Steps Taken to Distribute Surplus Food in County

EASTLAND.—Eastland County has made initial steps to set up a countywide program to supply an estimated 3,000 persons with surplus food commodities owned by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Under the program individuals and families with an income below the minimum set up by the county commissioners court can receive monthly such surpluses as butter, cheese, nonfat dry milk, lard or shortening, dry beans, rice, corn meal and flour.

The Commissioners Court passed the following resolution this month:

"Whereas, there are numerous recipients in Eastland County of Old Age Assistance, Aid to Dependent Children, and Aid to the Blind, and whereas, there are certain other persons and families in Eastland County in dire need of food beyond the quantities they are able to purchase; and

"Whereas, the Federal Government owns great quantities of surplus goods which threaten the security of our farmers and ranchers, and our aged and needy citizens can help dispose of these huge surplus stockpiles which are now stored at great expense to the taxpayers;

"Whereupon a motion was made by Commissioner J. E. McCoolies and seconded by Commissioner R. L. Carter that the Commissioners Court of Eastland County, enter into a contract with the Commodity Division of the Texas State Department of Public Welfare to receive and distribute United States Department of Agriculture donated commodities to be made available to Eastland County through the State Department of Public Welfare Commodity Division."

Under the program, an individual with an income of less than \$60 monthly can share in the program. A family of two or three persons making not more than \$140 is eligible. A family with six or seven members can make as much as \$165 monthly and still participate in the program and a family with eight or nine members can have a monthly income of \$180 and still share in the foodstuff allotted to the county. For each additional person over nine, \$15 additional income is allowed.

The standards of eligibility says that every recipient of old age assistance, aid to the blind

and aid to dependent children and their normal dependents shall be eligible to receive commodities even though their income exceeds the limits mentioned previously.

Building Leased.

The Court has already leased the ground floor of the Masonic Hall building for \$40 a month and hired J. J. Porter of Cisco to serve as administrator. His beginning salary will be \$250 monthly. Only cost for the food itself is 20 cents a year for each citizen participating.

County Judge John Hart said commissioners visited Haskell County where the system has been used for a year before making a final decision. He said applications for the foodstuff are not yet being taken.

Judge Hart also pointed out that all foods listed as surplus are not always available.

What could a family of four expect to receive? The list shows four pounds of butter, five pounds of cheese, nine pounds of nonfat dry milk, six pounds of lard or shortening, eight pounds of dry beans, six pounds of rice, 10 pounds of cornmeal and five pounds of flour.

Parent May Still Claim Exemption If Child Earns \$600

Do you have a son or daughter working during the summer vacation, who is likely to earn more than \$600 before school starts again?

If so, he or she doesn't have to quit work before earning that amount for you to retain your child's exemption deduction. The same holds true if you have a non-student working child who will still be under 19 by the end of the tax year.

In either case, regardless of how much the child earns, the parent may claim an exemption, providing he has furnished over half the total cost of his child's support for the year. This rule also applies in the case of legally adopted children.

There is one important thing to keep in mind: A dependent child is also entitled to an exemption deduction for himself on his own separate return. On the other hand, if he is married, and files a joint return with his wife, no dependency exemption may be claimed by the parent.

Mr. A. E. Fogle, Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene office, today clarified revenue laws which have confused many parents.

"We have reports of both parents and employers telling working children they'll have to quit their jobs before they earn \$600. They can work right up to the reopening of school if they want to," Mr. Fogle said. "The children, however, may have to pay a small tax. Since many of them are studying our own courses in basic taxation they already know this. By the same token, many of them who work only short terms of employment or for a smaller salary will probably be entitled to refunds during the next filing season."

This information should prove helpful to three parties to summer employment, the student or child worker, the parents, and the employer, Mr. Fogle said. He warned that to gain advantage of this rule, children over 19 must be bona fide students at recognized educational institutions, or pursuing a full time farm training course. Any questions regarding individual cases may be referred to the Internal Revenue, Abilene, Texas.

New Law Requires License When Eggs Sold for Resale

COLLEGE STATION.—The Texas Egg Law, which became effective August 22, provides that no person can buy or sell eggs within this state for subsequent resale without first obtaining a license from the Commissioner of Agriculture.

The exception to this, says F. Z. Beamblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist, are those agents, Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Monsey, live in May.

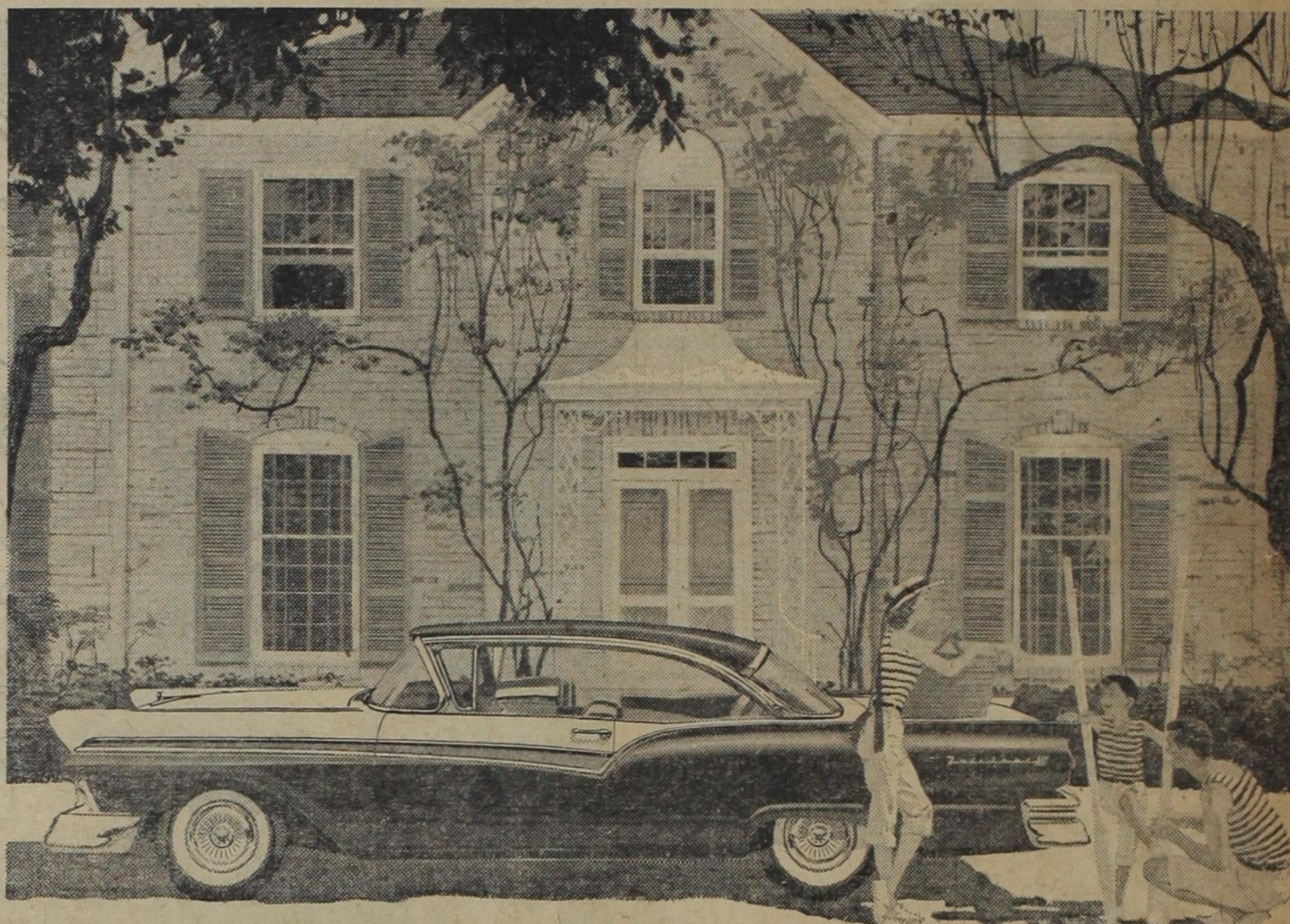
who sell from their own flock and claim no grade; hatcheries which buy eggs for hatching; public eating places where all eggs purchased are served by the establishment; food manufacturers purchasing eggs to be used only in their products; agents employed and carried on the payroll on a salary basis by persons licensed under this act; and any retailer, as defined by law—that is, any person selling or offering for sale, eggs to consumers in this state.

In order to create a fund for the enforcement of the provisions of this act, each licensee shall pay a license fee. The annual fee for dealers, wholesalers, and processors shall be de-

termined according to the average weekly volume of the month in which the licensee handles the most eggs in the preceding twelve months ending on March 31. The proceeds of such license fees shall be paid into the State Treasury by the Commissioner of Agriculture in a fund known as the Egg Law Enforcement Fund.

The deadline for obtaining licenses is October 20. Actual enforcement of the law will start February 17, 1958.

NORTH ZONE: Sept. 1 to Oct. 17, both days inclusive.

SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 1 to Nov. 17, both days inclusive, except in those counties having white-winged season—Oct. 1 to Nov. 14, both days inclusive.

WHITE-WINGED DOVES and mourning doves, Sept. 13, 15, and 17.
