County Commissioners Pass Resolution On HB 1841

Eastland County Commissioners passed a resolution Monday stating that they had no objection to the dissolution to the South Eastland County Hospital District, (Gorman area) with the understanding that the County assume no debts of the district.

This Resolution was in regards to House Bill 1841, which has been introduced to the Texas State Legislature by Representative Jim Parker. The Bill, which was restated last week, outlines certain steps for dissolving the bankrupt district.

Herschell Cordell of Gorman, acting administrator of the district, met with Commissioners and requested that they furnish a Letter of Resolution on the Bill - either of support or that they had no

objection. He said that if the Bill passed in the State Legislature the assumption of the district by Eastland County was subject to the district being debt-free.

The 1989 taxes should pay off the debt, Cordell said. He also told the Commissioners that the District had been offered \$50,000 for the hospital building and the three acres on which it stands. This would be applied to the indebtedness.

If the district is dissolved, its assets and obligations would be transferred to Eastland County after Dec. 31, 1991. Eastland County would assume indigent health care costs for the part of the county in the district.

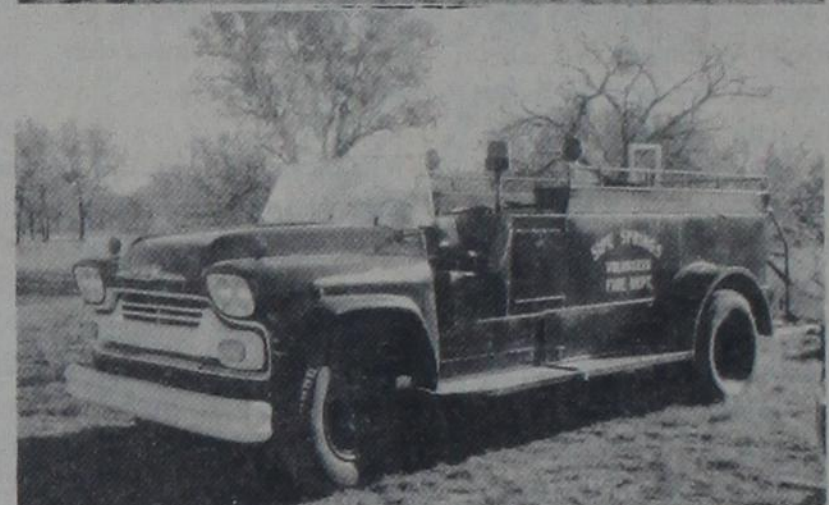

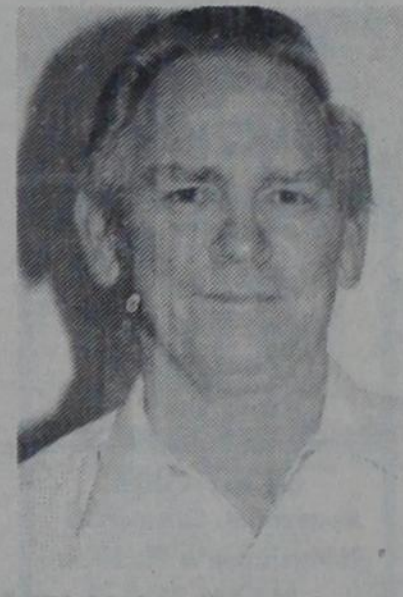
Letter to the Editor

County Commissioners

In other business, a majority of the Commissioners approved a re-drafted Jail Contract to be used with cities wishing to keep prisoners in the county jail.

District Attorney Emory Walton, who worked with the contract revision, stated that this contract had the same basic provision as others that persons arrested by law enforcement officers in cities were city prisoners until such time as the police filed appropriate charges against them.

Walton also said that he had placed a couple of new stipulations in the contract: that the cities be liable for damages to the jail by any city prisoners, and that in cases of overcrowding in the county jail the cities would have to store prisoners elsewhere.

Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, said he still had problems with the definition of city and county prisoners in the Contract. He said that he believed persons arrested in the cities on felonies should be considered county prisoners from the time of arrest, with the towns not billed for the interim time until the prisoners were formally charged.

All agreed that formal charges should be lodged as soon as possible. Sheriff Dee Hogan said that it was a Federal offense to hold a prisoner past 72 hrs. without charges, and he did not intend to hold them longer than that.

Emory Walton said the Jail Contract was not "his" contract, but he felt a moral and legal responsibility to look after the county's finances.

The contract will be signed and sent to the City of Cisco for their approval.

On other jail matters, Commissioner Billy Bacon, Pct. 4, said that 20 prisoners were in the county jail, and nine of them belonged to T.D.C. Several of the Commissioners remarked about how the county had to pay for feeding these state prisoners, and there would never be any reimbursement.

On other agenda items, the Commissioners heard a discussion on computer equipment by Bill Miers, and received a report from Computer Consultant Harley Gwyn, who services the county systems. Approval was given for the application of a grant suggested by Miers. This would reportedly update the equipment, beginning with the District Clerk's office.

Harley Gwyn said that applying for grants was great - if the Commissioners could afford to match the grant money. But he suggested that

the County go "slow and easy" on new equipment until it was found useful and compatible.

On other agenda matters, Glenna Sue Westmoreland, a property owner near Ellison Springs, told of her difficulties with a gas pipeline on her land.

She stated that this line was placed across a county road and on to her property by Comanche Pipeline Inc. several years ago. The Company has since changed its name and she is unable to contact anyone who will be responsible.

The line was apparently placed under the road properly, she stated. But as it goes across her land it is not buried properly, and is impeding the watershed across a field.

The Commissioners said they could not help her on the matter, since the improperly buried part of the pipeline was not a county easement. They suggested that she contact a lawyer on the matter, and also the Soil Conservation Service on the watershed impedement.

Local Vineyard Loan Application Goes to Austin

In a called meeting Monday night a quorum of the Eastland County Commissioners approved the Texas Capital Fund application of Rising Star Vineyards Inc.

A loan of \$325,000 is being sought by this Company through the Texas Department of Commerce.

The first public meeting concerning this application was held on March 27, and was attended by Project owner Dr. Bill Lagle of Houston and Rising Star. Dr. Lagle has begun a 180 acre vineyard 8 miles north of Rising Star.

He hopes to grow table grapes, wine grapes for wineries, and grape cuttings, all for an extensive market.

At the second meeting Monday, Dr. Lagle was represented by Randy Mosely, CPA of Stephenville, who is the consultant on the loan aspect of the project.

Mosely brought along the loan application - an approx. 400 page book consisting of forms and papers involved with the application. This will be carried to the Texas

Department of Commerce in Austin for review and possible approval.

Mosely told of some of the background of Dr. Lagle's project. Lagle works for McDonald Douglas in Houston, and also has a great interest in grape horticulture. He is the incoming President of the Texas Grape Growing Association.

In searching for the best soil for grape growing, Lagle used data from satellite readings. He analyzed the soil content, and minerals, then decided a certain area from wichita Falls down to San Saba had the right combination for vineyards. The sandy loam near Rising Star was his pick of the area.

Mosely said it would take about three years to bring the grape vines into production. Before that Lagle plans to sell grape stock (cuttings) to vineyards in a number of places. He is grafting a lot of his vines to native stock, which is disease resistant.

Within the next two years Lagle hopes to employ 25-30 people at Rising Star Vineyards, Mosely said.

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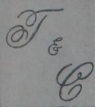

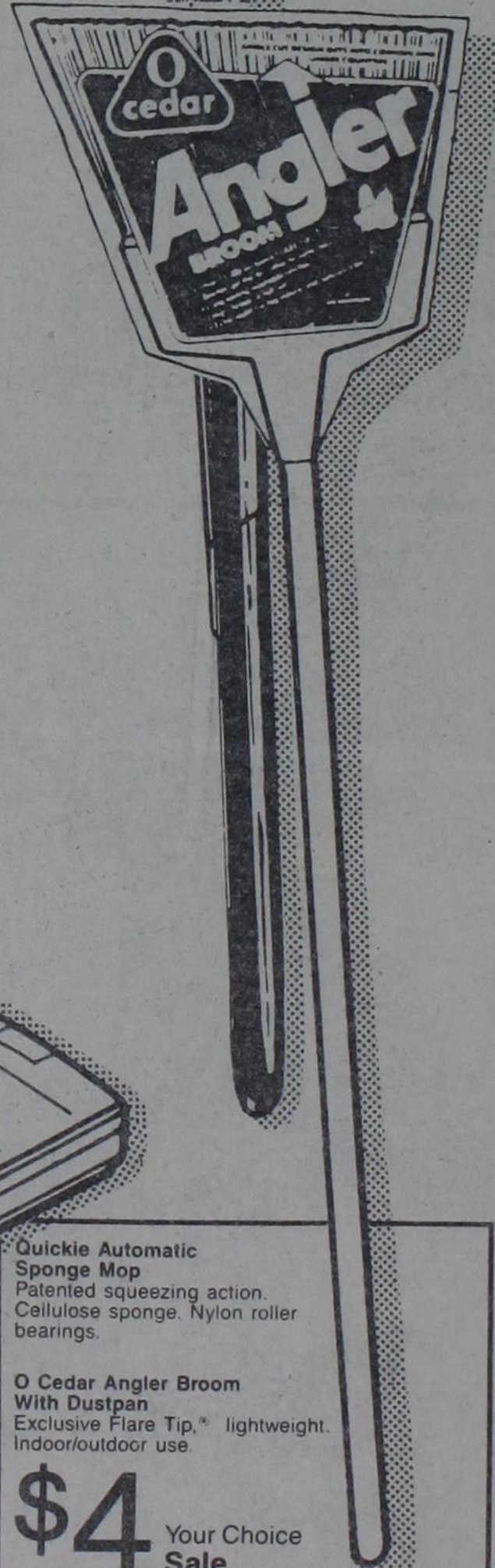
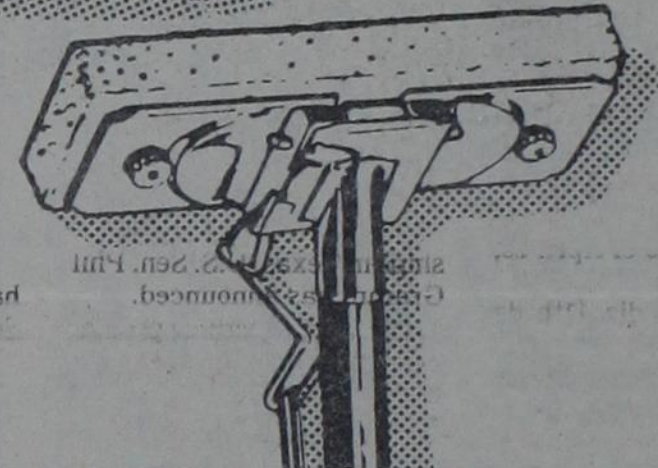
