





by the apostles and others from Pentecost onward (Acts 2:38,41; 8:36-39; 16:31-34; etc.) Z In the face of this, how could the apostle Paul affirm, in Ephesians 4:5, that there was

ONE BAPTISM? It is obvious that John's baptism was temporary (Acts 19:4). Jesus' "Baptism of suffering" applied only to his death, and possibly to the violent deaths of the apostles. The "baptism" of the Israelites was for one time only. The "baptism of fire" is reserved for the unrighteous, at the judgment. This leaves only the 'baptism of the Holy Spirit' and "baptism" in water.

That the "baptism of the Holy Spirit'' had a limited application is seen from the following: Although John spoke of it in general terms, Jesus made it specifically applicable to the apostles (Acts 1:2,4-5,26; 2:1-4, 14-22; Cf. John 13:5, 22-23; 14:26; 15:26; 16:13-15). Only one extension of this is directly noted in the New Testament. Peter describes the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the household of Cornelius (Acts 10:44-48) as a "baptism in the Holy Spirit" (Acts 11:1517) but also explains the particular purpose of such as being to show him, and the six Jewish brethren with him, that God "had granted to the Gentiles repentance unto life" (Acts 10:44-47; 11:15-18).

The purpose of the "baptism in the Holy Spirit", as applied to the apostles, was: to enable them to be witnesses of Christ (Acts 1:4-5,8); to "teach them all things" and bring to their remembrance all that Christ had said to them (John 14:26);





Medicare **Premium Rates** To Go Up .40

Monthly premiums on the medical insurance part of Medicare will go up starting July 1.

The basic premium rate will go from \$6.30 to \$6.70 per month, according to Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene.

The medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses and is funded by individual premiums and Federal general revenues. The protection is offered automatically to people reaching 65 who are eligible for social security benefits--and to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more. 'The Medicare law requires

an annual review of the cost of the medical insurance program and adjustment of the monthly premium rate to cover the estimated medical expenses of Medicare patients", Hammons said.

The 40 cent increase in July is related to a rise in the cost of medical services and compares to a 50 cent increase in the medical insurance basic monthly premium rate in 1973.

Medicare hospital insurance premiums must also be increased starting July 1. "The basic premium rates will go from \$33 entire families, and be of to \$36 a month", Hammons said.






