The family name "King" is well known in Texas high school and college music. It belongs to a family long identified with high school and college bands and with other areas of music as well- one of whom, James E. King organized the Texas Band Directors Association in 1918, the first of its kind in the United States. He served as its president for four years and was succeeded by one of two brothers, likewise pioneers in Texas music.

A son of James E. King, called "Jimmy" after following in his father's footsteps in a youthful career, left the teaching field 25 years ago to organize the "King Music Company" at Brownwood, and devote himself to a larger field of service to bands. orchestras, and musicians in general.




