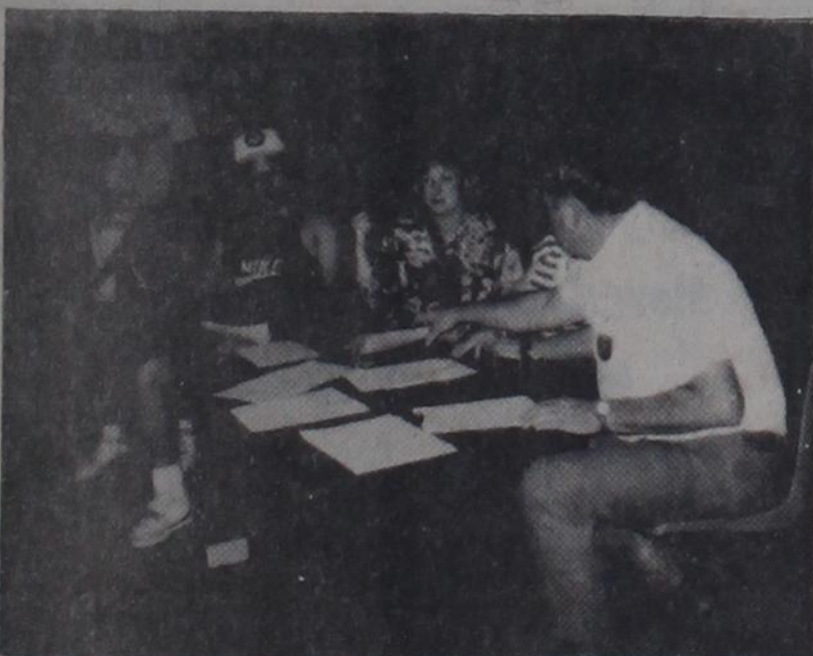

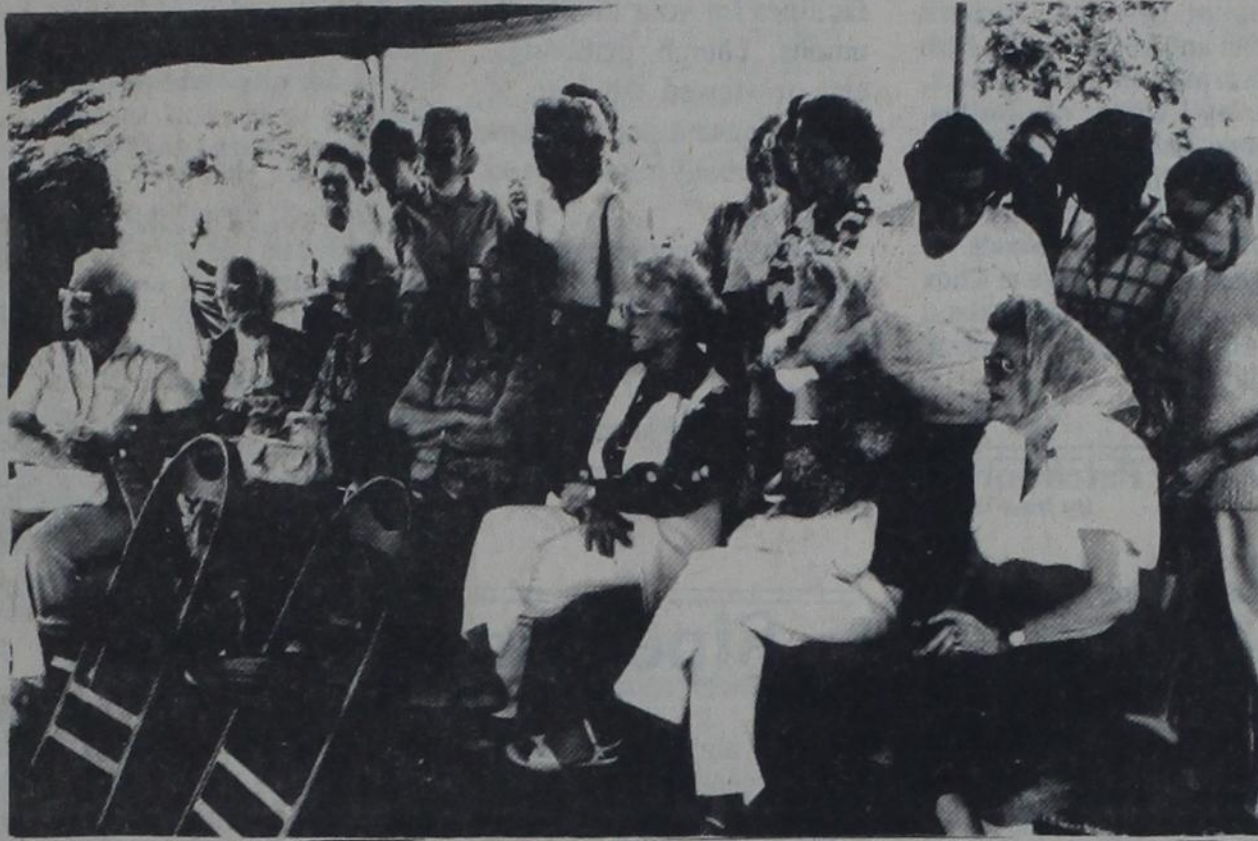

Memorial Day Service Held



Area citizens paid tribute to veterans at Rising Star Heritage Cemetery on Memorial Day.

Red Chamberlain, Roger Barron and the Rev. Darrell Dossey spoke the words paying tribute to our nation's veterans whose service to their country have meant so much through the years. Some 50 or 60 persons gathered at Rising Star Heritage Cemetery for a ceremony sponsored by the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture.

Earlier Gene Lyon, president of the Chamber, had placed United States flags

at the graves of veterans. He, and assistants Gene Hicks, L.T. Owen, Roger Barron and Roanen Barron, put out 144 flags to honor those who served in this country's armed forces.

The flags were placed at the graves which were recognized to be those of veterans by the types of stones the government issues. If there were graves which were not marked with flags and the families wish them to be included in

the 1990 Memorial Day service, let Gene Lyon know and the appropriate number of flags will be provided to the families.

The Chamber of Commerce commends its president for bringing to its attention that Memorial Day services were no longer held in Rising Star and for heading the committee to reestablish the custom.

Plans are being formulated to hold a work day prior to the services next year.

Eastland Hospital District Bill Signed

A bill allowing for creation of Eastland Memorial Hospital District was signed into law Saturday by Governor Bill Clements. The legislation was introduced in the Texas House of Representatives by Rep. Jim Parker, D-Comanche, and in the Senate by Sen. Bob Glasgow, D-Stephenville.

The measure provides for a local option election to de-

cide whether the Eastland Memorial Hospital District should be created or property taxes levied to support it.

Under the legislation the tax rate cannot exceed 37.5 cents on each \$100 of property valuation, nor can any of the taxes be used to pay off revenue bonds.

Two-hundred registered voters must petition the temporary Board of Regents before an election can be called.



Texas Gas Production Up In Month Of March

Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 481,556,435 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in March, compared to the February gas production total of 437,962,274 Mcf. March production was down 0.88 percent compared to March

1988's production total of 485,848,390 Mcf.

Eastland County produced 1,285,813 Mcf (1,000 cubic feet) of gas in March, according to figures from the Texas Railroad Commission.

Texas gas production in March came from 190,600 oil wells and 46,532 gas wells.

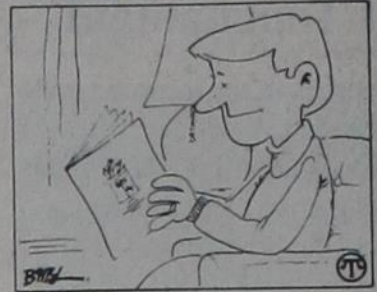

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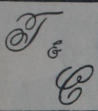
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BEHIND THE HEADLINES

America's Sense of Humor

Whenever life seems to be getting too grim and serious, Americans have a way of finding something to laugh about. Throughout the worst of times, our national sense of humor has served as a get-well tonic. Or at least as a palliative to ease the pain until things get better.

Take for example the 1988 election campaign. Just when the rhetoric was getting nasty and feelings were turning ugly, along came a catchy little ditty called, "Don't Worry, Be Happy." Recorded by jazz singer, Bobby McFerrin, the song swept the country like a welcome breeze after a July thunderstorm. Soon, millions of Americans were whistling the tune, and radio jocks couldn't keep up with listeners requests.

Arriving along with the "song-of-the-year," came another sensation: "The Smiley Face." Resurrected from the late '60's and early '70's, the cartoon face with the dot-like eyes and U-shaped mouth soon appeared on everything from T-shirts to boxer shorts.

Some leading department stores cottoned onto the craze with "Don't Worry, Be Happy" shops and boutiques. Paris and Tokyo stores followed suit. *Newsweek's* Bill Barol nominated 1989 as "The Year of Sweetness and Lite," warning that America was getting a little too cheerful for its own good.

Don't bet on it. In a new book called *The Trusting Heart*, Duke University psychiatrist Redford B. Williams argues that a bad attitude is hazardous to your health. Of all the traits associated with so-called Type A behavior, writes Williams, the only ones that are truly predictive of early death are hostility, cynicism and aggression. And the antidote? "Laugh at yourself," says Williams.

There's a famous American who seems to have grown

younger by doing just that - Ronald Reagan. He left the White House, still smiling, after two terms with the highest popularity rating on record. Not unexpectedly, a book soon appeared, called: *Gripping with the Gipper: A Celebration of the Wit, Wisdom and Wisecracks of Ronald Reagan* (Atlantic Monthly Press, 19 Union Square West, New York, N.Y. 10003, \$6.95). Edited by James Denton and Peter Schweitzer, the work is a treasure trove of humor that will enliven the pages of presidential history for all time.

Here are some excerpts: Addressing a high school graduating class in Glassboro, New Jersey, in 1986, Reagan quipped: "There are advantages to being elected president. The day after I was elected, I had my high school grades classified Top Secret." On another occasion, Reagan offered an appreciative audience of older adults his definition of middle age: "That's when you're faced with two temptations and you choose the one that'll get you home at nine o'clock."

President Reagan had a knack for getting laughs, even from the Russians. At one summit conference, he is said to have asked Gorbachev if it was true that "the communists now have a million-dollar lottery for the people - the winner gets a dollar a year for a million years!" (Distributed by America's Future, Inc., New Rochelle, N.Y.)

Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board Accepting Applications For Grant Funds

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board is accepting applications for more than \$2.5 million in grant funds to improve the quality of precollege (K-12) instruction in mathematics and science in Texas. Grants are awarded for 12 months.

The grant funds, available to Texas under the new Dwight D. Eisenhower Mathematics and Science Education Act must be used to improve the teaching skills of K-12 teachers and increase student access to mathematics and science courses. The Eisenhower Act reauthorized the predecessor statute, Title II of the Education for Economic Security Act (EESA). Applications must be submitted to the Coordinating Board by Aug. 1, 1989.

Thirty to forty (30 to 40) grants ranging from \$25,000 to \$65,000 each will be awarded to support coopera-

tive teacher training programs between higher education institutions, local school districts, and regional service centers, said Nan Broussard, Coordinating Board Title II program director.

Another four to five grant awards above \$100,000 will finance the development and/or implementation of demonstration models specifically designed to increase the access of the State's growing minority student population to mathematics and science education and careers.

The Coordinating Board will announce the grant awards at its October meeting. Projects funded under this grant application must be completed by October 1990.

24,000 School Kids Read For Six Flags

More than 24,000 children will visit Six Flags Over Texas free of charge during the month of June, because they spent six hours of their spare time reading.

The youngsters from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana were enrolled by their teachers in the theme park's Read to Succeed program, which is designed to encourage recreational reading.

The children, in grades 1 through 8, represent 564 schools in the four state area.

Under the program Six Flags provides a special reading course with teaching materials to participating schools at no charge.

Bugs Bunny and his Looney Tunes pals are used in the classroom materials to catch the attention of the young students.

One phase of the program is the 600 Minute Reading Club. It challenges students to devote 600 minutes of their own time to reading, with their progress to be confirmed by their parents or teacher.

Those who successfully complete the six hours of recreational reading are provided with a complimentary Six Flags ticket which they may use on the day of their choice during the month of June.

Six Flags president Bob Bennett said 24,003 students qualified for the ticket awards during the school year now drawing to a close. "Last year," Bennett said,

"slightly over 7,000 children earned park tickets, so we've seen a tripling of participation this school year."

He continued, "With 2,500 student hosts and hostesses on our seasonal staff, we have many reasons to be interested in quality education. Read to Succeed is just one of the vehicles we use to show our support of the schools, both public and private."

Bennett said the theme park also co-sponsors a weekly current events program for all grades. Like the reading program, News Currents is prepared by a staff of top educators working with Knowledge Unlimited of Madison, Wisconsin.

News Currents presents a weekly summary of current events accompanied by a film strip and detailed instructional aids for teachers

on the elementary, middle school and high school levels.

More than 1,000 teachers in some 300 schools used the program during the 1988-89 school year. It was seen weekly by more than 56,000 youngsters.

The News Currents program culminated last month with a Current Events Challenge, pitting teams of students from all three grade levels against one another in a fast-paced test of their current events knowledge. Members of the winning teams each received a \$200 U.S. Savings Bond.

Other educational programs sponsored by Six Flags Over Texas include a yearly Physics Day and Band Festival competitions which attract high school bands from across the country.

graduates with a valid driver's license and experience in child care or babysitting. They will join carefully screened families to provide live-in child care. In return they receive room, board, a minimum of \$125 per week and 1 1/2 days off per week plus the opportunity to explore an exciting city or region. Companions can also enroll in college courses paid for, in part, by their Host Family. Upon completion of one year with the program, Family Companions receive a bonus of a free trip to Europe worth \$1,000.

AIFS specializes in educational exchange programs. In 1989 the organization celebrates its silver anniversary. More than 325,000 students and teachers have participated in international learning and cultural exchange programs through AIFS since 1964.

Currently AIFS operates the first legal, nationwide Au Pair program which brings European men and women to

American families through a carefully administered cultural exchange program. The enormous success of the Au Pair in America program prompted AIFS to found the Family Companion program. American Family Companions will work along side the European Au Pairs sharing the discovery of a new city and participating in activities and events together.
