New Stone Marks Grave of Unknown Child

Impressed by the way citizens in the Sipe Springs area have tended to a roadside grave for well over a hundred years, local funeral home director Gene Lyon approached the monument company with which he does business about providing a

marker for the grave. Dave Deison, president of Rawlins Monument Co. of Weatherford, agreed to the request and sent workmen Ron Gaskill and David Burks to set the stone when they had other work in this area last Friday.

The grave is that of a three-year-old girl who died while her family was moving west in about 1870. It is surmised that they traveled in an ox-drawn cart and had camped overnight when the little girl died. The family had little choice but to bury their child there beside the trail. The story has been handed down by word of mouth and the name of the family has been forgotten.

Minnie McNeely and the students she taught at Center Point school, located just south of the grave, were faithful tenders of the little mound at the turn of the century. The school no longer exists.

Miss McNeely later married, and after they were grown her daughters, Amber Craddock and Jewell Huddleston, and the late S.P. McKeehan made a united effort to preserve the site by making homemade concrete markers. The caring teacher's son H.W. "Tex" Dukes is one of the present day keepers of the grave.

Passersby often place coins on the grave and as they accumulated Dukes used the money to replace the faded flowers that were kept on the grave of the unknown child,

With the new marker in place, he thinks it likely the coins will be donated to the newly organized Sipe Springs Volunteer Fire Depart-



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
