

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent

KEEP ATTIC VENTS OPEN

Wrapping the attic vents on your roof with plastic because you think it will reduce energy costs, will actually increase them and may damage your insulation. Attic ventilation performs the vital functions of air flow and moisture removal. The air removal feature is most important in the summer, when ventilation through the vents reduces the hot air in the attic space. During the winter, moisture produced inside the house tends to migrate to the outside. Part of this moisture passes through the roof into the attic area. By placing plastic over roof vents, the homeowner is shutting off ventilation so that the condensation of moisture can

occur in the attic space. Once this moisture has condensed in the attic, it will settle in the insulation, reducing its effectiveness and adding to your energy

Over several heating seasons, moisture trapped in the attic may also cause structural damage. When there is no moisture-vapor proof barrier between the attic insulation and the ceiling, as is the case in many Texas homes, wet insulation can cause sagging or wet spots on the ceiling.

Moisture held against wood in the attic may also eventually cause it to rot. If you are concerned about losing heat through the attic, you should check to see if the pull-down stairway or other attic access inside your house is in-

sulated. Adding an insulation batt over this area will help reduce energy costs without damaging the rest of the attic insulation.

MOLD ON WALLS

Mold grows because condensation is occuring as a result of high humidity and low surface temperatures. Furniture, pictures, cabinets and other objects mounted on exterior walls can act as insulation. This causes the surfaces behind these objects to be cooler than exposed surfaces. If the humidity is high enough, the temperature of the walls behind these objects can be below the dew point, resulting in conden-

germinate bacteria on these surfaces. This problem generally occurs only on poorly insulated exterior walls and in conditions of relatively high humidity.

The immediate solution is to move furniture away from outside walls, remove pictures, and open cabinet doors, and/or, use a small fan to circulate air behind furniture or through closets.

The humidity also may reduce by increasing ventilation with exhaust fans. If the relative humidity in your house is very high, with levels above 60%, an exhaust fan should be operated continuously until the humidity drops to below 50%. Eventually, you should try to maintain humidity levels in the 30% to 40% range. The longterm solution to mold buildup is to improve the insulation in your exterior walls. If this is not feasible, humidity control and good air circulation should keep the problem from reoccurrRECIPE FOR THE WEEK:



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

A recent outing to Lake proctor showed me one again just how fickle the Micropteus Salmoides (Largemouth bass) can be. This is even more so during pre-spawn water temperatures. One week prior to this outing water temperatures were stable in high 40 degrees. Catches were reported as being good, with many four pound fish being caught. Two lunkers over seven pounds were taken. All these fish were caught in 2-5 feet of water. This past weekend things turned around. temperatures actually improved, raising to 52 degrees. But the fishing

Other area lake reports were just as fickle: Leon black bass fair to 6 pounds, very few fish over 14", on north banks in protected pockets, crappie very good in numbers. Brownwood black bass very good to 3 pounds on spinners and lizards; crappie fair up both creeks, catfish good to 4 pounds. Pioneer - black bass slow to 31/2 pounds on spinners, no other reports. Lake Cisco - black bass fair to 4 pounds on jigs in 12 feet of water.

Find some in the best depth range for bass on the day you're fishing. Work them properly, and you're very likely to catch bass. Humps are good fish attractors for several reasons, prime among them is the fact that very few fishermen bother to find them. These hilltops also serve as oases of cover amid acres of open, empty water, luring baitfish and their predators.

In winter and summer, locate humps at likely depths by searching for circles on a topographical map. Pinpoint them with a depth-finder and fish with worms, the jig and pig, tailspinners, jigging spoons or swimming lures like Cordell Spots. If fishing the tops of humps doesn't produce, drag bottom hugging lures down or up the slopes, testing other


