



Pharmacy Topics

Extensive study at Harvard University school of Public Health indicates that moderate alcohol intake -- one or two drinks a day -- substantially cuts the risk of heart disease.

After pupils are dilated for an eye examination, new eye drops return them to normal quickly so patients can resume their usual activities. Dapiprazole is approved by the Food and Drug Administration.

The mercury in tooth fillings -- a small amount in the silver amalgam -- poses no health threat to patients, the National Institutes of Health concluded. The amalgam has been in use for almost 150 years.

Measles is on the rise, perhaps because only 60 percent of youngsters in some areas have been immunized. Children generally should have the first shot at 15 months, the Centers for Disease Control suggest.

Temporary memory lapses may be caused by low levels of zinc and iron. Research at the University of Texas in Galveston suggests that supplementation of both minerals helpsrestore short-term memory.



FOR THE most part it was the name of an un-pronounceable town in Germany, but we did know that Oberammergau was the passion play and wood carving town, and since we've always been somewhat of a whittler, it was a place we wanted to visit. And while our own creations have pretty much been saw dust and shavings, we weren't disappointed in what we saw in the little German Alpine village. The three of us bused from Garmisch on a cold and drippy day, and found a warm and picture book-pretty dream town. The main streets are lined with beautifully frescoed houses shops, occupied by families whose men are engaged in highly skilled which wood-carving craft, flourished for over three centuries carving Fine there. Oberammergau's route to economic recovery after the ravages of the Thirty Years' War and the art and the town thrive today, thank goodness.

The town is probably better known for the Passion Play, which is performed once every decade in years ending with zero in faithful accordance to a solemn vow. The play started as an offering of thanks, commemorating the fact that the Black Plague stopped in 1633 as though by miracle, just short of the village. It was first performed in 1634 and has been repeated every decade.



Oberammergau

We visited the amphitheater where the 16-act, 5 1/2-hour play is presented depicting the final days of Christ from the Last Supper Crucifixion the through Resurrection, against an open-air mountain backdrop from late May to late September. Some 1,500 locals are involved in the production, and the little town is swelled by thousands and thousands of people during the Play season. It must be a traffic nightmare and a not-to-be-forgotten experience.

Unbelievably detailed and fine carvings fill the shops and the windows. Nativity scenes traditional particular, angles, figures and all the gee-gaws so familiar to wood carving are to be found. And we're talking BIG bucks for the hand-done pieces, although router-reproduced, and/or castings of the more familiar pieces are reasonable prices. at available You get the impression that the carvers are a tightly-knit guild of craftsmen who closely guard their skills and keep the prices UP. We were there in November and the crowds were not heavy so we're quessing that they may have three months or so of severe winter, with few sales, so they have to make it the rest, of the year when crowds are heaviest.

In season, classes in carving, pottery and painting are available, and the museums are open year-round.

The frescoes here are famous, although they can be seen in most of Bavaria. We understand that local ordinances prohibit altering or removing these colorful housing decorations once they are in place.

The locals tell you that the long, hard mountain winters preclude much income from farming and agriculture, so the people turned to crafts, and so born out of need,



their work is known worldwide. Dating to the Roman Empire, the carvings were found as early as the 16th century. Nearby forests of linden and alderwood in vast quantities provide the raw materials, and from the beginning, Bible themes were popular: Christ's crucifixion, Mary, and the crib scenes, and the most famous "Christ on the cross," theme led nickname Herrgottsschnitzer, Kraxentrager carvers. (curbstone traders), or what we'd call peddlers, using a wooden carrying frame (Kraxe)

took the carvings all over Europe to sell. Today, a model in the village square is a reminder of those times of long, long ago.

Another unique Oberammergau skill is that of glass painting in which the work is done in reverse: on the backside with the background done last! Beautiful and so fine.

King Ludwig II, a benefactor of the town, is remembered by the village and his famous Linderhof Castle is nearby. Gene and Clara White of Eastland lived in this area while he was in the service.

Dr. H.J. Bulgerin



Dr. H. J. Bulgerin, 65, of Eastland passed away Thursday, Jan. 9 1992 at Hendrick medical Center in Abilene. Services were held at 11 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 11, 1992 at the Edwards Funeral Home Chapel in Eastland with Dr. Vaughn Baker officiating. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

Dr. Bulgerin was born February 10, 1926, in the community of Sommerset in Atascosa County, Texas. His family later moved to New Braunfels, where he grew up.

Bulgerin's father worked for United Gas Company, and his mother was a Librarian. Her love of literature and learning influenced Dr. Bulgerin and two other sons to get as much education as they

The family was Lutheran, and Dr. Bulgerin's brothers Melton William and Davis Lewis Bulgerin became Lutheran ministers.

Dr. Bulgerin had a varied background before he began to practice medicine. The country was in the middle of World War II when he graduated from New Braunfels High School in 1943. He enlisted in the Navy and became an Aviation Metalsmith.

When Bulgerin arrived

on Okinawa in May, 1945, he learned that his title could cover a wide field of

He was stationed with a combat aircraft service unit, which had to do everything from patching disabled aircraft to hauling fuel and guarding Japanese prisoners.

Patching up airplanes had its points, but another kind of "patching up" had much more interest for the young sailor. For the Navy had a large field hospital near the base, and there they received

Air Force casualties. H. J. could look beyond the mosquito netting and makeshift surroundings and watch surgery and other tense situations. He was fascinated, and began to admire the Doctors who battled for lives.

He began to wish he had the skills to accomplish something that meaningful.

War was the order of the day, however. The Island of Okinawa was being geared up for an invasion of Japan. But then an extremely heavy typhoon hit the Island, inflicting great losses on the Navy.

Bulgerin always believed that the loss from this typhoon was so disabling that it led to President Truman's decision to

drop the atomic bomb on Japan.

After the war was over Bulgerin returned home and enrolled in Southwestern University at Georgetown, Texas, where he majored in Chemical Engineering and took some pre-med basics. At Southwestern he met Loretta Davis, who later became his wife. In 1950 he graduated from the University Cum Laude, with a B.S. in Chemistry.

But he couldn't forget his desire to become a Doctor, so he enrolled at the University of Texas, Galveston to study medicine. During summers he worked at hospitals in Houston - two shifts per

While Bulgerin took studies leading to his M.D., Loretta Davis studied Medical Technology. They were married June

9, 1953 in Houston.

In 1954 Bulgerin graduated from the University in the top ten percent of his class. After that he served as Chief Resident at City-County Hospital in Fort Worth.

In 1955 Dr. Bulgerin visited Eastland, liked what he saw, and decided to set up a medical practice here. He went into partnership with Dr. B. B. Westbrook in an office across from the Courthouse Square.

Bulgerin always said he was happy about his decision to come to Eastland, that he considered it a great place to live and bring up a family.

From the time they came here he and his wife, Loretta, became interested in the community. They were civic workers, involved in politics, interested in the schools, and members of the First United Methodist Church. They were also to their home and chil-

After Dr. Westbrook left Eastland Bulgerin had an office with a Dr. Lindsey, who also moved away. Then came the remarkable partnership with Dr. B. B. Alexander, which lasted until Dr. Bulgerin's retirement in 1987.

In 1972 the Doctors Bulgerin and Alexander moved to the spacious B & W Clinic, located on West Plummer across from Eastland Memorial Hospital. The clinic is 1991 IN REVIEW

Bulgerin was a member of the Tri County Medical Society, the Texas Medical Association, the American Medical Association, and the Association of Physicians and Surgeons. In his last years of practice he became especially interested in the treatment of heart patients.

In addition to his medical practice, Dr. Bulgerin enjoyed several hobbies photography, hunting, collecting guns and stamps, and art.

Bulgerin was acquainted with state and national political figures, among them President George Bush. One day in 1964 Bush visited in the Bulgerin home and then toured Eastland. "He liked it, too!" reported the

Dr. Bulgerin's survivors include wife Loretta of Eastland, four sons, Steve of Weatherford, Donald of Tyler, Curtis of Round Rock, Kieth of Watauga; one daughter, Claudia Hurst of Weatherford, two brothers, Rev. David Bulgerin of Brenham and Rev. Melton Bulgerin of Eau Claire, and seven grandchildren.







erated that in his opinion there is more to gain over the long term with freer and fairer trade agreements. These agreement not only affect agriculture, they will affect the oil and gas industry too, an industry of vital concern to this area.

This year's import of peanuts was not necessary, is Stenholm's opinion. He feels imports should be brought in to fill definite shortages, with people from the industry with the actual shortages sitting in on meetings before those imports are allowed.

Imports of peanuts are to be controlled and limited to 3 percent, under the agreements, he said. Having the President make trade an issue is a plus, even though the recent trip abroad did not meet expectations, Stenholm said.

Another point brought up at the meeting is the average age of the American farmer, which is 55. Young farmers need help, said one citizen. In a related area, Stenholm said he would like to see tax incredit on long term capilower capital gains tax on long term holdings.

He also supports eliminating deficit spending by the Federal Government. Stenholm is a member of the Budget Committee and a is working on a 10year plan to balance the budget. An amendment to the Constitution requiring a balaned budget is another project he is work-

ing on. "Keep letting Congress know" your opinions, Stenholm told his listeners. Congressmen need to know how their constituents feel on the issues
