## Pavilion Is Going Up Excellence Excels in Local High School





## Petition Filed for Another Election

A petition for a new election for Eastland County Commissioner Pct. 3 was filed by Dick Burgess March 24 in 91st District Court.

The petition is styled Dick Burgess vs. L. T. Owen, who is the incumbent Commissioner of Pct. 3. Saul Pullman is the Attorney for Burgess.

Burgess and Owen are opponents for the Democratic nominee for Commissioner in the Party Primary Election held

March 10.

The suit alleges, in part, that in the election for Pct. 3, 414 votes appeared to have been cast for Contestant (Burgess) and 426 votes appeared to have been cast for the Contestee (Owen), as shown by the results of said election.

It goes to say that "A recount was requested by the Contestant and was duly and legally held on the 16th day of March, 1992. That at the recount

413 votes appeared to have been cast for the Contestant, and 426 votes appeared to have been cast for the Contestee, as shown by the canvass of said recount."

The grounds stated for the petition are "that among the votes counted for the contestee upon the canvass of the election, there were numerous votes cast illegally for the reason that many persons casting their vote were not

# Eastland County Convention Proves The Democrats On Happy Days Again Theme

Over 50 delegates and guests met in the 91st District Courtroom for the County Democrat Convention which was held in even-numbered years on the third Saturday following the Primary.

Eastland County Chairman, Mrs. Scott Bailey, opened the meeting by asking Roy Cartee to pronounce an invocation. Judge J. V. Heysler led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

The Convention delegates then elected Saul Pullman as the convention chair and June Hicks as the convention secretary.

Pullman appointed County Judge Scott Bailey, chairman, Heysler, and County Treasurer Ruth Hart as the Creditors Committee. Sheriff Ronnie White, chairman, Clarence Dill and Phyllis Halford as the Platform and Resolutions Committee. Ann Murray, chair-

man, District Attorney Leslie Vance, and Nolan Ritter, Sr. as the Nominations of Delegates Committee.

Cartee addressed the convention on problems of obtaining long-term health care. Donna Driskill told the group about the Ranger School's REACH program. Doris Smith and other Ranger delegates extended invitations to all people to attend the Ranger Prison Proposal meeting on March 30. Robert Tucker spoke to the group about maintaining party support and unity. Olin Odom III addressed the group about concerns of financing Higher Education. Hicks addressed the concerns of inability of the governor to satisfy Advocacy, Inc. with State School closures. Odom, Vance, Pullman and Hicks all expressed concerns of Senator Bob Glasgow and Representa-

tive John Cook having opponents from large urban areas. All requested support both by volunteering help and financial support to enable Glasgow and Cook to defeat large, urban area opponents who would govern Eastland County from Fort Worth area.

Resolutions presented were for an area prison, smoke-free public buildings, and that successful nominees and elected officials be required to support the party. All resolutions passed and will be presented to the State Convention.

Delegates to State Convention to be held in Houston on June 5 were announced. Due to the number of ballots cast in the 1990 gubernatorial election, Eastland County was allotted 16 delegates and alternates. That being 1 delegate/alternate for every 300 ballots cast for Governor Ann Richards, Pullman, Hicks, Vance, Heysler, Murray, Odom, White, Truman Kirk, Gregory McDonald, Kenneth Dean Halford, Autero Comancho, Lee Starr, Phyllis Halford, Kenneth Halford, Helen Heysler and Donna Driscoll will represent Eastland County Democrats in Houston.

The secretary, after calling the roll, introduced Carolyn Foster, a visitor from Attorney General Dan Morales' office. Foster visited her parents of Lake Leon just so she could attend the convention.

Judge Bailey then entertained a motion that Pullman be elected permanent chairman to represent Eastland County at the State Convention.





# SSI Program Makes Special Provisions For The Blind

Special provisions can help people who are blind or near blind qualify for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments, said Glyn Hammons, district manager in Abilene. "And there are also other provisions to help people who are blind and already receiving SSI return to work and still receive SSI benefits or Medicaid protection," he noted.

SSI makes monthly payments to people 65 and older and to people with disabilities at any age (including children) whose income and assets are below a certain level. And people who receive SSI usually qualify for Medicaid and food

stamps, too.

If local Social Security officials determine that individuals meet the eligibility standards for blindness, those individuals can receive SSI payments for up to six months while they wait for a formal decision by a state Disability Determination Service. If they're later found not to meet the SSI definition of blindness, they do not have to pay back any money.

Other provisions within the law also help people with disabilities receive SSI while they're working. For example, when figuring a disabled person's earnings, SSI does not count any work expenses directly related to the disability.

"These exclusions are important because the SSI payment is offset by other income a person has," Hammons explained.

People who are blind receive additional exclusions. SSI excludes most of their work expenses (not just those related to their disability.) Some examples include Federal, State, and Social Security taxes; routine transportation costs to and from work; and union dues.

People who are blind also can ask for special handling of any letters sent by Social Security about changes in their SSI.

"At their request, we can either telephone them or send the letters by certified mail," Hammons said.

Good news: fewer pregnant women are taking alcohol. Researchers at the Centers for Disease Control found that only 20 percent of pregnant women were drinking in 1988, down from 32 percent in 1985.

Even mild exercise can lower blood pressure for more than 12 hours, researchers found at the University of Connecticut School of Medicine. Small study got dramatic results.

New device simplifies the surgical removal of precancerous lesions and stems the spread of a sexually transmitted viral disease. Electrified wire loop, introduced from Britain and Canada, removes lesions better than a biopsy and causes no pain or scar.

Some pediatricians suggest that acetaminophen - not aspirin - should be used for those under 21. Excessive aspirin use by children has been linked to Reye's syndrome, a dangerous complication of viral diseases like flu and chickenpox. Convulsions and vomiting are danger signs.

**HIGHLIGHTS**

Capitol eyes last week focused on Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, criticized by the news media for using state phones as campaign manager for Democratic presidential front-runner Bill Clinton. Speculation was rife on both sides of the political fence.

The Texas Republican Party called on federal authorities and the Travis County district attorney to investigate illegalities by Mauro and his staff on Clinton's behalf.

Meanwhile, Texas Democrats worried whether Clinton, who won the Texas primary last month, would keep or dump Mauro.

Mauro apologized, calling it "stupidity" on his part, and his office began cooperating with the Travis County probe.

But he squelched rumors of being dumped; Mauro hosted a Clinton fund-raiser in Austin

which raised about \$100,000.

The Texas dollars will pay for Clinton's media ads in this week's New York primary, where a big win could possibly sew up the nomination.

**Is Mauro Safe?**

If Clinton wins in New York, he will owe Mauro for victories in two big states; without even considering their years-long friendship, Clinton is not likely to reward Mauro by firing him.

In fact, look for Mauro to be high on the list of names to play crucial roles in a Clinton administration.

Republicans are still pushing for a federal probe, putting little faith in the Travis County courthouse officials controlled in part by liberal Democrats.

That failing, Republicans will almost certainly target Mauro when he is up for re-election in 1994,

but it better be a stronger candidate than the GOP has served up in the past.

**Perot's Campaign Phones**

Speaking of campaign phones, Texas billionaire H. Ross Perot said the toll-free numbers he set up to get signatures on his petition to run for president is taking 90,000 calls per hour.

Perot told CBS he has 100 open lines and will add more.

Seeking to add his name as a third candidate for president, an independent, Perot faces staggered deadlines in the various states, the first being May 11 in his home state Texas.

**Electronic Welfare Card**

State government is preparing to test an electronic welfare benefits card—like a welfare credit card—this summer, which Comptroller John Sharp thinks will reduce fraud and save \$10 million annually.

Plans are to start a six-months' test this summer for services ranging from food stamps to aid for dependent children.

Recipients will use a credit card at grocery stores; one good effect may be to stop the use of food stamps as currency for drugs and sex.

**National Guard**

**Cuts**  
Proposed federal cuts to the national reserve force will trim \$43 million annually from the Texas National Guard as the Pentagon seeks to save \$20 billion over the next five years.

Capt. John Stafford, spokesman for the Texas National Guard in Austin, said individual guardsmen will not lose their jobs if they are willing to re-train.

**Ellis Now Lobbyist**  
State Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, has been hired by the Mexican government to lobby Congress for their interests in the North American Free Trade Agreement.

Heran the Washington, D.C. office of the late Congressman Mickey Leland before his own election to the state senate.

The proposed pact would dissolve trade restrictions between the U.S., Mexico and Canada.

**Other Highlights**

• Texas Lottery director Nora Linares promised the Hispanic Women in Leadership conference she will hire more minority workers than any other state agency, more than 20 percent.

• Gov. Ann Richards killed a proposal to close the state school which is the largest employer in Mexia: "I cannot destroy a town," she said.

• A grand jury declined to indict former Texas

Department of Commerce director Bill Taylor on charges of fiscal wrongdoing used by Richards to sweep clean the appointments by her predecessor, Bill Clements.

• Meanwhile, a second group of former agency employees, also hired under Clements, has filed a federal lawsuit against Richards, claiming they were fired because they were Republicans.

• State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison ended her agency's practice of cashing personal checks for state lawmakers. Traditionally, the agency warned the lawmakers of insufficient funds, allowing him/her time to cover them without a penalty.

• Texas Libertarians say Ross Perot's presidential bid would hurt their party's top candidate, Andre Marrou, but would help down-ballot Libertarians because Perot's money will get out the vote.

• Gov. Richards appointed two judges elected in the March 10 primary to fill temporary seats created by resignations. Susan Larson of El Paso was appointed to the 8th Court of Appeals; Bill Peek of Texarkana was appointed judge of the 202nd District Court in Bowie County.

**Sharp Announces Spring Taxpayer Seminar April 6**

"Texan's shouldn't have to contact Austin when they need to have a tax question answered," State Comptroller John Sharp says, announcing that his office will conduct a free seminar on state taxes in Abilene on Monday, April 6, 1992.

that can be useful in the future," said Sharp.

## ASCS News

**1992 Annual Program Signup:** Signup for participating in the 1992 Wheat, Feed Grain and Cotton Programs continues through April 17. Advance payments equal to 40% of the estimated deficiency payments can be requested at signup. In order to better meet the needs of the county, the nongrazing date for ACR and CU for PAY has been changed to June 1 through October 31.

**Failed Small Grains:** Producers who have program crops that fail due to drought, freeze, flood or other conditions beyond their control should file a failed acreage report before making other use of the crop. ASCS must inspect the crop before disbursement in order to receive disaster credit, and planted and considered planted credit.

**Final Planting Dates:** The final normal planting dates for program pur-

poses are: corn, April 30; grain sorghum, June 20; cotton, May 31.

Producers unable to plant by these dates due to reasons beyond their control should file for prevented planting credit within 15 days of the final planting date.

**1991 Crop Loans:** The final dates to request CCC Price Support Loans on 1992 crops are: March 31 for wheat, oats, barley and rye; and May 31 for grain sorghum and corn.

Additional information is available from this office.

**1992 Peanut Quotas:** Notices of 1992 peanut quotas were mailed to all farms on March 18. These notices reflected a decrease factor of .993207 in the basic quota due to a reduction in the national quota. This notice also reflected an allocation of undermarketings of up to 10% of the farm's basic quota provided that the farm's quota in the prior year was undermarketed.

**Peanut Poundage Quota** Notices should be mailed by the end of March and will reflect an additional allocation to individual farms of undermarketings credited to the farm not previously allocated. These notices will constitute all poundage quotas to be allocated to Eastland County farms for the 1992 crop year.

Transfers of quota will be processed after the second notice allocating undermarketings is mailed.

**Peanut Considered Produced Credit:** Producers who spring transfer by lease to different operators or owners can receive considered produced credit for the pounds transferred provided that the receiving farm has not spring leased or released quota in any two of the previous three years. Producers who

spring transfer to the same operators or owners can receive considered produced credit for the pounds transferred provided that the receiving farm produces the receiving farm's basic quota and the transferred quota. These type transfers do not have a year restriction imposed as on leases to different operators or owners.

**1992 Wool and Mohair:** Ownership requirements for participation in the Wool and Mohair Price Support Programs require that sheep or goats from which the wool or mohair is sold shall be owned 30 calendar days by the producer or producers before an application for payment can be filed. A change for 1992 requires that in community property states where sheep or goats are community property, both husband's and wife's names shall be shown on sales documents as sellers, both names shall be shown as sellers on the application for payment and both signatures are required on the application for payment.

**Reporting Deadline, May 1:** The final date to certify to planted acreage of wheat, oats and barley is May 1. ACR and CU for pay must be reported by this date if small grain is used for cover. Report of acreage will be accepted for all planted acreages in order for producers to maintain compliance with the sodbuster provisions and to establish a record of crop history.

Special emphasis is being placed on the importance of reporting all cropland, regardless of use to be eligible for benefits.

The petition lists 31 names of individuals who are said to be in that group.

It continues by saying that the number of illegal votes is greater than the number of votes necessary to change the outcome of the election.

The Contestant (Burgess) requests the court to declare the March 10 election void and order a new election for Eastland

County Commissioner Pct. 3.

L. T. Owen is cited to appear, and notified to file an answer to the petition. He is expected to file his answer soon.

Reports are that under the State Election Code a Judge who resides in Eastland County cannot decide on this case. The Judge who hears the suit will have several options; he can reverse the results of the March 10 election for Commissioner, he can throw out the appeal by Burgess, or call for a new election.

# New Achievement Tests Hit Rising Star Schools

In response to sections 21.551 and 21.559 of the Texas Education Code, beginning with the 1991-1992 school year, the state will administer, score and report the results of a nationally standardized norm-referenced test in Grades 3-11. Subject areas included in the assessment are reading, language, mathematics, social studies and science.

In February 1991 the State Board of Education authorized a contract with The Riverside Publishing Company to provide national comparative data for students in Grades 3-11. The program established by this contract, the Norm-referenced Assessment Program for Texas (NAPT), is scheduled to continue through the 1994-1995 school year. Each year of the norm-referenced testing program, a new test form will be administered; there will be no overlap of test items among any forms. The State Board of Education has also authorized a contract with The Psychological Corporation to provide scoring, reporting and other related services for these tests.

This year's NAPT tests will be administered the week of April 6 according to the administration guidelines outlined in the manual. In order that all

appropriate students may be tested, make-up test sessions are encouraged and must be completed during the week of April 6.

**Rising Star Elementary will administer tests Monday, April 6, through Wednesday, April 8. High School will begin Tuesday, April 7, and finish Thursday, April 9.**

NAPT and the criterion-referenced testing program (TAAS) are designed to provide different kinds of information.

NAPT, a norm-referenced test (NRT), can be used to compare the achievement of Texas students with that of stu-

dents across the nation. This assessment program measures a range of skills, from basic knowledge to the use of higher-order thinking skills. Skills tested by NAPT represent curricula in schools across the nation in the subject areas of reading, language, mathematics, social studies and science.

TAAS, a criterion-referenced test (CT), is used to measure how well students in Texas have mastered the Texas essential elements at a particular grade. The TAAS program, which assesses a wide range of skills in reading, writing and mathematics, emphasizes problem solving and



\*\$84,000 to study why people fall in love.

\*\$1 million to study bicycling and walking safety.

\*\$160,000 to study food gathering habits of the Ache Tribe in Paraguay.

\*\$50,000 to prove that sheepdogs do, in fact, protect sheep.

\*\$46,000 to determine how long it takes to cook breakfast eggs.

\*\$170,000 to fund a Dunkin Donuts store in Lawton, Okla.

\*\$6.1 million in the search for extraterrestrial life.

\*\$90,000 to study the social and behavioral aspects of vegetarianism.

\*\$350,000 to renovate one of three Congressional Beauty Salons.

\*\$6 million to upgrade the Senate subway system which runs just two blocks from Senate offices to Capitol.

\*\$219,592 to teach college students how to watch television.

\*\$2,500 to investigate the causes of rudeness, lying and cheating on the tennis courts.




Kevin Bacon as an inmate linked to both men, British actor Gary Oldman as Oswald, and Sissy Spacek as Garrison's wife.

Even the worst critics of "JFK" give it credit for being an awesome achievement technically. And the more they criticize it, the larger the crowds at the box office.


For the Kennedy mystique is still alive - along with endless speculation about who is responsible for his death.

## WIC Program Can Serve More Than Half Million

Each month, more than half a million pregnant women, babies, and children younger than five now can benefit from the state's Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC). The program provides free, nutritious foods, nutrition education and counseling, as well as general information and referrals to other health and social services.

Debra Stabeno, chief of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of WIC Nutrition, said, "The Texas WIC program has expanded in the past year because we have begun highly effective cost-containment measures and because the cost of WIC

foods has not risen as quickly as projected. The savings allow us to serve more eligible participants."

Stabeno said that the combined factors have produced an over-all increase of nearly \$33.4 million dollars for the program.

"We have for years aggressively sought to extend services throughout the state. Just five years ago, we were only able to serve 182 of Texas' 254 counties, about 21.2 percent of the state's eligible clients. With improvements in the program, we now serve all Texas counties, and can reach more than 33 percent of those who are eligible," Stabeno said.

Among the state WIC programs, only California now serves more clients than Texas.

By the year 2000, WIC expects to be able to serve at least 80 percent of eligible applicants anywhere in the state, Stabeno added. "To do that, we need to dispel some public misunderstanding about who is eligible for WIC. Many lower income pregnant women, their infants and children younger than five are eligible - if our nutritionists find they have nutritional need.

A large portion of our clients learn about the program when they apply for other public assistance, such as AFDC, Food Stamps, and unem-

ployment benefits, but other prospective clients may not realize that WIC may be available for them also," she explained.

Working families, college students and families of enlisted military personnel are among groups who may not know that WIC is an important resource. Stabeno said that WIC, now 18 years old, "has a responsibility to serve every eligible woman and child it can."

She said that even many working families, unable to stretch their resources, cannot afford nutritious foods. Others know little about choosing the best foods to ensure healthful diets for their babies and children. "WIC serves as a safety net for these people," she said, adding that, beginning in April, a family of four can have an annual income up to \$25,808, and still be eligible for the program.

Although the main

benefits of WIC are better health for newborns and young children during critical periods of their growth, the program also saves state and federal dollars that otherwise might have to be spent on hospitalization and other health care for the very young.

Stabeno said that a recent nationwide study showed that pregnant women in the Medicaid program who participated in WIC had fewer premature births than did other low-income mothers who did not participate in WIC. The babies of the WIC participants were heavier and healthier.

The Bureau of WIC Nutrition operates a toll-free information line in Austin to explain WIC eligibility and services, and to help applicants locate their nearest WIC clinic. That phone number is 1-800-WIC-FOR-UT (1-800-942-3678).

Add lemon juice and mushrooms. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 20 minutes or until tender. Serve over rice; garnish with parsley. Refrigerate leftovers.

2 cups flour  
4 eggs  
2 t. baking powder  
2 cups grated carrots  
1 1/2 t. soda  
8.5 ozs. crushed pineapple, drained  
1 1/2 t. salt  
2 t. cinnamon  
1/2 cup nuts  
2 cups sugar  
3 1/2 ozs. coconut  
1 1/2 cups oil  
Sift together dry ingredients. Add oil and eggs; mix well. Add remaining 4 ingredients. Bake in 3 9-inch cake pans at 350 degrees F. for 35-40 minutes. Cool.

1/2 cup margarine  
1 t. vanilla  
8 ozs. cream cheese  
1 lb. powdered sugar  
Mix margarine, cream cheese, and vanilla until smooth. Add powdered sugar. Spread on cooled cake.


