

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

Good new: fewer pregnant women are taking alcohol. Researchers at the Centers for Disease Control found that only 20 percent of pregnant women were drinking in 1988, down from 32 percent in 1985.

Even mild exercise can lower blood pressure for more than 12 hours, researchers found at the University of Connecticut School of Medicine. Small study got dramatic results.

New device simplifies the surgical removal of precancerous lesions and stems the spread of a sexually transmitted viral disease. Electrified wire loop, introduced from Britain and Canada, removes lesions better than a biopsy and causes no pain or scar.



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

1992 Peanut Quotas: Notices of 1992 peanut quotas were mailed to all farms on March 18. These notices reflected a decrease factor of .993207 in the basic quota due to a reduction in the national quota. This notice also reflected an allocation of undermarketings of up to 10% of the farm's basic quota provided that the farm's quota in the prior year was undermarketed.

Peanut poundage Quota Notices should be mailed by the end of March and will reflect an additional allocation to individual farms of undermarketings credited to the farm not previously allocated. These notices will constitute all poundage quotas to be allocated to Eastland County farms for the 1992 crop year.

Transfers of quota will be processed after the second notice allocating undermarketings is mailed.

Peanut Considered Produced Credit: Producers who spring transfer by lease to different operators or owners can receive considered produced credit for the pounds trnsferred provided that the receiving farm has not spring leased or released quota in any two of the previous three vears. Producers who

spring transfer to the same operators or owners can recieve considered produced credit for the pounds transferred provided that the receiving farm produces the receiving farm's basic quota and the transferred quota. These type transfers do not have a year restriction imposed as on leases to diffeent operators or owners. 1992 Wool and Mohair:

Ownership requirements for participation in the Wool and Mohair Price Support Programs require that sheep or goats from which the wool or mohair is sold shall be owned 30 calendar days by the producer or producers before an application for payment can be filed. A change for 1992 requires that in commuity property states where sheep or goats are community property, both husband's and wife's names shall be shown on sales documents as sellers, both names shall be shown as sellers on the application for payment and both signatures are required on the application for payment. New Achievement Tests Hit Rising Star Schools

In response to sections 21.551 and 21.559 of the Texas Education Code, beginning with the 1991-1992 school year, the state will administer, score and report the results of a nationally standardized norm-referenced test in Grades 3-11. Subject areas included in the assessment are reading, language, mathematics, social studies and science.

In February 1991 the State Board of Education authorized a contract with The Riverside Publishing Company to provide national comparative data for students in Grades 3-11. The program established by this contract, the Norm-referenced Assessment Program for Texas (NAPT), is scheduled to continue through the 1994-1995 school year. Each year of the normreferenced testing program, a new test form will be administered; there will be no overlap of test items among any forms. The State Board of Education has also authorized a contract with The Psychological Corporation to provide scoring, reporting and other related services for these tests.

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

WIC Program Can Serve More Than Half Million

Each month, more than half a million pregnant women, babies, and children younger than five now can benefit from the state's Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC). The program provides free, nutritious foods, nutrition education and counseling, as well as general information and referrals to other health

and social services. Debra Stabeno, chief of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of WIC Nutrition, said, "The Texas WIC program has expanded in the past year because we have begun highly effective cost-containment measures and because the cost of WIC

foods has not risen as quickly as projected. The savings allow us to serve more eligible participants."

Stabeno said that the combined factors have produced an over-all increase of nearly \$33.4 million dollars for the program. "We have for years ag-

gressively sought to extend services throughout the state. Just five years ago, we were only able to serve 182 of Texas' 254 counties, about 21.2 percent of the state's eligible clients. With improvements in the program, we now serve all Texas counties, and can reach more than 33 percent of those who are eligible," Stabeno

Among the state WIC programs, only California now serves more clients than Texas.

By the year 2000, WIC expects to be able to serve at least 80 percent of eligible applicants anywhere in the state, Stabeno added. "To do that, we need to dispel some public misunderstanding about who is eligible for WIC. Many lower income pregnant women, their infants and children younger than five are eligible - if our nutritionists find they have nutritional need.

A large portion of our clients learn about the program when they apply for other public assistance, such as AFDC, Food Stamps, and unemployment benefits, but benefits of WIC are better other prospective clients may not realize that WIC may be available for them also," she explained.

Working families, college students and families of enlisted military personnel are among groups who may not know that WIC is an important resource. Stabeno said that WIC, now 18 years old, "has a responsibility to serve every eligible woman and child it can."

She said that even many working families, unable to stretch their resources, cannot afford nutritious foods. Others know little about choosing the best foods to ensure healthful diets for their babies and children. "WIC serves as a safety net for these people," she said, adding that, beginning in April, a family of four can have an annual income up to \$25,808, and still be eligible for the program.

Although the main

health for newborns and young children during critical periods of their growth, the program also saves state and federal dollars that otherwise might have to be spent on hospitalization and other health care for the very

Stabeno said that a recent nationwide study showed that pregnant women in the Medicaid program who participated in WIC had fewer premature births than did other low-income mothers who did not participate in WIC. The babies of the WIC participants were heavier and healthier.

The Bureau of WIC Nutrition operates a tollfree information line in Austin to explain WIC eligibility and services, and to help applicants locate their nearest WIC clinic. That phone number is 1-800-WIC-FOR-U (1-800-942-3678.)





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
