Ambulance Contract Approved

The Eastland County Commissioners Monday approved a subsidy plan for Pct. 1 which is expected to keep the ambulance service at Eastland Memorial Hospital in operation.

Monday's agreement for the Precinct, which includes the City of Eastland, was approved by a 2-1 vote. Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1 and Reggie Pittman of

Pct. 4 voted "Yes" on the proposal, and Calvin Ainsworth, Comm. of Pct. 2, voted "No." L. T. Owen, Comm. of Pct 3, was absent, recovering from recent heart by-pass surgery.

The court had previously given notice that all subsidies to Precincts for Emergency Medical Services would be terminated Sept. 30, due to the cost to the County. (Up to

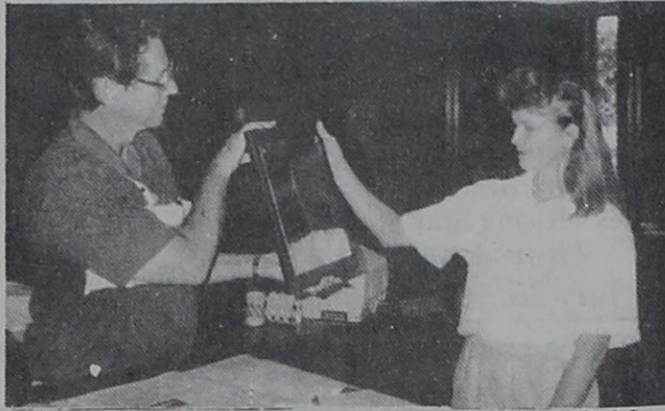
\$30,000 annually for each Precinct).

Hospital Administrator Marcia Carr replied by letter to the county and city, stating that the hospital could not offer ambulance service after the contract ended because the hospital did not own the ambulance.

Under the new agreement the City of Eastland and the County will each pay \$15,000 annually to help provide ambulance service.

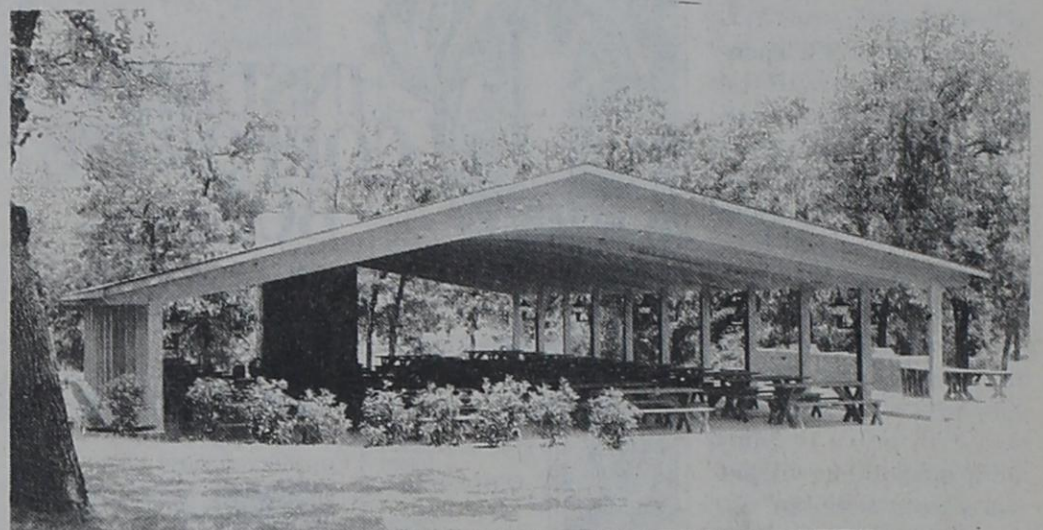

Pavilion Is Next Major Project for City Park

At a recent meeting of the Rising Star City Park Board it was concluded that the construction of a pavilion would be the next item to emphasize during the improvement program for the park. As has been stated previously, Rising Star has been the recipient of a grant from the state to pay for major changes in the park, which will make it possible for all citizens to thoroughly enjoy this facility.

The original land in the amount of four acres was given to the city by the family of Colquitt Williams, who was one of the outstanding citizens of

this area in the '30s and '40s. This property has been gradually improved through the years but the improvements have never been completed. With the money allocated by the state and with matching gifts of money and labor by local citizens it is hoped that a first class facility will be finished in the

next two or three years.

The addition of a pavilion will provide a place for gatherings such as during the Freedom Festival, family reunions, musical events, recreational programs, etc. At the present time completion of the jogging trail is underway and a plan for horseshoe **Continued Inside**

Large Rocks, Live Oaks and Cactus Needed at Park

The City Parks Board of Rising Star is seeking donations of large, unusual rocks for installation at its city park, which is in process of being renovated and upgraded. Persons who have such and would like to get rid of them are asked to contact the administrative officer for the City of Rising Star. In most cases arrangements will be made to move the rocks, and appropriate recognition will be made to the donor.

In addition the city is seeking donations of small live oak trees to be transplanted to the park

area. Trees to be donated should be no larger than 4-6 inches in diameter at their base. Live oaks are needed for shade near picnic tables, particularly in the winter and early spring.

The Parks Board is asking citizens who might have some unusual growth of cacti they would like to donate to the park for popular display to make known their willingness to offer them for this purpose. It is believed that a sizable group of unusual specimens can be collected and will make the park more attractive.

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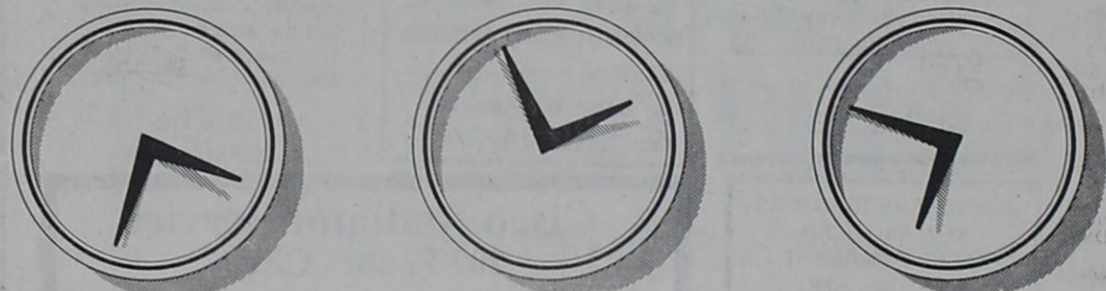

TEXAS A & M BEEF SHORT COURSE SET
AUGUST 13-14

Eastland County Cattle producers will want to make plans to travel to Texas A & M University for the 37th Annual Beef Cattle Short Course and Trade Show on August 13th and 14th.

"The program will provide producers with useful information that can be returned into dollars back at the ranch," said Dr. Larry Boleman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist and short course coordinator.

Sessions will be at the Kleberg Center and Louis Pearce Pavilion on the campus, Boleman said. The program was set on Tuesday and Wednesday to allow participants to travel and visit with the Texas A & M faculty on Monday.

Boleman said beef cattle specialists have worked closely with beef industry professionals to develop the 1991 program. Special features include a trade show and live animal demonstrations.

Boleman said the agenda includes a complete discussion of lean beef production and the effect of low-fat products on American consumers and beef producers. Latest information on lean beef hamburger sales and their effect on U. S. beef cattle production will be discussed. Other speakers will address food safety issues.

"Our producers are committed to animal welfare and food product safety, and they will receive training in the food safety assurance program at the cow/calf level of the industry," he said.

Participants will hear information on profit management, breeding, forage management, nutrition, health and marketing from actual producers with varying sizes of ranching operations.

"All Texas producers should be able to relate to some of these management discussions," Boleman said. "We will have producers representing large cattle herds of more than 1,000 head, medium-sized herds and small herds of 30 to 40 head."

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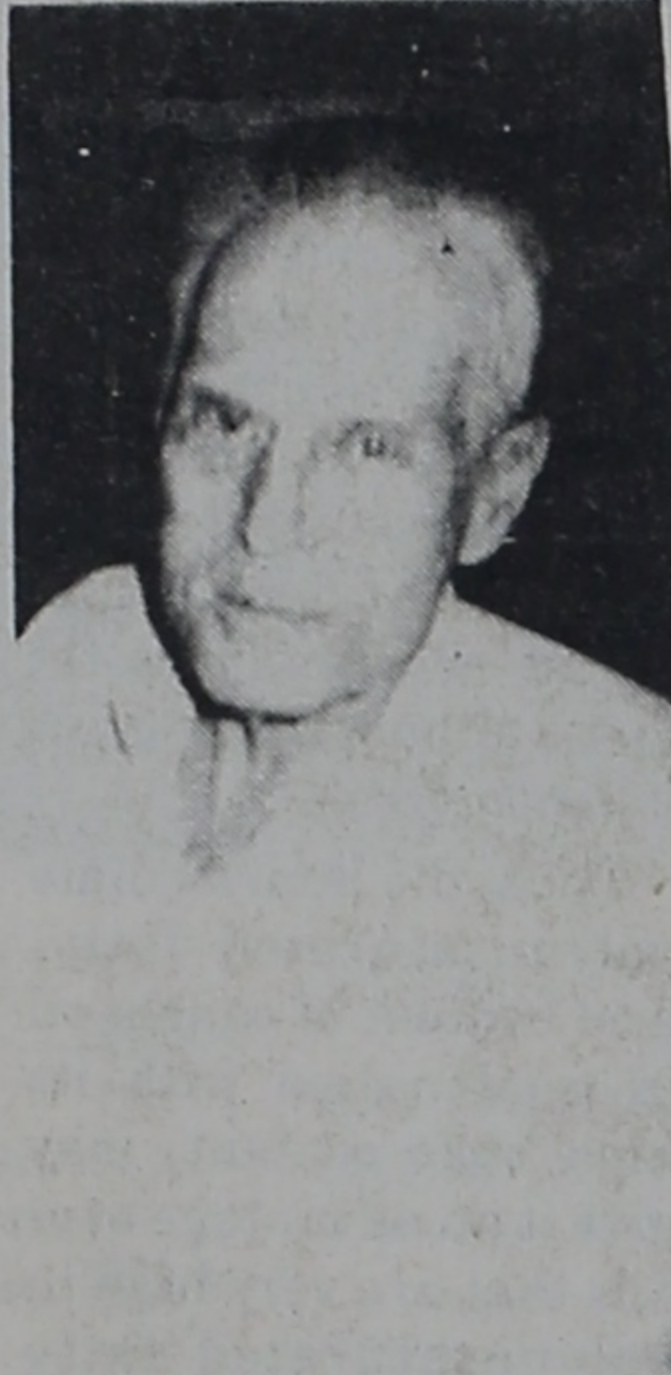

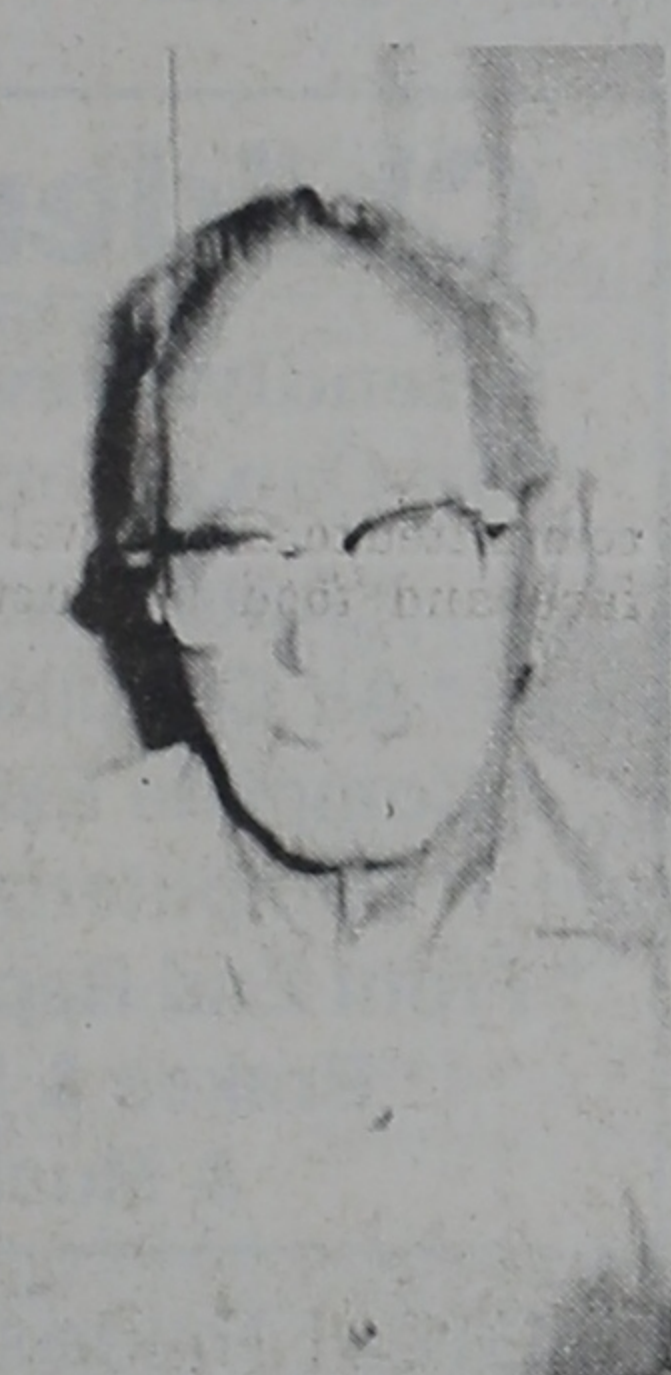

Bill Hoffmann, Chairman of the Hospital Board.

He explained that under the new plan the Hospital would agree to set up a fund to help provide future replacements for the two ambulances, which are owned by the city and county.

Hoffmann did go on to say that if the hospital started going in the red under the new plan the county and city would be expected to give additional subsidies.

The decision by a majority of the Commissioners to support the new subsidy agreement for Precinct 1 was made after considerable discussion. County Judge Scott Bailey brought up this agenda item by first reporting on the effort to set up a new County-wide Emergency Medical Services Taxing District.

Judge Bailey said there were only about 85 names on the petitions, when 200 were needed.

Indications were that the project had not received the popular support needed to call for an election on County-wide funding for the service.

Commissioner Reggie Pittman suggested that a privately-owned ambulance service be allowed to operate in the county. He said he didn't believe the County should be in the ambulance business.

Richard Robinson said he had looked into the possibility of an independent ambulance service and it "wouldn't work." He told Pittman: "All these folks (ambulance owners) that have been calling me, I'll give you their telephone numbers."

Every one of them wanted a county subsidy, he added.

Marcia Carr gave the court information about the Ambulance Service out of Eastland Memorial Hospital. She said that contrary to recent publicity in some news media the ambulances offer excellent transportation, including long-distance.

"We have Basic Life Support Ambulances with the 'Life Pack,' she said.

If an IV or other special care is needed a nurse is sent with the ambulance, she explained.

As the matter of subsidies came to a vote Hospi-

tal Board members reminded the Commissioners that there was not much time right now to work on alternate plans - Sept. 30 would roll around and there would be no ambulance service at Eastland Memorial.

"What we are talking about is a matter of life and death for citizens of our community," Hoffmann said.

In offering support to the measure Richard Robinson said he would vote to increase county taxes 1 to 1.2 cents to collect enough money to pay the subsidies.

County Auditor Ray Pruitt told the court: "One cent won't do it. We can't count on 100 percent collection."

During the meeting Monday no provision was made to subsidize Emergency Medical Services in all the Precincts in the County. Indications were that they would negotiate their own contracts with the court.

One Commissioner was heard to say: "Of course we'll have to give them the same as we give Precinct 1."

Another replied: "I wonder if they can get by on that?"

pitching has been submitted for approval to the state.

Several designs for the pavilion are under consideration by the Parks Board. Basically it is hoped that the building can be about 50x100 feet in size with a stage at one end, complete with a sound system. The floor would be heavy duty concrete which could provide areas for skating, at times. There is need for a storage area also to lock up seating and tables or other equipment. A major need is for rest rooms which can be maintained in a clean and sanitary manner. Since they would serve the entire park, rest rooms may be constructed nearby in a separate building.

Most of the pavilion designs being considered will require \$18 to \$24 thousand dollars for materials. With volunteer labor and some financial contributions from citizens, it is believed the construction can be completed in the next few months.

Families who wish to contribute funds toward the construction of the pavilion, or any other part of the park improvements, may contact the city administrative officer at city hall. There is also a Park Improvement Fund at Peoples State Bank for those wishing to make cash gifts to the program. Some people have indicated they wish to donate in memory of a loved one or friend.

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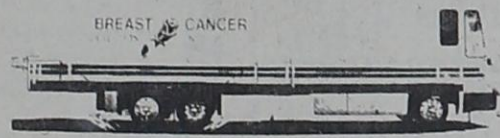

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According to the American Cancer Society, one out of four women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

Fishing Outdoors

In our last cast I mentioned the teams in the race for the Anglers Choice Classic to be held in October. I neglected to list the team of James Fullen and B. J. Johnson, sorry guys. This team has moved up quick with only two events and is currently in the top 20.

A slap on the back for Lake Leon grounds keeper Gary Crew for a job well done cleaning up the Chock-O-Block area after the 4th of July. Mr. Crew stated that he thanked all those people who picked up after shooting their fireworks.

As many of you may recall the funding for housekeeping at the state ramp comes from the TP&WD via a maintenance contract between

the Eastland County Water Board and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (Boat Ramp Division). Fees are paid each month to the Water Board.

This ramp and parking area are furnished at no fee by the TP&WD for public use so lets all try to help Gary keep it clean.

America's most popular panfish is no more than a short cast away at most ponds, lakes, streams or river shores. The catching is easy and the outing great family fun. Here are a few shortcuts to success:

Better than buying or digging worms, get about a half dozen store-bought shrimp. Find a body of water with cover such as lily pads, weeds, cattails or brush bordering the

shore.

To the end of your four pound Berkley Trimax line, attach a number 8 aberdeen hook, pinch off a soup-bean-sized blob of shrimp and hide the hook inside. Then add a tiny, clip-on-bobber about a foot above the bait. No sinker is needed because long casts aren't necessary.

Hold down the thumb-button of a Zebco reel and flick a soft cast just far enough to reach the dark water bordering the cover.

Watch the bobber closely. If it rises minutely, a bluegill has sucked in the bait from above. If it nods to the left, the fish has inhaled the shrimp from the right side. If it does a highland fling, a bluegill is heading home with your bait. Set the hook and keep a bend in a light rod.

Release the fish if it needs to grow more or depending on your luck, take home a batch for a

bluegill-fry!

Another very effective bait for perch, crappie, and all panfish is the Berkley Power Wigglers.

The lifelike, durable pre-shaped wigglers outperform live worms because the panfish cannot easily tear off pieces of the bait they just won't let go. Fortified with specially formulated scent and taste enhancers which disperse a scent trail, the wigglers will attract panfish from several yards away. The nonperishable power wiggler needs no refrigeration, even in the heat of the deep South.

Easy to use in hot or cold weather, the tough-skinned bait won't cast off the hook. Thread it onto a number 8 hook and fish under a small bobber for best results. Fish the fore around logs, weeds and clocks, where panfish often hang out. Find small out-of-the-way spots where the bait can be easily and accurately placed and not be blown away. The scent attractant will find the fish for you.

Fancy tackle is not required when using Power Wigglers. A spin-cast or light spinning outfit and an extra limp 6 pound test line Trilene XL is perfect, even for those panfishermen tipping small jigs with their bait and casting the rig. Fish-

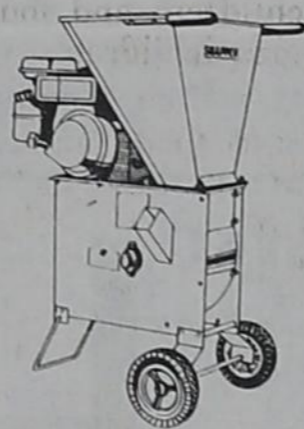

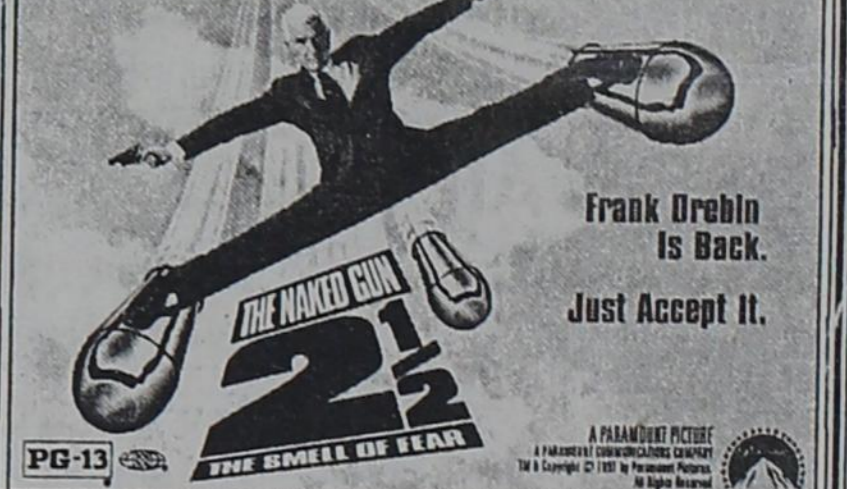

with a specialization in Government at the University of Texas in Austin this year, wherein she plans to return to Washington.

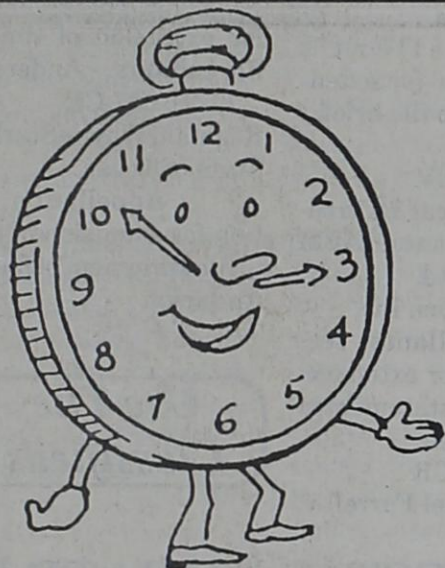


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
