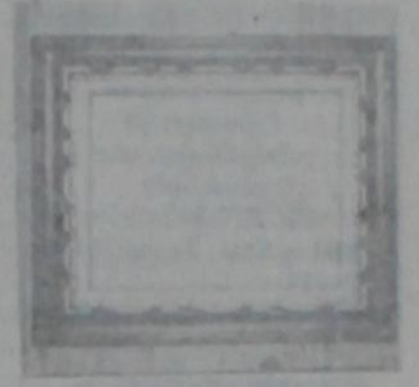

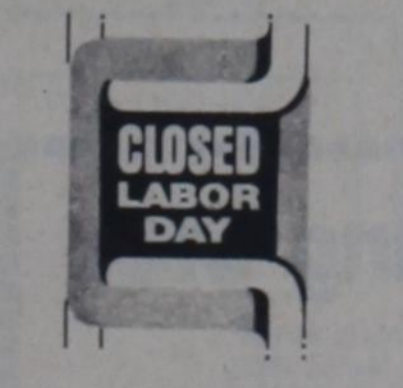
Monday, Sept. 4th - Labor Day

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the supreme prize for which we seek. In chapter 3:13,14, Paul gives what I believe is a four step plan to success which will work in any area of our lives. There, Paul says, "brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended; but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Notice the four steps, (1) Be aware of your need, or "I count not myself

We are unprofitable servants: we have done that which was our duty to do." So, as far as our need in Christianity is concerned, we need to be saved by the grace of God, according to the faith that has been revealed to us in the Bible. Others may have a different need. There is a story told about a boy fishing and not catching very much. He was sitting on the bank cussing for every thing he was worth. A preacher came along and told him that that was not the best way to get a catch. The

shing I do. Singleness of purpose is necessary. Things divided are not as powerful as things united. The rays of the sun, when diffused are relatively impotent; but, if some are focused into one ray, they can start a fire at a campsite. Likewise there is power in the concentration of purpose. (Jeremiah 29:13) On the other hand, a divided life is a weak life—completely at the mercy of circumstances. (Matthew 6:24; James 1:8; Luke 8:14). Once your goal is set, keep your mind on it, not

There are blessings, and fond memories that will continue to bless us; but let us not think that living in the past will help us achieve our need: we need to press on toward the end. (4) The fourth step is to "press on" toward the prize. Paul Rees says of Florence Nightingale that she made a pledge to God at age thirty to put away childish things, and ask the Lord. "Let me think only of Thy will." Near the end of her life, she gave what she thought was the reason for her success, "Well, I can only give one explanation. That is, I have kept nothing back from God." So let us too be aware of our needs, set our goals in accordance with God will, forget the past, use today to press on toward the prize: Jesus our Lord.

The sermon for Sunday morning is about salvation by faith. The Bible makes it clear that we are saved by faith. Is there any such thing as a person who has faith but is lost? FIRST UNITED METHODIST

How do you regard time? Monday afternoon my wife and I were visiting with a wonderful couple in their home. The man of the house invited me to walk out into his garden with him. He had plowed his garden that morning and it was really clean. During the course of our conversation he stated that he had planted pinto beans because the signs were just right. He must have been right for we sure did get a good rain that night, and the beans should be up soon. I have never paid a lot of attention to planting by the signs, but I think I will start doing so. This causes me to think of the duality of thought and expression we moderns have about time. The Bible also contains a duality of thought and expression about time. These two modes of thoughts and expressions may be called the chronological and the realistic. For modern man the emphasis is on the chronological. Modern man thinks of time is used realistically. Mulches are important for the fall vegetable garden to conserve moisture and reduce soil temperature. But gardeners should be aware that diseases and insect pests can be introduced with some mulches.

For example, nematodes can be brought into the garden, particularly when using peanut hulls as a mulch. Peanut hulls do serve as a carrier of root knot and lesion nematodes which attack garden vegetables.

In addition to the nematode problem, organic mulches such as grass clippings, leaves and plant debris have the possibility of increasing a disease known as Southern blight. Southern blight is a fungus that lives on organic material in or near the soil surface. During the summer after an extremely dry period followed by scattered showers, plants may begin to wilt and die rapidly. The base of the plants may show a white fungal growth with small light tan to dark brown structures the size of a pin head or so. These are sclerotia, the overwintering bodies of or Southern blight. These will drop off the plant and remain in the soil for the next crop season.

Certain diseases such as Southern blight as well as nematodes can be avoided by using plastic or paper mulch.

Of course, large amounts of organic material are good for the soil, so we suggest working the material into the soil as deep as possible so that it can decompose at a

Work For A Better Spring Lawn

SPRING LAWN—A homeowner can take a few steps to insure a weed-free winter lawn and good recovery of the lawn next spring, notes a turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Control such lawn insects as chinch bugs, white grubs and armyworms since weeds will quickly invade insect damaged areas. Apply fertilizer in the fall to maintain the lawn's color and to promote early green-up next spring. Use 12 pounds of 12-4-8 or a similar fertilizer per 1,000 square feet. Also, apply a preemergence herbicide if winter weeds have been a problem in the past, and use a fungicide to control brownpatch in St. Augustine lawns.

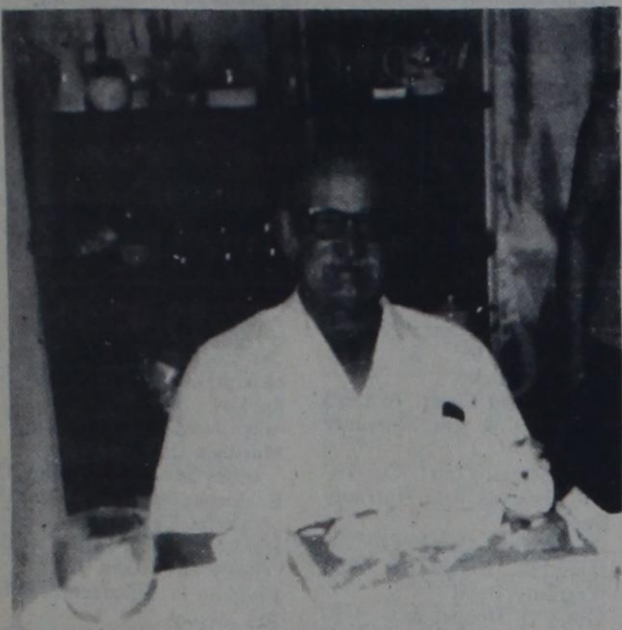

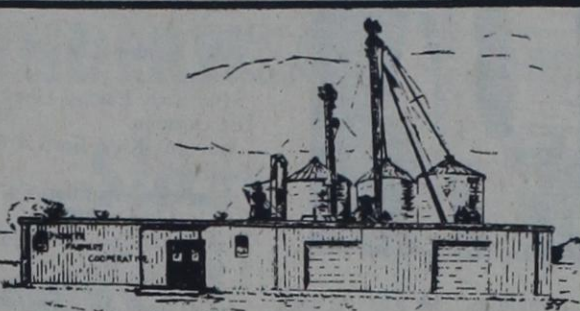

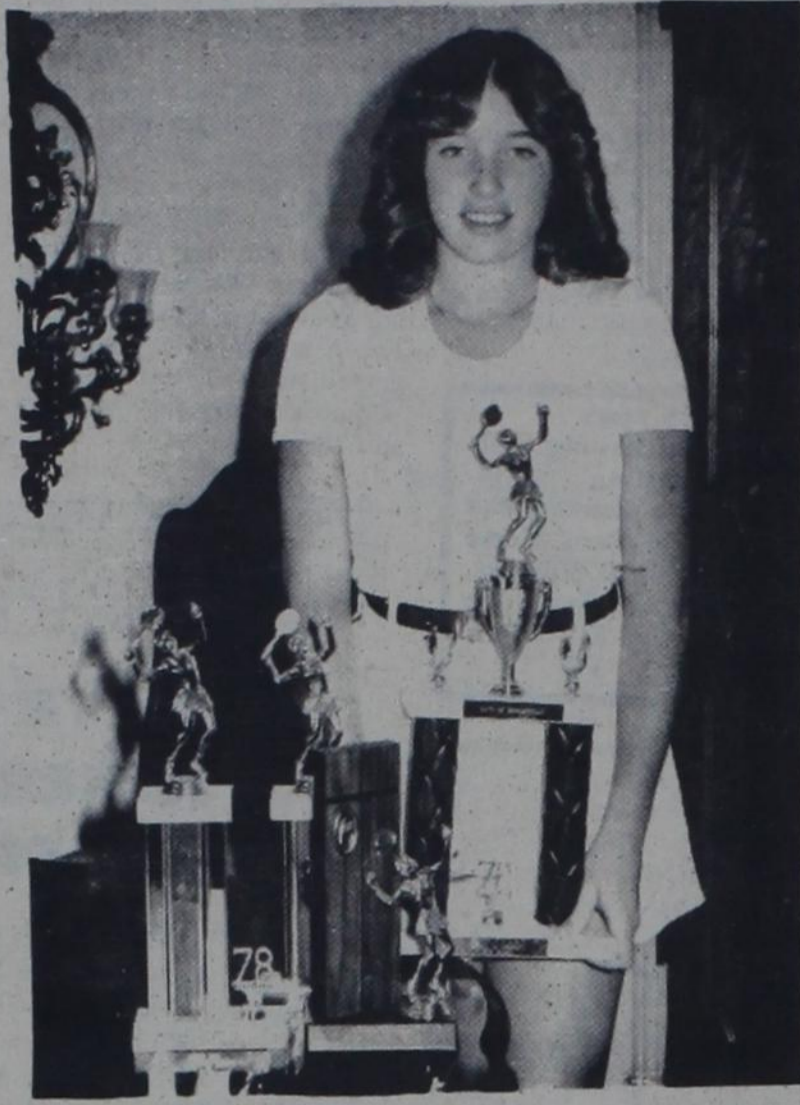

Protect Against Credit Card Loss
Protect against credit card loss to avoid problems and financial burdens. Millions of credit cards are lost or stolen each year with millions of dollars of unauthorized purchases made on these cards, says Claudia Kerbel, a consumer information specialist.
Consumers are partially protected against financial losses when credit cards are lost or stolen. The federal Truth-in-Lending Act provides that the maximum liability of a credit card holder is \$50 for unauthorized charges made on a credit card.
However, many consumers carry a number of credit cards and if, for example, they lose 10 cards, they are liable for \$500, Ms. Kerbel points out.
Ms. Kerbel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.
To avoid problems and financial burdens of credit card loss, follow these tips:
1. Cut up and throw away all cards not needed or used regularly.
2. Maintain in a safe place a list of all credit cards and their numbers.
3. Keep a list of the toll-free numbers to contact if cards are lost.
Most companies that provide credit cards will provide a postage paid postcard to send in the event that the credit card is lost or stolen. Keep this in a safe place because it will show the credit card number as well as a toll-free number to call.
4. Notify the issuer of a lost card immediately.
5. Upon receiving a new card, sign it immediately.
6. Never loan a credit card to anyone who hasn't been authorized to use it by the issuer—this is a violation on contact.
To recognize the possible signs of credit card theft, check the monthly bill closely, the specialist advises.
If the bill is larger than the total of the individual charge slips, check closely to see if a purchase that you did not make was added to the bill.
If an expected monthly bill doesn't arrive, someone may have stolen the card and sent in an address change, she warns.

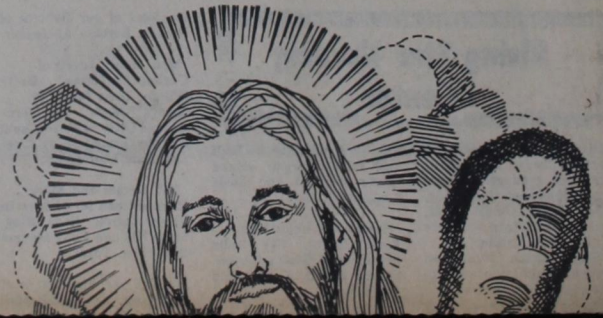

Hot Weather Management For Cattle

Proper management of the beef cattle herd is important during hot summer weather to avoid production losses and possibly even some deaths. Emphasizes a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The main thing is to leave cattle alone as much as possible. Avoid movement, crowding and handling. Also, delay surgery, control flies, and make sure water is available. Hauling water may be necessary as creeks and stock tanks dry up.

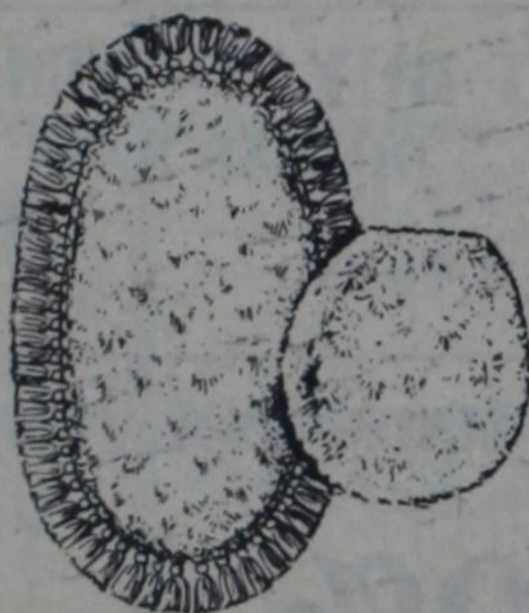

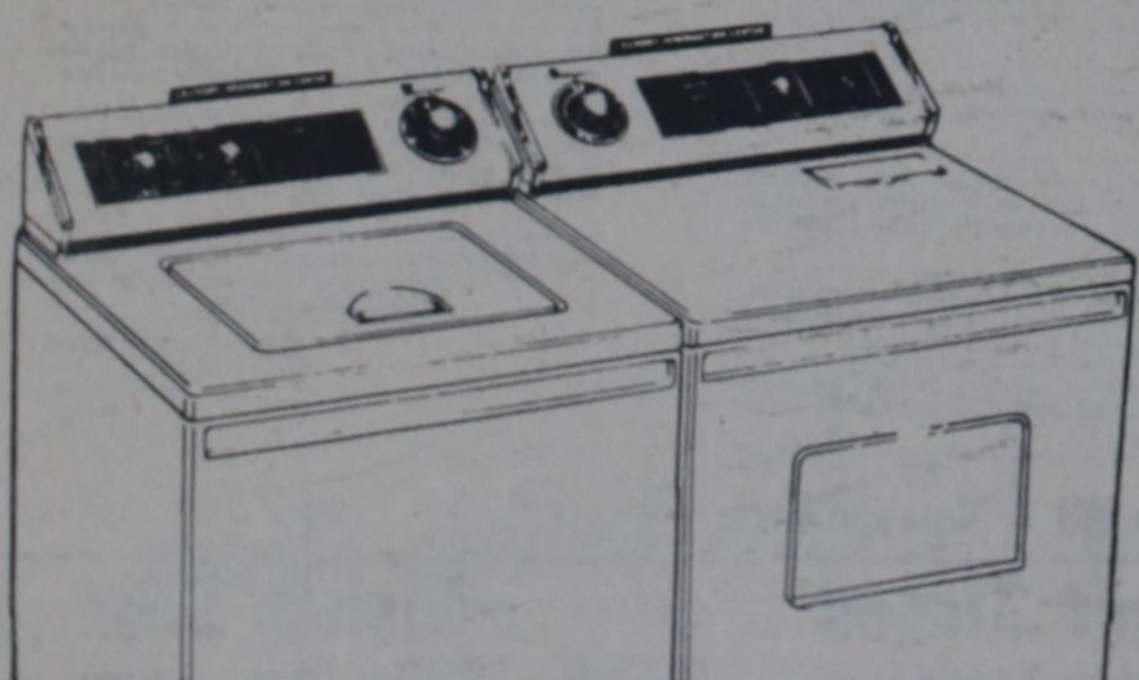
