

Texas Crude Oil Shows Decline For Fifth Year

Texas' crude oil production declined last year for the fifth consecutive year. The downward trend continued in spite of another year of production at our near the maximum effective recovery rate in nearly all fields.

The output of the nation's No. 1 oil producing state in 1977 was just over 1.1 billion barrels and pushed the state's cumulative production was almost 51 billion barrels below 1976 billion barrels. But, last year's production was almost 51 million barrels below 1976 production and more than 162 million barrels below the all-time peak production year of 1972.

H.B. (Hank) Harkins, Alice, president of Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, blames the continuing decline in large part on federal price controls on crude oil.

"Only increased developmental and wildcat drilling, combined with expensive secondary and tertiary recovery projects, can brighten Texas' oil production and reserves picture, strengthen the state's economy, and reduce our dependence on imported oil. But, we must have the cash flow necessary to finance this activity. It will not come under price controls," says Harkins, an independent producer and drilling company executive.

Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 820,613 barrels of crude oil at the rate of 2,248 barrels per day. Production in 1977 boosted Eastland County's production total through the end of the year to 125,208,516 barrels.

In 1977, 26 counties produced more than 10 million barrels of crude oil, a decrease of one county from

1976 and four from 1975. The following chart shows 1977 production figures for the state's five top producing counties, all with production in excess of 48 million barrels. Yoakum replaced Scurry as the state's top producing county, while Ector, Gaines, and Hockley retained the Nos. 3, 4 and 5 ranks they held in 1975 and 1976.

Gregg County, the first Texas county to produce more than two-billion barrels of crude oil in the history of recorded production, remains the all-time leader with a cumulative total through 1977 of 2,596,793,663 barrels. Ector County, through the end of last year, had produced 2,135,900,495 barrels.

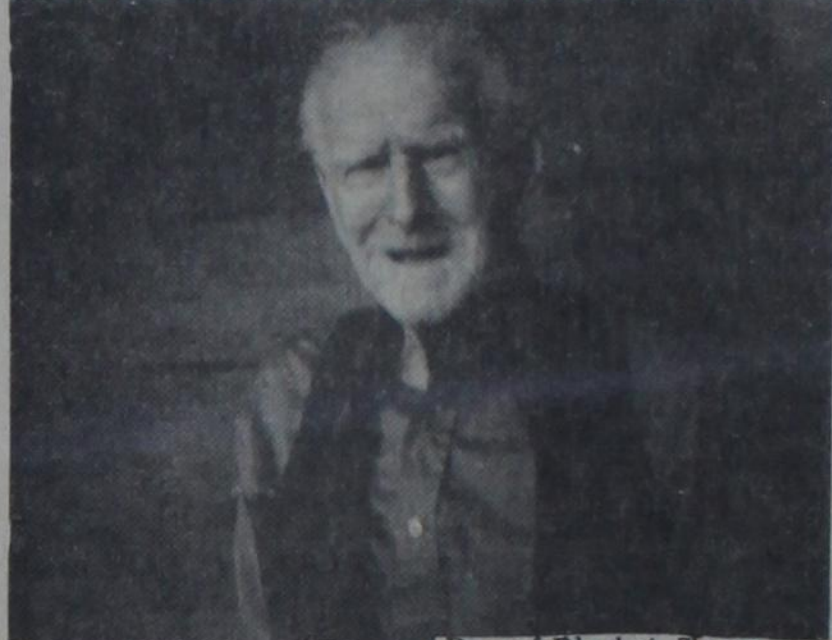

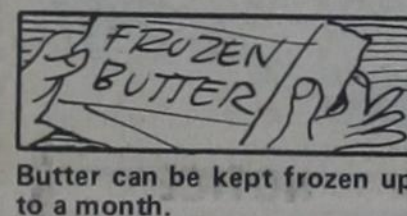

FARM NEWS

SOUTHEASTERN SECTION- Demand for southeastern grown peanuts was fairly good during the week ending June 2. Trading was slow due to limited supplies. Prices were unchanged. A truck shortage delayed shipments. The weather remained hot and humid. Planting was just about finished in Georgia. The Alabama crop progressed more slowly than normal. Prices paid per pound for shelled runner type peanuts sold on an FOB Shipping point basis were for old crop June shipment Jumbo 38 1/2 to 39 cents; Medium 35; US Splits 35; New Crop Sept.-Dec Shipment Jumbo 36 1/4; Medium 34 3/4 to 35; and US Splits 32 1/2.

VIRGINIA-NORTH CAROLINA SECTION- Demand for Virginia and North Carolina grown peanuts was moderate during the week ending June 2. Trading was slow due to the limited supplies. Prices were about unchanged. Truck shortages delayed many deliveries. Planting was just about complete. Ample showers fell over the area and delayed planting in a few fields. Prices paid per pound for Virginia type peanuts sold on an FOB Shipping Point basis were

for old crop June Shipment unshelled Jumbo 43 1/2 cents; Fancy 40; Shelled 33 1/2; Number one 33 1/2; Number two with 70 percent splits 33 1/2 to 34; New crop Oct-Dec Shipment unshelled Jumbo 37 1/2 to 38; Fancy 35. Sales of other grades were too few to quote.

SOUTHWESTERN SECTION- Demand for southwestern grown peanuts was fairly good during the week ending June 2. Trading was inactive due to very light supplies. Some shelling plants closed for the season. Prices were slightly higher. Planting was just about over in South Texas with planting of seed peanuts nearing completion. Progress was slow in Central Texas, Good in Oklahoma and New Mexico.

"As It Looks From Here" OMAR BURLESON Congressman 17th District

WASHINGTON D.C.--THE BARBARIAN ARMIES WHICH FINALLY SACKED ROME were smaller than the armies which had been turned back and cut to pieces by Roman legions in earlier times. The barbarians were not stronger--Rome was weaker--self-weakened. At the time Rome was burned, each roman legion was smaller than before, less heavily armed and less disciplined.

THE ROMAN ARISTOCRACY NO LONGER PROVIDED OFFICERS for her legions. Emperors no longer led them in battle and Roman youths increasingly evaded military service. The Romans had become wealthier and afforded "Bread and Circuses" for the idle, both rich and poor. Rome's enemies, who had been defeated in each invasion attempt in the century before, were able to overrun and burn it out only after the Roman's will to resist was lost.

COULD IT BE THAT AMERICA'S WILL TO DEFEND OUR NATIONAL INTEREST is being eroded? No one suggests that we are about to fall apart tomorrow a year from now or perhaps in the next decade. A civilization does not go that way but some of our actions in the aftermath of Vietnam and Watergate are not lost on our adversaries in this world. Our scoring, or a lack thereof, includes the abandonment of our defense of American vessels seized on the high seas--both fishing boats and U.S. Naval craft. Our once superior military power is reduced to what we now hope is "parity" with

Russia as more and more of our military share of the Federal budget has been diverted to "social services." Rome did that too--it made politicians popular in the short run as it does today.

DURING THE PANAMA CANA TREATY DEBATE there were continuous references to our "generous" or even "courageous" act by yielding to pressures, not only from panama but other nations jealous of our power. There was also the "of course we could defeat Panama militarily if we wanted to." The question is not our ability but our will.

THE WILL TO RESIST OR NOT TO RESIST has been demonstrated by nations since the fall of Rome. Western democracies were nearly destroyed when Hitler began his rampage in the 1930's. There are always probes for the testing of wills. Small powers test soft spots, first seeking small concessions and, if successful enough, grabbing for the whole thing.

WE CAN BE SURE THAT THE SOVIETS WERE NOT LOOKING THE OTHER WAY while we paid ransom for American fishing boats seized by some South American countries, or while we quibbled and palled to get back the crewmen of the Pueblo, or while derision greeted President Ford's attempt to reverse this trend by using troops to recover the crew of the Mayaguez. Our sophisticates howled at the decision, similar to those of the 1930's who asked, "Why die for Danzing?" IN THE AFTERMATH OF WORLD WAR I

disillusionment caused young men to take the "Oxford pledge" which meant never to fight for their country. But when they saw bombs falling on their homes that generation vindicated themselves in the skies over Britain and the beaches of Normandy. A terrible price was paid and it was almost too late. No such timetable can be adopted in a nuclear war. ONE WE HAVE TRADED AWAY WHAT HAS OUR SUPERIOR TECHNOLOGY--since we no longer challenge missiles placed in Cuba, have failed to develop the neutron bomb, and have vacillated on developing and maintaining our strength--we are in effect indulging ourselves with "Bread and Circuses."

Interpretation Of Law Causing Confusion

Interpretation of Article 3912-K of Vernon's Civil Statutes of the State of Texas Annotated is causing problems for several Eastland County officials. This week Sheriff Ronnie White filed with 11th Court of Civil Appeals a "writ of mandamus" asking the court to force the county commissioners to abide by a recommendation of the Eastland County Salary Grievance Committee made last October. The Committee unanimously recommended that White receive the extra help he requested, after county commissioners had previously denied the request.

According to the law which created the committee, if all nine members sign a recommendation, it is to become effective "without action of the commissioners court on the first day of the month following its delivery to the commissioners court." White believes, because of that clause, the commissioners should have given him the additional deputy and vehicle, which it has not done.

The 11th court refused to accept the jurisdiction for the actions and White and others are seeking other court rulings.

Pasture Management

At present cattle producers are in a dilemma with short grass and high cattle prices. A simple solution would seem to be to completely liquidate. However, producers are hesitant to completely sell out for several reasons. Many ranchers have spent years developing their breeding foundation herd which they could not readily nor easily replace; also the outlook for high cattle prices is that they will continue due to the large amount of cattle numbers that have been slaughtered. With cattle in demand a producer can selectively cull his herd and apply sound pasture management to help overcome the dry period we are facing. In the Soil Conservation Service pasture management can be simple or complex in its application depending upon the producer.

Basically pasture management is grazing different forages during their optimum growth periods leaving enough grass

for the plant to survive the dormant season and begin growth in the next year's growing season. A grass plant has to retain enough food reserve to accomplish these tasks and be a quality forage.

Research has proven that approximately half of the plants annual growth should be retained for this purpose.

Pasture management includes proper rates and sequence for fertilizing, minimum grazing heights and rotational grazing systems. Using these practices a farmer or rancher can get "more mileage" from their grass and raise more pounds of beef per acre when properly applied. The Soil Conservation Service will be glad to assist anyone desiring to learn more about pasture management and help them set up a grazing plan that will fit their particular situation. The Soil Conservation Service is located in room 311 of the Eastland National Bank Building.

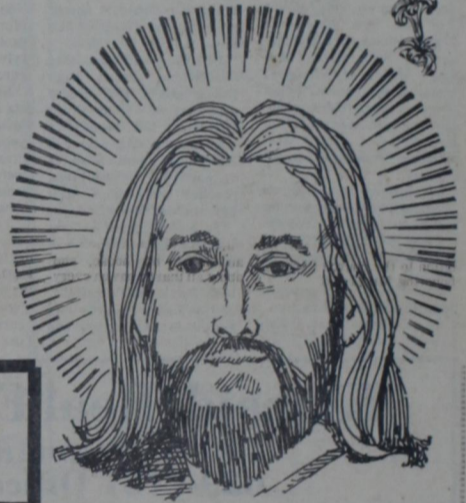

Texas Farmland Up 11 Percent

COLLEGE STATION - The value of Texas farmland went up 11 percent for the year ending Feb. 1, slightly outdistancing the nationwide increase of 9 percent.

The increase raised the national average from \$450 to \$490 per acre, noted Dr. William E. Black, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, citing figures from a U.S. Department of Agriculture report.

"Although the rate of increase has slowed, land markets still can generally be called strong," said Black.

While Texas surpassed the national average increase, a number of states showed an even greater increase in farmland values. Wisconsin had the steepest gain, 18 percent, followed by South Dakota, 17 percent; Maryland, 16 percent; Louisiana and Mississippi, 15 percent; Missouri, 14 percent; California, Ohio and Kentucky, 13 percent; and Minnesota, Indiana, Tennessee, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Delaware, 12 percent.

Nebraska was the only state showing a decline in farmland values for the year, down 4 percent. Increases of 3 and 4 percent were common in the Southwest, Southeast and Northeast.

Texas farmland values at this time are New Jersey, \$2,057 per acre; Connecticut, \$1,962 and Rhode Island, \$1,939. New Mexico and Nevada farmland is currently valued under \$100 per acre.

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Need Evidence To Get Duplicate Social Security Card

A person who needs a duplicate social security card to replace one lost or to show a new name must now present evidence of identity before the new card can be issued. Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene said today.

Previously, all a person had to do was submit the stub of the lost card, or the old card, and a new card could be issued on the spot. This can no longer be done, Hammons said.

In addition to submitting evidence of identity the person's application will be checked against the records at social security headquarters. If all the information checks out, a new card will be issued.

The new rules are intended to help protect the person's social security record, assure that it is complete and accurate, and to prevent anyone else from misusing or abusing the person's social security number.

Evidence of identity should show the person's picture, signature, date of birth or age, or other identifying information. All documents are subject to verification with the agency which issued them.

Since it takes 3 to 6 weeks to issue and deliver the new card after all documents have been submitted, it is a good idea to apply for the duplicate card as soon as possible.

A free leaflet, "applying for a social security number," lists the kinds of evidence that can be used to establish a person's identity. Copies can be obtained at the Abilene social security office, located at 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is 698-1360.

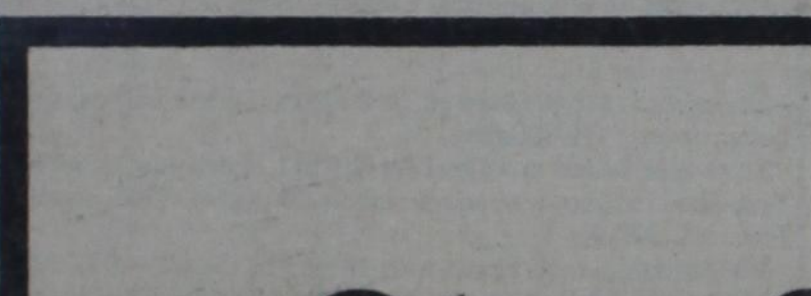
