

A Restoration And Revival For Senior Citizens

A restoration and revival are taking place in Rising Star through the activities of a group of Senior Citizens---mostly women---in the Senior Citizens Club.

The restoration is occurring in the east wing of the Community Hospital building, long vacant and crumbling, which is being transformed into a community center capable of accommodating meetings, luncheons and other community functions of the nature, attracting as many as 100 persons, perhaps more.

The revival is a matter of spirit. It involves an excited interest in the activities of a group of more than 25 who refuse to submit to the languors of retirement and instead, are giving the town an example of development enterprise that should be a stirring example to citizens of all ages.

Members of the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce, which the Senior Citizens serve by hosting its luncheons, are giving help with the project. Other organizations are also contributing. 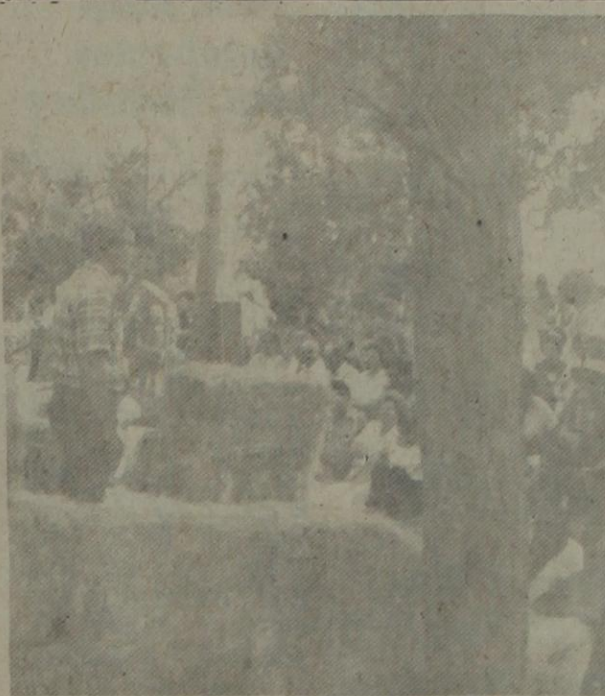

In that portion of the old hospital building, cut off from the west wing which houses Dr. Billy T. Carpenter Medical Clinic, the senior citizens have made a meeting-luncheon space 14 feet wide by 75 feet in length by removing four former hospital room partitions to combine five such spaces into one. Where the walls have been removed--by volunteer labor, supplemented by limited funds--the group has concealed the scars with attractive framing. The floor has been painted, and painting of the windows and ceiling is underway. The result is one of inviting space and cleanliness. A wide hall running the length of the wing and reached through large hospital type doorways is available to accommodate overflow crowds.

At the rear of the wing is a large kitchen affording service to the main room through a pantry. On the other side of the hall the club is fitting out lounge and game rooms and two large baths.

The center is entered from the rear of the hospital where there is ample room for parking cars. It is remote from the section of the building occupied by the medical clinic and its use will not interfere with activities there.

Mrs. Marjorie West, president of the senior citizens organization, said the club hopes to move from its present quarters in the building adjoining the West Texas Utilities offices on South Main, to

Eighteen Register For Emergency Ambulance

With 18 registered for training as emergency ambulance attendants and ten signed up as drivers, a course in emergency life-saving techniques to be taught here by Ranger Junior College instructors has been assured, Mrs. La Juan Killion, president of the newly organized Rising Star Emergency Ambulance Association, announced last week.

Hopefully the class will begin sessions in Mid-October, the exact date to be determined by the schedule of State Health Department supervisors who will test the students and issue certificates to those successfully completing the 40 hour course, she said.

The class will meet at the High School Library in three-hour periods beginning at 7 p.m. on either Mondays or Tuesdays.

Drivers are not required to take the life-saving instruction, although they may, but they are required by state law to have chauffeur's licenses.

Meanwhile a promising effort is being made to obtain an ambulance from the Armed Services surplus depot under the auspices of the City. One such ambulance has been loated at Dyess AFB, Abilene, and an application for its contribution to Rising Star has been made subject to its being declared surplus equipment.

A minimum of 15 students is necessary for the emergency attendant and first aid course to be taught in the community where organized.

Decision on the date for beginning the class will be made within the next week or so Dr. Beryl McKinnerney, dean of Ranger school, who has attended two preliminary meetings to explain the course

and its requirements, will be here with the official application forms for its final organization.

Contributions and membership fees to supplement charges for ambulance transportation of patients will be sought for financing the program and suitable cards have been ordered for membership registration, it was announced. The membership fee will depend upon the wishes of those who join, Mrs. Killion said. It may range from a small amount periodically to whatever the member wishes to contribute, she said.

Operation of the service will be a voluntary basis with schedules for attendants and drivers to be worked out well in advance and so organized that there will be no burden on any team. This type of program is proving successful in many communities, including Cross Plains and three small communities in Palo Pinto county, representatives of whose organizations were present at a recent community meeting here to explain how the program works.

They have found, the Rising Star group was told, that the satisfactions of working in a life-saving effort is a positive and motivating influence, but it was also pointed out that there must be a constant and dedicated leadership for the program to be carried on consistently. That seems in evidence here, according to those who have attended the promotional meetings. The need of an efficient emergency transportation service for victims of sudden illness and accidents in the Rising Star area is compelling, concerned citizens agree.

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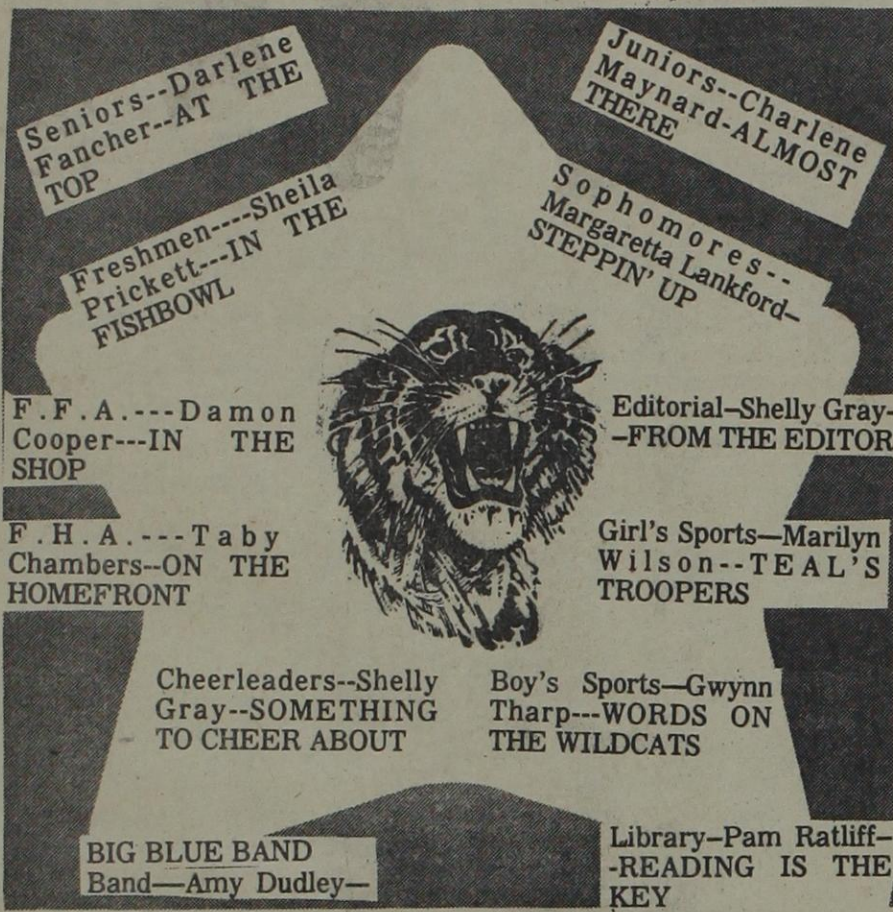

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ISSUE CITY OF RISING STAR, TEXAS, REVENUE BONDS

NOTICE is hereby given that the City Council of the City of Rising Star, Texas, will convene at its regular meeting place in the City Hall of Rising Star, Texas, at 8:00 P.M. on the 8th day of October, 1979, and will consider the passage of an ordinance and the taking of such action as may be deemed necessary to authorize the issuance of revenue bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$140,000 in order to provide funds for the following purposes, to wit: \$110,000 to refund an outstanding obligation of the City (described more fully as a note held by the First State Bank of Rising Star in the original principal amount of \$125,000, dated the 18th day of April, 1978) incurred in connection with the improvement and extension of the City's Natural Gas System, and \$30,000 for making improvements and extensions to the City's Natural Gas System. Such bonds shall mature not later than January 1, 2019, and bear interest at the rate of 5% per annum, and shall be payable from and secured by a lien on and pledge of the net revenues derived from the City's Water, Sanitary Sewer and Natural Gas System.

The holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and such bonds shall not be a debt of the City of Rising Star, Texas.

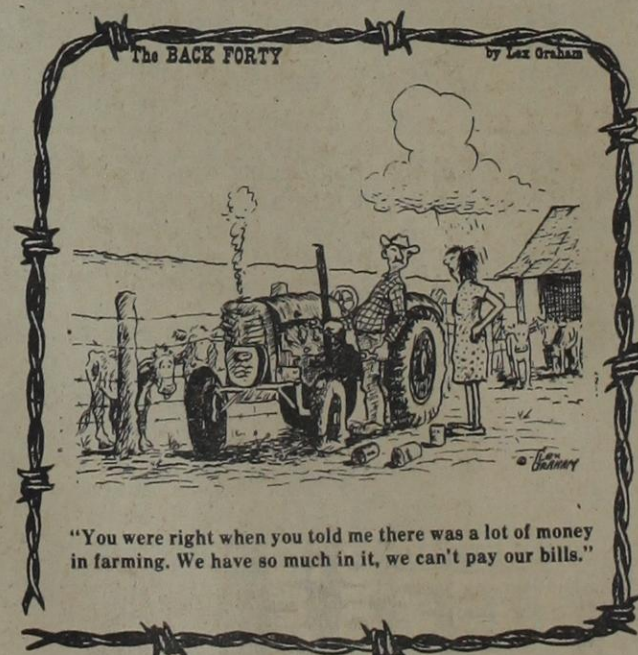

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Applying For Social Security Benefits

Applying for social security benefits is a simple procedure if you follow the old adage, "Be prepared." Knowing when to apply and what proofs you'll need will help to assure that your claim will be processed without delay.

You should apply for retirement benefits about 3 months before you plan to retire. Retirement benefits are payable as early as age 65.

You don't have to retire to have medicare at 65, but you do have to apply for it even if you keep working. To make sure you have the full protection of medicare at age 65, you should contact a

social security office about 3 months before you reach 65.

If you are disabled, you should apply for disability benefits soon after the disability starts if it appears you will be unable to work for a year or more. To be considered disabled, you must have a physical or mental condition which prevents you from working and is expected to last for at least 12 months or to result in death.

If you are eligible for disability benefits, your wife or husband and children may get benefits, too.

If an insured worker dies, someone in the

family should apply for survivors benefits as soon as possible after the worker's death. Survivors benefits may be paid to a widow or widower and children even if the worker had as little as 1½ years of covered work.

You will need some proofs to go along with your application. When you apply, you should have with you your social security card or a record of your number (if the claim is on another worker's record, you'll need his or her number), proof of your age, your marriage certificate if your spouse is applying for benefits, your children's birth cer-

tificates if you're applying for them, and your Form W-2 for the previous year or a copy of your last federal income tax return if you're self-employed.

If you are applying for disability benefits, you also will need the names of doctors, hospitals, or other facilities where you have been examined or treated.

Don't delay applying because you don't have all the proofs, assistance will be given to help you secure other proofs you need.

Like most businesses, social security offices have certain periods when they are particularly busy. The first week of each month, for example, is especially busy because that's when social security and SSI checks are delivered.

The best time to call is after the middle of the month.

Green Horizons offers Bluebonnets in packages ranging from 1,000 seeds up to 50 pounds, all of which contain full growing instructions.

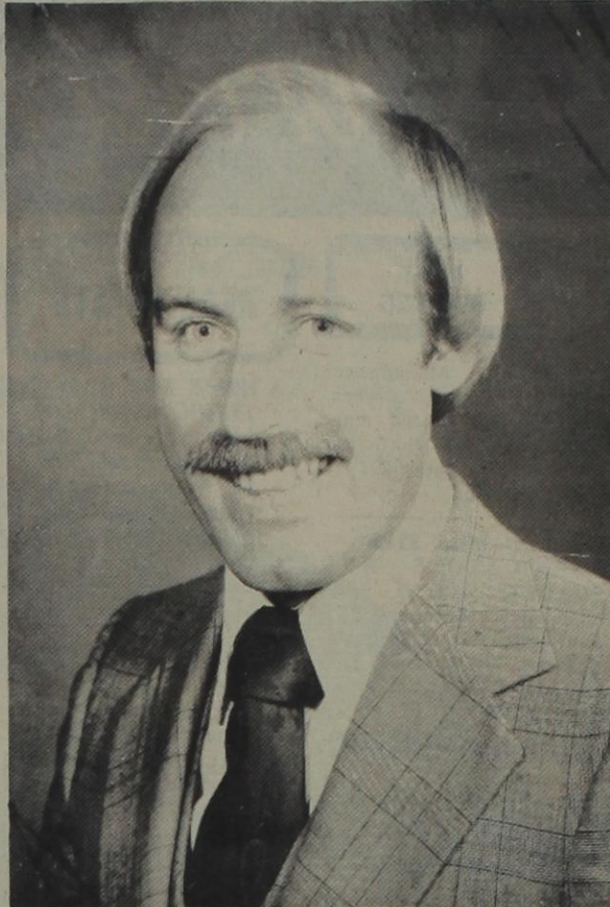

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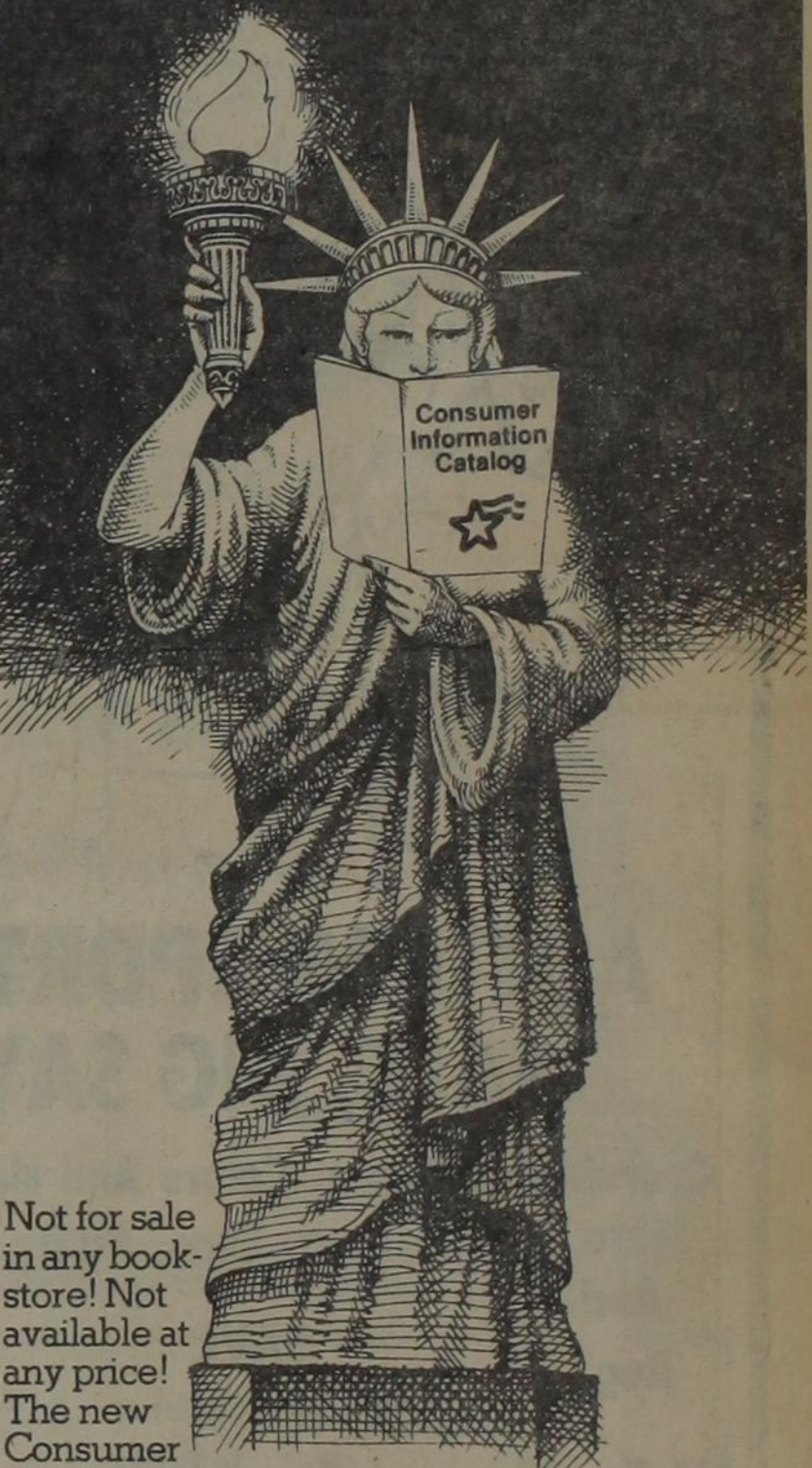
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Sec. Of Ag Bergland Plans Visit

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Plans for a two-day visit by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland to the 17th Congressional District have been announced by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm. Bergland, accompanied by Stenholm and Congressman Kent Hance of Lubbock, has scheduled a press conference and address in Abilene Thursday, September 20, and will tour agricultural facilities in Stephenville Friday, September 21.

The head of the U.S. Department of Agriculture will arrive in Abilene around 4 p.m. Thursday, after spending the morning in Hance's district. Members of the area press have been invited to the 4:30 p.m. press conference scheduled at the Kiva Inn, Stenholm said. The Thursday night banquet will be co-hosted by the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, with tickets on sale at the Abilene Chamber through Monday, September 17. The dinner will be held at the Abilene Civic Center Foyer and reservations are being restricted to 500 due to seating limitation. Cost of the banquet tickets is \$8.

"As far as I know, this is the only trip of this type scheduled for Bergland this year," Stenholm said. "It isn't often that an area has a unique opportunity such as this to brief the Secretary on areas of specific concern to farmers and ranchers. I am especially pleased that we were able to receive such excellent co-operation from the Abilene West Texas Chambers of Commerce, on such short notice, in hosting the banquet."

Bergland will fly to Stephenville Friday, September 21, to tour the Texas A&M University Research and Experiment Station and will meet with area farmers and ranchers for a question and answer period at the Tarleton State University Livestock Pavilion at 9:15 a.m. The tour will conclude with a visit to the Texas Department of Agriculture Seed Lab in Stephenville at 10 a.m. Bergland will then continue on to Waco for the dedication of the Bob Poage Library at Baylor University at noon.

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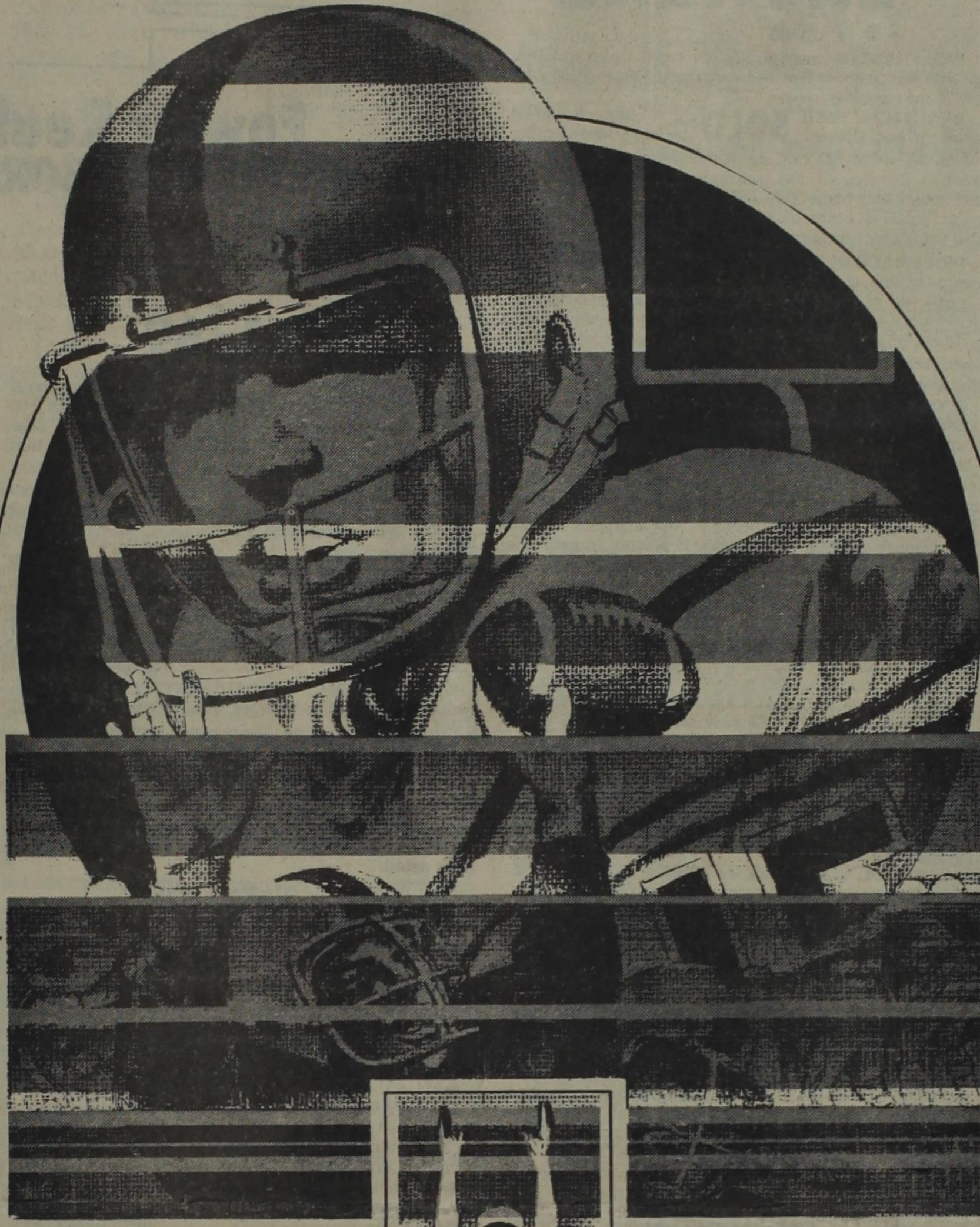

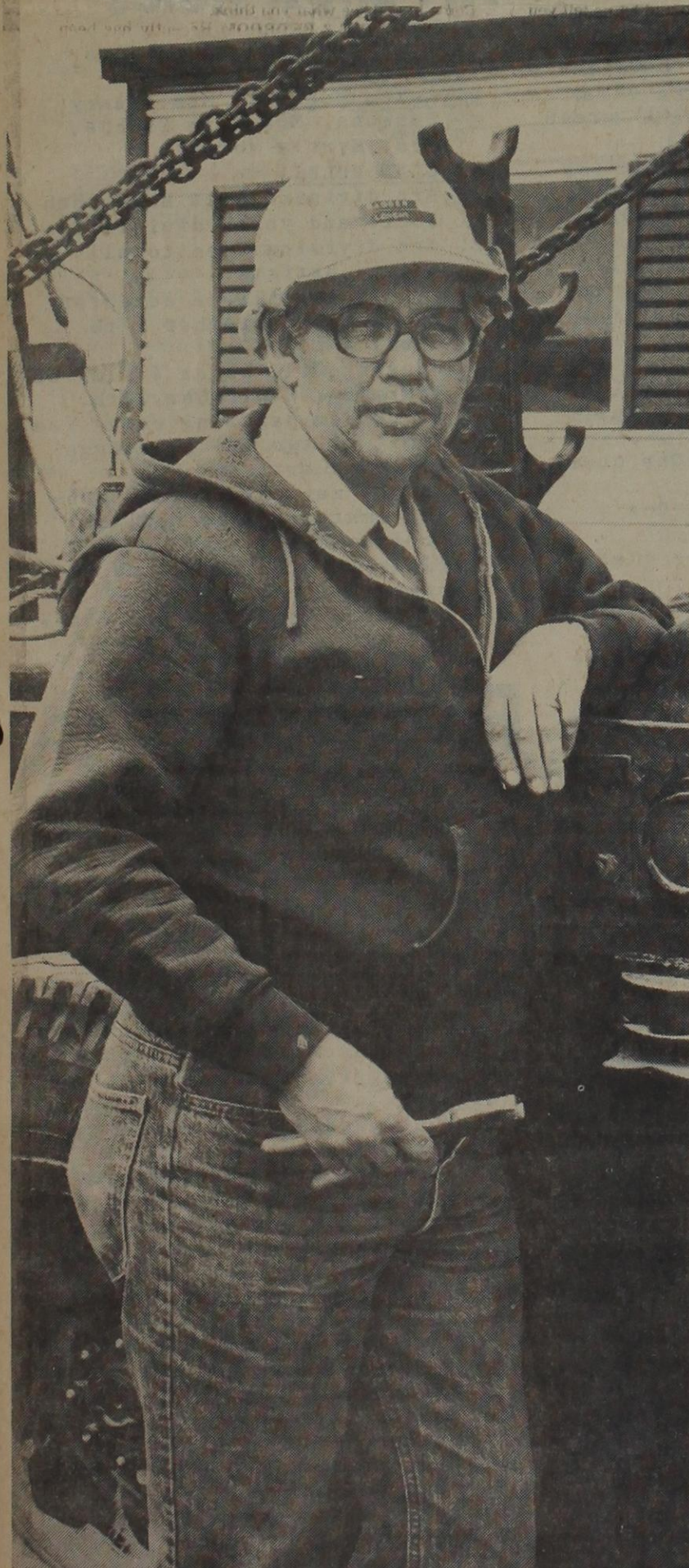

The seventh Annual Eastland County Hay Show will be a feature of the county fair. Over 60 entries of hay were entered in August. A sample of hay was taken from each bale and sent to the Agricultural Analytical lab at Texas A&M to determine the protein analysis.

On September 28 at 9:30 a.m. the hay will be classified by Dr. George Alston, Extension Agronomist. Both physical and chemical (crude protein) factors are considered in classifying all hay entries.

The hay show which is sponsored by the Eastland Young Farmers chapter focuses attention on this important crop with special emphasis on hay quality.

At 1:30 p.m. Friday Dr. Alston will present an educational program on quality hay production. The program will be of interest to hay producers, hay users and general suppliers of fertilizer, seeds, chemicals, machinery, buildings and equipment.

Businesses and organizations donated money to pay the cost of protein analyses and prizes. The Texas Plant Food Institute will provide the ribbons.

The hay will be grouped in the following classes: Alfalfa and other legumes; Sorghum - Sudan hybrids and other forage Sorghums; Coastal Bermuda, other Bermudas; Other perennials grasses; Oats and other winter annual grasses; Peanut; and Legume mixtures.

Hay Show Rules

1. Anyone in Eastland County may exhibit hay which he produced or purchased.
2. Any individual may exhibit only one bale per class, but may have entries in a many different classes as he chooses.
3. An entry must be in a bale form or large round bale.
4. Each entry in the officially established classes will be awarded a blue, a red, or a gold ribbon, if it is scored 50 points or better by the judge.
5. An entry will be disqualified when it contains more than a trace of injurious foreign material. This includes injurious plants such as bull-nettle, briars, headed sand-burs, mature Texas winter grass, or Aristida species (needlegrass) with needles attached, and poisonous plants. Presence of hardware, such as nails, wire, and other matter which is injurious when fed to livestock will disqualify an entry.
6. An entry will be disqualified when it has any objectionable odor; or when it is undercured heating, hot, wet, musty, moldy, caked badly shattered or broken, badly weathered, badly frosted, or very dusty.

Pioneer News

Mrs. A.C. Halsell

I like the brief visits I have with the ladies of the community, when I call them or they call me and report their social activities of the week. Most of all I like the privilege of writing; this time about some experiences I have had, where we lived for six years. Many times I have recalled a line in our school song (class song, composed by the late Lexie (Dean Robertson) "To the world we will give our aid." Our lives in this community was an endeavor to do just that.

Now there was this "point in time" when the Brazos River flowed gently or hurriedly along with gurgling springs, so fresh and so plentiful, that often they were used as a source of drinking water, by the people who lived near by. The land, through which the river flowed, was very fertile, where cattle grazed and grew fat. The river was a fixture, something as eternal as the land itself, until surveys and excavations began, for the Morris Shepherd Dam, which, in time became the retainer for "Possum Kingdom Lake". Life in these two communities, Pickwick and Lucille, was never the same after that. Pickwick was deluged and Lucille School site became only a cherished landmark on the banks of the lake. Several years prior to this, my husband made application to teach Lucille's school. The trustee meeting, for this business, was held in a Ford car in front of

the two-teacher school building. The contract was signed by the light of the car. The night was stormy with high winds and lashing rain. The trip home called for traveling winding roads and crossing one of the few winding bridges. The high rise of the river caused the water to lap the sides of the bridge as it heaved and rocked in the wind. The remainder of the one hundred mile trip home was uneventful and he arrived home about dawn.

In due time we were moved to Lucille community and school started. Inquiry at school, the first week, as to when there had been preaching in the community, drew a reply from a less timid pupil: "I don't know but I'll ask Mama." The next day he announced that it had been thirteen years since there had been preaching in the community. Mr. Halsell announced: "Tell your parents there will be preaching here next Sunday." "Who will do the preaching?" one pupil inquired. "I will," he replied. "Are you a preacher?" another asked. "Yes, I am," the teacher answered. There was preaching the next Sunday, and the next and the next—

This was the beginning of a revival of religion throughout all the area. A Sunday School was organized. A tabernacle was built, where summer revivals were held as long as there was a school and a community. Ministers of all

denominations vied for an opening date to make appointments to preach. That teacher and his wife were pastor, in charge, teachers, nurses, foster parents, morticians and singing school sponsors until the great change came that was inevitable, due to the Dam construction. (To be continued).

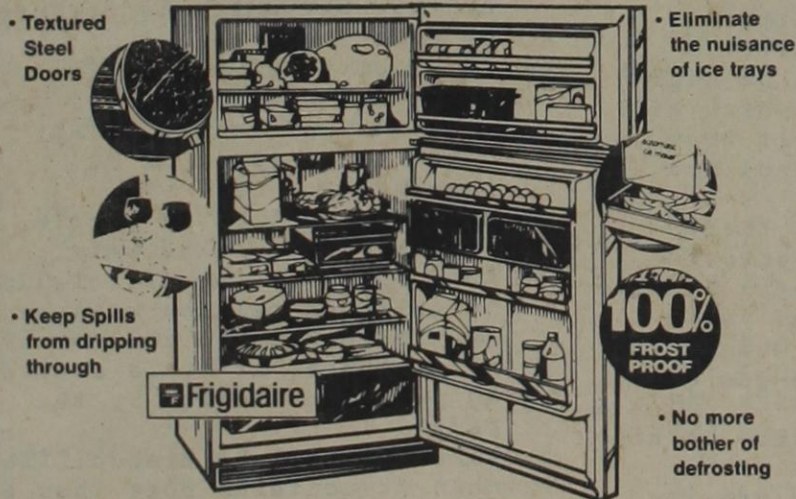

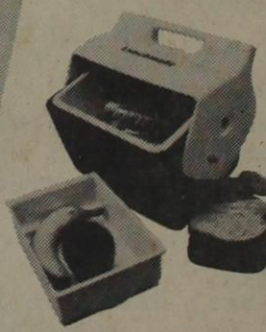

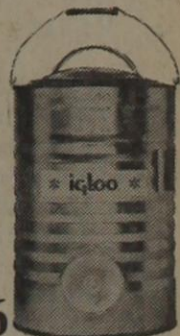

GORDON SPOT

If you have not sprayed your pecan trees for weevils recently you should check them very carefully for weevil infestation. Unless you closely observe your pecans you may not notice that the weevils are consuming the entire crop.

It's very discouraging to think you have a good pecan crop only to discover at harvest time you only have empty shells with small holes where the grubs have emerged.

We found an abundance of weevils in trees this past week. One female weevil may deposit an egg in as many as 60 nuts over a two month period. This insect is a large weevil being brownish in color and about three-eighths of an inch in length. It has a beak about as long as it's body. You can shake the weevils from a limb in order

to check for infestation or you may find the weevil on the pecans. Another method of checking is to look for infested nuts. A weevil punctured pecan will have a small pin size hole. The shuck will be black around the hole and you will see a circle of black marks in a larger ring around the small hole. This outer ring of marks are made by the weevil's feet as it bores its beak into the pecan.

Trees should be sprayed with Sevin for weevil control. Once a pecan has been punctured and the egg deposited there is nothing that can be done to save that pecan.

We see a lot of small grains being planted in Eastland County. Weed prevention is a practice that producers need to consider.

Wild oats, mustards and other weeds will show up this winter where they were a problem last year. Despite last year's severe winter weather, enough wild oats survived to reseed thousands of acres.

Therefore, weed-free seed is the best investment a producer can make. Run seed purchased in bulk lots through a seed cleaner to prevent the addition of weed seed to the soil.

There are other things that can be done to control weeds in wheat and oats. First, plant on clean (weed free) land. Although this is sometimes impractical, it is important in keeping weeds under control.

Next, if wild oats have heavily infested a field, rotate to a spring-planted crop. Wild oats emerging in the summer won't produce seed.

If crop rotation is impossible, destroy wild oat seedlings through tillage before seeding small grains. Late planting reduces grazing potential but decreases spring weed competition. Heavy seeding rate will also increase a crop's competitive advantage.

Heavy grazing of infested fields is another way to reduce plowing plus heavy grazing pressure applied before wild oats produce seed reduces weed seed numbers that will infest the next crop.

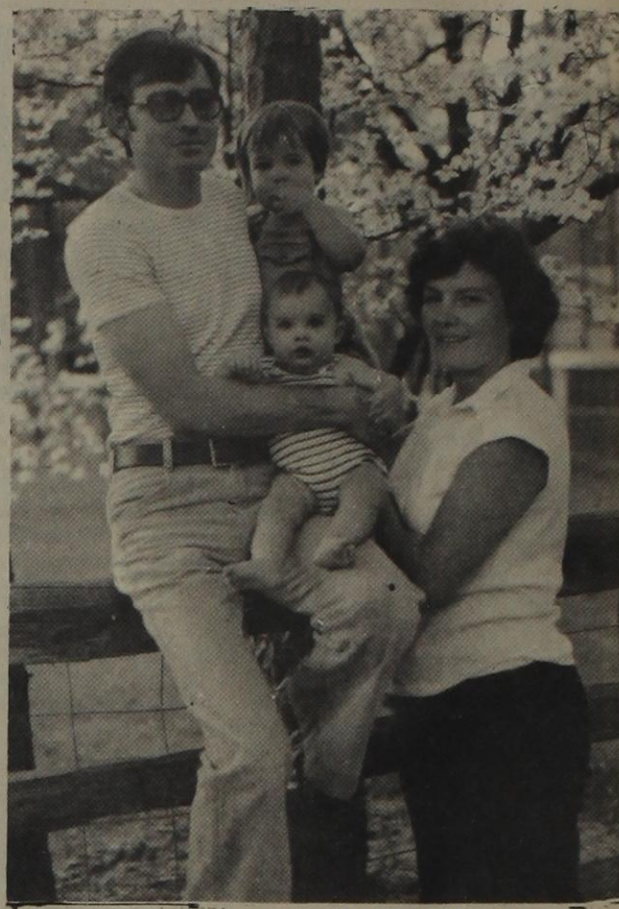

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

- Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and
- Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

Stenholm Announces Nominations For Service Academies

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced the final request for applicants who are interested in competing for nominations to the service academies for the class entering July, 1980. A competitive nomination procedure will be used to select the nominees in order to give all interested young persons who meet the requirements an equal opportunity.

The service academies are the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland; the Military Academy at West Point, New York; the Air Force Academy near Colorado Springs, Colorado; and the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, New York. "These institutions offer a fine education and a great opportunity for service to their country by young persons who wish to follow a military career," Stenholm said.

In order for Congressman Stenholm to consider applicants, a candidate must meet

the following requirements: (1) Must be a U.S. citizen; (2) Must be over 17, and a legal resident of the 17th Congressional Dist.; (3) Must be under 22 years of age on July 1, 1980; (4) Must never have been married; (5) Must be physically fit; (6) Must have a good high school record.

Stenholm stressed that political influence is not a factor in his nomination to the academies. Nominations are based on the individual's mental and physical abilities.

Interested young persons who meet the requirements should write to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm, House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515, no later than October 15.

Congressman Stenholm emphasized that all young persons who are genuinely interested in a military career have the opportunity to compete for nomination and he will consider all qualified applicants fully.

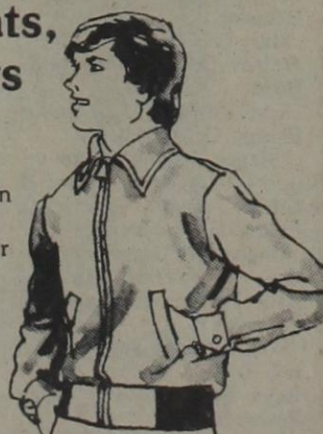
