Fish can be a welcome and nutritious addition to the picnic basket, suggests the Seafood Marketing Division of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Picnics can happen most of the year in Texas, but with Daylight Savings Time here again there's an extra hour to enjoy them.

The success of a picnic depends heavily on how good the food is. The old favorites are fine, but sometimes a little variation can add a lot of interest.

Potato salad, for instance, is a good old standby but for a change try it with fish, as in "Texas - Tater Salad." Or take along a "Smoked Fish Log," for some tasty outdoor nibbling.

TEXAS - TATER SALAD
1 1/2 lbs. fish fillets
2 cups cooked potatoes, cut into small pieces
3 eggs, cooked hard and chopped

1/2 cup grated carrot
2/3 cup salad dressing
2 Tbs. chopped onion
pepper to season
1 tsp. salt
Place fillets in boiling, salted water. Cover and simmer about 10 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Drain. Remove skin and bones; flake. Mix all ingredients together and place in refrigerator until cold. Serve on lettuce. Serves six.

SMOKED FISH LOG
2 cups flaked fish or 1 lb. smoked fish fillets
1 tsp. liquid smoke, if not using smoked fish
1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened

1 Tbsp. lemon juice
2 tsp. grated onion
1 tsp. horseradish
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup chopped pecans
2 Tsp. chopped parsley
Assorted crackers
Poach, drain and flake fish. Combine cheese, lemon juice, onion, horseradish, liquid smoke, salt and fish; mix thoroughly. Chill for several hours. Combine pecans and parsley. Shape fish mixture into a log. Roll in nut mixture. Serve with crackers. Makes approximately two cups spread.

Mental Health Services Offered To Seven Counties

To observe National Mental Health Month in Texas this month, the Mental Health Mental Retardation Center will feature articles in the next few editions of the Cisco Press.

The Mental Health Mental Retardation Center for Central Texas, located at 100 Melwood, continues to serve approximately 195 - 200 clients a month. The Center serves a seven county area including Mills, San Saba, Comanche, Coleman, McCulloch, and Eastland.

Professional staff is on hand 24 hours a day to assist the residents of these seven counties in treatment for emotional and - or behavioral problems. Individual or group settings are utilized in treatment under the supervision of the Center's Clinical Director, Dr. Joe H. Oliver, psychiatrist. Parental counseling is available for parents who are experiencing problems with their children, whatever they may be.

The Center is for people with problems in living, such as, difficulties in adjusting to school or job; problems in dealing with other people; unhappy family relationships; temper outbursts or uncontrollable behavior; and excessive worry, anxiety or prolonged depressed feelings.

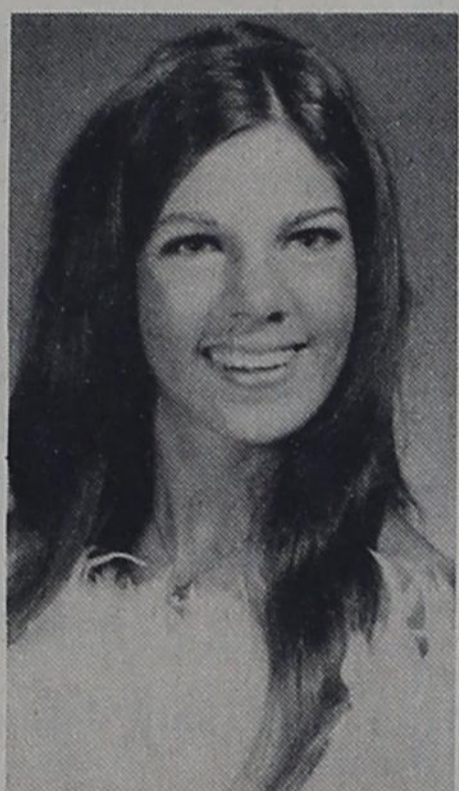
This year's season of summer rodeos will mark the 20th consecutive year of the event. The season will be inaugurated Saturday, May 27, by a parade through the

Voters in Eastland, Ranger, Carbon, Gorman and Desdemona will be making decisions in state races including: U.S. Senate;

Governor; Lt. Governor; Comptroller; and State Senate, 22nd district.

In Rising Star, voters will also choose between run off candidates Curt Smith and L.T. Owen, who are both seeking nomination as County Commissioner, Precinct, 3; and Constable, Justice Precinct, No. 3, which pits Run Off

Candidates W.H. Kornegay and Arley Bibby.

In Olden, voters will make the statewide choices and also pick between Dick Hodges and Jim Everett for Democratic Precinct Chairman, Precinct No. 2. Neither name appeared on the May Primary ballot, but both men received write in votes.

In the state races, Former Senator Ralph W. Yarbrough is opposed by Barefoot Sanders for nomination to see which will run against Republican John Tower in the November General Election.

Dolph Briscoe and Mrs. Frances Farenthold seek the nomination for the governor's post.

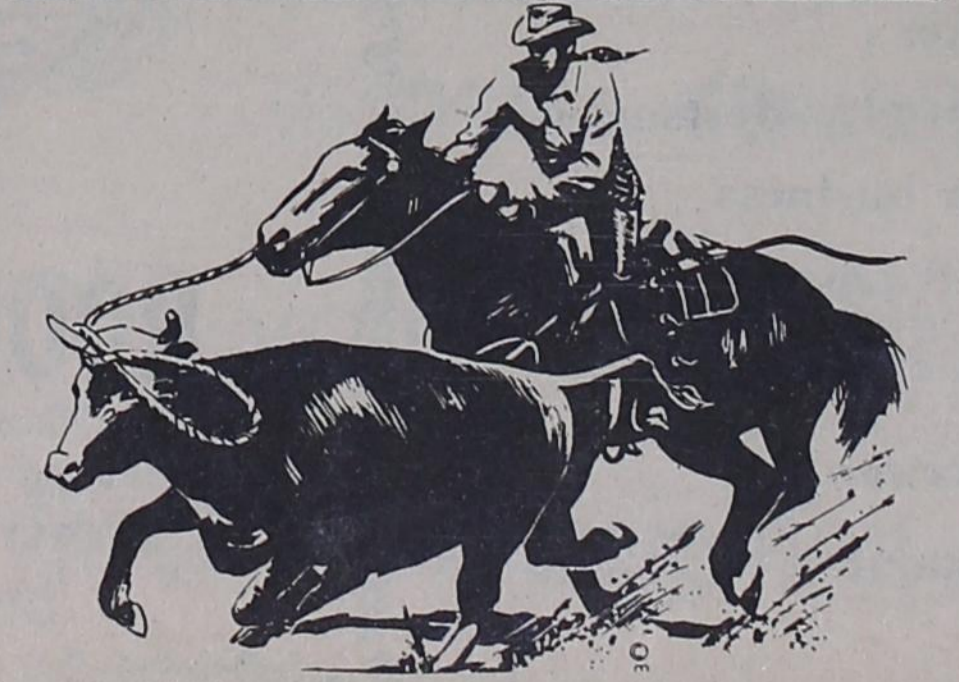
Bill Hobby and Wayne W. Connolly are in a run off for Lt. Governor.

Noe is the time to control the pecan nut casebearer in

Eastland County.

Judging from the insect activity in pecan orchards and groves, County Agent, De

Gordon predicted that May 17th through May 20th was the best time to spray pecan trees.

Gordon emphasized that the insect development will vary from one place to another in the county. Growers should check their own trees for egg deposits and feeding of newly hatched larvae to determine the optimum time to spray. When one

to two percent of the young nuts have been punctured by the casebearer it is time to spray, the agent said.

Gordon urged commercial pecan growers to have their sprayer and insecticides ready and make daily checks in the orchard or grove to observe egg deposits and feeding of the small worms.

Adult mothers deposit small eggs - barely visible to the naked eye on the tips of the pecans. Eggs hatch in four or five days and the young larvae migrate to buds below the nuts to feed. After a day or two, they enter the nuts at the base. The insecticide should be applied when a majority of the eggs are hatching.
