## Through The Editor's Specs

None of us does it intentionally -- for all of us want to, and try to help in every possible way in a catastrophe such as happened here Monday of last week -- but there is a fascination about fires that causes us to forget ourselves and our responsibility to the men who are doing the fire fighting. Some of us even stop our cars in the middle of the street, and stare, unconscious of the fact that we are blocking the route of the fire trucks and possibly -- as happened then -- causing unnecessary delay and loss of property that might be prevented if we had stayed out of the way.

In the big towns where law enforcement and civic organization is on a more impersonal basis such interference with the fire fighters would not be tolerated a moment, but out in our smaller towns where we are more important as individuals, the problem is serious. Lanes of travel unnecessarily blocked by spectators in last week's fire may have caused losses that would otherwise have been prevented. Some of the city's hose was badly damaged by cars running over it. A fire is not an entertainment spectacle -- it is a tragedy. We ought to realize that when we stop to stare. Get out of the way and let the firemen go through. Give them your cooperation by keeping your distance. In that way you can help your neighbors, keep your insurance costs down and perhaps save yourself embarrassment by making it necessary to control rubbernecking.

## Fat Animals To Be Judged On Packer Basis

All fat animals entered in the Annual Eastland County Livestock Show, in Eastland, March 20-21 will be judged on a packer basis according to Ed Harrison, Gorman, president of the County Livestock Raisers Ass'n.

A total of 311 fat animals have been entered of which 158 are lambs, 27 are steers and 126 are fat pigs.

These animals will be sold at auction on the night of March 24 at the Eastland Auction Barn it was explained.

A registered heifer will be given away at the time of the auction. The animal was given the livestock association by Harrison, who is prominent Hereford breeder. The heifer, presently at Faircloths Feed Store in Eastland, will be on exhibit at the stock show.

Jim Tom Warden, Abilene and W. E. Steele, Jr., Graham, will judge the beef cattle.

Warden, born and reared in Eastland, is a Texas Tech College graduate where he was on the livestock judging team. He has been a buyer for one of the largest meat packing firms for the past eight years.

Steele, graduate of Texas A&M, was on the livestock judging team of that institution, was a former Assistant County Agent for Hill and Eastland counties, has been ranching Northeast of Graham in that county for the past several years.

Dr. R. M. Anderson, Ft. Worth, one of the outstanding hog judges in the state, will judge all of the swine in the show.

Charles Bell, Brownwood, will judge the dairy cattle and Jack Hancock, Tuscola, will judge the fat lambs. Hancock has judged here for the past years. O. B. Edmondson, Cross Plains Agric. teacher, will judge the goats and the other classes of sheep besides the fat lambs.

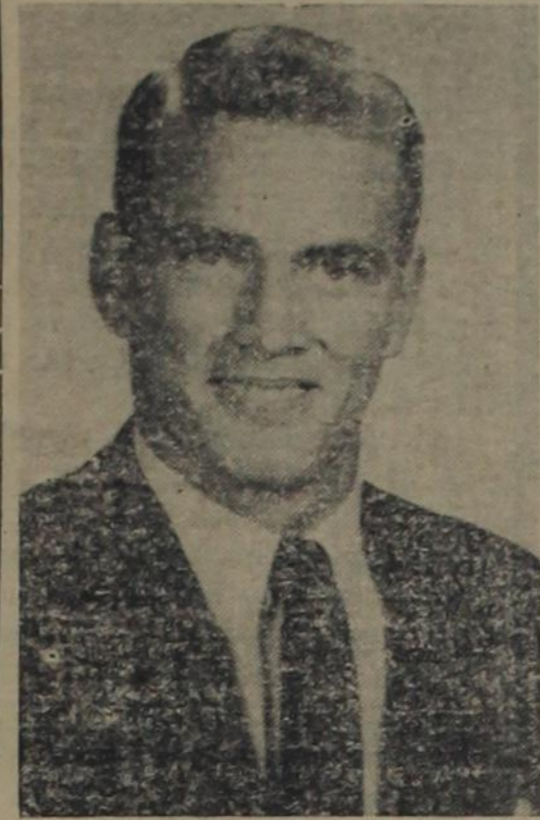
He was employed by Star Electric in Rising Star before entering the service.

## New Nylon Dam Aids Irrigation



Farm and ranch operators using coated nylon dams for ditch irrigation report they give important advantages over boards, dirt, or sandbags. They are light and easy to carry, they don't disturb the ditch contours, and they last a long time. Nylon dams last longer and are more economical than canvas dams because nylon doesn't develop holes from rot or mildew, and their coating of neoprene is less likely than canvas to be cut with a shovel while setting the dam in a ditch.

## Fertilizer Use Can Increase Farmer's Profits

College Station. — Use of cattle and poultry manure as a source of plant nutrients and organic matter can mean profits in increased production and decreased fertilizer costs, reminds Bill Bennett, extension soil chemist.

The value of manure will depend on the type of bedding or litter used, age and type of animals and type of feed used, Bennett pointed out. In general, however, one ton of dairy manure will be about equal to 100 pounds of 8-4-8. A ton of poultry manure will equal about 100 pounds of 20-16-8.

Handling of manure prior to application can sometimes have a lot to do with its value, Bennett added. He said the best practice is to haul manure directly to the field, spread it and incorporate into the soil as soon as possible.

"However, this usually isn't practical," Bennett explained. "Hence proper storage and handling is necessary. Manure piles should be covered if possible to prevent rainwater from moving through the manure and leaching out valuable nutrients. It is advisable to keep the pile dry if possible to prevent heating and loss of nitrogen as ammonia gas. Once manure is spread and incorporated, the chance of losing nutrients is decreased except for normal rainfall leaching."

Crops requiring high levels of nitrogen should receive preference on available supplies of manure. Corn, cotton and grass pasture also give good response. Application rates on these crops should seldom exceed four or five tons per acre. If the supply is limited, as is usually the case, it would generally be better to spread the manure over more acres.

Since cattle manure is low in phosphorus, application of additional phosphorus may be desirable on very low phosphorus soils. Poultry is relatively low in potassium and additional potassium as muriate of potash may be advisable on low potassium soils. A soil test will reveal your soil's needs.

## ABOUT YOUR HEALTH



A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health, HENRY A. HOLLE, M.D., Commissioner

You have ever been leery of drinking from water systems on interstate trains, planes, buses or cars - - forget it. Unsung men who ride rails and highways, air and sea lanes, and yet other men who stay at home make it possible for the traveling public to shrug off those apprehensions.

Interstate quarantine regulations say carrier companies can load drinking water only at those points approved by the surgeon general of the Public Health Service. The surgeon general, in turn, bases his approval or disapproval or recommendations made by state health departments.

Engineers of the Texas State Department of Health or local health department personnel working cooperatively with them routinely inspect watering point facilities at bus and train depots and air and sea ports within Texas.

Their partners in this venture of guaranteeing water of safe quality to travelers are Public Health Service water specialists who ride the carriers to inspect on-board plumbing.

Watering-point inspectors are a curious lot. They want to know the type of hydrants and buckets and hoses used to fill water storage tanks of conveyances. What protective devices are used? How are they handled during loading operations and how are they stored when not in use?

They ask questions about and look into facilities for handling

ice used to keep drinking water cool during long trips aboard carriers.

What sort of treatment does the water get and where does it come from? Cross connections with other systems could mean contamination and a load of sick passengers.

They even get curious about the condition of service platforms methods by which conveyances dispose of wastes and presence or absence of employee sanitary facilities.

Inspectors recommend "favorable" or "prohibitive" certification, depending on whether the system is up to par or erring at the time of inspection. Prohibitive certification can be erased only by correcting defects.

All this effort is spent toward one objective: To get travelers to their destination in distant states - - without getting sick on the water they drink on board enroute.

Railroad, airline, and port officials cooperate in the program by improving drinking water facilities and replacing obsolete equipment with the result that traveling today is more comfortable and convenient than ever before. (A weekly feature from the Health Education division, State Dept. of Health.)

As a Notary Public, Charles Richard Yarborough, 94, of Chandler (Henderson County) has put his seal on a great many official documents. However, the one he notarized Wednesday (December 31) held special significance. It was the State Oath of Office for his son, Ralph, who was just reelected to the United States Senate from Texas. The oath was administered in the room in which the senator was born in the Yarborough home at Chandler. The elder Yarborough, once a Justice of the Peace at Chandler and a former mayor there, counseled his son to "do a good job."

### President Emeritus Of HPC Versatile In Retirement

(From the Brownwood Bulletin)

"Dr. Tom doesn't know everything, but he knows something about everything."

That was one of the expressions used by a friend of Dr. Thomas H. Taylor in describing the versatile president emeritus

of Howard Payne College. And versatile he is.

His interests range from photography to government and economics.

Dr. Tom's photographic interests stem from his travels throughout the nation. He recently shunned his bathroom darkroom for a 35mm camera and color shots.

Landscape scenes fill most of his film holders, especially shots of his 10,000 mile trip to Alaska made by airplane, railroad, bus,

Taylor was born at Wolf Valley, near May, July 5, 1885, and got his start in politics soon after. He was named for the vice-president under Cleveland, Thomas Hendrix.

Now holding the Democratic position of county chairman he first won in 1920, he officially got into the party in 1893 when he carried a torch down old Church Street, now Flisk Ave., in a torchlight parade for President Cleveland's second term.

His big political boost came during Wilson's administration. Dr. Taylor won the county office on a prohibition platform, upholding "more water, more oil, an less whiskey."

Dr. Tom's time is divided among work for the Democratic Party, Rotary Club, Howard Payne, Baptist work, and work in his home church, Coggin Avenue Baptist Church.

Being connected with so many

positions naturally means making plenty of speeches.

After becoming president of Howard Payne in 1929, Dr. Taylor traveled an average of 50,000 miles a year making speeches and studying the country. Since his retirement in 1953 he has traveled some 25,000 miles a year.

Dr. Taylor attended school at Wolf Valley, Ford School, and in 1896 started in Howard Payne College grade school. He finished his first two years of college at HPC in 1905, and received his bachelor of arts degree from Baylor University in 1907. He was awarded his M.A. by Baylor in 1920.

Tom Taylor became Dr. Tom Taylor in 1930 when Howard Payne awarded him the honorary LL.D., and again in 1949 when Baylor awarded him the LL.D.

"I graduated from Baylor June 6, 1907, married Myrtle Evans 10 days later, and went to work for Howard Payne 14 days after

that," Dr. Taylor said. "And since that time I have had only one job and one wife."

Dr. Taylor enjoys discussing politics, and political trends. "It looks like a Democratic year," he smiles. "I think anybody could win on the Democratic ticket."

In his opinion Lyndon Johnson is the most capable man for the presidential job, "but Kerensky, Symington, or Stevenson would make a good president."

The "Will Rogers of Texas", as he has been called, has possibly done more for Howard Payne College, Brown County politics, and good relations than anyone else.

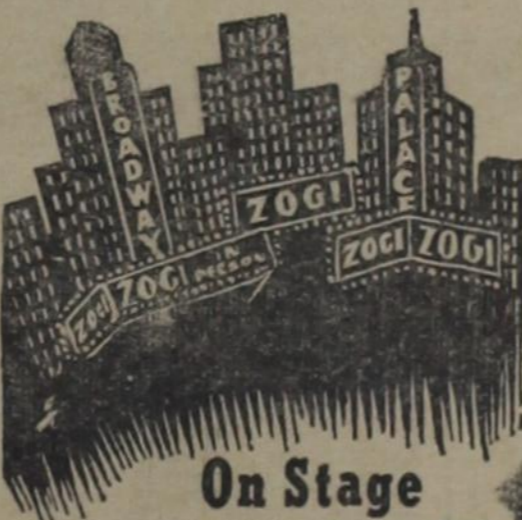

### 'NEGOTIABLE INSTRUMENTS'

The average person does not often use the term "negotiable instruments" in his everyday conversation, and the words may not mean much to him. Actually, it is just a mouth-filling term used in law to describe certain important pieces of paper that we normally call by simpler names.

Even though we seldom use the words, we deal with negotiable instruments all the time. Every check we write to pay the gas bill is a negotiable instrument, and so is your paycheck or pension check. The note you sign to buy a new car, the money order you purchase at the bank or post office, or the traveler's checks you take with you on a trip instead of cash, all are negotiable instruments.

It was all started by merchants who had to send large sums of gold or currency between cities or nations. They worked out a way to exchange money, or the value of money, by written messages, much of the time through a third party like a broker or bank. But when you deal in pieces of negotiable paper instead of hard money, there have to be certain standards and safeguards or the paper could lose its value.

Consequently, there developed

a whole system of laws within nations and between nations, upon which all our business rests. Through the courts, if necessary, the owners of negotiable instruments may enforce the terms written on the paper.

In the United States things used to be confusing some times because of different state law, but by 1924 all 48 states had adopted a Uniform Negotiable Instrument Law which sets up the same rules nationwide.

Since so-called negotiable instruments are so important; since they are ordinarily just like money in many ways; since they often are used like money, or are sold to other persons or companies, and since there are special laws defining the ins-and-outs of negotiable instruments which we wouldn't ordinarily have any reason to know about, there are one or two simple rules we should follow:

We should make certain we read what's on the paper, that we

may be, BE-ONE Remember: You are person in the world with that signature, and the courts, as a rule, must take your signed promises at their face value.

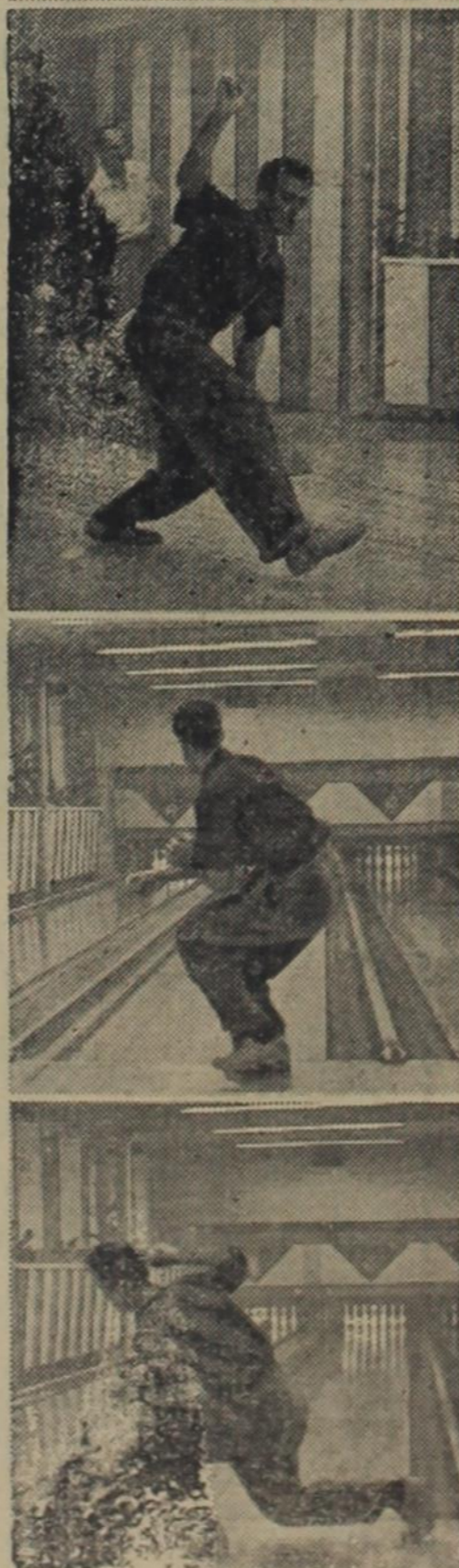

**JEWELRY**

One of the most important functions of the choker or bib style necklace is to make the face appear as lovely as possible. In order to do this the shape, color and texture of the beads should be in perfect harmony with the face and the costume.

The classic choker necklace of pearls appear in high fashion colors of white, shaded pastels or mother of pearl in such colors as navy, olive green and cyclamen. Textures will vary from the bogue, the pebbled, to the satin smooth finish. Pearls will also be found in combination with beads of different textures and colors. Because the eye is so attracted to the strand of beads, its selection should be given the same careful consideration as the neckline of your costume. The choker or bib produces a pleasing roundness and also provides a soft transitional effect between the neckline and the face.

In selecting the choker, the size and shape of the bead should be considered. The pearls should be kept in proportion to the face. A bead that is large will make a thin face seem thinner, and a bead that is tiny will make a large face seem larger.

The bib necklace that fits the base of the neck will add apparent width to the face and at the same time camouflage a bony structure.

An illusion of length may be created by necklaces which do not fit the base of the neck closely. Short oval loops of beads have a slight slendering effect. Longer strands of beads will increase the apparent length of the face and throat. A person with a prominent bustline should refrain from wearing a dangling rope of beads. One choice strand of pearls may be used with several costumes.

**Handbags For Spring & Summer** Handbags of good leather are considered an investment and they are the mark of a well-dressed woman.

The leather handbag is a wise choice for wear with street and travel clothes. This bag should be simple in line and of durable leather. It should be as large as the proportion of the individual allows.

The trend is for bags to take on a new appearance this spring. They may be either slim and flat or softly gathered with contoured corners and a generally flattened silhouette.

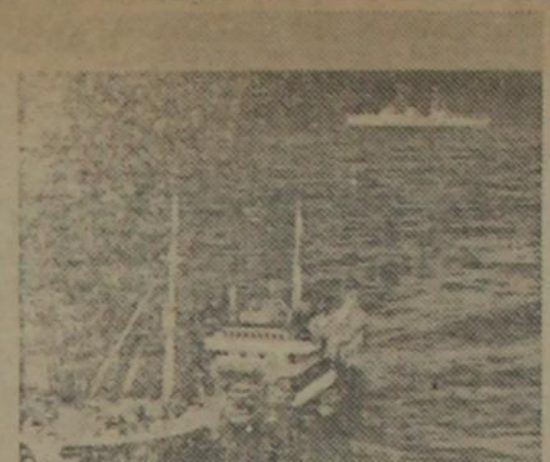
The bag with handles is almost a "must" for travel. The handles are slim and less dominant. Look for the secure closure. Slide fastener compartments add to the convenience and safety of the handbag for street and travel wear.
