Sheriff Dee Hogan Monday requested that County Commissioners approve money to hire an additional Deputy. Hogan handed Judge Scott Bailey and the three Commissioners present a leaf-

L. T. Owen reported that some were also within the City of Rising Star, and he would like to have them removed. District Attorney Emory Walton told the Commissioners that the County might be held liable where county signs are posted inside city limits.

Main Hunting Seasons In Texas

The fall and winter months are the main hunting seasons in' Texas. Consequently, advertising for hunting equipment, ammunition and firearms, plus a few news stories about hunting accidents tent to heighten public awareness

even more people-including children-are accidentally killed in homes where guns are kept for self-defense. These domestic tragedies occur throughtout the year. According to officials at the Texas Department of Health (TDH), mishaps with firearms of all types are the third leading cause of accidental death among children ages 5-14 (after motor vehicle accidents and drownings). Most of these shootings can be attributed to adult irresponsibility in allowing children access to

loaded guns. In a recent report in "Texas Medicine," the journal of the Texas Medical Association, TDH's Dr. Patti Patterson said that firearm accidents comprise less than 5 percent of shooting deaths among adults, "but they are a major part of (firearm-related)morality in children." Dr. Patterson is pediatric consultant to the TDH Associate Commissioner for Family Health Services.

Dr. Patterson and her co-

a professor of epidemiology in San Antonio's UT School of Public Health, found that from 1984, some 337 Texas children younger than 15 died from firearm injuries. About 43% of those deaths were accidental, while 41% were intentional homicides, 15% were suicides and the cause of the remaining 1% was unknown.

The authors said that their own research and other studies confirm that most fatal shooting accidents among children occur in homes, when unsupervised children play with loaded, improperly stored guns. "Many tragic incidents have occurred when children have mistaken real guns for toys," Dr. Patterson said.

Dr. Patterson recommends that physicians counsel parents about potentioal dangers posed firearms in the home. In addition, she advises parents who decide they need to keep a gum at home to follow basic firearm safety rules:

*Never keep a gun loaded,

*Keep guns and ammunition locked in separate places; *Always treat a gun as if it were loaded and ready to fire; *Never allow children access to a gun;

*Have a gunsmith check antique or souvenir guns to be sure they are disarmed, preferably modifying them so they can not fire; and

*Be sure that gun owners in homes where children may visit also follow the same safety rules.

An estimated 830,000 develop diabetes. Texans — about one in 20 have diabetes mellitus. However, only about half even know they have the disoping serious health complications such as eye problems, nerve damage, heart disease and kidney disease.

illness from diabetes, the Texas Department of Health has joined a national effort

during November, Diabetes Month, to make the public more aware of the importance of proper health care for diabetics.

Diabetes is one of the top ten leading causes of death in Texas. It is also the leading cause of new causes of blindness and the leading cause of lower extremity amputations not related to injury.

People at risk for diabetes include those who: have a family history of diabetes, are 40 and older, and/or are overweight. Also, American Indians, Mexican-Americans and blacks are more likely than others in the U.S. to

Adult onset diabetes is most likely to To help prevent death and develop during middle age, and as an already overweight population ages, an increase in the adult form of the dis-

ease is expected. In addition, members of Texans' growing black and Hispanic populations are more likely to get this disease. Diabetes is 33% more common among blacks. Black women have 50% more diabetes than Anglo women and face an even greater risk if they are obese.

Hispanics have three to five times the risk of developing diabetes as Anglos. One study in San Antonio showed that

persons with Type I, or insulin dependent, diabetes require regular insulin injections to control their blood sugar levels. Type I usually occurs in young children. There is no known way to prevent this type of diabetes.

Adults, however, are more likely to contract non-insulin dependent, or Type II, diabetes which often can be controlled by a combination of dietary therapy and regular exercise. Type II patients may also take oral medications that help to control their blood sugar. Approximately 90% of all diabetes cases are Type П.

In either type of diabetes, dietary management is crucial to controlling blood sugar level. Diabetes therapy is intended to strike a balance between the effects (on blood sugar levels) of food intake, physical activity and medication. Each person with diabetes should have a prescribed nutrition plan, designed to meet that individual's specific needs.

In most cases, by following the doctor's treatment plan the patient can lead an other wise active, "normal" life, Failure to do so can lead to kidney failure, strokes, blindness, heart disease, amputations — even premature death.


Risk for developing Type II diabetes can be reduced by keeping weight at a moderate level, getting regular exercise, abstaining from smoking, using alcohol in moderation, reducing stress and getting regular medical checkups.



heart disease decreased meer, according to the Texas slightly by 641, from 40,803 in 1988 to 40,162 in 1989. However, the number of cancer deaths increased by 1.438, from 25.880 in 27.318 in 1989.

Cerebrovascular disease ranked third among the leading causes of death, claiming 8,343 Texans in 1989, while accidents ranked fourth, with 6,540 victims.

Completing the list of 10 leading killers were: (5) bronchitis, emphysema, asthma and allied condition-4,337; (6) pneumonia and influenza-3,869; (7) diabetes mellitus-2,872; (8) homi-

cide-2,086; (9) suicide-2,073; and (10) chronic liver disease and cirrhosis-1,606. The remaining 25,357 deaths of Texas residents in 1989 were attributed to other causes.

Dr. Robert Bernstin, Texas Commissioner of Health, said, "Death for whatever cause is always tragic, but since heart disease, cancer and some of the other leading killers are largely preventable, it is even more saddening." The commissioner said that individuals can dramatically reduce the risk of heart disease and cancer by developing healthful lifestyles.

'Young people should be aware that many illnesses in older people are the result of years of bad habits, such as smoking," Dr. Bernstein said. He said that physicians

usually can help patients to manage dibetes, high blood pressure and tendencies toward obesity, all of which can contribute to heart problems. Individuals can learn to correct their high blood cholesterol, and add needed exercise to improve their overall health.

Cancer prevention includes: not smoking, having regular checkkups, maintaining a proper diet, using a sunscreen and protective clothing in the sun, and limiting exposure to chemicals and other cancer-causing substances.
