## County Commissioners Vote To Vandalism, Theft Make Lone Cedar County Road Jeopardize Lives

Eastland County Commissioners voted Monday to designate Lone Cedar Country Club Road and links of roads adjoining it as County Roads, and to maintain them as such.

Norman Christian, Comm. of Pct. 2, where the roads are located, made the motion of approval. Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, seconded the motion. L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3, and Billy Bacon, Pct. 4, joined with them in making the vote unanimous.

There was standing room only in the County Courtroom as the Commissioners considered what to do about this one mile of pavement leading south from FM 570 to the Clubhouse.

Joe Anderson and W.E. Sikes, President of Lone Cedar Country Club, brought a petition to the Court requesting that the road be declared a county road, and improvements be made. This petition was signed by 204 people.

W.E. Sikes said that the Lone Cedar Road was used by a mail route, a school bus, a state game warden, 242 Club members and their guests, and 40 families in that area of Lake Leon.

Lone Cedar Country Club was used by every community in the County, he stated. Last year more than 3,000 people were served meals there.

There was some discussion by the Commissioners as to whether to make the Lone Cedar Country Club Road improvement a County project, or to pay for it from Pct. 2 funds. Billy Bacon noted that it would cost about \$2500 per mile to seal coat the road.

Richard Robinson offered help from Pct. 1 with the seal coating, a little at a time. He said that the names of a number of people in his Precinct were probably on the petition list.

He also said there needed to be some ditches fixed to keep water from crossing the pavement.

"I will share the cost," Robinson told Christian.

Visitors to the Courtroom applauded when the Commissioners gave a favorable vote on the designation of The Lone Cedar Road. As most of them left, the Commissioners continued with the next item on the agenda—the measurement and reallocation of County Road Mileage for each Precinct, a discussion brought by Norman Christian and Richard Robinson.

County Judge Scott Bailey stated that 1975 was the last time mileage had been

figured on the rural roads. These figures are still used: 133.6 for Pct. 1, 139.9 for Pct. 2, 296.0, Pct. 3, and 164.4 for Pct. 4. The annual allotment for each Precinct is \$750 per mile.

Billy Bacon said: "This is different from at Cisco (the Lake). People rent that (homesites) from the City of Cisco, and I'm not going to maintain it."

He also said he felt "We're getting into a bed of worms" in getting county roads reallocated.

Robinson said that lines, boundaries and voting precincts were measured by population, not the length of the roads. He also said the Texas Highway Department was obligated to assist the counties in the determination of roadways, and this work should not cost anything.

"If it don't cost anything to do this, that's fine," Bacon said.

Judge Bailey concurred that the State Highway Department should assist in the measurement of county roads. He also suggested that the Commissioners might want to put an amendment on their request, stating that no Precinct would get less dollars from the reallocation of roads—and any Precinct gaining mileage would take this increase from General Funds.

The Commissioners voted to request the State Highway Department to measure the roads in each Precinct, consulting with each Commissioner. The Highway Department was also requested to place any road they considered a County Road on a map and assign a number to it.

In other action during the meeting the Commissioners gave approval for Norman Christian to advertise an old 30x50 ft. metal County barn in given for sale. This sits on .22 acres of land, and the land will be sold with the building.

Judge Bailey reported on information about the annual expenditures of the Department of Human Services in Eastland County. The Department is currently spending about \$6 million in the county, he said. This includes direct delivery services, contracted services, and staffing expenditures. Ten or twelve years ago the expenditures here were slightly over one million annually, he noted.

The Commissioners affirmed that the County

would pay Indigent Health Care expenses allowed for an individual who had appealed to them before.

Other matters included a report on the County Jail. Billy Bacon said that 20 prisoners were currently in the facility, which is under the population allowed by the "guidelines" of the Texas Jail Standards Commission.

The Commissioners approved pipeline crossings to Ray Richey Management, Pct. 1, Christie Gas Transmission, Pct. 2, and Northridge Corporation, Pct. 3.

Potentially ill Rising Star citizens are being put in jeopardy because of vandalism and theft.

When volunteers of the Rising Star Emergency Medical Service prepared to administer oxygen to a local resident early this week, it was discovered that all the valves on the ambulance unit's large tank were open and no oxygen remained in it. Luckily a smaller oxygen bottle was immediately available. Later it was found that both oxygen bottles in the other ambulance unit had also been emptied.

Just days earlier EMS was

transporting a patient to Brownwood Regional Hospital when it was discovered that fuel was low, apparently because it had been siphoned from the ambulance tank.

Lives could have been lost because of these acts of vandalism and theft. Donated funds were lost.

Anyone who tampers with the ambulances or the equipment may be prosecuted under the law.

Residents and motorists in the neighborhood are asked to keep an eye out for anyone who might be vandalizing the ambulances. Night watchmen have been alerted.

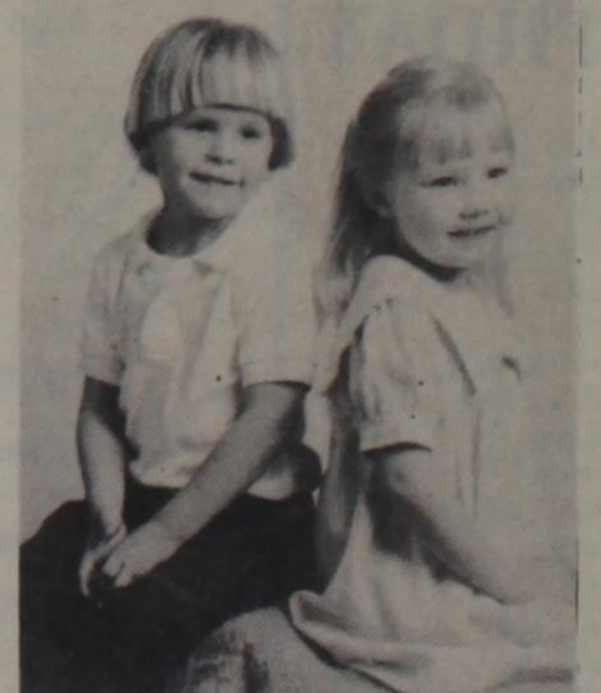
## All Stars to Play in Gorman Friday

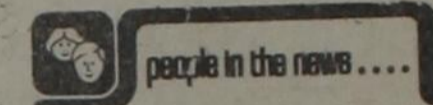

# OUR HERITAGE

## Changes in the Presidency

Today when the President of the United States travels, it is an event that calls for weeks of careful planning by a large number of staff members who must see to everything from communications to security. Scores of staff must travel with the president and separate airplanes are necessary to carry all the press who follow the chief executive's every move.

Just seeing to the communications needs of the president and those traveling with him is a major undertaking. Scores of direct lines to the White House must be in place so the president can continue to be in touch with all areas of the government, civilian and military, as well as with other world capitals.

Huge crowds turn out to greet the president. Local police, as well as the U.S. Secret Service, must be prepared for all those who want to see their elected leader.

Contrast that scene with the spring of 1791 when George Washington set out on a two-month tour of the Southern states. While Washington was traveling through North and South Carolina and Georgia, he was completely out of touch with his government. There were no telephones or telegraph lines to carry immediate messages. The postal service was slow and uncertain, and even if that were not the case, no one knew in advance where the president would be staying or for how long.

Mindful of this, Washington made provisions for decisions to be made while he was traveling. The federal government was much simpler in those days, and so it was only mildly surprising that the two months were so quiet that no decisions were called for in his absence.

Thomas Jefferson was worried about Washington's safety on his trip but not out of fear that the "Father of Our Country" would be attacked. In fact, Washington traveled without a guard of any kind. Jefferson's safety warnings were about the terrible conditions of the roads and highways Washington would have to travel.

No advance men traveled ahead of Washington's party to pave the way and see to arrangements. Instead, the small party simply sought a tavern or inn where Washington could buy a hot meal and the use of a bed for the night. Innkeepers were stunned to learn that their guest would be the world-famous George Washington.

When the tour was completed and Washington was back in what was then the capital, Philadelphia, he calculated he had traveled 1,887 miles. With some humor he noted that his horses had lost weight but he had gained a few pounds. What he had truly gained, however, was an accurate, first-hand survey of current public opinion. **ll**

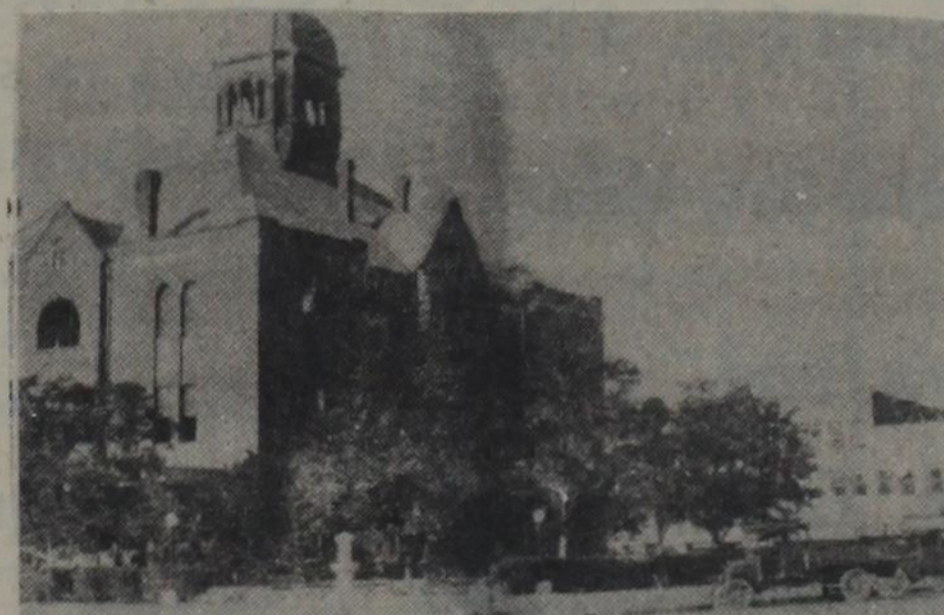

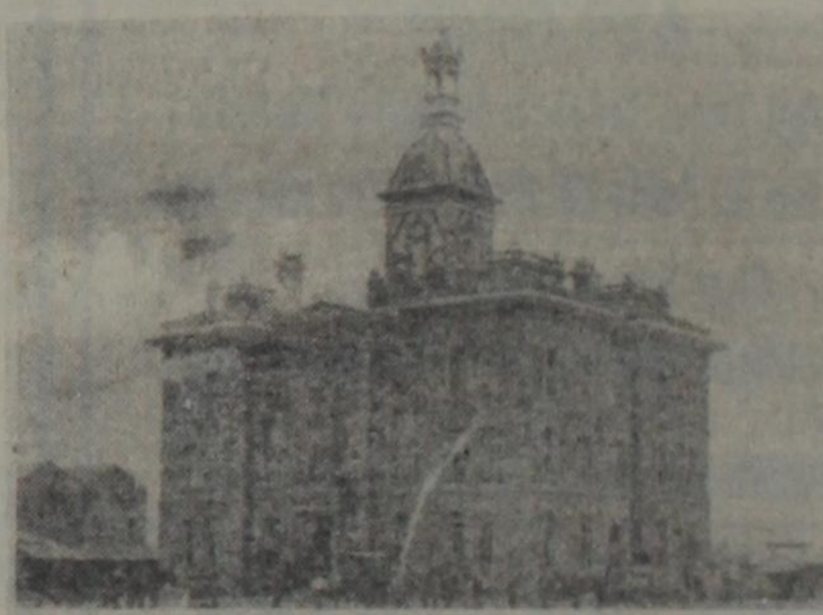

# Area News Briefs

**RANGER**  
The 26th Annual Ranger Jaycee Rodeo will hold a performance at 8:30 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 14-16. There will be many fast-moving events - bareback, bull and bronc riding, calf roping, team roping, and steer saddling. A Montana Silversmith belt buckle will be awarded for First Place in each event, excluding Steer Saddling. And don't forget the Little Miss and Jaycee Rodeo Queen Contest - these winners will be announced. A dance will be held each night of the Rodeo, with music by "Bandera."

Eastland County Commissioners voted Monday to designate the Lone Cedar Country Club Road and approx. 1 mile of auxiliary road in that area as County Roads. Improvements to the roadways are being planned. The Commissioners also voted to ask the State Highway Department to measure County road mileage for all the Precincts. Some reallocation may result from this survey. Norman Christian, Commissioners of Pct. 2, estimates there are about

10 miles of roads around Lake Leon which should be designated as County Roads.





# Drug Committee Is Formed

On Friday, July 8 the Citizen's Committee on Drug Abuse was officially formed. This committee has only one objective: confronting the drug problem in this area in every way that it needs to be confronted.

A great deal has been said lately, concerning what we in this area cannot do about the problem, along with a long list of reasons why we shouldn't even try. The Committee on Drug Abuse is determined not to be stopped cold by this type

of negative attitude.

To help insure that this will not happen we have decided that we will work as a very diversified group, composed of a cross section of the community and area. Among those who have endorsed our effort and expressed their intentions to work with us on an official or informal level are parents, school officials, law enforcement agencies, recovering addicts and other agencies and individuals. With this type of broadly based con-

cern and effort geared toward a common goal, there cannot help but be advancement toward this goal.

At the meeting on Friday night, three programs were approved by a majority vote. They are as follows:

1. (Establishment of a directory of area services available for chemically dependent persons and their families.) After printing, this directory would be made available to all who would be in a position to utilize it.
2. (Seminars and

workshops program for students.) The requirements for eligibility would be set up, so as to make the Scholarship a direct incentive for attendance of the Seminars and workshops. The content of these programs would be geared toward such things as the dangers of drug experimentation and abuse, peer pressure and how to manage it, coping skills, stress management, enhancement of self esteem, and other topics that would emphasize the positive aspects of being chemical free. Most importantly it would provide helpful skills to enable the student to remain chemical free.

3. (Scholarship program for Eastland County

schools.) The requirements for eligibility would be set up, so as to make the Scholarship a direct incentive for attendance of the Seminars and workshops.

(Both of the school programs will be presented to school officials and the school board for their approval, as will the contest and methods to be incorporated into each individual seminar and workshop.)

Also approved at the meeting Friday night, was a fundraising event to be held in September. This event will be a songwriter's showcase, and should prove to be a success, due to the wealth of talent in this area. Proceeds from this event will go towards the scholarship fund.

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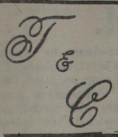

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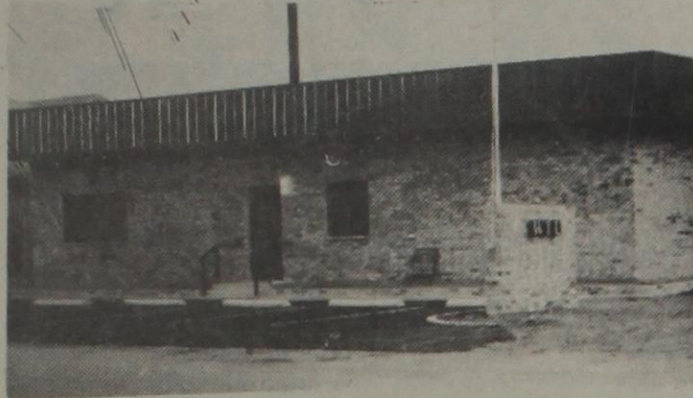

**Brazos Electric and TU Electric Reach Agreement**

WACO (July 6, 1988)--Brazos Electric Power Cooperative today announced an agreement with TU Electric intended to settle litigation related to the Comanche Peak nuclear plant.

Under the agreement, TU Electric will purchase Brazos Electric Power's 3.8 percent interest in the Comanche Peak plant and related nuclear fuel and transmission facilities. TU Electric will make Brazos Electric Power's loan payments on the project.

and \$322,000 for other expenses as part of the \$229 million settlement.

Brazos Electric Power received about \$22 million upon signing the agreement. At a closing anticipated for March 1989, the cooperative expects to receive another \$15 to 16 million. TU Electric will then begin making the cooperative's loan payments on the project to the Federal Financing Bank (FFB).

The agreement will require the approval of the Rural Electrification Administration, which guarantees Brazos Electric Power's FFB debt, the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation, the Texas Public Utility Commission, and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

Brazos Electric Power is based in Waco. It provides wholesale electric to 20 member cooperatives, seven municipal electric systems and Texas A&M University. These systems serve 233,000 consumers in a 66-county area of central and north Texas.

"We are very pleased with this agreement which we value at approximately \$229 million in today's dollars," said Richard E. McCaskill, executive vice president and general manager of Brazos Electric Power. "Its long-term effect on our rates and power supply structure should benefit our consumers," he said.

TU Electric will pay the cooperative \$19 million for nuclear fuel, \$15.3 million for litigation costs, \$2.5 million for transmission facilities,
