GOOD VALUE.

No one doubts the value and the necessity of farm machinery. All agree that the machine has transformed agriculture almost completely, to the enormous benefit of producer and consumer alike.

But now and then it is argued that the machines cost too much—that their price tags are unreasonably high even in these days of the 50-cent dollar.

A few facs punch deep holes in that argument. Between 1939 and 1950, for instance, the factory prices of farm equipment went up 54 per cent—while the cost of iron and steel rose 76 per cent, and the wages paid labor in farm equipment plants jumped

And this doesn't take into account the improvements that have been made in the equipment. The machines are far ruggeder and more efficient than they used to be. Important improvements have in-evitably added to their manufacturing cost. Their life is longer. And they do the jobs they are design-ed for faster and with proportionately lower operating and maintenance expense.

Today's farm machines are cheap measured by their productive ability.

WE CAN'T AFFORD TO RELAX.

Most of us believe that this Administration will attempt to check what has accurately been termed "creeping socialism." That trend has been especially noticeable in the electric power field, where billions of the taxpayers' money has been spent for socialized electric plants and transmission lines—the eventual goal being a political monopoly of this allimportant service.

However, it will be a tragedy if the friends of freedom and private enterprise ever come to the belief that the battle has been won. The socialists and those who follow the socialist philosophy may take reverses, but they never give up. They simply bide local county level. Business competition takes many forms. Sometimes it is in price. Other times it is in the quality of service. Other times still it is in some innovation which people find interesting and attractive. Whatever the form, competition—which exists in its true state only in a free economy—is the great force for progress that exists.

WHO HAS THE MOST TO GAIN?

The old illusion that the cost of government isn't too important to the average family because it can be paid by soaking the rich dies hard.

Today, the rich pay extremely heavy taxes—the federal personal income tax alone reaches a top of 92 per cent. Even so, their tax contributions meet only a small part of the total cost of government, for
