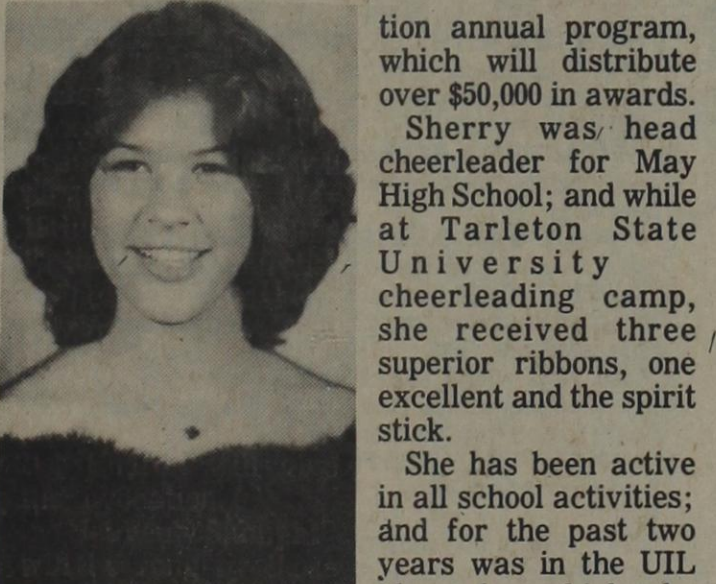
Baccalaureate And Commencement Exercises Announced For Rising Star High School

PEANUT PLANTING REQUIREMENTS Some Reminders

A. A farm must plant 71.5 percent of the effective allotment to be eligible to carry forward any undermarketings of quota peanuts.

B. A farm must plant 53.63 percent of the effective allotment to be eligible to transfer quota from the farm at harvest time.

RELEASE - REAPPORTIONMENT OF PEANUTS

The final date to release unwanted peanut acreage and quota to the County Committee or to request additional acreage and quota from the County Committee is May 15, 1980.

CONTRACTS FOR ADDITIONAL PEANUTS

This office has received Form CCC1005 to be used for contracting additional peanuts. The CCC1005 must be signed by the producer, operator (if different from the producer) and handler by JUNE 16, 1980.

TRANSFER OF PEANUT ACREAGE AND QUOTA

Transfer of peanut acreage and quota may be made through June 16, 1980. This office maintains a list of those interested in transferring to or from the farm. Transfers must be signed by all persons by the final date.

Church of Christ

WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES?

Jon N. Bailey

QUESTION: Who is a disciple of Jesus Christ?

ANSWER: A "disciple" is a "learner, pupil, student, or adherent of a doctrine, disciple, or teacher". A disciple of Jesus Christ is one who learns, believes, and obeys the teachings of the Lord Jesus. A disciple of Jesus Christ also seeks to imitate the actions and attitudes of his Lord, and become as much like him as possible.

Jesus commanded his apostles to preach the gospel to the whole world (Mk.16:15-16), and make disciples of all the nations. "Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you" (Mt.28:19-20). The main verb of this commission is "Make disciples". The way in which they were to "make disciples" is described by the two participial phrases, "baptizing them..." and "teaching them to observe all...". Disciples of Jesus Christ, therefore, have been baptized and taught to observe all the commandments of the Lord.

Disciples of Jesus Christ learn and follow the word of the Lord. Jesus said, "If ye abide in my word, then are ye truly my disciples; and ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:31-32). True disciples also follow the words which the apostles wrote in all the New Testament scriptures, for they, too, are "the commandments of the Lord" (1 Cor. 14:37).

Disciples of Jesus Christ abound in love one for another. Jesus taught, "A new commandment I give unto you, that ye love one another; even as I have loved you, that ye also love one another. By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:34-35).

Disciples of Jesus Christ bear abundant fruit for God. Jesus said, "Herein is my father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; and so shall ye be my disciples" (John 15:8). As disciples, we must bear "the fruit of the Spirit" (Gal.5:22-23), "the fruit of the light" (Eph.5:9), "the fruit of righteousness" (Heb.12:11), etc. We must especially bear the fruit of new disciples as we convert the lost to Christ.

Disciples of Jesus Christ are totally committed to him with their love, devotion, dedication, and service. Jesus taught, "If any man cometh unto me, and hateth not his own father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple. Whosoever doth not bear his own cross, and come after me, cannot be my disciple...whosoever he be of you that renounceth not all that he hath, he cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:26,27,33). Jesus must reign as Lord of your life, or you cannot be his disciple.

Many claim to be "Christian", yet they have never become disciples of Jesus Christ. In truth, a person is a Christian only if he is a disciple of the Lord (Acts 11:26). Are you a disciple of Jesus Christ?

Then the love of Christ will rule in the heart, bringing into captivity to the Savior the secret springs of action. The hasty, easily roused temper will be soothed and sub-

dued by the oil of Christ's grace.....

In humble, grateful dependence he who has been given a new heart relies upon the help of Christ. He reveals in his life the fruit of righteousness. He once loved himself. The sins he once loved he now hates. Firmly and resolutely he follows in the path of holiness. E.G. White

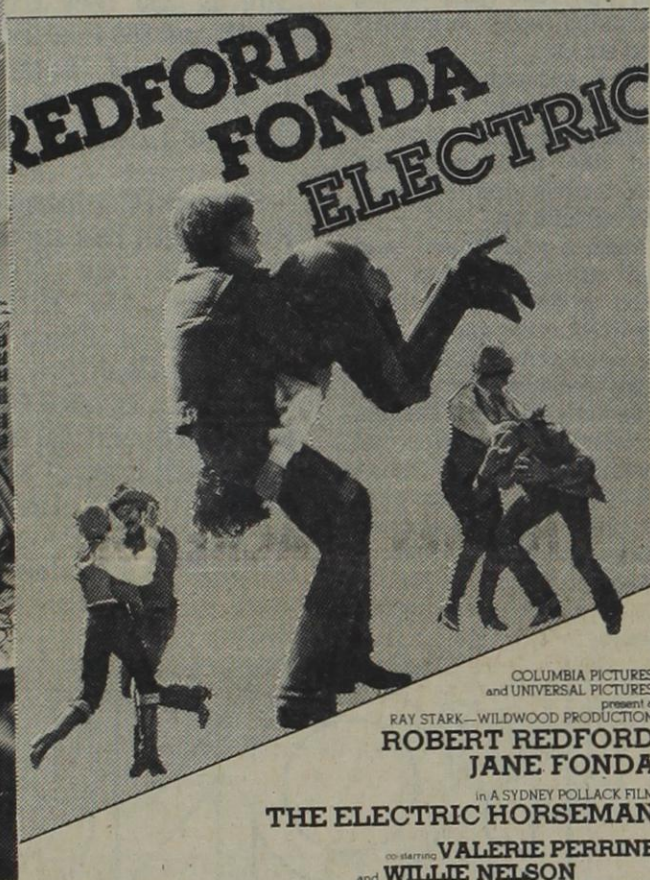

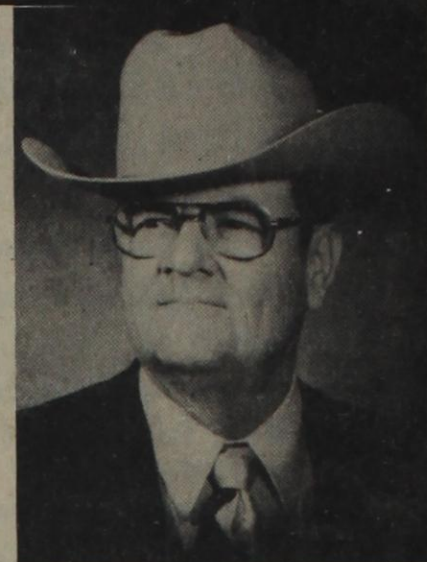
