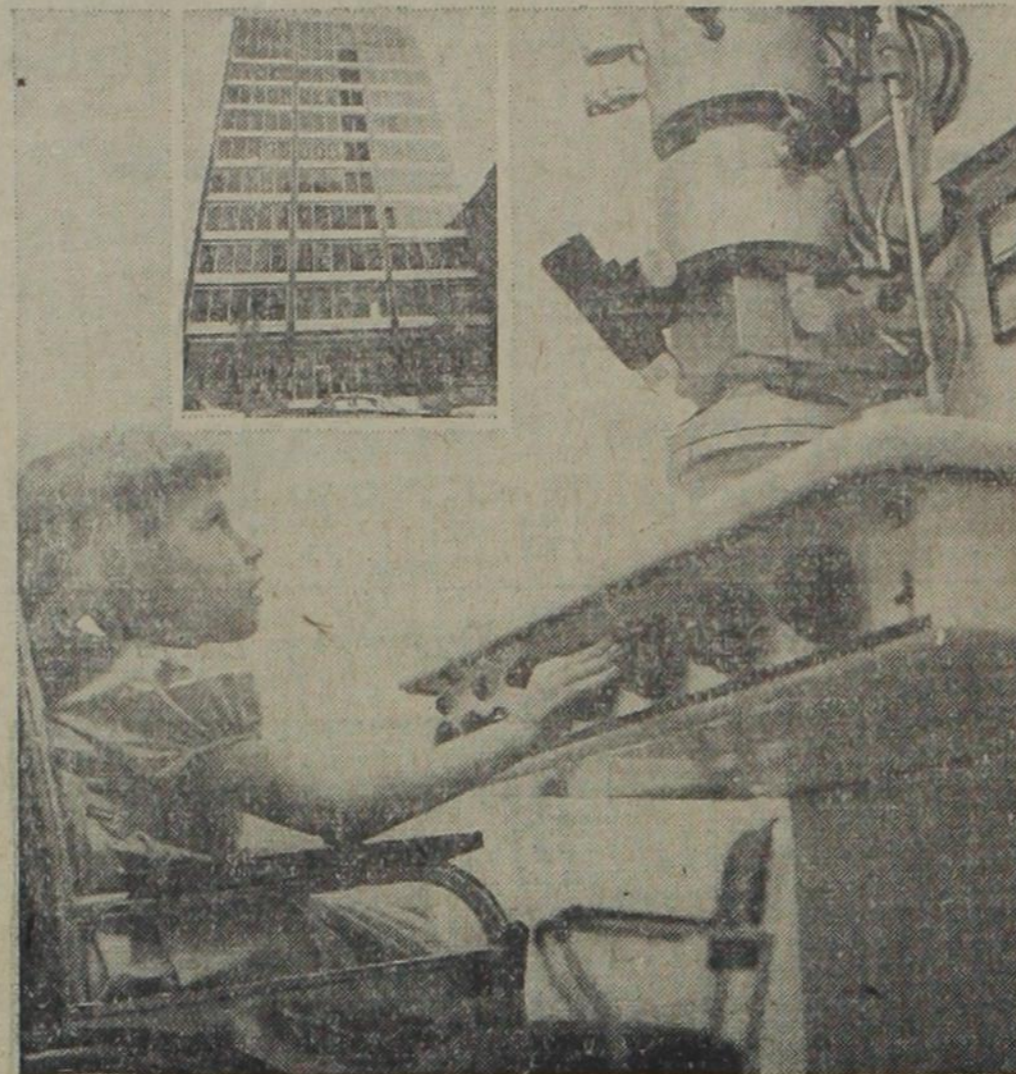

## Research Holds Hope For MD Victims



One little girl, and one big complicated scientific machine. What do they have in common? The little girl has muscular dystrophy, a disease that defies analysis; the big machine is an electron microscope, capable of magnifying muscle tissue 160,000 times. The microscope is installed at the Institute for Muscle Disease, New York City, the modern research center built at a cost of more than \$5,000,000 by Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America, Inc., with funds raised in the annual March for Muscular Dystrophy. Robin Balnis, MDAA's 1960 National Poster Child, asked, while on a recent wheel chair tour of the Institute, "Will that machine help me walk?" In time it may, because it enables scientists to explore the mysterious processes by which normal and diseased muscle develops and functions—or, as in Robin's case, ceases to function. In time. In time for Robin? In time for the thousands of other children suffering from muscular dystrophy? Their only hope for recovery lies in the kind of research being done at the Institute, and in nearly one hundred scientific institutions across the world under MDA's grant-in-aid program.

### Howard Payne Sets Dedication for Fountain

BROWNWOOD.—(Spl.) Howard Payne College will dedicate its new "Fountain of Freedom" in ceremonies next Saturday on the campus.

The fountain will be dedicated to the 19 HPC students killed in World War II. Dr. Guy D. Newman, originator of the school's Democracy-in-Action program, will give the dedicatory address.

Designed by Houston architect Frank Dill, the fountain is in the shape of a triangle with an American flag on a pole at the back. Flags of six other nations also are flown. A flow of water falls down from the base of the triangle.

The fountain was named by Mrs. J. C. Gober of Brownwood, who submitted the winning entry in a contest to select a name.

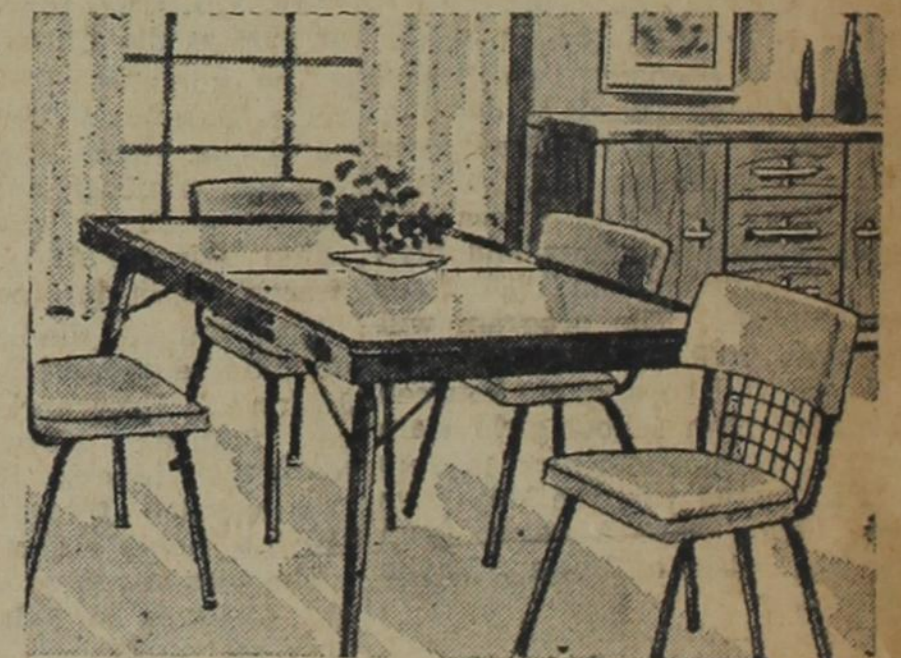

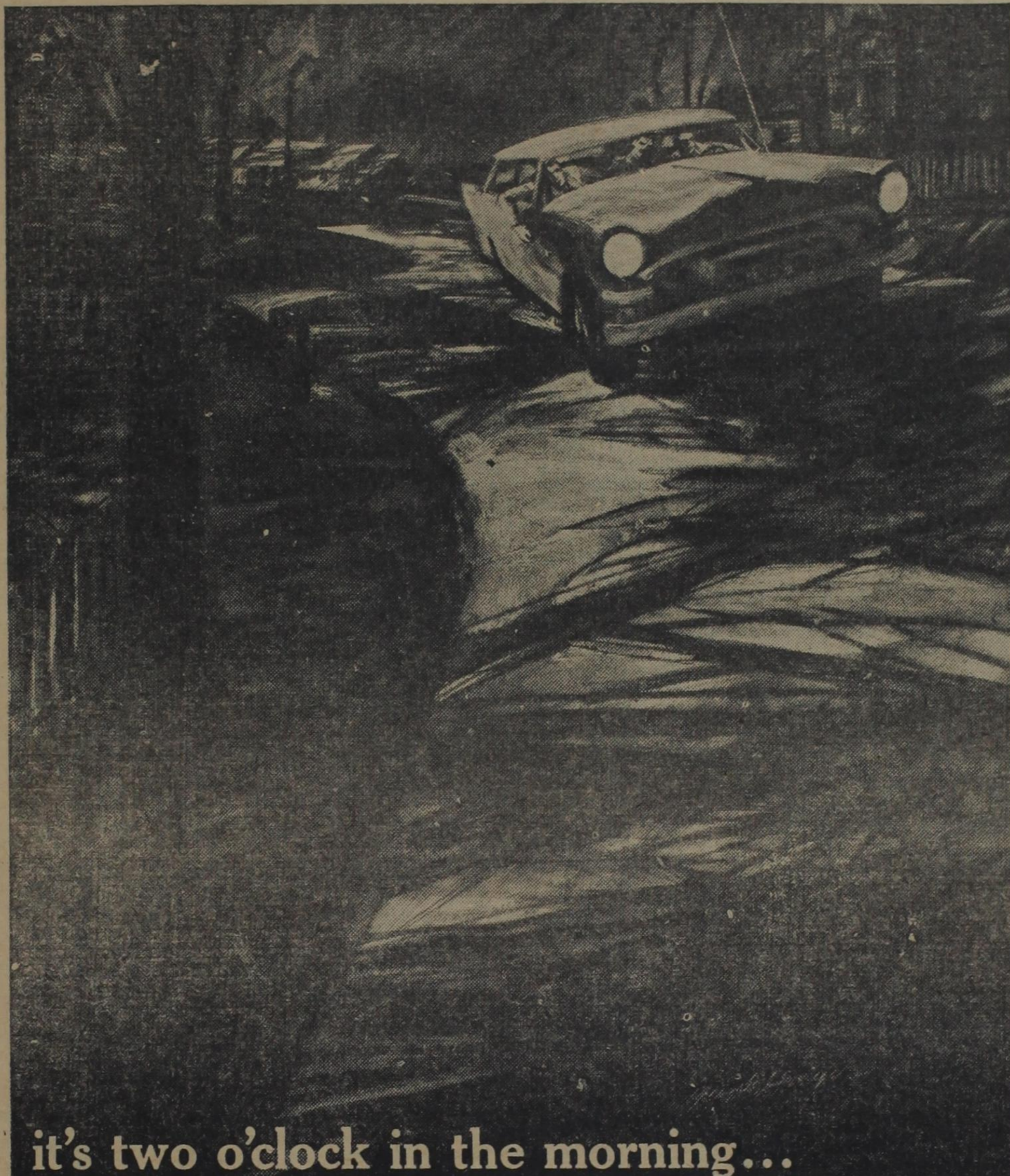

## Deer Hides Are Wanted by State Hospital Patients

DALLAS. — Puhleeze, Mr. Hunter, don't throw away that deer hide!!

That's the plea of volunteers in state-operated hospitals who annually sponsor the collection of these skins and have them tanned into leather for use by patients in occupational therapy.

Mrs. Frank O. Hamilton of Dallas, chairman of the Volunteer Services Council for all the state hospitals and special schools, said the patients fashion all types of small articles from the leather which provide gifts for their families, or if salable, "coke and cigarette" funds for themselves.

"The real value though," she pointed out, "is in giving the patient something to occupy his thoughts and his hands. Working with leather especially appeals to many men in our hospitals."

The hides should be lightly salted, drained and sent to the Austin Taxidermist Studio, 2708 Fredericksburg Road, Austin, where the owner L. M. Rathbone donates storage, curing and preparation of the hides for the tannery.

Most motor freight lines in Texas haul the hides without charge if the shipping tag is marked "charity". Many locker plant operators also will assist in adding the hides to the collection when the deer are skinned if instructed to do so by the hunter, Mrs. Hamilton said.

In addition to the Texas Motor Transportation Association, the buckskin collection has the endorsement and active cooperation of Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas, Texas Independent Meat Packers Association, State Game and Fish Commission, sports writers and radio editors throughout Texas, the Volunteer chairman said.
