Chairman Kent Hance announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 481,556,435 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in March, compared to the February gas production total of 437,962,274 Mcf. March production was down 0.88

percent compared to March

Railroad Commission 1988's production total of 485,848,390 Mcf.

Eastland County produced 1,285,813 Mcf (1,000 cubic feet) of gas in March, according to figures from the Texas Railroad Commission.

Texas gas production in March came from 190,600 oil wells and 46,532 gas wells.



Peanut Crop Shares: Lease documentation will be required when a peanut producer claims 100% share of the peanut crop beginning with the 1989 crop of peanuts.

Producers are requested to bring copies of their cash leases when reporting their peanut acreage or when requesting measurement ser-

False certification of crop shares will result in liquidated damages due on peanuts erroneously placed in the loan and a penalty of 43.1 cents per pound of peanuts sold where the person with the unidentified share had not certified compliance with the sodbuster provisions or conservation

compliance provisions. Part or all of the Farm Poundage Quota may be released temporarily or permanently. Quota may be temporarily released for one year only and will provide considered produced credit for that year for the pounds released provided that quota has not been released from the farm in the prior two years. The final date to release quota is June 15.

Reapportionment of Peanut Quota: Release quota will be reapportioned to those farms that make a request and meet other eligibility requirements. Requests cannot exceed the expected production considering other available quota on the farm. The final date for requesting reapportioned quota is June 15.

Transfer of Peanut Quota: The final date for spring transfers is June 15. Transfers filed after that date will be considered fall transfers and the transferring farm must have planted a sufficient acreage to be expected to produce the full effective quota on the farm or a transfer will not be allow-

Land Devoted to Nonagricultural Use: Producers are requested to notify the county ASCS office when land is sold for or devoted to nonagricultural use. This incudes land that is no longer suitable for poducing crops or forestry products and land that is devoted to residential or commercial uses including small acreage used for garden or hobby production of crops.

Conservation Deadline Anyone who farms highly erodible cropland must develop a conservation plan for the land and have it approved by Dec. 31, 1989 in order to remain eligible for many USDA farm program benefits.



America's Sense of Humor

Whenever life seems to be getting too grim and serious, Americans have a way of finding something to laugh about. Throughout the worst of times, our national sense of humor has served as a getwell tonic. Or at least as a palliative to east the pain until things get better.

Take for example the 1988 election campaign. Just when the rhetoric was getting nasty and feelings were turning ugly, along came a catchy little ditty called, "Don't Worry, Be Happy." Recorded by jazz singer, Bobby McFerrin, the song swept the country like a welcome breeze after a July thunderstorm. Soon, millions of Americans were whistling the tune, and radio jocks couldn't keep up with listeners requests.

Arriving along with the "song-of-the-year," came another sensation: "The Smiley Face." Resurrected from the late '60's and early '70's, the cartoon face with the dot-like eyes and Ushaped mouth soon appeared on everything from T shirts to boxer shorts.

Some leading department stores cottoned onto the craze with "Don't Worry, Be Happy" shops and boutiques. Paris and Tokyo stores followed suit. Newsweek's Bill Barol nominated 1989 as "The Year of Sweetness and Lite," warning that America was getting a little too cheerful for its own good.

Don't bet on it. In a new book called The Trusting Heart, Duke University psychiatrist Redford B. Williams argues that a bad attitude is hazardous to your health. Of all the traits associated with so-called Type A behavior, writes Williams, the only ones that are truly predictive of early death are hostility, cynicism and aggression. And the antidote?"Laughatyourself," says Williams.

Texas Higher Education Coordinating BoardAccepting Applications For Grant Funds

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board is accepting applications for more than \$2.5 million in grant funds to improve the quality of precollege (K-12) instruction in mathematics and science in Texas. Grants are awarded for 12 months.

The grant funds, available to Texas under the new Dwight D. Eisenhower Mathematics and Science Education Act must be used to improve the teaching skills of K-12 teachers and increase student access to mathematics and science courses. The Eisenhower Actreauthorized the predecessor statute, Title II of the Education for Economic Security Act (EESA). Applications must be submitted to the Coordinating Board by Aug. 1, 1989.

Thirty to forty (30 to 40) grants ranging from \$25,000 to \$65,000 each will be awarded to support cooperative teacher training programs between higher education institutions, local school districts, and regional service centers, said Nan Broussard. Coordinating Board Title II program director.

Another four to five grant awards above \$100,000 will finance the development and/ or implementation of demonstration models specifically designed to increase the access of the State's growing minority student population to mathematics and science education and careers.

The Coordinating Board will announce the grant awards at its October meeting. Projects funded under this grant application must be completed by October 1990.

Having trouble sleeping? According to researchers at the United States Department of Agriculture in Grand Forks, North Dakota, that could be the result of a deficiency in copper or iron. They studied groups with below-RDA diets.

An easier way to make dental crowns, scientists at the University of Minnesota have desgined a computer program that converts photos of teeth into instructions for the milling machines that grind the crowns. System should be available soon.

To ease anesthesia in children, Yale University is giving sedatives in lollipop form. "Knockout candy" is still awaiting FDA approval.

Another bad mark for smoking: nicotine actually causes changes in the cells of the gums, encouraging disease, say researchers at the D.D. Eisenhower Army Medical Center at Fort Gordon, Georgia.

Children should wear sunglasses with full ultraviolet protection, especially for long rides in a car or stroller, say a pediatric eye specialist. New smaller glasses are being made for them.
