Doctor, Druggist On Private Medical Mission To Remote Guatemalan Tribe

A Rising Star physician and druggist have teamed in a 12-day medical safari of mercy to the teeming and primitive backlands of Guatemala where modern medicine is virtually unheard of.

"We are doing this on our own and we are paying our own way," he said. "We have had a wish to do this for a long time and Bill and I have talked about it frequently. This seemed a very good time to do it, and so we are going."

from there to minister to the medical needs of an area in which for 40,000 persons there is not a single doctor.

"We are looking forward to the experience, said Carpenter. "I think we will find it revealing."

Although he will carry certain basic surgical instruments, Carpenter said he did not expect to do much surgery and then only the simplest.

50 PER CENT MORTALITY He anticipates that his doctor's knowledge and experience will be fully occupied with fevers and other diseases and with taking care of obstetrical needs of Indian tribes in which 50 per cent of all infants die within a short time of birth.

"We will be able to treat almost any kind of disease with the medicines that we have," said Carpenter, "and we hope to do some real good."

Dennard, by the way, is one of the survivors of the heroic USS Ben Franklin, the aircraft carrier which survived a direct Japanese kamikaze pilot attack in World War II. He was one of 800 who brought the stricken ship across thousands of miles of Pacific ocean to a berth in Brooklyn Navy Yard. National Broadcasting Company did a spectacular on the stirring "Big Ben" incident some time ago, an episode which ranks among the all-time heroic highlights of American naval tradition.

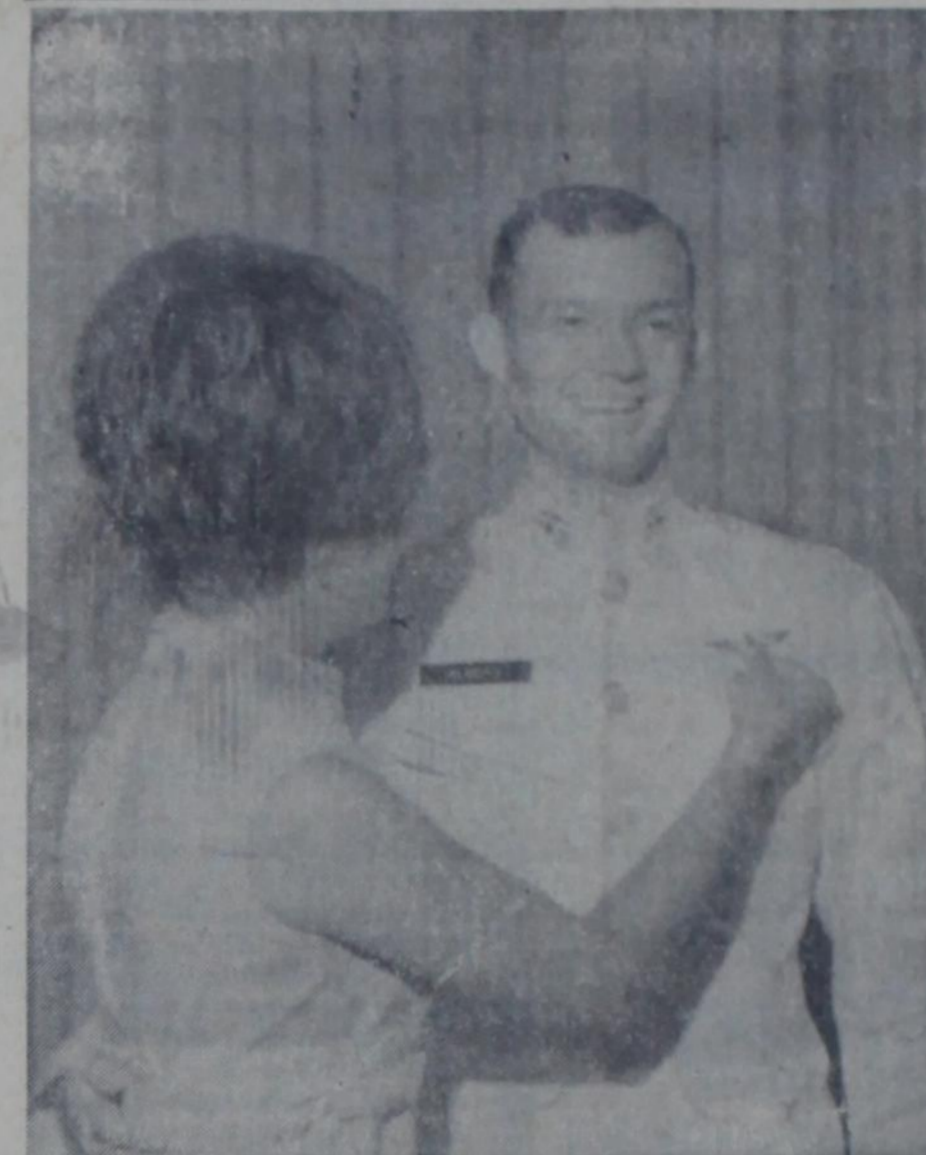

**The Destruction Was Great.  
 The Need Is Greater**

(An Editorial)

Disaster is a human tragedy on a mass scale—on such a scale, in fact, that it is often hard to comprehend. A case in point is the misery caused by Hurricane Celia recently in Texas. The American Red Cross reports that, in addition to the deaths and injuries in the disaster, more than 64,600 homes were destroyed or damaged. But an added figure, perhaps one more easy to comprehend, is the fact that this one horrible storm brought losses to more than 65,000 families.

Right now, amid the wreckage and debris along the Gulf coast of Texas, plans are underway to build anew. As always, the Red Cross is there, giving hope and helping to rebuild the thousands of lives that have been shattered in just a few hours. Its financial assistance to the victims is an outright gift. Repayment is neither asked for nor implied.

The task before the Red Cross is a great one. 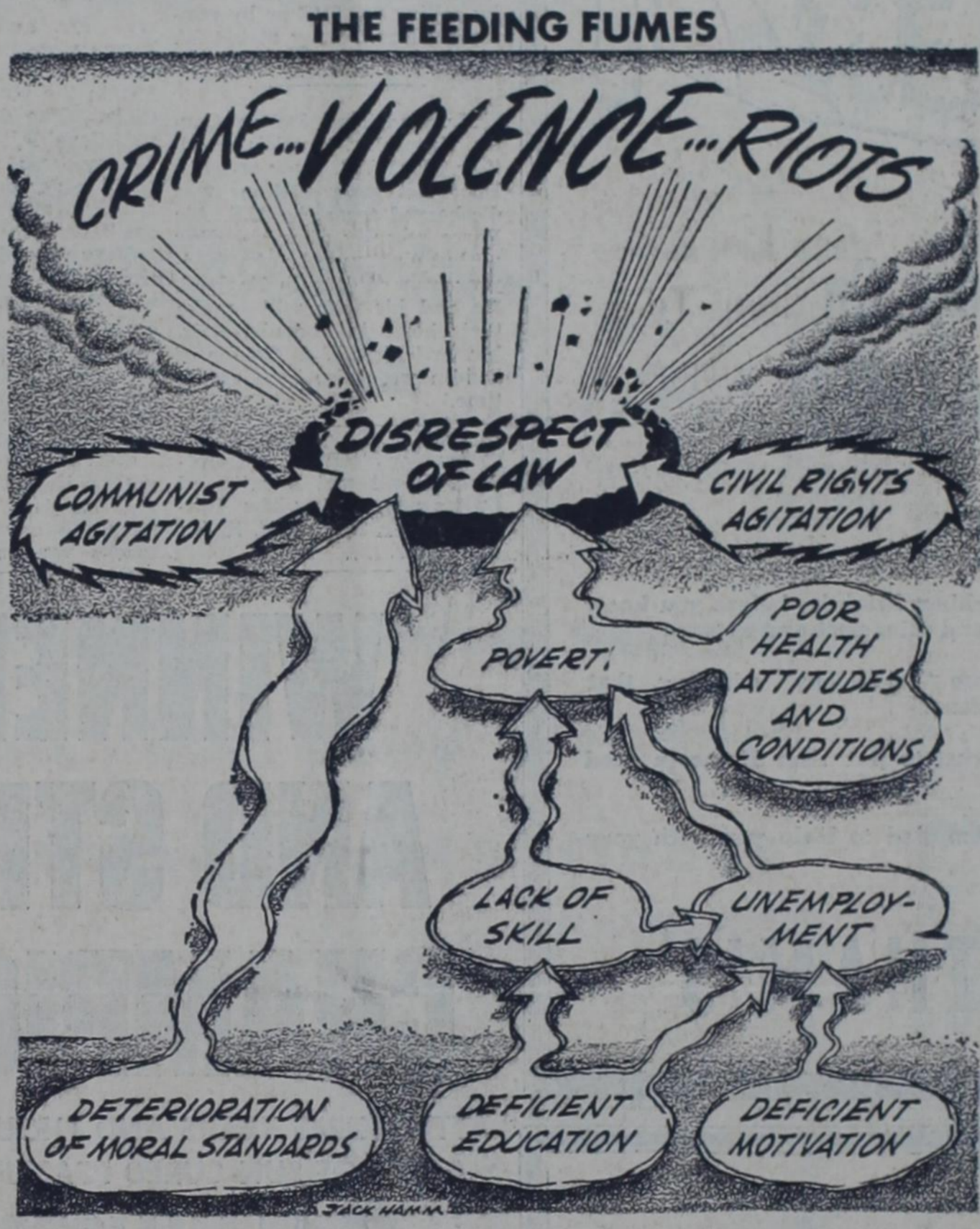

This hobby goes along with other western collections and has become overwhelmingly popular in Texas. Memberships for the next 30 days will be considered charter members.

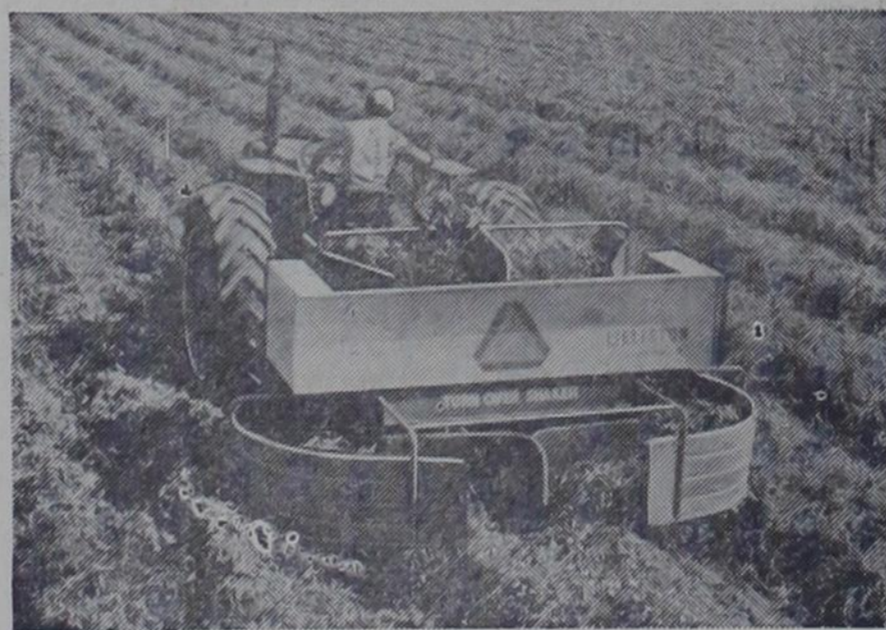

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

General Election Nov. 3, 1970  
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

# IT HAS BEEN

A fake murder story created panion's story and lay still as much excitement and a mad search from noon until 2 o'clock p.m. in April 1920 when officers in Cisco notified Sheriff Elmer Lawrence at Eastland, who with two deputies in automobiles searched the city of Cisco and all roads leading out for a black hack drawn by a bay horse and containing the body of a murdered boy. Finally the vehicle was found down back of the railroad station.

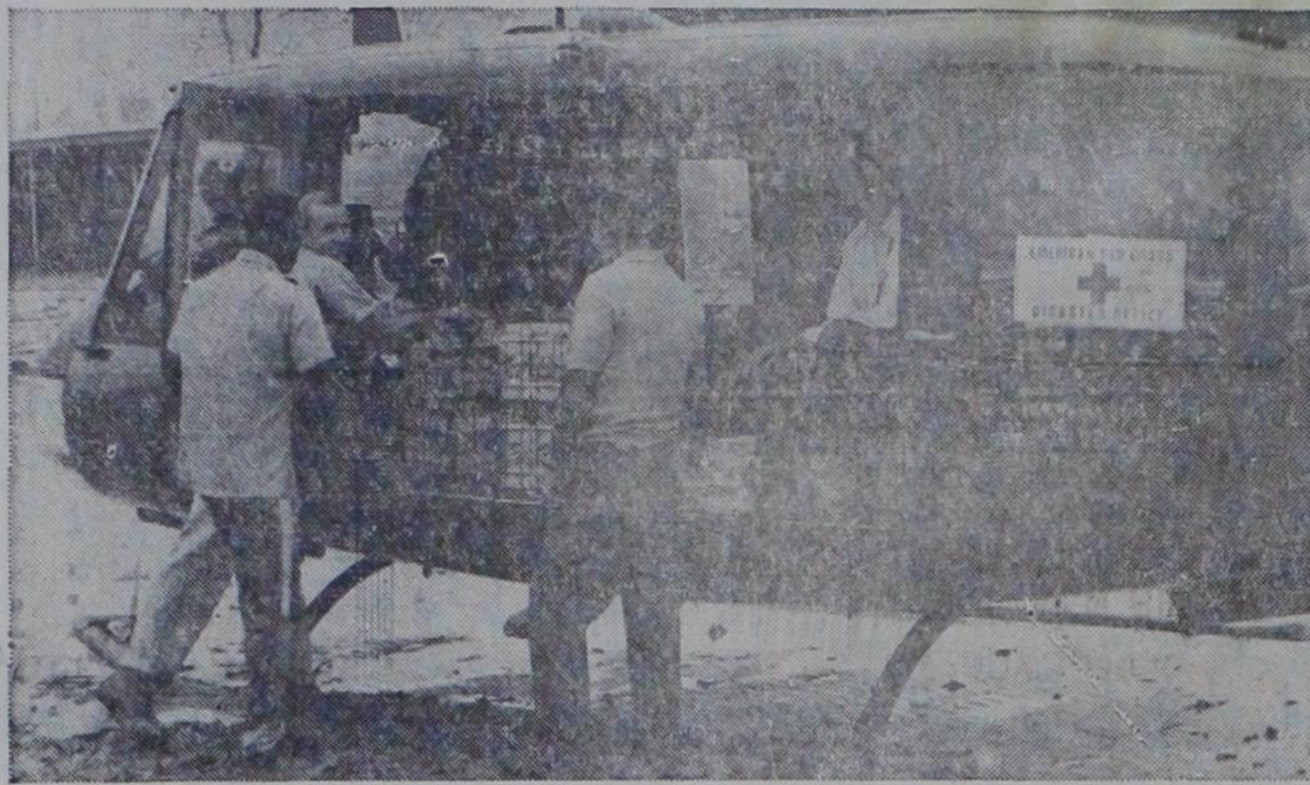
Two youths in the hack told the sheriff that it was all a joke. According to the story the two boys from Abilene were driving along the road from Eastland to Cisco when about two miles out of Cisco they came upon a 12 year-old girl who was walking into town. She was offered a ride and accepted it. One of the boys, (both 15) was asleep on the back seat in the hack. The girls asked what was wrong with the boy in the back seat that made him so quiet. The youth responded that it was only a dead body he had picked up along the road and that he was taking it into town. The sleeping youth awoke to hear his com-

if he were dead, for the rest of the way. The girl was told that the boy was killed in cold blood and left to die beside the roadside.

Upon arriving in Cisco the girl told the story to her father, who immediately notified the police and county authorities. The boys were taken into custody for questioning. They told police that it was all a joke. As no crime was committed the boys were released.

The same month and the same year, two young "knights of the road" found the police station in Cisco and told the Chief of Police a sad story of how they had been enticed by an older companion to leave their homes in Dallas and find thrills and joy on the road that they could never dream of having if they stayed at home. Each took all the money out of his Piggy Bank and left home seeking a perfect life on the road. But their expectations soon came to an end. Their older escort took all their money at Dothan and hopped onto a slowly passing freight train, leaving the younger boys to their fate.

They told the police that they were ready and willing

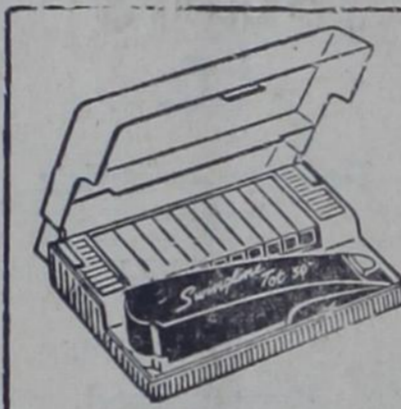
