied. "I'll get you up four times," Dean countered. Dean had a shutout and a big lead working

the next day. He had struck out Waner three straight times entering the bottom of the ninth. Waner was fifth up that inning, so Dean struck out the first two batters, then walked the next two.

"Frankie Frisch, our manager, screamed at Diz, 'what in heck are you doing?'" said Pippin. "But Diz struck out Waner a fourth time, then screamed from the mound, 'Don't forget about the \$100, Paul.'

Who was Pippin's toughest batter?

"Man, they all wore me out," he answered, "but Ted Williams was the toughest.

"I struck him out three times out of four his first year (in the Pacific Coast League), because of the curve ball. Well, he paid kids that following winter to throw him nothing but curve balls. Throw him one after that and it was gone. He learned the curve ball in one winter.'

Cotton Pippen and his wife Lillian have much to be thankful for-two daughters, one son, four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren -not to mention Cotton's returning health.

"We came here to retire," said Cotton, who left bartending and hectic Bay Area living seven years ago for the quietude of Colusa County.

There are 15 private duck clubs on the same road as The Capital Outing Club, where Pippin works and lives. Billy Martin hunted for 10 days at the Capital last year. Martin is a friend of Lew Figone of El Cerrito, one of Capital's eight owners.

'Duck season lasts three months," said Cotton. "The rest of the time is just waiting for the season to open."

How do you pass the time between seasons?

"Just fishin' and froggin'," said John Hilty, Cotton's good friend who owns the Stone Creek Land Company hunting club down the road.

There was a flood three years ago after the 2047 Canal broke.


"It stopped one inch from my doorstep," said Cotton. "I caught a yellowcat (fish) standing right on my porch.

Cotton Pippin is content.

'You ought to see the sunsets around heresunsets you wouldn't believe," he said. "I'm also the best cribbage player in the county, bar none."

Cotton's sunrises have taken on new meaning. too. Every day he feels better.

'They say my hair will come back when I get off it (chemotherapy)," he said. said. "I just thank God I'll get well.'



"Every other night, it started on fire somewhere," he remembered. "I bet I put out 15 fires myself. I bet I started 15 too.

Henry Harold Pippen was raised on a ranch in Cisco, Tex., and was a four-sport letterman at Texas School of Mines in El Paso (now UTEP), which he attended for three years.

"It was a pretty good depression job, \$150 a month for going to school," he said. "But I had to play the four sports to get the \$150. I never opened a book. It was an outlaw school."

Fifty years ago, Cotton could sprint 100 yards in 98. He raced three times against world record holder Charlie Paddock, and beat him once, at a stock show in Ft. Worth.

Cotton signed a baseball contract with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1932. His major-league career added up to three years and a 5-16 record with the Carus, A's and Tigers.

Although with St. Louis a short time, he became friendly with Dizzy Dean.

'A little of him rubbed off on me," said Pippen. "He wasn't goofy; he did things on purpose He'd tell you one story, then tell another reporter the same story another way 30 minutes later. Good reading.'

Pippen was with Dean in a Pittsburgh restaurant the night Ol' Diz told Pirates' star Paul Waner, leading the league in hitting at the time, that he'd strike him out four times the next day.
