For anyone who cared to investigate, there was no lack of evidence to show that Jesus was indeed the long awaited Messiah. Had the people received Him, He would have fulfilled the Kingly prophecies in their day in addition to the ones regarding the suffering Messiah. But when the Jewish nation as a whole rejected Christ, the fulfillment of His Kingship was postponed until the final culmination of world history. This is the subject of the Book of Revelation. Unfortunately, many people today are making the the work of the church, same tragic mistake

when they ignored the Our concern as overwhelming evidence of Christ's claims as His first coming. Today we are standing at the threshold of Christ's return as King of Kings and Lord of Lords; yet men in general are totally ignorant of the

event or have dismissed it as religious fantasy. When John says and that all the tribes of the earth will mourn over Christ when they see Him coming, he is referring to the prediction in Zachariah 12:10, "And I will pour upon the house of David and upon the inhabitants Jerusalem, the Spirit of grace and of sup-

plications; and they will look upon Me whom they have pierced; and they shall mourn for Him, as one mourns for his only son, and will be in bit-

terness for Him, as one that is in bitterness for his first-born." In this prophecy, the ancient prophet Zachariah declares that when Christ returns to the earth at the height of the coming war, called Armageddon, the Jewish people will for the first time recognize Him as their longrejected Messiah. They will mourn as they look on the One they rejected nearly two thousand years ago. At any moment that Christ will return for His Church; Even So Come. Lord Jesus, COME! It staggers the imagination to realize

that one-fourth of the world's population will be destroyed within a matter of days. According to projected census figures this will amount to nearly one billion people. Since one of these grim reapers of death is Hades, it means that only unbelievers will perish in this phase of the holocaust. When we think about this awful judgment that awaits the Christrejecting world, it gives no satisfaction to our heart; it just fires us up to get out the message that God has provided an alternative in Jesus. Today it isn't just the religious world that's warning us the world is headed for chaos. "Prophets" in the academic, scientific, and political world are telling us the same thing.

AUSTIN-Texas operators Fort Worth has staked a reported 110 gas and 53 oil wildcat test 11 miles discoveries in June 1981, the Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division announced today.

> In the year-earlier month, 110 gas and 51 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the sixth month of the year included 24 in deep South Texas, 23 in Southeast Texas, 20 in the Refugio area, 17 in West Central Texas, six in the San Antonio area, five in North Texas, four in East Texas, three each in the San Angelo and Midland areas, two each in the Panhandle and Lubbock areas, and one in East Central Texas.




nine in Southeast Texas, 11 in the San Angelo area, eight in North Texas, six each in the Midland and Lubbock areas, five each in the Refugio area and West Central Texas, and three in the Panhandle area.

In June, operators reported 321 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 3,704 in June, compared with 2,572 in the same period of 1980.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in June amounted to 4,014 against 2,839 a year earlier.



Musical Chairs In Washington - No Fun For The Oilman

July was supposed to be "showdown month" in the U.S. Congress on legislation concerning oil producers and royalty owners, and the prediction is turning out to be correct. The 1,000 barrel per day Exemption (Windfall Tax) Bill has been under heated discussion, and some of the results are coming in. But most unpredictable was the changing of sides by a number of Senators in the Finance Committee, creating a situation where Republicans supported a tax voted in by a **Democratic Administration** while most Democrats on the Committee turned against it. In the final count the Senate Finance Committee rejected the 1,000 Barrel per day Exemption from the Windfall Profit Tax. The proposal, which would apply to all Independent producers and all royalty owners, was defeated 9 to 6 with individual votes as follows: Republicans:



I, Soott Bailer, County Judge of Bastland County, do he declare the week of July 25-31, 1981 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Bastland County, for the following reasons County, do hereby

WHEREAS, work, play, travel (traffic) and home accidents involving Texas farm and ranch residents accounted for over 330 fatalities, thousands of painful and disabling injuries costing millions of dollars in 1980; and

WHEREAS, the President has proclaimed National Farm Safety Week and the Govenor has proclaimed the same period as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety week;

WHEREAS, during this week, a statewide farm accident prevention education campaign is being undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and 4-H clubs, Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, the Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Farthered County Farm Bureau with the theme, "ENJOY LIFE-SAFELY", and

WHEREAS, the latest National Safety Council Preliminary Accident Survey for 1980 indicates a 1% increase in fatal and non-fatal accidents, (an increase from 103,000 to 106,000 fatal injuries and costing \$83.5 billion) The latest Agricultural data being 1979, more than 4,200 farm and ranch rtsidents died and 380,000 were disabled in farm, home, public, and highway accidents with 1,900 (less than half) being work related. Of these, 1,150 fatal and 115,000 injury accidents were farm and ranch residents. The total cost of Agricultural accidents to farm and ranch people in 1979, exceeded \$5 billion, and

WHEREAS, the 1980 Texas Farm Burcau Accidental Death Program records show that 330 death claims were paid in 133 different counties. County recorded one death claims under the Program. Traffic related incidents caused the most claims statewide, with 212 - (Auto/Truck-182, Motorcycles, Minibikes and Go-carts-20, Bicycles/Big wheels-2, and Pedestrians-8) other ranking causes of death were firearms, falls, drownings aircraft crashes, tractors, machinery, fires δ burns, choked/strangled electrocutions, animal accidents and snake bites.



Most consumers throw away more food than they realize in many cases - leftover vegetables, meats, milk that turns sour and bread that goes stale. Throwing these nutritious foods out is the same thing as throwing away pennies, nickels, dimes, quarters and even dollars at meal time.

Try some of these tips to conserve food you spend money for real savings depend on your storage and preparation habits, as well as on buying:

BUYING - Buy foods in amounts your family will eat for one meal - or amounts you can set aside in the freezer or refrigerator or later without wasting. Don't get "carried away" buying fresh foods on special if you can't store them properly to prevent spoilage. Fresh peaches at 49 cents a pound are no bargain if you buy four pounds, eat three pounds and throw one pound away.

STORAGE - Wrap leftovers properly for freezer or refrigerator. In the refrigerator, always cover foods with wax paper, foil or plastic wrap - or store them in a plastic bag or a container with a tight-fitting lid. Foods

How much food in stored uncovered lose moisture and can pick up flavors from other foods. Foods for the freezer should be packaged in moisture, vapor-resistant packaging such as plastic containers, foil or freezer paper. Label packages before puting them in the freezer.







"Currently, peanuts in the South and Southwest are making good progress following rains that caused some planting delays," notes Feagan. "Good moisture conditions point to a better-thanaverage year, with total plantings up about 4 percent over last year."

Most producers remain optimistic about the market for their 1981 crop due to the past year's short peanut supplies, which are 30 percent below 1979. Although peanut imports were increased in mid-April to ease the shortage, these should have little or no effect on the domestic price support program. According to Feagan, the special import will expire before the new crop comes to market.

What have higher peanut prices done to consumption?


"Edible usage is currently running well below last year's levels and will likely be down 17 to 20 percent by the end of the marketing year (Aug. 31) due to short supplies and high prices," notes Feagan. "Manufacturers are concerned that these high prices will continue to turn consumers away from peanut products."



County Judge Scott Bailey has proclaimed July 25-31 as Farm and Ranch SAFETY WEEK in Eastland county, at the request of Ernest Reich, Eastland County Farm Bureau President.

This marks the 38th Annual National Farm Safety Week, co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The theme for the 1981 observation of Farm Safety Week is "Enjoy Life-Safely."

In his proclamation, Judge Bailey said "accidents involving farm and ranch residents, employees and guests at work, in the home, at play and on the highways accounted for more than 330 Texas fatalities and more than 3300 disabling injuries, costing millions of dollars in 1980. Time, Planning, and Educational efforts using engineering ingenuity could help prevent much pain, expense and even death. National Safety Council accident surveys indicate that nearly half the accidents were traffic related, with home accidents, recreational accidents and work related accidents following. With 106,000 fatal accidents in the United States in 1980, and with agriculture accounting for more than 4,200, we need to endeavor stronger to "Enjoy Life-Safely".

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C.-They say only two things in life are certain; death and taxes. The absolute certainty of those two are never more apparent than to family survivors faced with li-

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quidation of an inheritance due to inequitable estate taxes. Hardest hit by past estate laws are owners of family farms and ranches and small businesses. Land

values, in particular, estates of more than

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\$175,000 are taxed at rates that rise as high as 70 percent. To pay that estate tax, many owners of small farms and businesses may be faced with the prospect of selling out-often to larger firms or wealthier individuals. Proposals included in both the Ways and Means Committee version and the Reagan tax package would bring needed changes to estate laws.

The exemption on taxable inheritance would be increased from \$175,000 to \$600,000 in both proposals. The House Committee version (tentatively approved July 16, but open to change at the last minute) would cut from 70 percent to 50 percent the maximum tax on estates of more than \$600,000.

Both proposals would allow a person to leave an estate of any size tax-free to the surviving spouse. Currently, the marital exemption is generally limited to half of the estate.

The bills would also increase to \$10,000 the limit of tax-free gifts to one person. For instance, a couple could transfer \$20,000 each year to each child without being forced to pay any gift tax.

Although the final form that these proposals will be presented to members of Congress is still unclear, I strongly support this general move

away from an inequitable and unfair tax.

Earlier in the year I had co-sponsored H.R. 3882, the "Family

Enterprize Estate and Gift tax Equity and Reduction Act" which would allow family farms, ranches and businesses to pass intact from one genera-

tion to another. This bill included a provision which has not, as yet, appeared in either Ways or Means Committee or the Administration's pro-

posals. Under this provision, the executor of an estate could elect to value an interest in a closely held business at 50 percent of its fair market value, provided the heirs do not dispose of their interests or merge the firm into a publicly

held company within 10 years after the parents' death. Vital improvements

in the estate tax laws. however, would seem virtually assured at this point, with all factions apparently realizing the necessity of this move to preserve the continuation of the thousands of

small family-operated farms and businesses in this country. That's
