Wildcats Lose in Bi-District Playoff Game by One Point



Spirit was high at the pep rally downtown Friday afternoon, as school students and townspeople cheered the Wildcats prior to the Bi-District game with Throckmorton that night.



The Booster Club sponsored a "Roast the Dogs" bonfire last Thursday night before the Wildcats clashed with the Throckmorton Greyhounds in the Bi-District playoff Friday night.

The Rising Star Wildcats traveled to Breckenridge last Friday for their playoff game against Throckmorton. I have been a spectator at all the games for the last seven years and I don't believe I've ever seen a more enthusiastic crowd of fans.

The Wildcats came to play football and did just that. The game was very close throughout and the final score of 14-13 shows just how nerve racking the game was. The Wildcats elected to go on defense first and held Throckmorton to only 6 yards their first series. The Greyhounds recovered a Wildcat fumble on the ensuing punt and drove the 12 yards for a touchdown in five plays. The PAT kick was no good and with 7:44 the Dawgs went ahead 6-0.

The Wildcat offense was determined to overcome the turnover. Alcorn picked up 12 yards and a first down on the Cats first offensive play of the game. Evans hit J. Horton for a 16-yard pass play, then Alcorn picked up another 15 yards before stalling at the Dawgs' 16-yard line. Alcorn's attempted 33-yard field goal was off and the quarter ended 6-0.

The Wildcat defense continued to stall the Greyhounds with their only good gains coming from the passing game. The Cats allowed Throckmorton only 35 yards on 20 carries the entire first half. The offense had some good gains as Alcorn man-

aged to gain 110 yards on 24 carries the first half. The Cats had an interception but the defense caused a fumble on a Throckmorton punt and J. Horton came up with the loose ball. With only :29 left in the first half Evans hit Geye for a 5-yard touchdown and Alcorn's PAT was good, giving the Cats a halftime lead of 7-6.

The third quarter the Wildcat defense continued to make things happen. Hollis blocked a Throckmorton punt, which netted only 9 yards. The Cat offense couldn't seem to take advantage and were forced to punt. Again the defense rallied. J. Horton literally stole the football on a handoff and ran 33 yards for a touchdown with 3:00 left in the quarter. Alcorn's PAT missed and the Cats led 13-6.

Throckmorton managed to score after a long pass completion, running the ball in from 2 yards out with 4:58 left in the game. This is where mass confusion took over. The officials met with coaches in the middle of the field to discuss possible tie breakers. The score was Rising Star 13, Throckmorton 12. A kick would tie, a successful run would be a Greyhound win, a

miss on either could mean a victory for the Cats because time was quickly running out.

The officials had the teams tied on penetrations with three each and Throckmorton led on first downs 12-10. This meant that Throckmorton had the edge if the score ended in a tie. But for how long? With 4:58 remaining in the game there was ample time for Rising Star to either make more first downs or score.

The Throckmorton coaching staff decided to go for broke. The tension was almost unbearable both on the field and in the stands. The run for the 2 extra points was good. Throckmorton led 14-13. Despite a valiant effort by the Wildcats, the game ended 14-13.

So close! Who would have thought the 1990 Rising Star Wildcats would have been 1 point away from a Bi-District Championship? Was this the team everyone expected to win a few, but not be in the playoffs? The 1990 Rising Star Wildcats had an awesome year and they went out in style.

Final Road Mapping Payment Is Delayed

Eastland County Commissioners held a regular meeting Tuesday, Nov. 13. The agenda was not as long as usual, but there were some important items.

The Commissioners agreed to a request from County Agent David Tunmire to sponsor a seminar on underground water management. This will be held Nov. 27 at 7 p.m. in the Community Room of Eastland National Bank. Tunmire said that several specialists will discuss the subject, focusing on Eastland County.

Tunmire also gave the Commissioners Court an invitation to the Eastland County Extension Program Council Luncheon, which will be held on Dec. 10, 12 noon in the First Christian Church Fellowship Bldg., South Lamar in Eastland.

In other business, the Commissioners again delayed authorizing the final payment to Jedco Sign Co. of Clyde, which was hired some months ago to map and number county roads.

Commissioners reported that some county road signs are inside the city limits, that signs have not been placed uniformly on the same side of the roads, that some have been placed outside the county's boundaries, and that signs have been placed around Lake Cisco on property owned by the City of Cisco.

County Auditor Ray Pruitt was asked to hold any money due Jedco until the Commissioners approve the sign company's work.

On other agenda items, the Commissioners approved a request from Norman Christian, Commissioner of Pct. 2, that he should bid on some property for sale in Ranger. This location would be used by the Precinct.

Also approved was a request by Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, that he pay for a damaged gas tank from his precinct funds.

Bacon said a grader on a county road in the Mitchell Community (SW of Cisco) left a large rock on the roadway. A woman's car was damaged when she hit the rock.

Repairs to the gas tank will cost \$269.00, Bacon said.

The Commissioners agreed to pay a bill for \$641.00 for transporting jail prisoners. Three Commissioners approved the motion, and one (Richard Robinson of Precinct 1) voted no. During the discussion on the Commissioners agreed that they had previously voted to pay costs of the transporting service. But the Sheriff had not budgeted any money for transporting prisoners, so this bill will have to be paid from the General Fund.

Several road crossings in Precinct 3 were approved. These included crossings by Staff Water Supply District pipelines and a Lone Star Gas pipeline.

Comm. Billy Bacon reported a low jail population - six prisoners in the county jail. Four of these were for TDC and due to be transported Tuesday.

In addition, one juvenile was being held in the Detention Center in Abilene.

Bacon said that the jail was "Very clean, as always."

The next regular Commissioner's Court meeting was set for Monday, Nov. 26.

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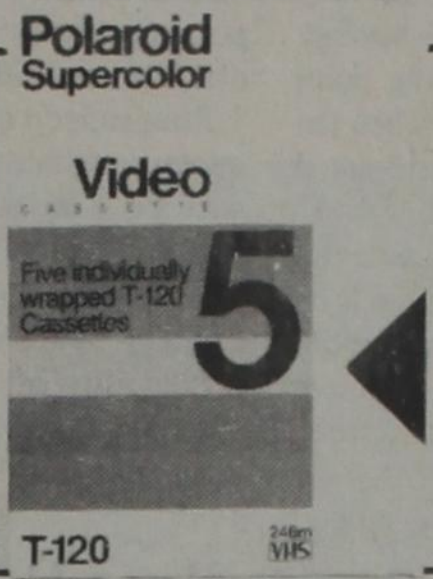


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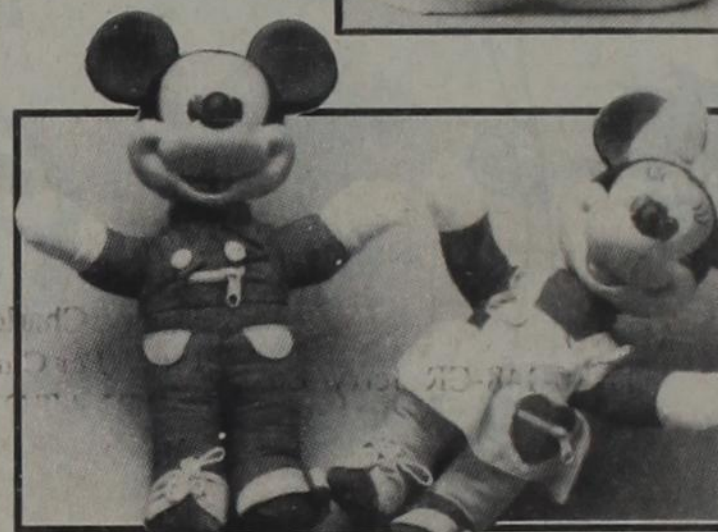
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Peanut Marketing Cards Due Dec. 15

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service reminds farmers to return their peanut marketing cards as soon as possible after marketings are completed for

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the farm, and no later than December 15, 1990.

"All peanut-producing farmers must report all marketings from the farm, as well as the amount of peanuts retained for seed or any other use," Jerry Harris, an official of the agency, said. The computerized marketing card should contain all sales transactions at buying points; any marketings not made through an established buying point should be reported when the card is returned, he pointed out.

Peanut producers receive a print-out of all marketings on their card. They are responsible for checking it to be sure that all marketings have been properly recorded.

"Our peanut price support

program limits the number of pounds of peanuts that can be marketed by producers for domestic edible uses through poundage quotas. Any peanuts not marketed against a poundage quota for a farm must be placed under additional loan, or marketed for export or crush in accordance with a previously approved contract entered into by the peanut producer and the handler," Harris said.

Price support on 1990-crop quota or additional peanuts will be available through warehouse-stored and farm-stored loans from harvest time through January 31, 1991. Availability of farm-stored loans on quota peanuts will continue through March 31, 1991.

Oil And Gas Drilling Permits Issued Increase In October

A total of 1,474 drilling permits were issued by the Railroad Commission in October, according to RRC Chairman Kent Hance. In September, the total was 1,275.

The October total included 1,004 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 49 to re-enter existing well bores, 46 to deepen existing holes, 134 to

plugback existing holes, and 123 for other wells. Operators were also issued 118 amended drilling permits.

Hance said permits issued for new oil and gas holes in October included 50 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 42 in the Refugio area (District 2), 51 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 66 in deep South Texas (District 4), 33 in East Central Texas (District 5), 55

Trimming The Turkey Without Fattening Feasters

- * Fill up on fresh fruits and vegetables before you get to desserts.
- * Be wary of party dips.
- * If you have to eat pies, ice cream, etc., just nibble, but

Heavy Television Viewing Can Harm Children

Too much television viewing can have a negative impact on children, especially during the summer when school is out, warns the Texas Medical Association. That negative impact can take several forms, particularly violent behavior and obesity, as well as early sexual activity and alcohol and drug abuse.

"What children see on TV, they imitate in life," said Fortunato O. Sunio, M.D., a Cleburne pediatrician and TMA member.

Television's influence on children is partly a function of how much time they spend watching it. According to recent Nielsen data, American children 2 to 5 years old watch commercial television 25 hours a week, children 6 to 11 watch 22 hours a week, and youth 12 to 17 watch 23 hours a week.

Heavy television viewing reduces the time children spend in other activities, such as bicycle riding and playing outdoors.

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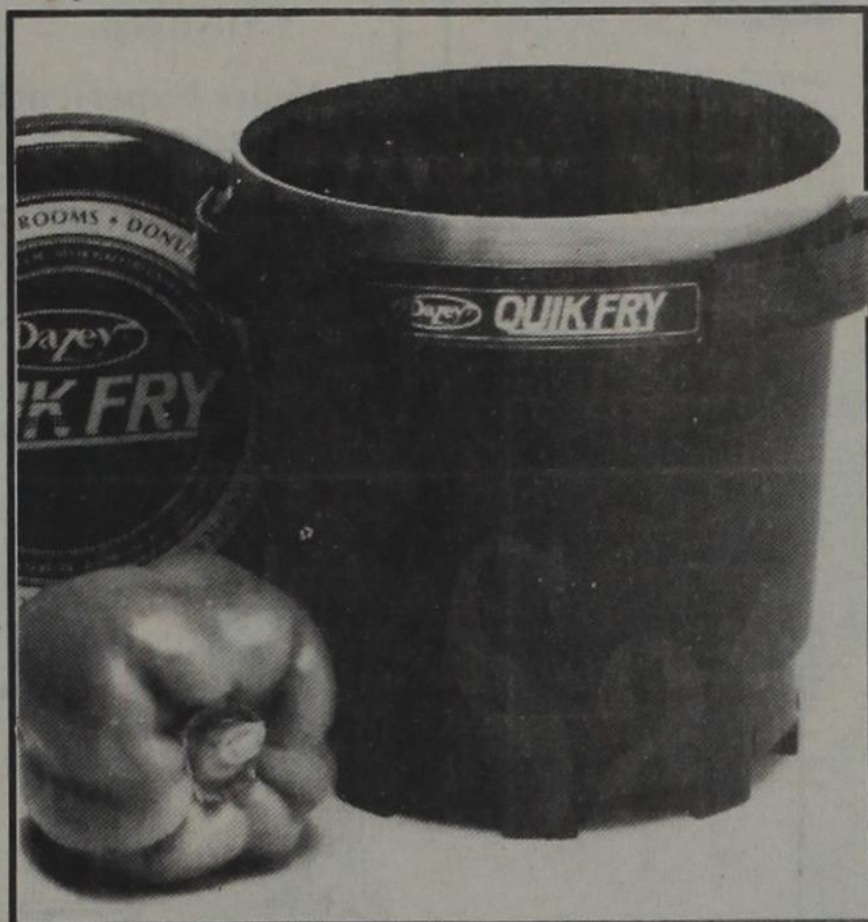

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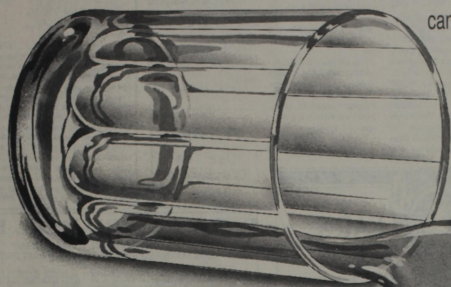

Change Made In Medicare Claims Process

If you have Medicare medical insurance, you should know about an important change in the way your claims are being handled.

Since September 1, 1990, your medical insurance claim must be prepared and submitted by the service provider - the doctor, laboratory, medical supply company, or other party providing the service.

In the past, you had to submit a Form 1490S (Patient's Request for Medicare) unless

your doctor or service provider accepted "assignment." (Assignment means that the doctor or other service provider accepts the Medicare-approved charge as the total charge.)

But now, the doctor or other service provider must send in

your claim even if they don't accept assignment.

The service provider can't charge you for preparing and submitting the Medicare claim. If a service provider refuses to prepare and submit your Medicare claim or charges you a fee for doing it,

you should contact your Medicare carrier.

The carrier's address and phone number are listed in your copy of the Medicare Handbook.

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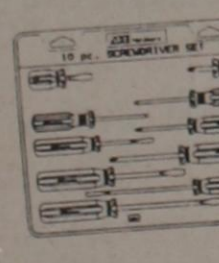

Baby Blues

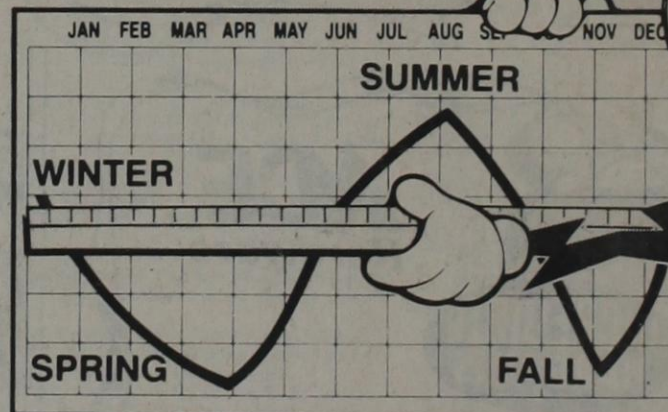
Q: Is it true a mother experiences more cavities, or even loses a tooth, with each new baby?
