Cats Vie for District Championship Friday

Another Wildcat Victory

The Rising Star Wildcats overpowered the Evant Elks 45-12 Friday, October 28, in district action, earning the Cats a 4-0 record in district play. The Cats are tied with Cross Plains for the District 16-A Championship.

The Cats' offense started slowly. Following a fumble on the Cats' first offensive series, the Elks had the ball on their own 31 yd. line. The Wildcat defense held, forcing the Elks to punt on 4th and 11. Again the Cats' offense roughed up the football giving the Elks the ball on the Wildcat 34 yd. line.

The defense refused to allow the Elks to capitalize on this turnover and Evant was forced to punt again. The Wildcat defense swarmed and Sophomore Donny Alcorn blocked the punt. It was Wildcats' ball on the Elk 34. With :22 left in the first quarter, Senior Stacy Green scored from the 1 yd. line. Green's PAT out of the hold of Lee DeLong was good and the Cats took the lead 7-0.

The second quarter saw the Wildcat defense again dominating the Elks. Evant decided to go for a first down on 4th & 1, but Senior Shawn Morrow made the crucial tackle and the Wildcats took over on their own 40 yd. line. Sophomore Jimmy Evans hit senior Reil Barron for a 25 yd. pass. After successfully fighting the Elk defender for the pass, Barron was hard to tackle. The offensive line opened the holes for the backs and with 7:23 left on the 2nd quarter clock, Junior Derrick White ran 4 yards for the TD. Once again, Green's PAT split the uprights and the score was 14-0 Wildcats favor.

With 3:24 left in the first half, Evant managed to elude tackles and scored on a 24 yd. pass play. The PAT was blocked and the score was Rising Star 14, Evant 6. The Wildcats then got down to serious play. This was the first touchdown an opponent had made against the Cats since district play began. Just 23 seconds of play later, Evans hit Barron on another long touchdown pass. Green's PAT was good and the score was 21-6.

The ensuing kickoff was a touchback giving Evant the ball on their own 20. Donny Alcorn had an excellent defensive game and came up with the fumble recovery on the 10 yd. line of the Elks. Three plays later, White ran 3 yds. for the TD, only 1:12 after the score. Green's kick for the PAT was true and the Cats led 28-6.

The Wildcat defense came up with another big play when Derrick White and Shawn Morrow teamed up to sack the quarterback on the Elks' 42 yd. line. With :10 left in the half, most teams would have been satisfied with a 22 point lead, but our aggressive Wildcat team. Derrick White's halfback pass to quarterback Jimmy Evans was good for a 19 yd. gain and with :03 left before the buzzer, Stacy Green kicked a 40 yd. field goal, his longest of the year. The half ended with the Cats leading the Elks 31-6.

The third quarter started out with another Evans to Barron touchdown pass. Just 1:63 into the 3rd quarter, Green's PAT was good again and the score was now 38-6, Rising Star.

Once again, the Wildcat defense held, forcing Evant to punt on 4th & 5. About the only problem the Wildcats had during the game was holding on to the football. On the next offensive series, the Cats coughed up the pigskin again giving the Elks the ball on their own 20 yd. line. The hard hitting Wildcats

returned the favor knocking the ball loose from an Elk back and recovering on the Elk 26 yd. line. However, there was another Wildcat fumble three plays later and the quarter ended with Evant recovering the ball on their own 20 yd. line.

The Wildcat defense consisting of tackles Bobby Flores and Derrick White; ends, Donny Alcorn and Alan Havens; outside linebackers, Kevin Bond and Larry Hollis; middle linebackers, Stacy Green and Toby Long; and the secondary, Brian Bailey, Reil Barron, and Lee DeLong; all did an outstanding job keeping the Evant Elks from capitalizing on the Wildcat fumbles.

This time, the Elks had the ball on the Wildcat 44 yd. line. They connected on a pass play and scored their second TD on the very next play. The run for the 2 points was no good and the Cats led 38-12. During the next offensive series, quarterback Jimmy Evans left the game with a knee injury and Wildcat Brandon Geye came in to lead the Wildcats. With 3:26 left in the game, Geye threw his first high school touchdown pass to Reil Barron. The pass was good for 32 yards and 6 points. Stacy Green's PAT was good and the Cats moved ahead 45-12. By this time, the referees had lost control of the game and it was showing signs of becoming a brawl. One of the Elk players took a swing at a Wildcat's head and was ejected from the game.

Stacy Green came up with a pass interception on the next play and ran the ball all the way back to the Evant 25 yd. line. A clipping penalty brought the ball back to the 50 and following 3 incomplete pass plays, the Cats were forced to punt for the only time during the game. When Evant punted three plays later, Reil Barron ran the ball 47 yds. for the TD, however, a clipping penalty brought the ball back to the 38 yd. line. Evant intercepted Geye's pass on the 25 and time ran out with the final score Rising Star 45, Evant 12.

This week, the Wildcats take on the Cross Plains Buffaloes for the District 16-A Championship. Both teams are 4 & 0 in district play and this showdown will determine the district champs. The Wildcats have been district runner-up the last two seasons and are determined to come away from this game as district champs. Cross Plains is equally determined as it's been 32 years since they have made the play-offs. Cross Plains dropped down from 2A last year and have the advantage in numbers (they have 45 players and we have 22) and size. But the Wildcats have the determination and endurance to make this a hard fought game. Please come to the pep rally Friday at 3:00 and to the Wildcat Stadium at 7:30 Friday night. The Wildcats have not lost a home game this year.

This is largely due to the tremendous support the team receives from the town. The stadium will be packed for this rivalry game, so come early to get a good seat and cheer the Wildcats on to Victory!

VOTE Tuesday Polls Open 7-7

The culmination of months (years?) of campaigning will come Tuesday when '88 General Election ballots are picked up by voters in the various voting precincts in Eastland County — and across the nation.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at nine voting sites in the County. The Rising Star voting will be at City Hall.

Absentee balloting has been heavy at the County Clerk's office and ends Friday at 5 p.m.

Qualified voters will be making decisions that will affect them for years to come.

At the top of course are the choices of Republicans George Bush and Dan Quayle for President, Vice President, or Democrats Michael S. Dukakis and Lloyd Bentsen for President and Vice President.

(And no, these combinations can not be split up.)

Moving down the extra big ballot, voters will find U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen challenged for that spot by Republican Beau Boulter. Sen. Bentsen, as all know, is running both for Vice President and his Senate Seat.

For State Railroad Commission, Jim Nugent (Democrat) is opposed by Republican Ed Emmett, and Incumbent Republican Kent R. Hance is challenged by Democrat Clint Hackney.

The hotly contested State Supreme Court races find Tom Phillips, Paul Murphy,

Nathan Hecht, Charles Ben Howell, Barbara G. Culver and Eugene A. Cook (all Republicans) opposed by Ted Robertson, Lloyd Doggett, Bill Kilgarlin, Raul A. Gonzalez, Jack Hightower and Karl Bayer, all Democrats.

For presiding judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Incumbent Mike McCormick (Democrat) is opposed by Republican David A. Berchelmann; and Democrat Charles Campbell is opposed by a Republican, but Democrat Chuck Miller is opposed by Republican Tim Rickhoff for another seat on that court.

Democrat Bill Hudson is opposed by Republican Donald Dorsett for the District 14 seat on the State School Board.

Incumbent Democratic State Senator Bob Glasgow is opposed by Republican Jesse Coffey.

State Rep. Jim Parker is unopposed as are 11th Appeals Court Chief Justice Austin McCloud and Justice Bud Amot. The 91st District Court Judge Jim Wright is unopposed as are County Sheriff Nominee Dee Hogan, and Incumbent County Tax Collector Nancy Trout.

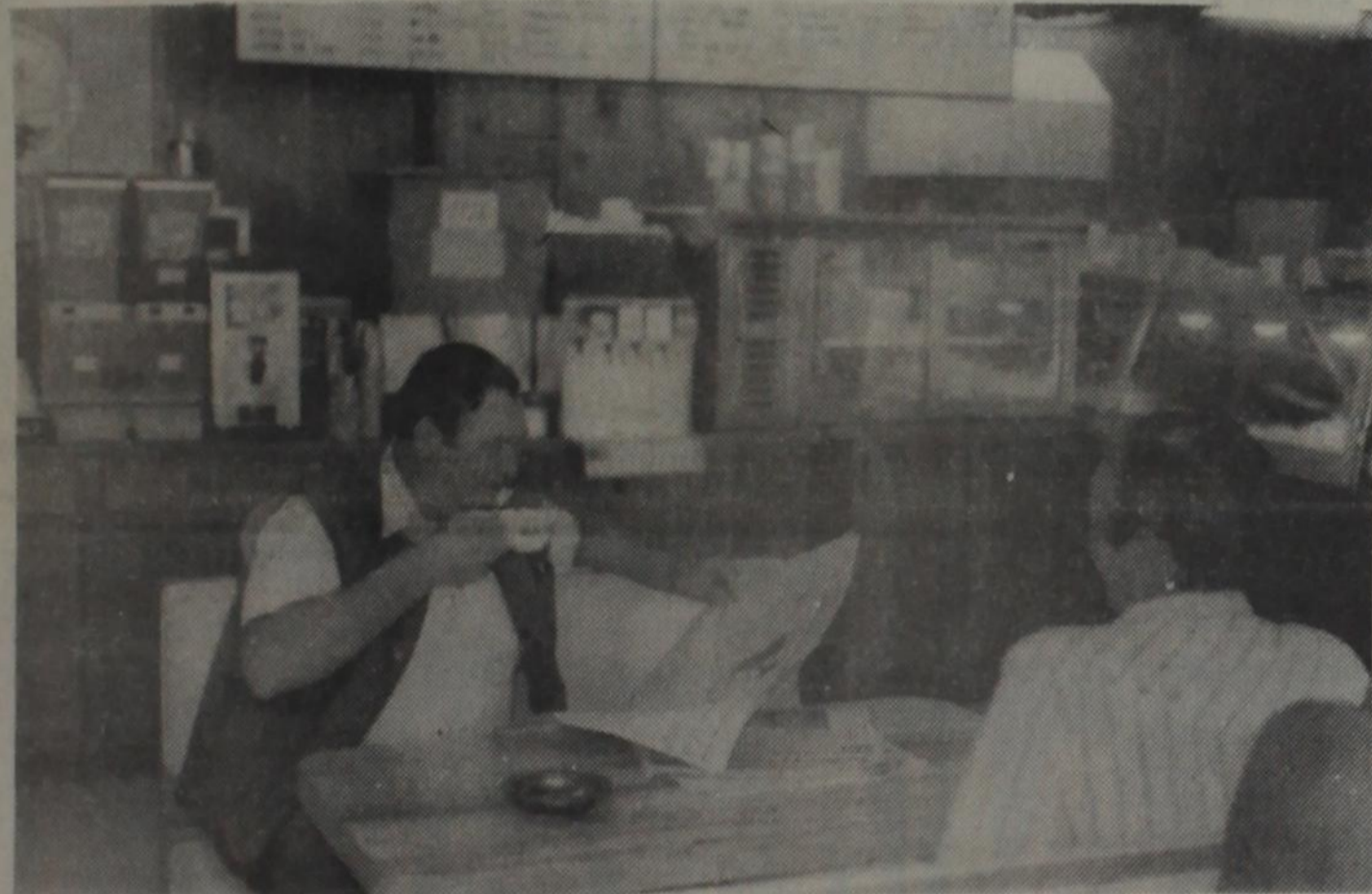
Rising Star County Commissioner L.T. Owen is unopposed for re-election, as is Rising Star Constable, Incumbent Gene Hicks.

And there are three proposed Constitutional Amendments on the ballots for which voters will mark either a "for" or "against" decision.

Mike Dukakis

Democratic Presidential nominee Michael Stanley Dukakis, 54, was born November 3, 1933, in Boston, Massachusetts, and raised in nearby Brookline.

His father, Panos Dukakis, was 16 years old when he came to America from Greece in the spring of 1912. His mother, Euterpe Boukis, was just 9 when she arrived the following year. Panos worked in the mills of Massachusetts, studying at night to complete high school and college. In just 12 years, he became the first Greek immigrant to graduate from Harvard Medical School.

Euterpe worked her way through Bates College in Maine, graduating Phi Beta Kappa. After facing rejection for teaching positions because of her foreign birth, she was accepted as a high school teacher in New Hampshire.

Panos and Euterpe were married a month before the stock market crash in 1929. For 50 years, Panos Dukakis practiced medicine in Boston, working six or seven days a week until he was 82, and delivering more than 3,000 babies.

Michael began his political career in the third grade, as president of his class. Known for his brilliance as a student, he graduated at the top of his class at elite Brookline High. He played varsity basketball at Brookline, ran cross-country, and was captain of the tennis team.

At Swarthmore College outside Philadelphia, Dukakis abandoned his pre-medicine studies after receiving a "D"

in physics, shifting to political science. He played baseball for Swarthmore, hitchhiked across country, and wrote for the school newspaper, "The Phoenix."

While an undergraduate, Dukakis learned Spanish when he won a fellowship for a summer at the University of San Marcos in Lima, Peru. He also spent a semester in Washington, D.C., at American University.

Immediately after graduating, Dukakis was drafted into the Army. He served much of his 21-month stint in Munsan, Korea. In 1957 he entered Harvard Law School, where he graduated with honors, 71st in a class of 468.

Dukakis won his first public election, becoming a town meeting member in Brookline, in 1959. A reform Democrat, he was elected to the Massachusetts House of Representatives in 1963.

He lost as a candidate for lieutenant governor in 1970. After serving as host for public television's "The Advocates," Dukakis returned to politics and was elected governor of Massachusetts in 1974. Shortly after his election, he found Massachusetts near bankruptcy. Dukakis cut social expenditures sharply and raised taxes to stem a huge deficit.

In 1978, he was defeated for the Democratic nomination for governor. After serving on the Harvard faculty, he again won the governorship in 1982 and was elected to a third term in 1986.

George Bush

Republican presidential nominee George Herbert Walker Bush, 64, was born in Milton, Massachusetts, on the southern edge of Boston, on June 12, 1924.

His father, the late Prescott Bush, served as U.S. Senator from Connecticut from 1952 to 1962.

Bush attended Phillips Academy in Andover, Massachusetts, graduating in June 1942. On his 18th birthday, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy Reserve. Bush received his wings and commission while still 18, becoming at the time the youngest pilot in the U.S. Navy.

From August 1942 to September 1945, Bush was on active duty. He flew torpedo bombers in the Pacific from the USS San Jacinto, receiving the Distinguished Flying Cross and three Air Medals for his service.

After World War II, Bush attended Yale University, graduating Phi Beta Kappa in 1948 with a B.A. in economics. He was captain of the Yale varsity baseball team.

Following his work for Dresser Industries as a trainee and salesman in Texas and California from 1948 to 1950, Bush was co-founder of a small oil royalty firm, Bush-Overbey Oil Development Company in 1951. In 1953, he co-founded Zapata Petroleum Corporation and one year later, at age 30, he became president and co-founder of Zapata Offshore Company, which pioneered in offshore oil-drilling equipment.

As Vice President, he has traveled over a million miles and visited 74 foreign countries.

In 1964, Bush was defeated in a bid for the U.S. Senate. His run for the U.S. House of Representatives from Houston in 1966 was successful and he was re-elected to this post in 1968.

In 1970, Bush lost the race for U.S. Senate to Houston businessman Lloyd Bentsen. Senator Bentsen is currently the Democratic nominee for Vice President. In 1971 and 1972 Bush was President Nixon's Ambassador to the United Nations.

After serving nearly two years as Chairman of the Republican National Committee, Bush was sent to China, where he served as Chief of the U.S. Liaison Office. In 1976 he was named Director of the Central Intelligence Agency. After leaving the CIA, he taught at Rice University in Houston.

Following his unsuccessful 1980 campaign for the Republican nomination for President, Bush was Ronald Reagan's choice for Vice President. He was inaugurated on January 20, 1981, as the 43rd Vice President of the U.S. He was reelected in 1984.

During nearly eight years as Vice President, Bush has chaired task forces on regulatory relief, on Atlanta child murders, on South Florida crime, on narcotics crossing the border, on community assistance in the Southwest, and on Japanese trade.

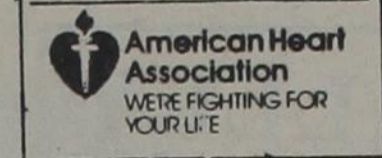

Farmers Urged To Check Insurance Needs

Farmers who plan to put in winter crops with the Farmers Home Administration emergency loans based on this year's drought should take steps immediately to see if they need crop insurance for 1989 crops, according to J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director for Texas.

The Disaster Assistance Act of 1988 requires any farmer with a production loss exceeding 65 percent of normal to agree to purchase insurance for 1989 crops, with some exceptions, as a condition for obtaining an FmHA emergency loan to help cover 1988 losses, Futch said.

The open season for obtaining multi-peril crop insurance for winter crops expires October 31, except in certain northwestern states

where it is November 30, leaving farmers little time to obtain insurance. Although some extensions to the deadline may be granted on an individual basis, Futch said farmers should get in touch with their local insurance representative without delay. Proof of insurance will be

required before disaster loan applications can be processed.

Exceptions to the insurance requirement includes cases where insurance is not available and where premium costs would impose an undue financial hardship as determined by the FmHA county committee.

News Briefs

CISCO

City Manger Mike Moore told City Council members at their regular meeting that the fiscal year for the City ended in the black on Sept. 30. He said 99 percent of the budgeted revenues, \$879,171, came in to the City and the City spent 96 percent of the budget, or \$855,173. Moore added that the City did not have to dip into their meager savings this year. Moore told the Mayor and Council members that the city also had enough money this past year to seal coat and pave more than 71 blocks. A total of 277 blocks have been paved over the past five years, using only city revenues. He added, "We are going to concentrate on new paving in Cisco. In the next two years I believe that a total of 80-85 percent of the City of Cisco will be paved. This will be 90 percent of the streets."

Moore said the city swimming pool ended the year with a deficit. The admissions and concessions were down \$1,000 from last year, and the maintenance up. He said the pool is a substantial expense to the city. Among purchases for the pool were a new pump and equipment. With chemicals, supplies, maintenance and other expenditures the pool showed a financial loss of \$7,110.

The Cisco Child Care Center has issued an appeal to the public for donations to offset recent expenses which have depleted the funds of this non-profit organization. Established in 1968 as a community service, the Child Care Center serves parents who must have care for their children in order to work. The Center does not receive any state or federal aid, but is licensed and regulated by the

State of Texas. Fees are kept low to provide services for working families. But recently maintenance requirements and lower than usual fee receipts have caused a money crunch. Donations may be brought to the Center, or mailed to the Center at 804 Ave. H in Cisco.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated

that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer. Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate. (The cost is only \$50.00) A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.
