Whenever one of these hippy characters with the exaggerated hairdo stands and berates the American 'power structure' and calls for a change in the social organization of this country, I do have a feeling of its inadequacy.

That would never happen in Russia, for instance. The "power structure" there is very effective in such cases.

But over here the so-called "power structure" seems too preoccupied with producing the goods and services that distinguish the economy of our standard of living, with antipoverty and civil rights programs,, with building hospitals and endowing colleges on whose campuses these hirsute reformers may culture their vermin and scream against authority-too much concerned with improving the conditions of society to worry about political dissent, as violent or insulting as it may become.

The very conditions and the freedom in which these objectors scream their insults damns their thesis.

Recently a group of them seized and occupied for a long while one of the buildings on the campus of a great New York university because they objected to the location of a gymnasium the university was getting ready to build. Questioned, some of them admitted that the seizure was a demonstration against the "power structure" of a society they wanted to overthrow.

It is significant that this outburst, as is the case with many others, took place upon educational grounds endowed by the very 'oppressors' against whom it was directed, an institution devoted to the enlightenment and welfare of the very students who seemed to resent its symbolism. How strange that oppression should seek its own destruction!

Now just what is the American "power structure"?


Our political parties rise and fall in relative strength; presidents come and go; there is a constantly changing spectrum of political leadership from small hamlet to the highest office in the land; our business leaders ,the presidents and other officers of our corporations, rise through the ranks and serve their terms and pass into retirement, and the same is true of our labor leaders and those of our educational and religious institutions. No one group, no one organization exercises dominance over the whole complex of our socigcy, as is the case in Russia or China or others of the communist regimes. Ours is a dynasty of merit.

And I am a part of that power structure; I am a voter; I am a consumer of the products with which American business entices me. I, along with millions of other Americans, own a part of the corporate structure of this country.

My vote helps determine who shall sit in the chairs of government; who shall make our laws and maintain the institutions of essential political discipline. It is my unrestrained weferences in the market place which help to determine the kind of goods found on the shelves of our stores and the category of services that insure the physical comforts and satisfactions of our society. It is my vote as a stockholder which helps to determine the management and policies of a corporation. I have a voice in the op-


