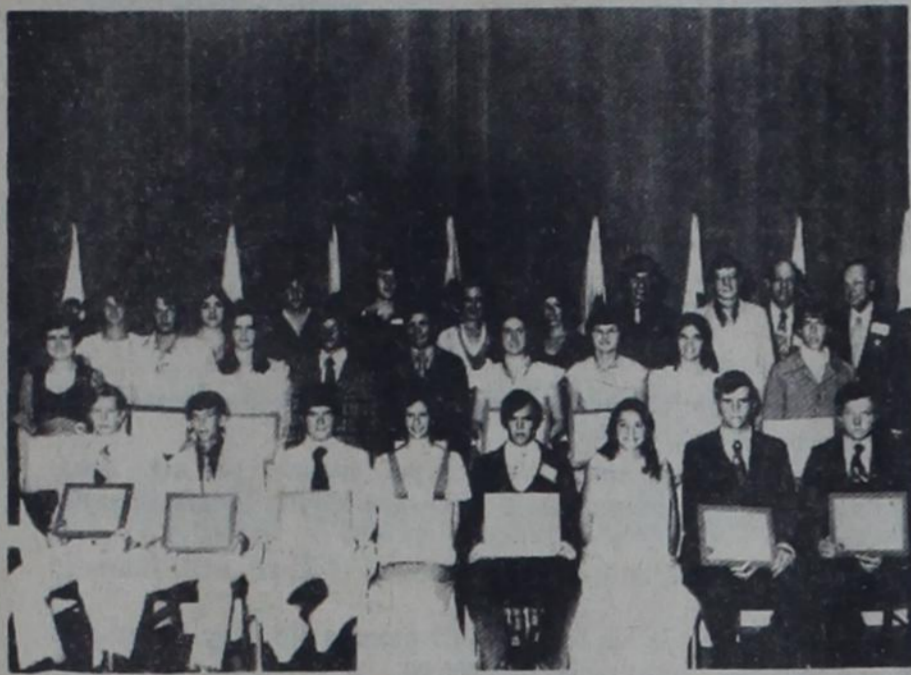

These people were applying for the position of Band Director. No decision was made at the time as further questioning is to be done by the Board on several applicants. There were three applicants for the job of High School English teacher. Wanda Moody of Georgetown, Barbara Smedley of Georgetown, and Wayne Criswell of Rising Star. After much discussion, the Board unanimously decided to hire Mrs. Wanda Moody of Carbon. Mrs. Moody has taught for the past two years at a Senior High School in Georgetown where she was also a sponsor for the Pep Organization. Mrs. Moody received her B.A. degree in 1967 and her M.A. Degree in 1970 from Southwest Texas State University in Georgetown. Her husband has been employed by the Cisco School system and will be teaching junior high science.

The Moody's are the parents of two children. In other business, Mr. Jim Loflin met with the Board to discuss delinquent taxes. Next item on the agenda was discussion of the present condition of the roof of the Rising Star High School. ## Registration For Beef Referendum Begins Monday June 13

The second and final week of registration for the national Beef Referendum begins Monday, June 13, and ends Friday, June 17.

Eastland County producers can register at the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office in Eastland, then return the first two weeks of July to cast their votes. At stake is the Beef Research and Information Plan—a producers' self-help plan to strengthen beef markets here and abroad, increase research to solve beef industry problems and improve communications throughout the cattle business.

The Plan would be funded by a 30¢ per \$100 deduction on all cattle sales, but any producer who does not want to participate can get a prompt refund. If a producer does not register, June 6-17, he can't vote in the referendum, according to Luther Fambro of Ranger. "This is a major decision for the cattle industry, and each producer should participate." Any producer who has owned cattle in the past 12 months is eligible to register and vote.

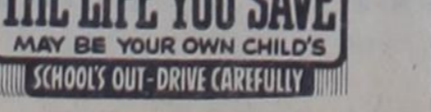

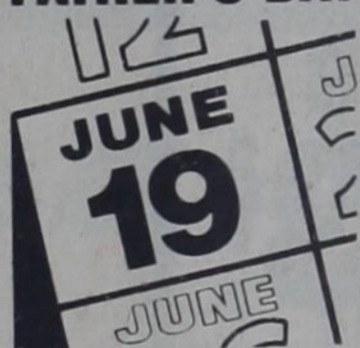

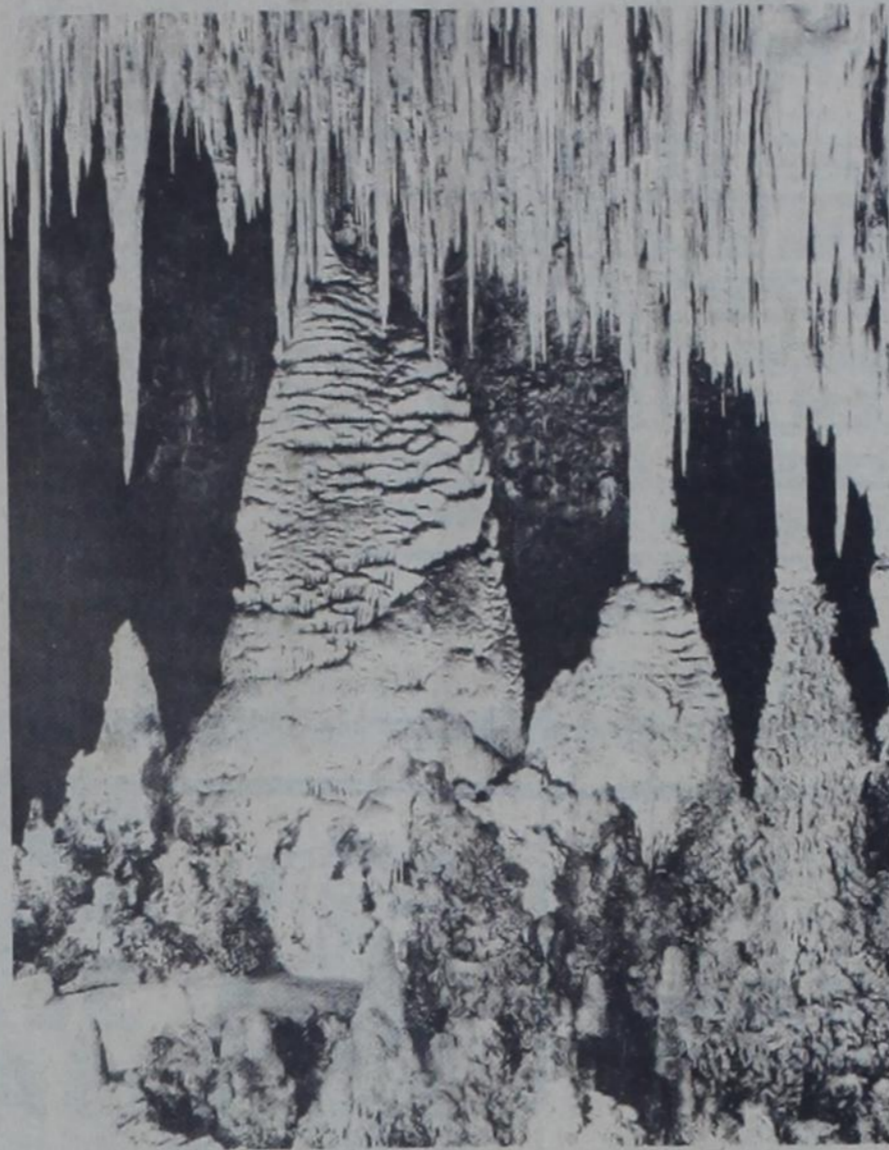

These Totem Poles were formed on the cavern floor by droplets of water, each holding a minute quantity of dissolved limestone. As the water fell and splashed against the stalagmite, the lime it carried precipitated and was deposited on the tip of the pole, building it higher and higher over the centuries.

The bats of Carlsbad Caverns are not as dependable as the swallows of Capistrano, but can they put on a show!

You can't nail them down as to the exact day they'll be flying in to their summer home at the Caverns. You can't even be sure of the exact time they'll be flying out of their cave in search of a nightly meal of insects.

Many a National Park Service ranger who has tried to get his nightly bat lecture completed before the beginning of the flight has been interrupted in mid-speech by the bats, who decided, en masse, to dine early on that particular night.

Hundreds of thousands of bats blacken the sky on these evening flights which begin in late April or early May and continue until fall's first frost.

As you enter the Caverns, you'll be given a radio receiver and along the way you can pick up messages that tell about the features you are near. You may set the receiver on any of three channels - one in English, one in Spanish and one for children. There are rangers strategically stationed along the way to answer questions or help you in any way.

The visitor center is located seven miles west of Highway 62-180 at the end of State Route 7, 27 miles southwest of Carlsbad, N.M. and 150 miles east of El Paso, Tex.

The park is a Designated Fee Area and the visitor center is the place to pay the daily entrance fee of \$3 for private non-commercial vehicles or \$1 per person for those arriving by commercial carrier. Golden Eagle and Golden Age passports are honored.

read and sought interpretation,  
until he soon deserved to enter  
the gate of faith.

The habit of reading, which  
includes the love of books is  
indeed, a discipline.

## Senior Citizen's Program Instituted By HPU

Brownwood, Tex. (SPL)--Howard Payne University has instituted a senior citizen's program to enable persons 55 years or older to receive a discount on courses. Dr. Joe Timmons, HPU director of continuing education, has announced.

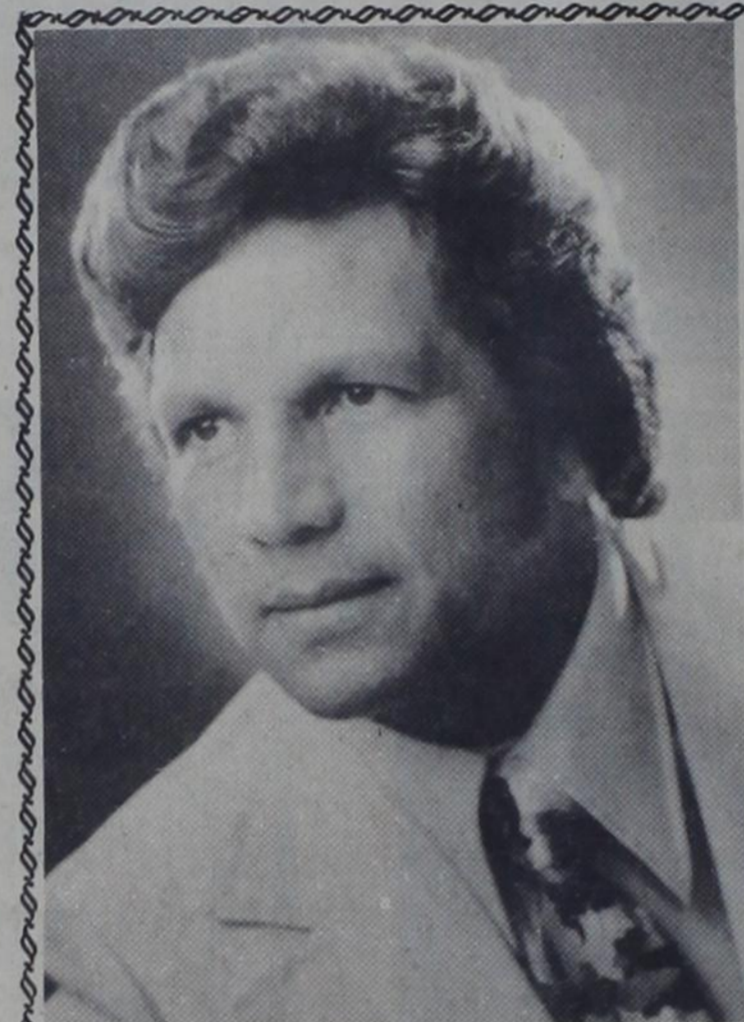
## Workshops Well Attended

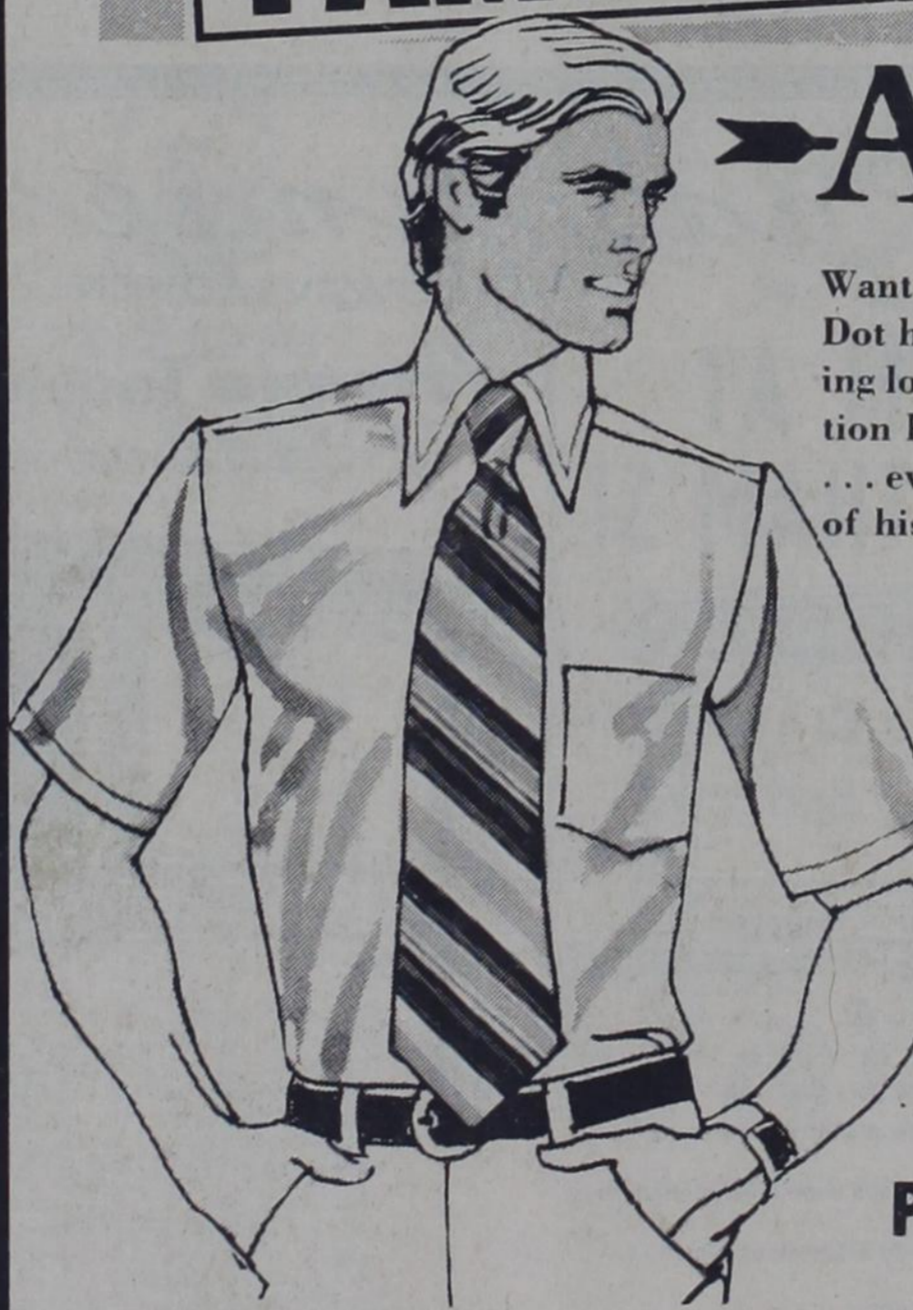

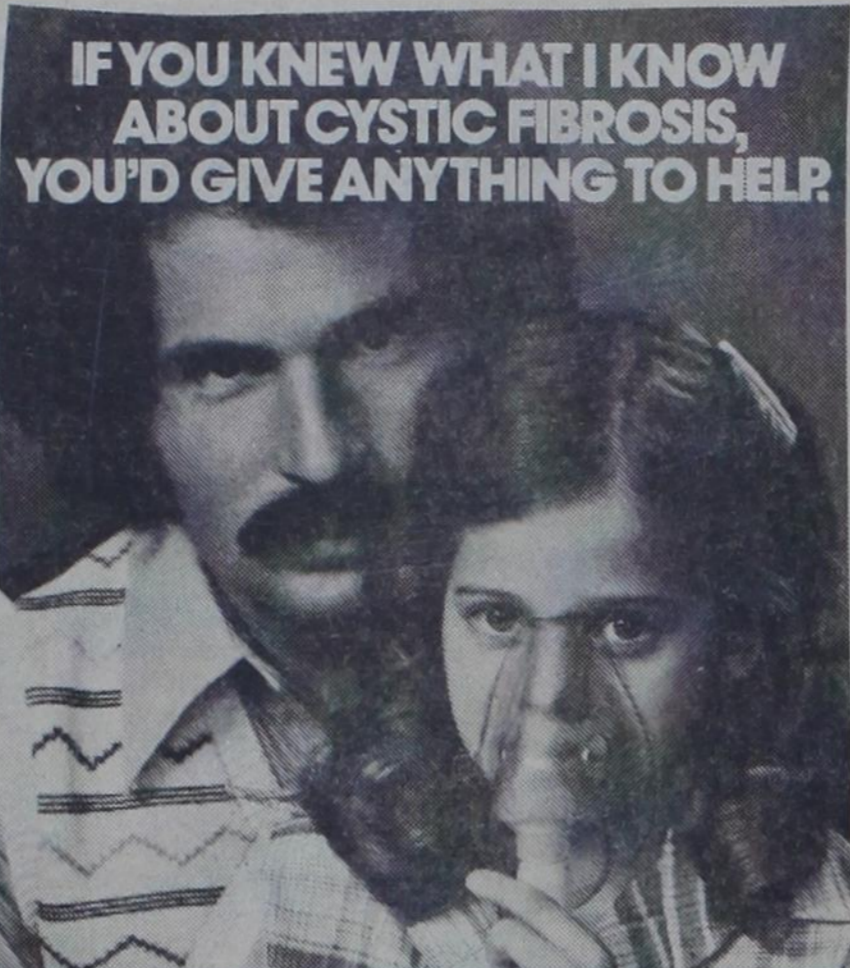

#### ASCS Reminds Farmers To Report Crop Acreages

Farmers who have planted grain sorghum, corn, cotton and peanuts should report their acreage to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) by July 15, 1977. Report wheat and barley acreage before harvest if possible, David W. Martin advises.

Farmers who have planted acreage in 1977 crop wheat, corn, grain sorghum or barley and fail to report such acreage may be ineligible for program benefits in 1978.

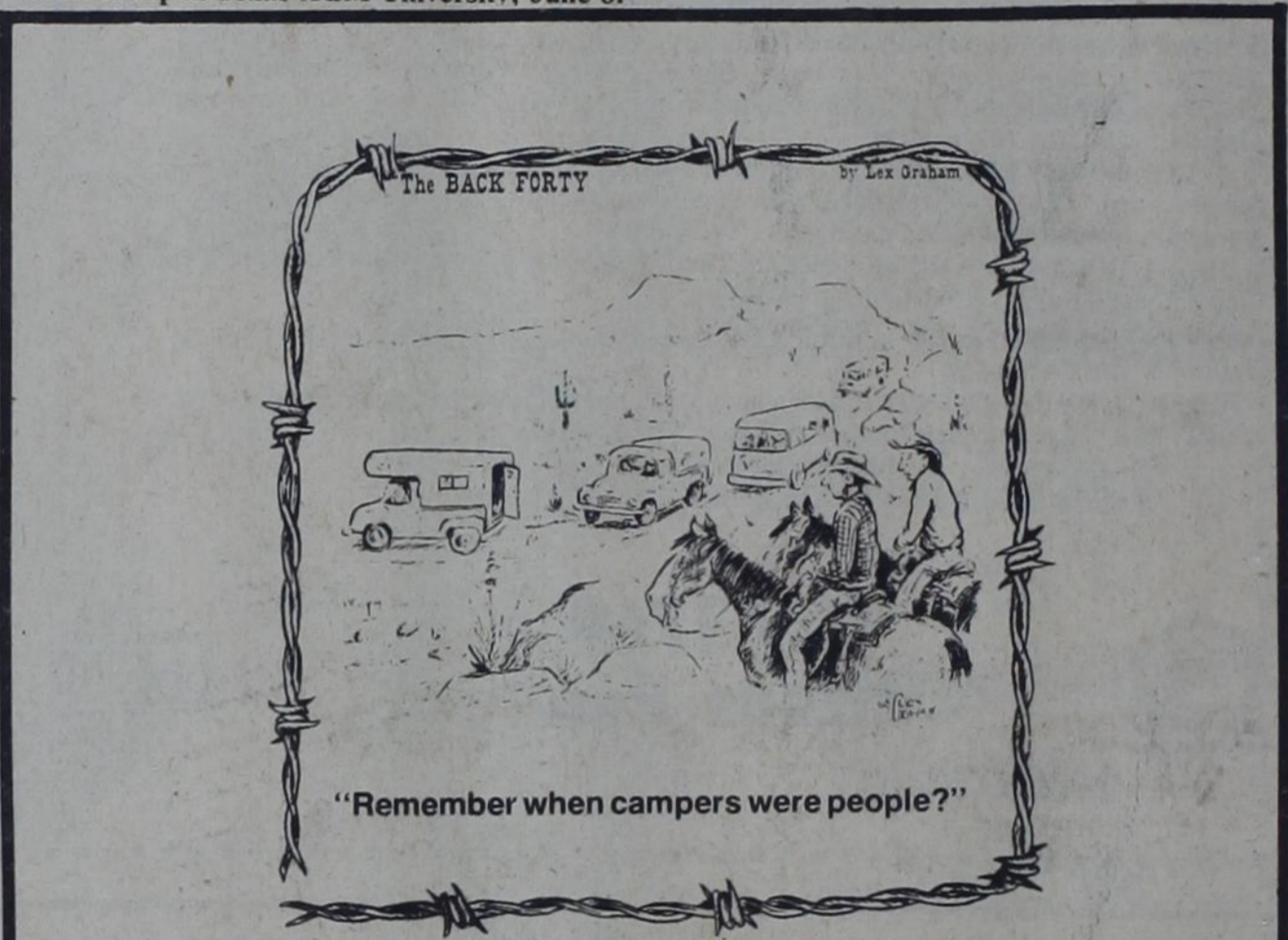
According to proposed legislation, if the Secretary of Agriculture declares a set aside for 1978 crops, 1977 planted acreage could be used to determine set aside requirements.

ASCS employees will make random checks of farms to verify that acreage reports are accurate.

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### 25,000 Peach Trees In County

AUSTIN - Eastland County had a total of 25,000 peach trees as of January 1, placing it in the top 10 countries in the state, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Texas' \$3.6 million crop set a new price record in 1976, even though production during the year was well below historical yields of the crop.

Severe hail damage reduced yields in the Hill Country, as well as the Cross-Timbers area. The majority of the commercial crop on the High and Low Plains was either lost or suffered extreme damage from a March freeze, according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

Texas is the 11th ranked state in peach production.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reproting Service said there were 790,000 peach trees in the state as of January 1, 1977 with 530,000 of the trees in commercial orchards.

Gillespie County leads the state in the number of trees with 126,000 followed by Gaines County, 86,300; Duval, 37,000; Atascosa, 34,000 and Smith with 32,100.

Production figures also showed Gillespie in the lead with 115,000 bushels, followed by Camp County, 21,400 gainses, 17,000; Smith, 16,000; and Atascosa, 15,300.
