Good Results Shown In Conservation Work, Annual SCS Report Asserts

Supervisors of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation Service in their annual SCS report issued Saturday, state that the application of soil conservation practices in the area during 1958 were generally satisfactory.

The SCS unit, of which Bernal Hickman, Rising Star, is chairman, covers approximately two-thirds of Eastland County with offices at Rising Star and Eastland. John Lee is chief conservationist in charge of the Rising Star office.

"Generally speaking the application of conservation practices such as cover cropping, rotation hay and pasture, strip cropping, crop residue utilization, referred grazing and proper use, show a favorable increase over prior years, while permanent type practices such as field terraces, diversion terraces, waterways and farm ponds show about normal or less than normal rates of application," the report stated.

Extended drought which greatly lowered the farm income of the area for several years is believed responsible for this condition, said Mr. Lee. Permanent type practices require a cash outlay, he said, whereas many of the vegetative and management practices can be applied by the landowner with his own labor and facilities available requiring little or no cash expenditure.

The report continues: "Interest in conservation by the landowners of this area is very good and with a favorable farm income last year, the new year, 1959, promises to be one of maximum application. For example, since Jan. 1, 1959, nine landowners are in process of constructing farm ponds, five men are now having over 10 miles of terraces constructed and one man has recently established a farm waterway.

"Soil conservation practice applied in 1958 on the land in Eastland Work Unit area of the Upper Leon and Palo Pinto Soil Conservation Districts showed a substantial increase in vegetative conservation work over 1957. During this period 6933 acres of rangeland were deferred from grazing during the growing period of better grasses, another 18,372 acres of rangeland was properly grazed. There is approximately 375,000 acres of rangeland in the work unit area, all of which needs a range management program in order to maintain a cover of better grasses to insure soil, water and plant conservation and maximum safe returns. Sixty-two landowners constructed farm ponds for livestock water and better distribution of grazing.

"Crop residue were left on or near the top soil on an estimated 6356 acres of cropland for soil protection and improvement.

"District cooperators planted 2524 acres of strip crops to protect their peanut fields from wind erosions. Cover crops were planted on 3308 acres of cropland on district cooperator farms. Cover crops help hold soil and water in place and serve as an excellent soil improvement crop. These acreage do not include land on which practices were applied in prior years.

"Many conservation practices such as terraces, diversion, terraces, farm ponds, waterways, range seedling, cover cropping, brush cropping, brush control, and deferred grazing are County Agricultural Program Practices as selected by the County ASC committee, Soil Conservation District, County agricultural agencies and others. Necessary site selection, layout, supervision of construction and final checks and certification of practices are made by Soil Conservation Service technicians. These practices are certified to the County ASC Committee for cost share payments as set forth in the Eastland County ASC handbook for 1959.

"Dirt moving contractors have constructed a high percent of all mechanical practices in the area during 1958."

Applications For Peanut Acreage Due By February 13

The 1959 ASC Program has been set up and conservation practices are the same as in 1958, a bulletin from the ASC office at Eastland announces.

Applications from new grower peanut allotments must be made on or before February 13 and for new grower cotton allotments on or before February 16. Applications for reapportioned acreage must be received on or before April 10.

Says the bulletin: "If there has been any changes in the farm operation for 1959, such as change of owners or operators, let the county office know the changes so that records can be changed.

"As in the past the county office is offering a premeasurement service on Cotton acreage. The cost to the producer will be \$10.00 for the first plot plus \$4.00 for each additional plot. Final date for application is April 15, 1959. If a producer is interested we will be glad to aid in determining approximate acreages from photographs.

"Now is the time to apply for New Grower Allotments. If you are not interested in an old peanut farm, have had 2 years experience within the last 5 years growing peanuts and depend on the farm for a living, you may be eligible for a new grower allotment. About the same requirements are necessary for a new grower cotton allotment, except experience is not required.

"Producers who sell wool and mohair between April 1, 1958, and March 31, 1959, should file the original sales receipt in the ASC office for a possible subsidy payment.

"We will begin measuring wheat in the near future. As we are using measuring tapes (instead of wheels) the help of each producer will be appreciated in measuring his wheat."

D&B Report Shows Business Gain For Rising Star

Rising Star was one of two cities in Eastland County to show a gain in the number of businesses the last five-year period, according to a report issued by A. J. Hemphill, manager of the Dun and Bradstreet Fort Worth office. The number of businesses in the community rose from 51 in January 1954 to 55 in January 1959, the report said.

During the five-year period Rising Star showed an eight per cent gain in business, the report said.

Eastland was the only other town to show a gain in the number of business houses during the period, the number rising from 125 in 1954 to 138 in 1959. Eastland's business growth gained 10 per cent during the period. Four of the five principal cities in the county also showed business gains for the period. The county as a whole showed a net increase of 14 new businesses.

Keep Peaches To Few Varieties Specialist Advises

"If you are planning a home orchard, don't plant a number of varieties, but center on one or two so you'll have a better chance of selling your surplus peaches," T. E. Denman, A&M Extension horticulturist of Stephenville, told a small group who gathered at the American Legion Hall last Thursday evening. Cold weather cut down attendance on the Chamber of Commerce sponsored meeting aimed at arousing more local interest in fruit growing.

"Even a few trees will produce a great deal more fruit than the average family can use," Mr. Denman said. "With the emphasis on quality fruit now, it is very difficult to dispose of peaches of other fruit which does not meet super market standards or is not in sufficient quantity to interest buyers."

The rise of the supermarket has had a revolutionary effect upon the production of fruit, Mr. Denman pointed out. The supermarket with its centralized buying, buys in tremendous quantities and insists on a standard of quality and a uniformity that the old time grower simply cannot meet by former methods. It has cut out the trucker by depriving him of his market and there is little left for the grower of peaches - which is about the only fruit that can be satisfactorily mass grown in the Cross Timbers area - except to aim for quality and develop his own markets.

It can be done, he said, and he described and illustrated with colored slides a number of new varieties which meet modern market standards and are well adapted to this area.

Apples are not profitable in this area, except for home consumption and even so, he said, the cost of producing them is not justified when New Mexico and Washington apples are available in such great quantities all season long.

There is room for berries, figs and plums, on a local market basis, he said. Berries in particular, seem to have a great local appeal and small growers of this type of fruit have found it profitable. Grapes are another fruit which, with the introduction of new table varieties similar to the California Thompson seedless, have promise of a profitable market, he said.

Some of the successful local peach growers present expressed disagreement with Mr. Denman's analysis of the market for the locally grown peaches, pointing out that they had found a big demand for home grown peaches among stores in this section of the state.

The meeting was one of a series being sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce as one means of stimulating development of a diversified agriculture in this area. A meeting on sheep and goat potentials will be held at the Legion Hall on the evening of February 12.

On the following Friday, Feb. 13, a group of Eastland County farmers, headed by County Agent J. M. Cooper, who presided at the meeting last Thursday night, will go to Montague to visit the State Grape Experimental Farm.

NOTICE TO VEHICLE OWNERS

TITLE PREREQUISITE TO REGISTRATION

The "Texas Title Act," which became effective on October 1, 1958, provides, with named exceptions, that a certificate of title is a prerequisite to registration. Section 63 (b) reads as follows:
"The Department or any agent thereof shall not after the 1st of January, 1942, register or renew the registration of any motor vehicle, unless and until the owner shall make application for and be granted an official certificate of title for such vehicle or present satisfactory evidence that a certificate of title for such vehicle has been previously issued to such owner by the Department. Provided, however, this shall not apply to automobiles which were purchased prior to January 1, 1936."

In order that the terms of above law and also instructions from the Texas Department may be complied with, it will be necessary for this office to require that the certificate of title and the 1958 license receipt be presented before the 1959 license plates can be issued. You should check now to see whether or not you have your title certificate. If it has been lost you should contact this office to secure the proper forms to be used.

This office has also been instructed to not recognize a title receipt (Form 31) as evidence that title has been issued unless such receipt has been issued within the last thirty (30) days prior to your application for plates. If title has not been issued within this period of time, there is a possibility that it has been rejected by the State Highway Department.

A NOTICE TO ALL COMMERCIAL VEHICLE OWNERS BY THE STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

"We have established certain standards governing the empty weight of commercial vehicles. As the Tax Collectors Reports are received in our office, each license receipt will be checked for minimum empty weight and carrying capacity. Each registration that does not meet the following minimum weight requirements will be investigated by our office or the Department of Public Safety. We will contact the owners and advise him to contact the Tax Collectors office immediately for additional weight to be issued. The law grants us the authority to cancel the owners title if the proper registration fee is not paid. It should be remembered that empty weight cannot be lowered from the weight shown on the title and registration receipt unless supported by a scale ticket, regardless of the

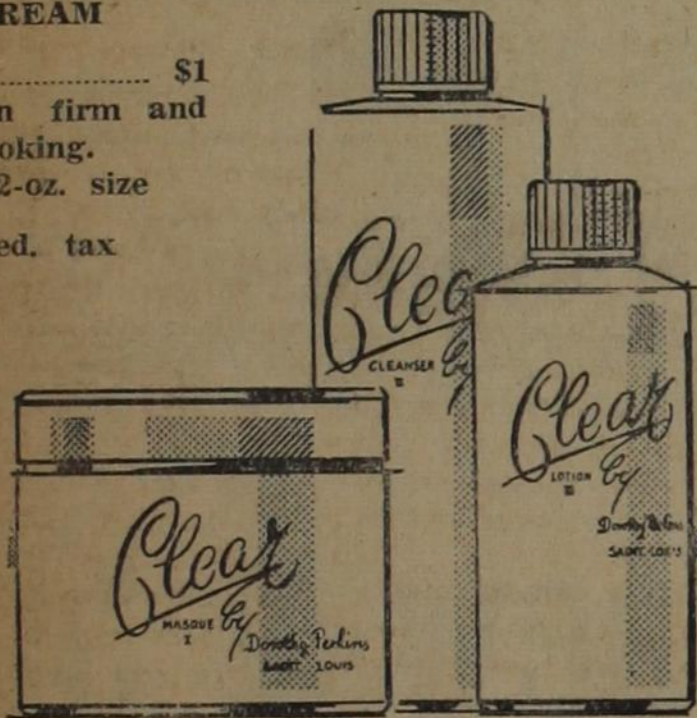

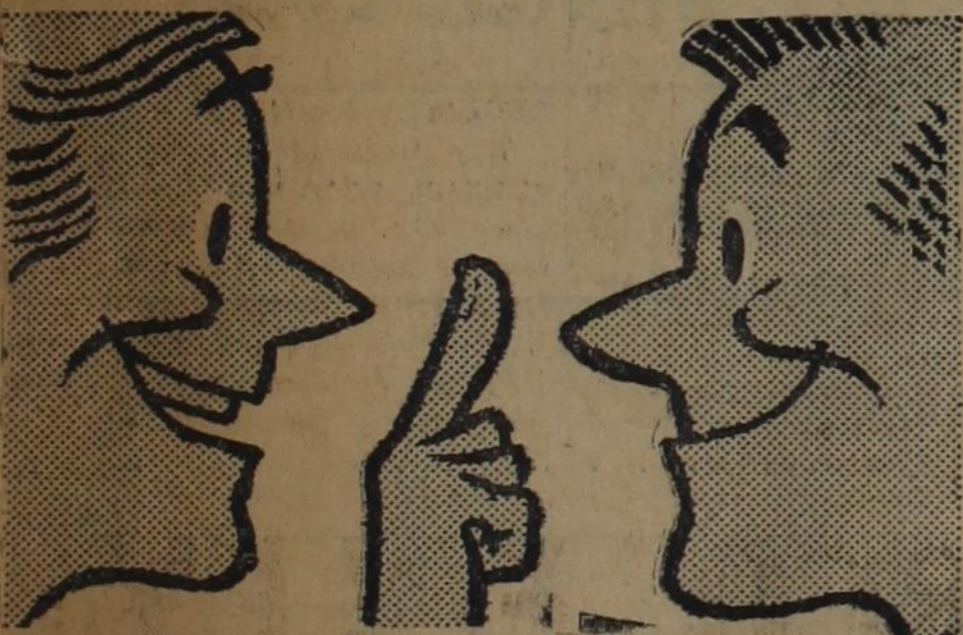

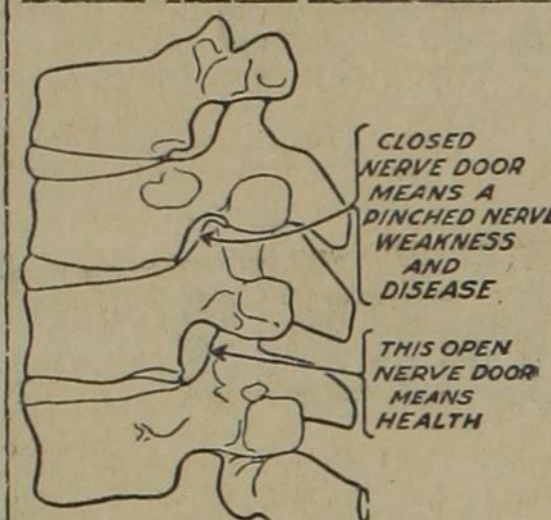
