Don't be too concerned if the kids eat a few icicles off the tree. In their metallic form they're practically ino uble and therefore poorly absorbed into the body. Tree balls are made of glass and plastic, and in addition to causing cuts could clog the windpipe of a child. Other tree decorations are equally dangerous. The gas propellant in artificial snow is toxic if inhaled, but leaves no residue when dried. Unknown to many persons, some forms of trees can cause discomfort from allergies. A chief offender is cedar. which


