Fruit growers are watching the weather forecasts and hoping that there are no more hard freezes. We didn't think the fruit had been damaged by the light freeze, but Tommy Rice, manager of the Smith Fruit Farm at Carbon, called to report a 75 percent kill of fruit by the freeze. Mrs. Stan Weekes, whose husband owns the Freeman Orchard near Ranger, said she didn't think they had received much damage. Mrs. Weekes said the temperature had dropped to 28 degrees, but only for a short period.

Before planting your vegetable garden this year, take precautions against harmful insects.

Wireworms, white grubs, mole crickets, cutworms, flea beetle larvae, fly larvae and maggots are among the insects that feed on the seed, roots and other underground parts of vegetables.

Areas which have been in sod for over two years, that have had the same crops every year, or areas that have large amounts of organic matter are most susceptible to soil insects.

It's important to use the right kind of insecticide on your garden. Many insecticides may be harmful to certain vegetables and only a few can be used safely. Diazion and chlordane are

two commonly used insecticides that are safe for gardens. However, root crops should not be planted in soil treated with chlordane. Apply the insecticide about

two to four weeks before the garden is to be planted. Work the insecticide into the top four to six inches of soil and make sure it is evenly distributed.

To cover 1,000 square feet of soil with diazinon, use six fluid ounces of 25 percent emulsifiable concentrate. Mix it with enough water to cover the entire soil area. If you use powder use 1/2 cup of 50 percent wettable powder mixed with adequate water. To cover 1,000 square feet of garden area with chlordane, use two fluid ounces of 72 percent emulsifiable concentrate mixed with water or 34 cup of 40 percent wettable powder mixed with water.



No where is the fad more popular than in Texas where an estimated 206,000 CB operators chatter away on the 23 channels authorized by the Federal Communications Commission for citizens broadcasts.

During 1975, more than half a million dollars worth of CB radios were stolen in Dallas alone, and during one seven month period there were 1,638 reported CB thefts.

The new ruling, which after January 1, means that unless the vehicle owner purchases coverage specifically for his CB, it will not be protected on his insurance policy.

Equipment valued up to \$750 may be insured for \$17 per year. For \$751-\$1500 in coverage, it would cost \$27. For equipment worth more than \$1500, it is \$53. Rates are set by the State Board of Insurance, which will review them periodically when there is additional statistical

These coverages may also be purchased under a different line of insurance, though the rates are generally higher.

Portable units that are moved from one car to another can be insured by a separate policy. Even if the radio is not insured, any damage done directly to an automobile by a thief comes under the standard comprehensive coverage of the policy.

A "hit" by a thief takes less time than it took for the owner of the CB to make the first payment. Typically, a thief goes to a large public function such as a basketball game looking for cars in the parking lot which sport a CB antenna.

It might take two and half minutes to open a locked car. Once in the car, the thief uses a bolt cutter and screw driver to remove the unit. At home the serial number, which is often pasted on, will be removed and unit sold to a "fence"

-First, record the serial number and date and place of purchase of CB equipment and keep the information with other

-Second, use an electric engraving tool or any sharp object to inscribe some identifying mark (such as a social security of driver's license number) on the back of the radio. Also, scratch your initials in some secret corner of the unit. The only way the police can return a stolen unit to you is if you are able to identify it properly.

- Third, if you park your car in a public place, remove the antenna and unit (if possible) and lock them in the trunk of take them with you.

- Fourth, buy CB equipment only from a franchised or reputable dealer. If it can be proven that you knew a unit was stolen when you bought it, you can be convicted as an

Phony As A \$2 Bill? --- Not Anymore

The Treasury withdrew \$2 bills from circulation in 1966, largely because their relative scarcity dampened public acceptance. About six million \$2 bills - - only a third of one percent of the Nation's outstanding currency - - were circulating in 1966.

By contrast, about 225 million notes will be available on April 13. And about 400 million notes - - the projected average annual production - - will be

circulating by July 4. The new \$2 note is expected to reduce the huge volume of \$1 notes in circulation, producing




