

GROWING TURF IN SHADE IS PERENNIAL PROB-LEM

Shade is desirable in landscape, but it is the number one problem in growing turf grass. It is a problem which the Eastland County Commissioners Court is addressing for the courthouse lawn. "Many people just do not

understand that grasses do not do as well in shade as they do in full sunlight," said Dr. Richard Duble, Turf Grass Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "There are a lot of situations where you just can't grow grass in the environment that you have."

"Environmental changes caused by shade have a major effect on grass,: Duble said. "Reduced light, less extreme temperatures, increased humidity, restricted air movement, competition from trees, increased disease problems and shallow root systems are all products of shade."

Additionally, grass in synthetic activity, less growth, less wear tolerance, more susceptibility to preemergent herbicides and less tolerance to cold.

"The problem is not fertilizer or water, it is light," Duble said. "To grow turf in the shade, you must have a shade-tolerant

grass." Bermuda grass and buffalo grass have little shade tolerance. At. Augustine is probably the most shade-tolerant warm season grass, followed closely by centipede and zoysia. Tall fescue, a

cool season grass, will

grown in moderate to

heavy shade where St.

Augustine fails. For any success at growing grass in filtered shade, Duble suggests these practices:

1. Start with a grass variety suitable for shade. 2. Raise the mowing height.

3. Water deep and infrequently. 4. Apply nitrogen mod-

erately in fall and spring. 5. Avoid high nitrogen applications in the sum-

In many heavily shaded areas, it is best to use ground cover plants or other landscape materials rather than wasting time and money trying to go against nature, Duble

A three variety mix of Tall fescue is planned to

be planted in the County Courthouse lawn in September. One problem which Tall fescue has in our area is it's lack of drought tolerance. It is a cool season grass which will go dormant in hot temperatures if not watered. This grass also does not produce runners, so it must be planted to a complete stand. One reason Tall fescue was selected over St. Augustine for the Courthouse lawn is that it is less likely to freeze out and need to be replaced.

If you would like more information on lawn establishment, you can pick up a publication called "Lawn Establishment" at the Eastland County Extension Office located in the Basement of the County Courthouse.

Property Tax Protest and Appeals Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- . the value placed on your property
- . exemptions that may apply to you . cancellation of agricultural appraisal
- . whether your property is taxable . which local governments should be taxing
- your property; or
- . you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

Informal Review: Contact the appraisal district staff at 817/629-8597 in Eastland, Texas for an informal review.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. NOTE: You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

You can also get a pamplet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Property Tax Board, 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746.

Deadline for filing protests with the ARB

(the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

Usual deadline:

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests: (If you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Before the day the appraisal review board approves records for the year.Contact the appraisal district for more information.

Special deadlines:

Change of use (if the appraisal district has informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land)

Before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

ARB changes (if the ARB has informed you of a change that increases you tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you

Before the 10th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

Communities Alerted To GATT Threat

The GATT threat to peanut farmers and communities with peanut production is for real. That word of caution comes from Benny Hagan of Cisco, local director for the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association. When the U.S. made its original proposal to GATT in 1987 calling for elimination of all farm programs by the year 2000, most observers did not appear to take the proposal seriously. But the total commitment of the Bush Administration to secure an international trade agreement is now universally convincing and currently poses a direct threat to farm programs that depend on import protection under Section 22 of the Agricultural Adjustment Act. Peanuts is one such commodity. One of the principal goals of the U. 5. proposal to GATT is the elimination of all trade barriers. The protection that Section 22 provides to the peanut, cotton, sugar and dairy industries is considered by the Administration to be an import bar-

nated or substantially altered, both Mainland China and Argentina stand ready to supply this country's peanut needs. China demonstrated in 1980 that it can supply peanuts to the U. 5. at prices representing roughly half of the U. 5. quota support price. We could not expect to see the retail price of peanut products drop below present levels as a result of lower prices of farmers stock peanuts. At least that has not been true in similar experiences in the past. Therefore, there would be no price advantages to American consumers of peanut products - - only a reduction in quality by substituting foreign produced peanuts

Another phase of the U. S. proposal to GATT calls for the elimination of "internal supports". For peanuts the quota support program is one of the basic parts of the peanut program. Any reduction in the quota support level, would be extremely damaging to the effectiveness of the program.

In other words the quickest way to kill the peanut program and with it the rural communities which-it supports would be to remove Section 22 for peanuts, or to reduce the quota support level. The U. 5. proposal to GATT would do both!

To compound the problem peanut communities face, any international trade agreement that may occur could be approved by Congress by fast track legislation if free trade advocates have their way. President Bush has asked that Congress extend fast track authority which would otherwise have ended last March 1. Fast track means that the trade agreement, which may include the loss of Section 22 import protection for peanuts, could only be voted yes or no by Congress without any changes being made by the Congressional Committees and without floor amendments.

An effort will be made in both the House and Senate to disallow fast track, but to be successful such a resolution must receive a majority vote in either the House or Senate by June 1, 1991. Otherwise the President will have continuing fast track authority.

Individuals in peanut

producing communities

have been urged to contact their Congressman and Senators to communicate their feelings both on the upcoming vote on fast track as well as the danger of losing Section 22 any eventual GATT Agreement. Numerous County Star Thursday, meetings have been held throughout the Southwest to alert growers to the potential dangers inherent in the U.S. proposals to GATT. Although these meetings were well attended, there are many growers and local business people who did not attend a meeting. Growers and business people who were not present at one of the meetings and who have not contacted their Congressional delegation are urged to do so. For Congressional addresses or to receive help with your letters, you may contact the SWPGA director in your area or you may call the offices of the SWPGA, in Gorman, Texas, telephone 817734-2222, the Oklahoma Peanut Commission in Madill, Oklahoma telephone 405-795-3622 or the Texas Peanut Producers Board telephone 817-734-2853.

It should not be necessary at this point to emphasize the importance and urgency of following through with contacting U. S. Congressmen and Senators. The future of our peanut communities depend upon how Section 22 and the peanut program fare in international GATT negotiations and the degree to which key U.S. elected officials are successful in representing the peanut industry with members of the U.S. Trade Team and in decisions made by the U.S. Congress.





Jankovic estimates that as many as 60 percent of cases of Tourette syndrome, which usually starts between the ages of 5 and 8 and is more common in boys, are diagnosed by parents after watching such TV shows as "L.A. Law" and "Geraldo," both of which have featured the dis-

Jankovic said the symptoms of Tourette, a central nervous system disorder, can range from excessive blinking to coprolalia, uncontrolled outbursts of obscenities.

"Physians may misdiagnose the condition because they believe that the early, relatively mild symptoms are just mannerisms peculiar to a specific patient when in fact they are early signs of Tourette," Jankovic said.

Jankovic and colleagues at Baylor are seeking to locate the gene responsible for tourette in families. Once that is located, all kinds of doors ma; y eventually be opened to the prevention of the afflic-



Eastland Hospital To Sponsor Cancer Detection Unit Monday

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services Eastland, Texas today received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accrediation must

be renewed every three years. The accredication program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society

Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accredication Program.

one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical brest exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammogrpahy on the following schedule:

A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.

A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49.

An annual mammogram from age 50.



Marketed Gas Production Increased In January

Railroad Commission Chairman Lena Guerrero announced that Texas marketed gas production in January totaled 388,610,113 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas, compared to the December production total of 381,189,149 Mcf. The January marketed gas production reflected a decrease of 2.94 percent compared to the January 1990 production of 400,372,481 Mcf.

Total gas production in Texas in January was 469,490,036 Mcf; compared to the December production total of 459,588,801. January 1990's total gas production was 487,105,568 Mcf.

Marketed gas production is the gas left after liquid hydrocarbons have been separated on the lease from the "wet" gas that is usually produced at the wellhead. It also does not include gas that is used to fuel productionrelated equipment on the lease site, or gas that is otherwise not marketed.

Exports of Texas-produced gas in January totaled 173,845,874 Mcf compared to 183,758,159 Mcf in December. The January exports of Texasproduced gas reflected a 3.37 percent decrease when compared to the January 1990 exports total of 179,888,865 Mcf.

According to Guerrero the state's top ten exporters of Texas produced gas in January were: Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America, 40,419,726 Mcf; Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company, 31,075,940 Mcf: Transcontinental Gas Pipeline Corp., 23,737,653 Mcf; Texas Eastern Gas Pipeline Company, 19,689,530 Mcf; United Gas Pipeline Company, 11,233,518 Mcf; Transwestern Pipeline Company, 11,162,826 Mcf; El Paso Natural Gas

Company, 8,229,430 Mcf; Trunkline Gas Company, 7,726,501 Mcf; Northern Natural Gas Company, 5,943,270 Mcf; and Texas Gas Trans. Corp.,

3,937,420 Mcf. Operators reported a total of 302,103,981 Mcf of gas in Texas storage facilities in January, compared to the December total of 333,646,074 Mcf. January's total of stored gas reflected a 12 percent decrease compared to January 1990's



Some opponents to selling water have voiced a concern about Rising Star running out of water in the future. Ken Martin, Abilene engineer, states that since the town's population has decreased about 400 people since 1980, the water sales to 46 new customers would not use as much water as the 400 people who are

There are several families on Highway 36 in Eastland County that have signed up for the new water system. They will benefit and hope to see the sale of water passed Saturday, May 4.

Some Rising Star citizens have complained about the proposed \$1.50 per 1000 gallon sale price to the Rural Water District and the fact that they have to pay \$2.50 for water service from the City. This difference is due to the wholesale purchase for the Rural Water Distric and to the cost of maintaining, collecting and upgrading the Rising Star system for customers in town.

The water sold by Rising Star will be used exclusively by Sipe Springs and vicinity customers. There has been a misconception by some that the City of Comanche is involved in the proposed sale of Rising Star's water. The City of Comanche has absolutely nothing to do with any contaract between the City of Rising Star and the Comanche County Water Supply Corp. This rural water cooperative will supply water for the Sipe springs area only. A map of the proposed lines may be picked up at the newspaper office.


