Oil Report

Union Exploration, Lamesa, No. 1 Kincaid has been completed as Marble Falls oil discovery well eight miles northeast of Cisco in Eastland County.

Location is 717 feet from the north and 1,541 feet from the west lines of Section 38, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Completed on a pump, it had a daily potential of 21 barrels of 41 gravity oil, plus 14 barrels of water. The well is producing from perforations at 3,523-29 feet fractured with 150 sacks of sand. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 3,963 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 4,091 feet.

Union Exploration completed No. 1-A Kincaid as a Marble Falls oil confirmation.

Wellsite is 1,148 feet from the north and 2,983 feet from the west lines of Section 38.

Daily pumping potential was 43 barrels of water. Production is from perforations at 3,558-64 feet, fractured with 150 sacks of sand. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 3,623 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 4,110 feet.

Lyles Energy Inc. from Ore City, Texas, will drill two Eastland County wildcats.

No. 3 Lyles Energy Inc. Loughry is located one mile south of Carbon on a 96-acre lease.

It spots 330 feet from the south and west lines of the southeast quarter of Section 5, 3,900 feet.

No. 1 Lyles Energy Inc. Baskin will be drilled on a 960-acre lease five miles west of Gorman.

Slated for 3,800 feet, it spots 1,320 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines of Section 7, D&DAL Survey.

Another wildcat in the county will be drilled eight miles southwest of Cisco on a 160-acre lease.

It is Jako Oil of Texas Inc., Denton, No. 2 Harrelson, slated for 2,000 feet.

Drillsite is 2,350 feet from the south and east lines of Section 101, H&TC Survey.

Trinity Exploration Co., Fort Worth, No. 2 B.F. Dudley is a planned 3,500-foot wildcat for Eastland County.

It will be drilled six miles northwest of Rising Star on a 98-acre lease.

Drillsite is 467 feet from the north and east lines of Lot 7, Mary Ann Clark Survey 29, A-51.

Snow Oil Co., Fort Worth, staked three locations in the Madewell Field six miles southwest of Cisco.

Each project is located on a 25-acre lease and slated for 1,400 feet.

No. 1 Texfel-Stroebel will be drilled 200 feet from the north and 893 feet from the west lines of Section 111, Block 3, H&TC Survey, A-183.

Site for No. 2 Texfel-Stroebel is 500 feet from the

north an 893 feet from the west lines of Section 111.

No. 3 Texfel-Stroebel will be drilled 800 feet from the north and 893 feet from the

west section lines.

Keystone Oil & Gas Inc., Abilene, completed No. 1 Russell Walker as a Ranger gas discovery well two miles

west of Eastland in Eastland County.

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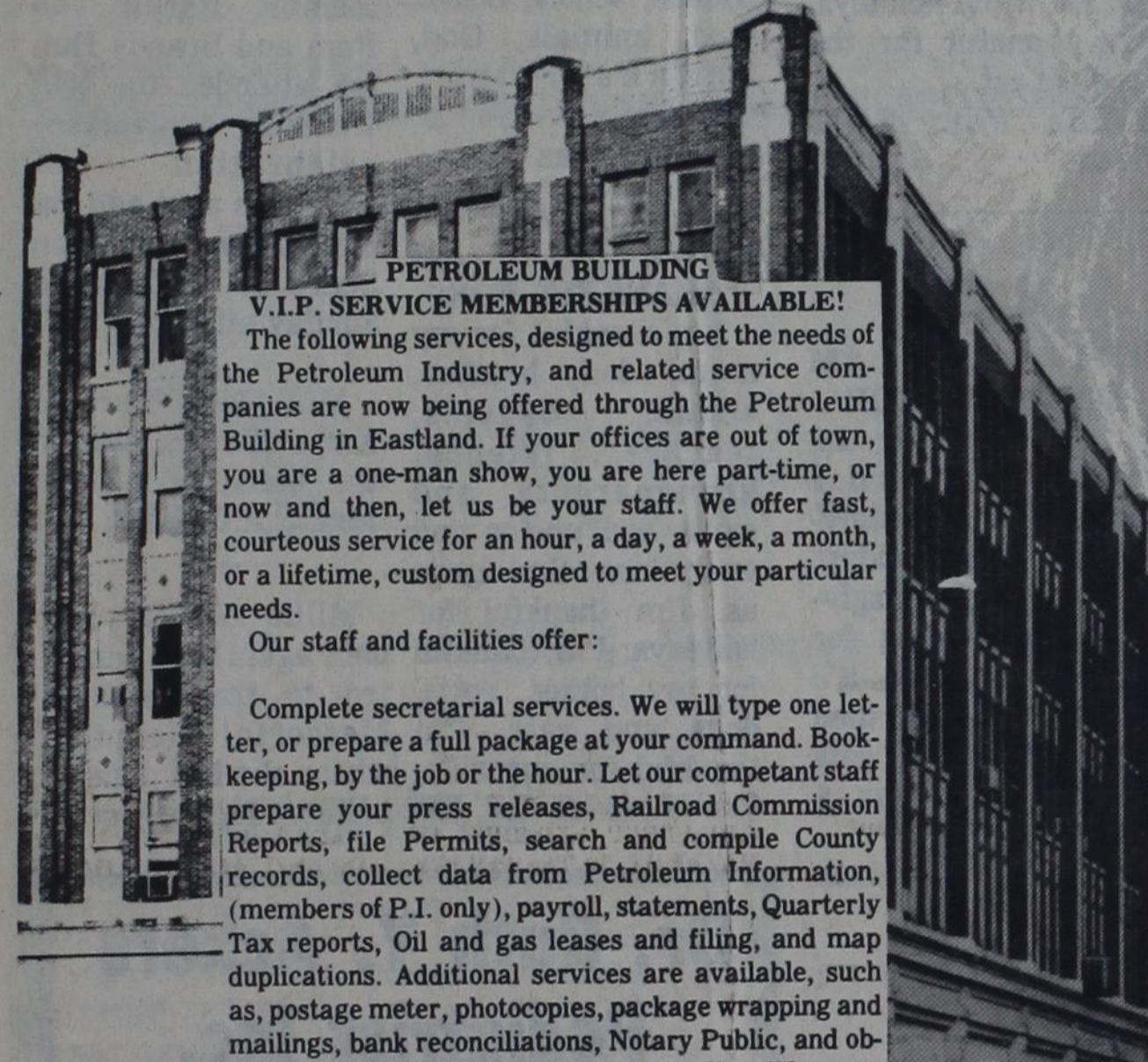

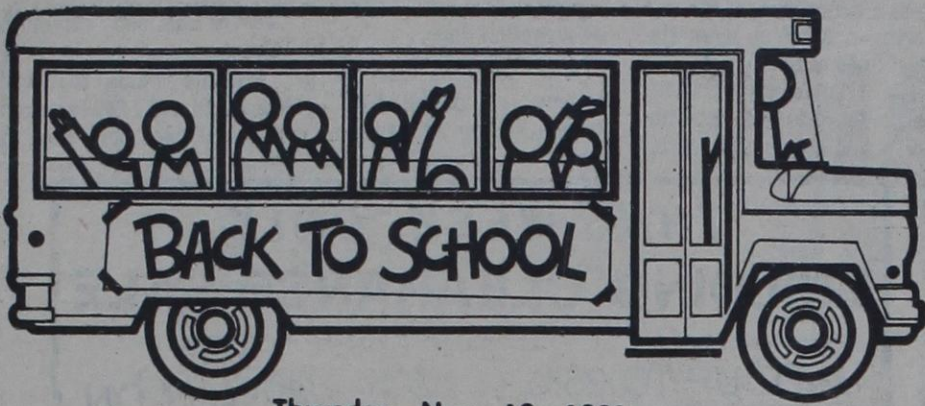

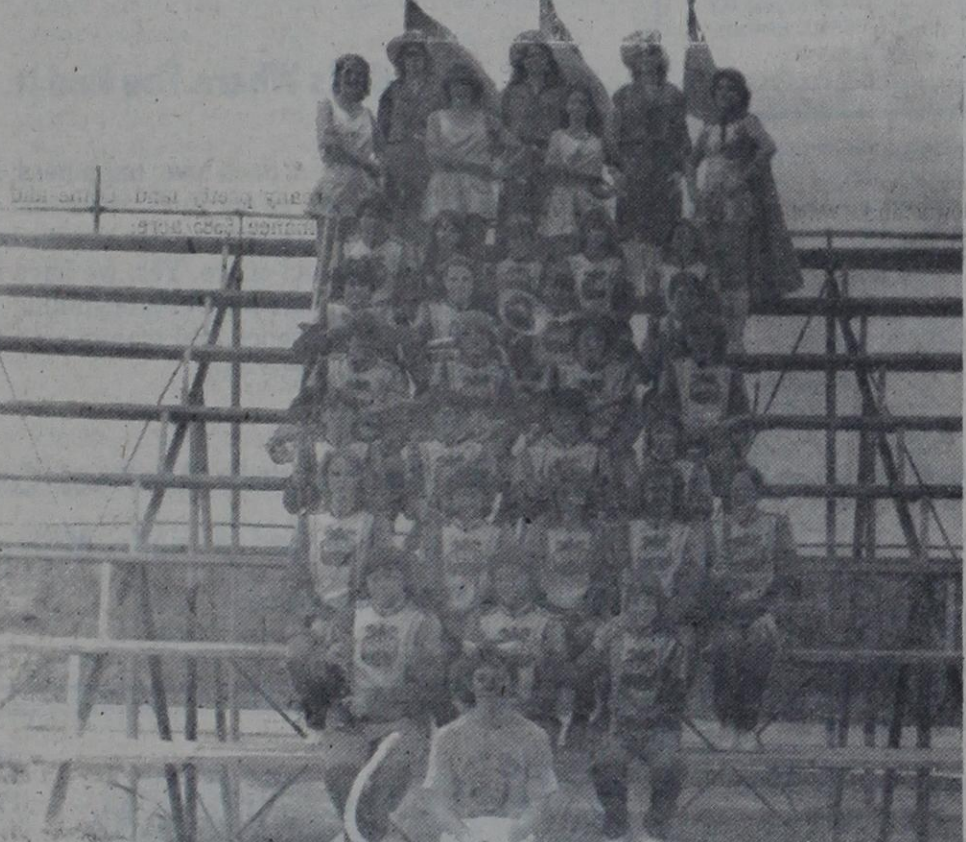

City Receives November Sales Tax Check

AUSTIN, TEXAS-- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$96.4 million to 948 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for November.

The payment this month is \$16.3 million more than Texas cities received during a comparable period in 1980.

The payments push totals for Texas cities through November of this year to \$614.7 million—a 16.6 percent increase over payments for the same 11 month period in 1980.

RIISING STAR received \$4,225.40 this period as compared with \$4,496.57 for the same period last year. Total payments for

1981 are: \$16,927.93 as compared with \$18,817.61 for 1980. This is a 10.04 percent decrease.

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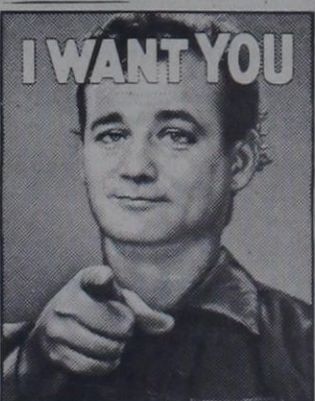
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
