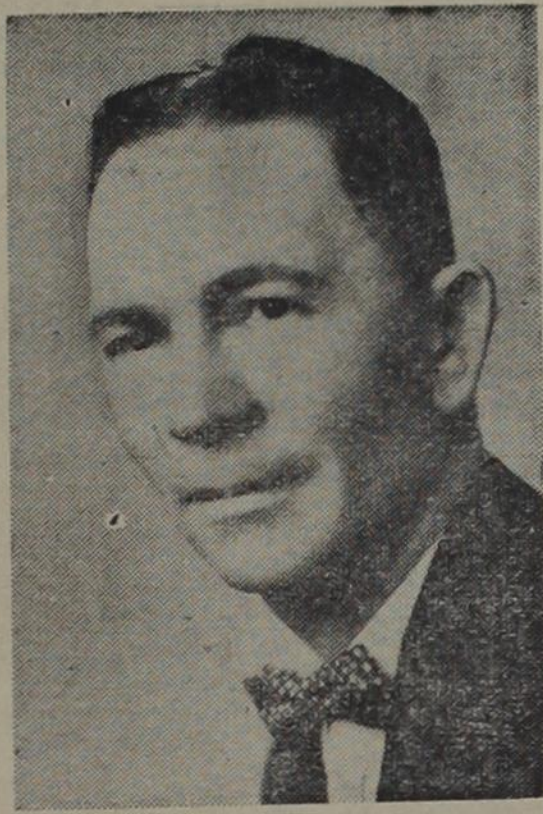
It was in North Texas University that she met her husband, Billie Phillips of Saint Jo. They both teach in his home town, as high school teachers.

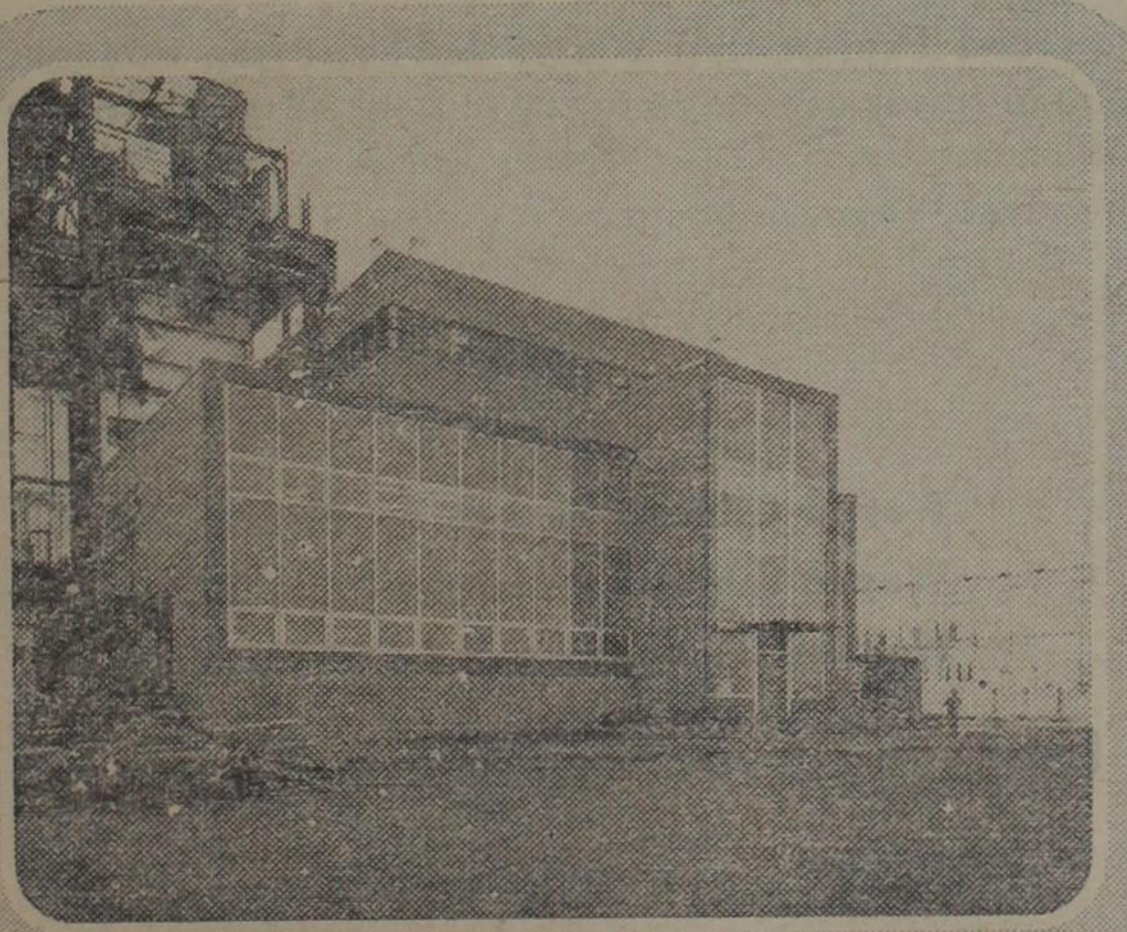

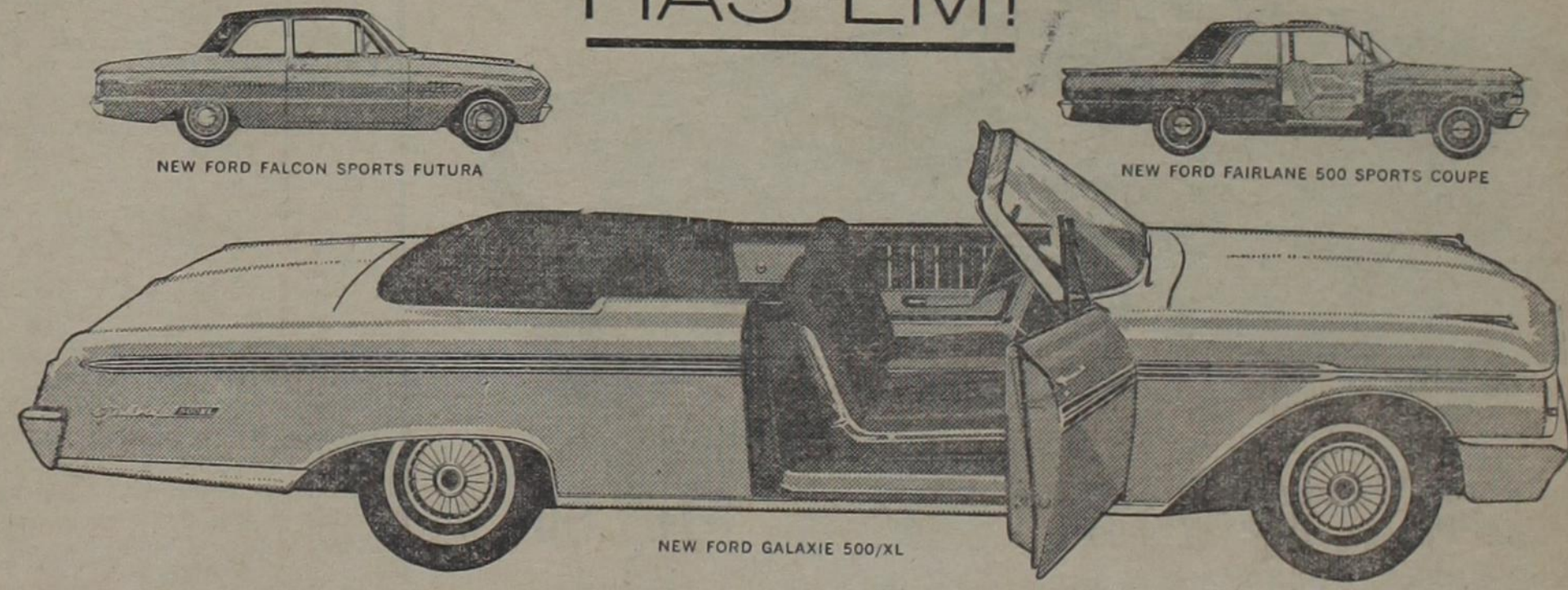

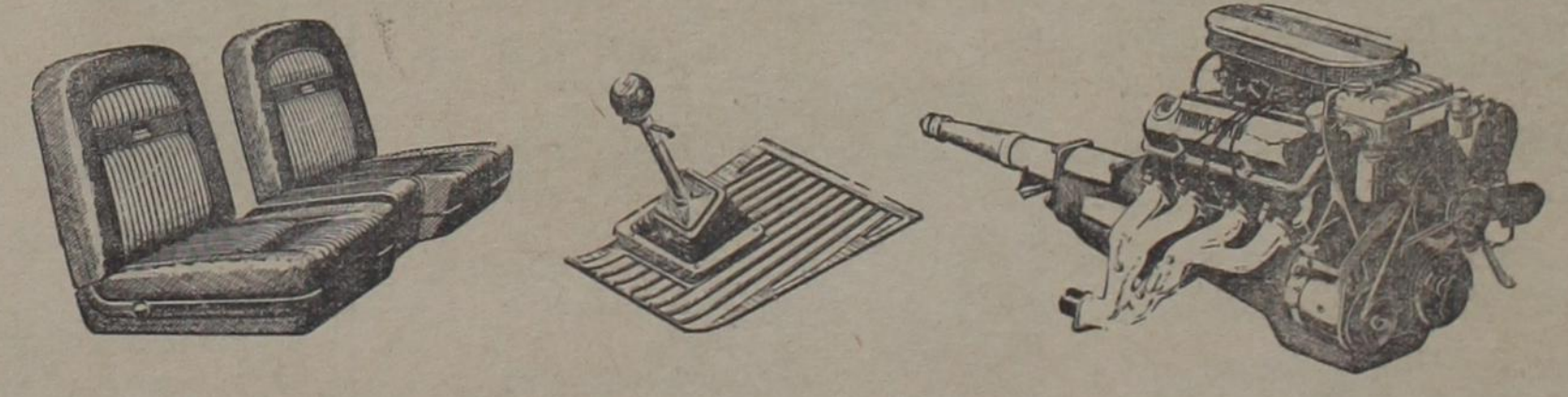

LAW DAY

For the fifth consecutive year, May Day has a special significance in this country. May 1st will again be observed as LAW DAY U.S.A. This is a special day dedicated across our nation to observance of the fact that we have a government of law instead of men. It is particularly appropriate that Americans set aside this day each year to demonstrate to the world — and to ourselves — that our belief in individual freedom under law remains strong and unshakable. Why is it that some men are able to live in freedom while others cringe under a rule of tyranny? We owe our rights and freedoms to our state and national constitutions, our laws, and our courts. In other lands, there are no rights and people are subjected to the edicts and whims of individuals unhampered by legal restraints.

Most of us tend to take it for granted that an individual is free to think for himself and that his rights are protected by law. We know without actually admitting it that our whole way of life is governed by this rule of law.

Law is the intangible force guaranteeing all of us freedom, peace and progress — ideals which have been, and are, dependent upon the adequacy of our legal system and the protection awarded the individual by our courts.

On May 1st then, this year and every year, with the nation's attention focused on LAW DAY

dictate our belief and faith in this rule of law that is the birthright of all Americans.

It is this liberty and equality under law that distinguishes our system of government from communism. Without laws and courts, these freedoms we take so for granted would be meaningless.

Our respect for law is vital to the continued growth and strengthening of our nation; our thoughtful observance of LAW DAY U.S.A., in a real sense distinguishes America from those who today live under tyranny; it is our answer to communism. LAW DAY U.S.A. is the American way.

More than 36,000 Texas homemakers are taking time out to tell of their work and invite other homemakers to join them in improving their home and communities.

Eastland county home demonstration women have planned some special activities for the week including: The Home Dem-

onstration Club Tea to honor the Outstanding Home Demonstration Club Woman of the Year on Wednesday, May 2, 1962 at 2:00 p.m. in the Basement of the First Baptist Church in Eastland. Several of the individual clubs are planning teas and observance of National Home Demonstration Week. Each club will have an exhibit in the windows of stores throughout the county, showing accomplishments through Home Demonstration club work. More than ever, improved family living depends upon expert management of resources by all family members. The margin between income and cost of necessities — food, clothing and shelter — is small. Programs in home demonstration clubs are designed to help families meet their needs. Up-to-date, reliable information in foods and nutrition, clothing, housing, home furnishings, household equipment, home management, health and safety, child care and development, is made available to families and homemakers through this phase of the Agricultural Extension Service of A&M College of Texas.

There are eight Home Demonstration clubs in Eastland county: The Flatwood H. D. Club; Lake Cisco H. D. Club; Morton Valley H. D. Club; Nimrod H. D. Club; North Star H. D. Club; Olden H. D. Club; Pleasant Hill H. D. Club and Word H. D. Club, with an active membership of approximately 160 ladies.

During National Home Demonstration Week, you are invited to attend a club meeting in your community or visit your county home demonstration agent's office in the basement of the County Courthouse to find out more about the program in Eastland County and to see the many kinds of bulletins and publications available.

New Publication On Texas Peaches Is Now Available

College Station — Strong consumer demand for quality tree-ripened peaches has developed in recent years and Texas peach growers can increase their share of the market by catering to this demand. To do this, Texas producers must continually strive for better cultural practices and improved harvesting, transportation and marketing methods.

Peach growing is a highly specialized, intensive type of agriculture and a topgrade fruitural factors. A good site is the result of a complex of cul- important and deep, fertile, well drained soil is essential. Other cultural practices, such as proper choice of variety, thorough site preparation, adequate spacing of trees, good pruning, proper fertilization and insect control are also indispensable.

In the production of quality fruit it is important that the peaches remain on the tree until they attain ripeness that insures good eating quality. This means that harvesting and marketing practices should be designated to protect the fruit and get it to the consumer in top shape. Picking and shipping containers should protect the fruit against bruising so that an attractive product will reach the consumer.

Decreasing handling and transportation time has become more important because of the perishability of tree-ripened fruit. Texas peach growers, therefore, tend more and more to market their fruit in a local area and avoid long hauls to

market. For more information on the Texas peach industry, get a copy of the recently released Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Texas Agricultural Extension Service publication B-986. A copy of this bulletin, "Production and Marketing Practices for Texas Peaches," may be obtained from your local county agent or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

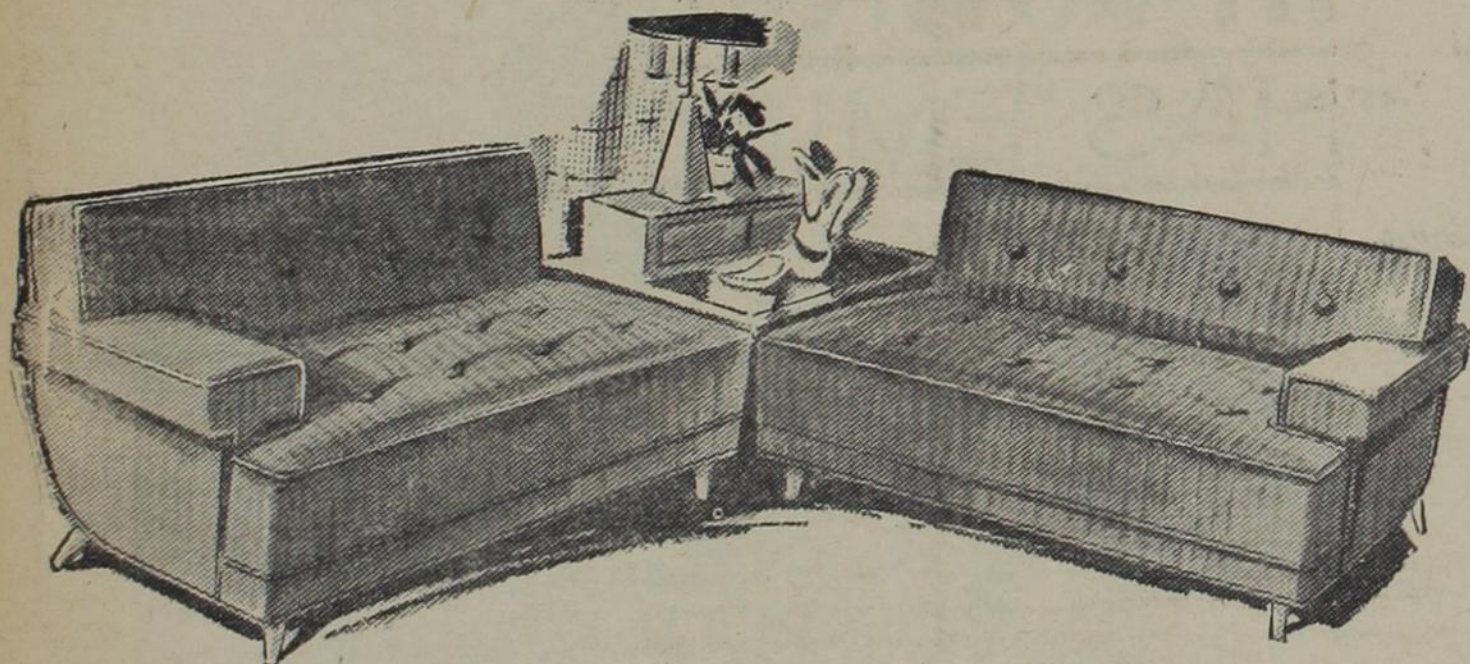

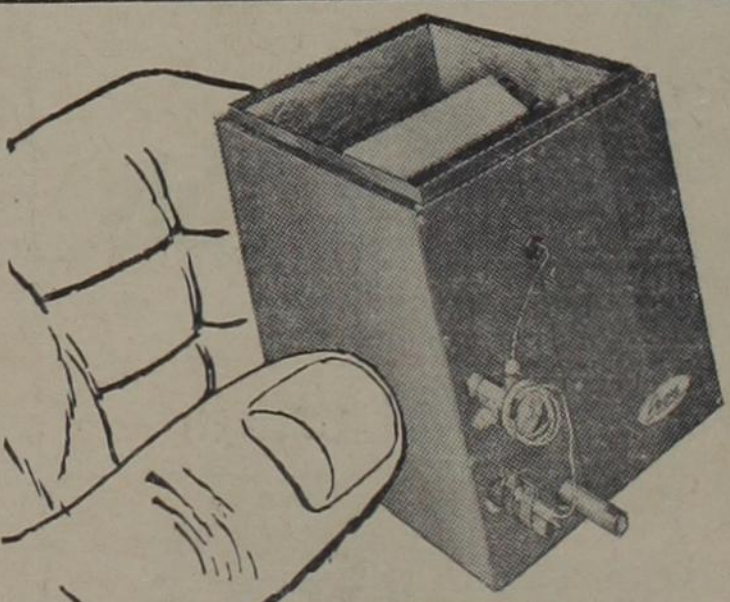

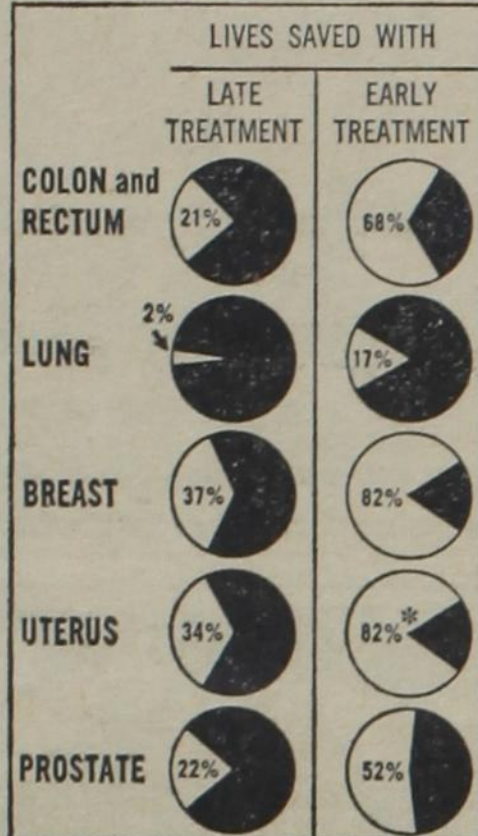

### South Americans Discuss Latin Dictatorship

Sr. Alejandro Zorrilla De San Martin, President of Uruguay's Parliament, was a speaker at the recent Moral Re-Armament Hemisphere Assembly for the Americas, held at Miami. In his address he declared:

Approximately two years ago was announced in my office in the Congress of Uruguay that I was to receive a visit from a delegation from Moral Re-Armament. To be quite open about it, I had an extremely remote concept of the idea.

We talked about the meaning of Moral Re-Armament, saw the new affiliation which was open to every man in all the democracies.

The world is moving through crucial age. Humanity is divided into two camps: on one side those who believe that liberty and justice are the basis of our life together, and on the other those who believe that despotism or dictatorship is the one way of controlling humanity.

The thing we lack in America is an ideology. There are people who think you can conquer Communism with arms alone. They are wrong. This is not a war of arms. We reject the methods of the assassins and of the atomic bomb. The battle-line is in the universities, in the schools and the homes. Our front trench is the home, the primary school and the university.

I want to say one word about my native land. It is a country where there is no difficulty of nature. It is a country of hard-working, religious people. But it

has become the headquarters of Communism for Latin America. We must fight now that it becomes a center of freedom.

A second speaker at the Miami Assembly was Eudocio Ravines of Peru, former Communist who founded the Party in Peru, organized the Popular Front in Chile, and directed Communist strategy in the second phase of the Spanish Civil War. In his address, he stated:

The Cubans asked me for advice yesterday. They were all there, the people in exile—the bankers, the lawyers, the doctors, the Rotarians, their wives and children. They have great bitterness because of their exile and a tremendous hatred towards Castro and Communism.

We have politicians in Latin America who take the view that in politics everything is permissible. That is corruption. Behind that corruption Communism penetrates. Therefore it is absolutely indispensable that we change the situation that exists between morality and politics.

If any feel that they can deal with the situation by first of all tackling the material problem and leaving the other problems to one side, Latin America will get no answer. It is absolutely clear that Latin America needs the investment of American capital. But investments of money, loans, and handing over of dollars will not cure the situation. It will only further corruption unless we deal with the moral issues.

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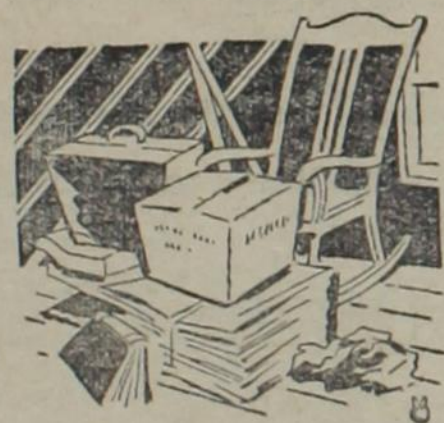

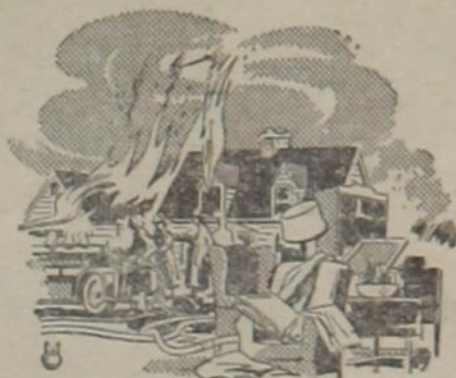

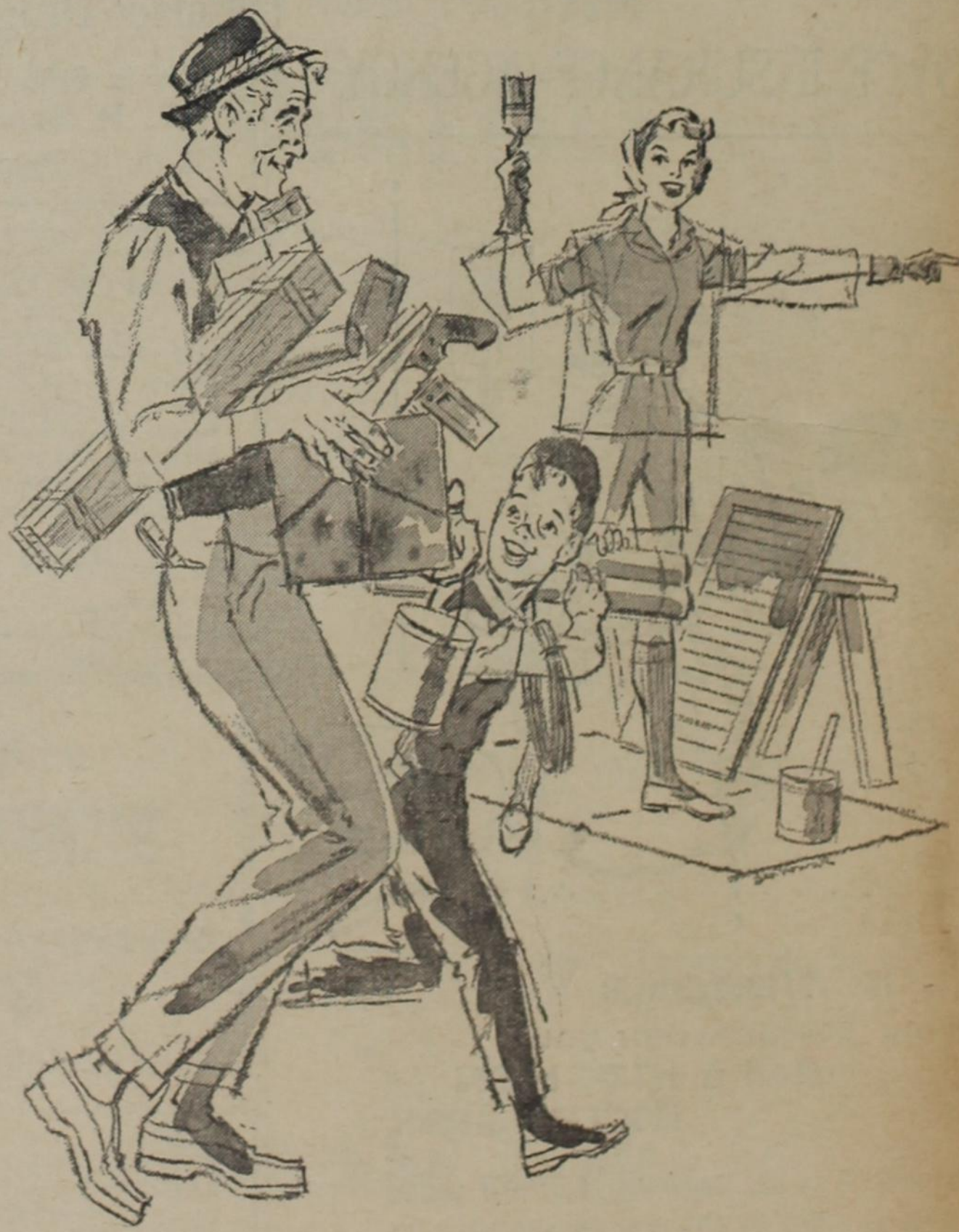

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## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

By Omar Burleson, M. C., 17th District, Texas

Washington, D. C. — Understandably enough, our officials now meeting with the British and Russians in Geneva do not publicly admit their skepticism of accomplishing very much. They must have the appearance of expectation. It is doubtful they hold out any great hope of material progress.

The United States representatives have before them the experience of 1958. This was when representatives of the Eisenhower Administration met in Geneva and agreed to a moratorium on nuclear weapons testing without any system of inspection.

The scientists at the Geneva conference at that time advised that underground nuclear testing could be detected and we would know when the Soviets violated their agreement. What they did not tell us was that without inspection, we would not know of the long preparation for atmospheric tests which occurred last September and October.

In addition, it has now been proved that underground testing can be conducted without detection.

It is reassuring to have the word of the head of the Arms Control Agency, William C. Foster, that tighter, not weaker inspection will be demanded on any agreement on a test ban which may possibly be reached at the current discussions in Geneva. Certainly there will be no agreement on any test ban without inspection, and there is not the slightest indication that the Soviets expect to agree.

Recently about twenty underground tests have been conducted in Nevada to determine whether they can be detected by seismic measurement. The answer is a definite no. This is one reason why Mr. Foster says that tighter, not weaker inspection will be needed if there is to be any guarantee against violations of a test ban.

The foremost nuclear scientist in the United States is Dr. Edward Teller. He warned in 1953 at the beginning of the Geneva Conference that underground tests could not be detected, and he foresaw the violation on the part of the Soviets at that time. He warned that the inspection truce in testing could be a Soviet trap. He warned correctly. He kept urging the American

Government to resume its nuclear experiments.

The president of the United States has now decided to resume such testing, and it was no easy decision. The decision did not come easy because of the awfulness of the weapons

involved. The decision was not made hard by reason of the conviction that we must be certain that we are ahead of our adversaries, nor because the pacifists and wishful thinkers brought great pressure against the resumption of nuclear tests. The decision is hard because it means a nuclear arms race and all the involved dangers to humanity.

For the sake of doing something; for the sake of having a

proposal, our Government has laid down a program, step by step, for what might be termed as an ideal — as a goal and as a hope. This broad general outline of disarmament was presented to the United Nations, but no one except the wishful thinker and the extreme pacifist could with reason believe it to be attainable, simply because there is not the slightest indication that the Soviets would permit an absolute foolproof system of inspection.

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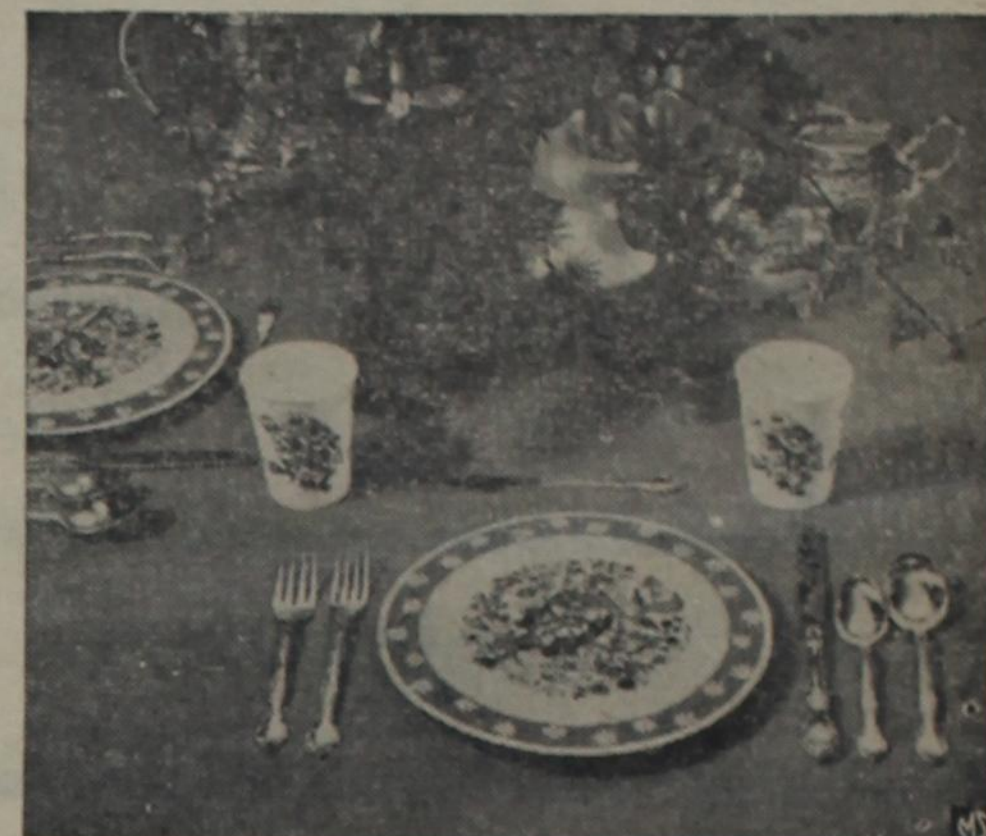
### Spring...Time for Breakfast Buffet

According to the calendar, Spring is here. However, a glance out the window most of these mornings is ample proof that Old Man Winter doesn't give up too easily. A wonderfully cozy brightener for such a dreary day is a party that comes at the time you need it most, a Breakfast Buffet. Planned either as a weekday Kaffee-Klatch for just the girls, or as a weekend party with husbands also included, you'll find that it will be a very successful and novel way of informal entertaining.

A definite characteristic of a morning party such as this one is that your guests are inclined to be far more relaxed than at an evening affair. Consequently, you, the hostess, should be too. First of all, plan your menu in advance, as you would for any other party, so that you won't be caught at the last moment with a vital item missing. Make it a simple menu, but not a dull one (after all, breakfast is a meal, not just a nutritional necessity, even when it's not a party.)

Another help to being a charming hostess is to set your table with the new attractive Sheffield paper plates and cups. That way, your enthusiasm isn't dulled by the thought of clean-up time. A very pretty breakfast table can be achieved through the use of paper in the sparkling hues of brown that remind one of Grandmother's heirloom china. Along with your favorite flowers and silver, the effect is a charming one. For the menu, our vote is for the following combination: Citrus Glow, Eggs on a Nest, Sour Cream Nut Bread and steaming hot coffee.

**Citrus Glow**  
1 can (6-ounces) quick-frozen concentrated orange and grapefruit juice  
2 cans water  
2 cups bottled cranberry juice  
Mint leaves (optional)  
Combine orange and grapefruit juice, water and cranberry juice, mixing well. Add sugar to taste — about 2 to 4 tablespoons. Pour into cold drink cups, chill, and garnish with mint leaves before serving. Makes about 5 cups.



**Eggs on a Nest**  
5 tablespoons butter or margarine  
¼ teaspoon salt  
¼ teaspoon sweet basil  
2 cups spoon-size shredded wheat cereal  
8 eggs  
Salt and pepper  
¼ cup chopped parsley  
¼ cup grated American cheese  
Melt 3 tablespoons butter or margarine. Stir in salt and basil. Add the cereal to the butter and stir until cereal is well coated with herb-butter mixture. Continue to cook over low heat, stirring constantly until cereal is toasty brown, about five minutes. Remove from pan to hot serving platter. Melt remaining butter in skillet. Beat eggs well. Stir in salt and pepper and parsley. Add eggs to skillet, and cook, stirring constantly, until eggs are softly scrambled. Spoon on top of browned spoon-size shredded wheat cereal. Sprinkle cheese over the eggs immediately. (You could make this in a chafing dish at the table and not have to leave your guests.) Makes 4 servings.

**Sour Cream Nut Bread**  
2 cups sifted flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
¼ teaspoon cinnamon  
¼ teaspoon cloves  
¼ teaspoon nutmeg  
1 egg, beaten  
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
1 cup dairy sour cream  
1 cup broken nut meats  
Sift flour, baking powder, soda and spices together. Beat egg. Add

sugar and mix well. Stir in sour cream carefully. Add dry ingredients, stirring only enough to moisten them. Add the nut meats. Pour into a well buttered pan and bake in 350° preheated oven for 1 hour. Good served warm or cold.

**Lemon Surprise**  
Another juice idea you might try is Lemon Surprise. This is not only an unusual breakfast beverage, it's a delicious way of including eggs in the menu in a different form.

1 can (6 ounces) quick-frozen concentrated lemonade  
Cold water  
3 eggs, beaten  
Crushed pineapple, strawberries, or other fruit  
Mix concentrated lemonade with cold water as directed on can. Add the beaten eggs, mix well, cover, and chill thoroughly. To serve, put a spoonful of fruit in each cup and fill with lemonade mixture. Makes enough for six-ounce servings.
