# Tuesday's Returns Show County Voting Two-Party

The Bush-Quayle ticket carried Eastland County by some 800 votes—with the county boxes generally splitting the Democratic-Republican slates.

The County voters two-toone helped return Se. Lloyd Bentsen to office and helped re-elect Nugent and Hance to posts on the State Railroad Commission.

For the State Supreme Court seats, county votes overall went for: Phillips, Doggett, Kilgarlin, Gonzales, Hightower and Bayer.

Eastland Countians joined the state in helping re-elect the three incumbents to the State Criminal Appeals Court and went for Democrat Hudson for the State School Board.

State Senator Bob Glasgow carried Eastland County with 4,156 votes to his opponent's 2,643. Glasgow carried every box here but Olden.

Countians voted for amendments One and Two but rejected No. Three.

At mid-morning Sen. Glasgow's office reported that the Secretary of State's Office had stated that with 87 per cent of the vote in, Sen. Glasgow was leading by some 24,000 votes throughout the 22nd District which includes Bosque, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Hamilton, Hood, Johnson, Palo Pinto, Parker, Somervell, Stephens, Wise and parts of Denton and Tarrant counties.

Glasgow handily carried the rural counties and was leading in those portions of Denton and Tarrant, with Denton County returns still job on rural fires. not complete.



Customers of West Texas Utilities Co. will see approximately a 12.5 percent drop in their rates beginning this month (November). The reduction is the result of using the lower winter rates, which will be in effect six months. Using higher summer and lower winter rates is part of the State's plan to encourage energy conservation during the summer when air conditioning creates the peak demand on

electricity use.

According to WTU local manager Travis Williams "a residential customer using 476 kilowatt hours of electricity a month, the average for November 1987, will see his bill go from \$43.53 to \$38.02." Other customer groups will see similar reductions Williams said Since mild fall weather has reduced many customers' cooling and heating use, the actual decrease in the electric bill from September when average use was 906 KWH to November will probably be around 50 percent. That decrease includes the combined impact of lower winter rates and lower use resulting from mild weather. The actual size of a

customer's bill is determined by their use. According to the local manager, the electric company is still waiting for final approval from the Public Utility Commission regarding a request to change the fuel portion of the bill. Fuel is used at power plants to

make electricity. Although the average cost

power stations. That was for gas at pre-oil embargo prices of 22 cents per mmbtu and has saved customers \$350 million. It must be replaced with gas at today's prices which are almost \$2 per mmbtu.

Kevin Reed raises his footlong trowel, bulging with mortor. Heavy gray slush slides from the blade in splendid uniformity as if spewed from an extruder. He sets a concrete block on the soft mud, taps the blocks into place with his trowel, then deftly trims the excess mortor. As one of the fastest bricklayers employed by A.A. Kelly Masonry Contractors of Abilene, Kevin may heft as much as six tons of material a

So when he returns to his pickup for the hour-long drive back to Cisco, Kevin welcomes a change of pace. He tosses his tools in the back, climbs in the cab, and reaches for a small cassette recorder. He pulis onto the freeway:

Kevin Reed, Songwriter. How did a West Texas bricklayer get to be a songwriter?

First, he is not a Texas native.

"I came down twelve or thirteen years ago from Watertown, New York—upstate New York," says Kevin, 32, his speech reflecting that heritage. He had heard work was plentiful in West Texas, so he and some friends, freshout of masonry school, headed for Ei Paso: They moved to Odessa, then to Cisco. Except for a brief return to work in Watertown last year, he has lived here since 1976.

Kevin married Deborah Crabtree of Eastland three years later. They have three children-Vanessa, 8; Jade, 5; and Chelsea, almost 4. Music, however special to Kevin, look a back seat to these developments.

"Eut I've always loved music," Kevin says. "I started band in the third grade. Played percussion through high. school. I'd have been better if
I'd practiced more. But there
were other tanget warme to
do —" he laughs and shales
his head "— like sports."

That interest persists. At 6'2" and 190 pounds, Kevin's muscular frame is testament to his passion for distance running. He loves to fish and hunt—"especially turkey and deer" — often with a bow.

As for televised sports, Kevin says, "I enjoy football, international track-and-field events, stock carracing. Love that! I used to go to the races a lot when I was a kid. And boxing —"

"Yes," his wife, Deborah, teases. "You should see him, WATCHING a boxing match!"

In spite of sports and other activities, Kevin absorbed music—rock, popular, country, religious, and—yes—opera. "Pavarotti," he says with awe. "That guy can sing!"

But somewhere Kevin, too, learned about singing, or so it seems to those who hear him. He reluctantly admits that people comment on the unusual strength and power of his voice.

He hears such remarks frequently now that he is singing more. Recent performers include the Cisco Songwriters Showcase in May; the August 20th and 21st productions of "Eastland County's First Wedding," a play by Roy Lee Smith for which Kevin wrote one song; and the Heart of Texas Songwriters Showcase at Eastland's Majestic Theatre in September.

How did he learn to sing with such concentrated energy and force?

"I took chorus one year in high school and they showed us that. You have to open up your throat—you know—"he lowers his chin and demonstrates with a strong, melodic

"When the second annual Cisco Songwriters Showcase came up, I decided to enter. That's when I wrote "Believe in Him."

How does a songwriter begin a song?

"I don't know about other people, but I first decide what to write about—find a subject. Then I think about the mood. For "Melinda," it was upbeat, exuberant. "Believe in Him," a religious song, is reverent and a little pensive. "She's Everything to Me," about Deborah, needed a popular, swinging style. I gave it a sort of reggae beat.

# Crop & Livestock Survey

With headquarters in Waco, Brazos Electric provides wholesale power to 20 member, distribution cooperatives, municipal customers and Texas A&M University. These wholesale customers serve 233,000 consumers in 66 counties of Texas.
