

His long time dream of a cotton gin in full operation produced the first bale December 1, 1980 and at 5:45 p.m. bale number two was out of the press. Mr. Squab Weaver, Kenneth's father-in-law has helped considerably with this project and last summer was forced to take a rest in the hospital. Squab Weaver is a determined man and will do what what he can, as he is also a farmer, completely.

Anytime one of these men is standing still it is a fact they are at a certain location on the gin floor so as to see a number of operations at one time.

Starting up the equipment to produce the first bale can only be explained by the people involved. The feeling of preparation and the final production products belongs to those hardy people and them alone.

Beware Of "Work-At-Home" Promoters

Shano Franklin Tage of Las Vegas, Nevada, and Cloy Hubert than Segrest of Lufkin, Texas, were convicted on ten counts of mail fraud by a Federal Jury at Tyler, Texas, on December 4, 1980.

During the two-day trial, several government witnesses testified they had responded to advertisements newspapers and periodicals offering the opportunity to "work-at-home" addressing and stuffing envelopes. Each of the witnesses testified they had paid a \$12 application fee to Habco sales of Lufkin, Texas, and in return, received two booklets entitled "Insider's Guide to Mail Order Riches" by Shano Tage and Cooperative Income

Program Starting kit of Instructions" rather receiving envelopes to address and stuff. Testimomy in-

dicated that Habco Sales, operated by Cloy Hubert Segrest, was one of at least 850 distributors of Shano Tage's programs. Shano Tage has been doing business under names the Ravenstone, Inc., Mailers Financial Cooperative, Cooperative Income program

Ambergate. Judge William M. Steger scheduled sentencing for Jan, 5, 1981. The defendents could face a maximum sentence of five years imprisonment and or a \$1,000 fine on each of the ten counts. Assistant United States Attorney Lawrence G.

Wells, who handled the prosecution for the government, stated he hoped the convictions would serve as a warnto other ing "work-at-home" scheme promoters. Postal Inspector in Charge W.R. Newsome stated the convictions were the result of an investigation by Postal inspectors from 'the Dallas and Beaumont offices.

Select Tree With Care

Select your Christmas tree wisely and give it proper care to make it last throughout the hoilday season, advises a forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, texas A&M University System. Buy your tree early for the best selection. Check for signs of needle shedding and brittleness which indicate that the tree has become too dry. At home, cut one to two inches off the base of the tree (at a slant), stand the tree in water and store in a shaded area. Once indoors, put the tree in a stand that holds water and check the level often. Place the tree away from all heat sources and use a

good lighting system. Before trimming your holiday tree, check all electrical decorations for frayed, cracked or worn insulation, including a close check of plugs. Be sure not to overload electrical circuits, and disconnect tree lights before leaving home or retiring for the night.

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First step appears to be the equalization of values across the state, and Peveto commented on his own property.

Peveto said he also expects the tax authorities to reduce the tax rate proportionately so his tax bill stays the same. If they want to raise his taxes, under the new law, the hike must be advertised, and Feveto can join other property owners at a public hearing to fuss at the local officials for raising taxes.

What's more, the same taxable value on his property will be used by each of the taxing jurisdictions that want revenue from Peveto. That is, the appraisal of his home and land will be done just once - by a county-wide tax appraisal district created under his law - not by each of the taxing entities.

If Peveto doesn't think he's being treated fairly, he can pay the disputed property tax with a protest and carry his unhappiness before a single countywide equalization board, and even to court, without disrupting the collection of taxes on all the property around him.

This is the way the tax law is supposed to work, not the way it has happened in Dallas, Peveto says.

Were it not for the experiences like that in Dallas, Peveto wouldn't have to be explaining anything. But the situation there, along with experience in other areas, indicates some need, Peveto said, for refining the

1979 law designed to bring equity in property taxation. Those refinements will be coming up in the 1981 legislature, where a big fight may develop about granting widespread residential tax exemptions to reverse the shift of the property tax burden from business to

Peveto thinks an exemption should be granted on home taxes, but he says business interests will resist such a move, not to mention the local taxing units who don't want to lose revenue or put the burden for lost tax revenues on other property. Such residential exemp-

tions, as suggested by some local Dallas officials, also require a constitutional amendment, which takes a wo-thirds endorsement by

each house of the legislature, plus ratification by the

Nevertheless, Peveto said he thinks some consideration must be given to homeowner tax relief to avoid a "tax revolt." Such a revolt already has reared its head, he said, in the form of local tax initiatives in Dallas. Corpus Christi and else-

"Preliminary figures show a 26.5 percent average shift of total taxes from other types of property to homes," Peveto said. "I think we'll have a real tax revolt if we don't do something to keep that shift from occurring."

Peveto said he thinks a homestead exemption of up to 27.5 percent on a statewide average might keep the existing balance between taxes paid by homeowners and those paid by other property owners.

*Inflation has driven up the value of homes faster than other property. Merely adjusting the inflation is raising home tax values phenomenally.

At the same time, tax collectors have kept pace with inflation's effect on other property. The result is a disproportionate rise in residential tax values.

*Poor appraisal practices have allowed homes to be undervalued in comparison to other property. More accurate appraisals on homes has resulted in heavy increases in taxable values. Peveto didn't mention the point, but homeowners and businesses, too, have had to bear the burden of a shift in property taxes from agricultural land and elderly homeowners, both of which received tax breaks from the "tax relief" program

fostered by Gov. Dolph

Briscoe in 1977 and approved by voters in 1978. Homeowners were granted a partial exemption from school taxes. The total loss from these taxes exemptions last year was about \$124 million, an amount that had to be shifted to other taxpayers in those local governments that didn't want to sacrifice the income. Peveto and Sen. Grant Jones of Abilene, who sponsored the property tax law in the senate, take the same go-slow attitude toward changing the law in 1981 as the House Ways and Means

*Make the homestead tax exemption and tax "freeze" automatic for those over the age of 65 so elderly people won't have to re-apply for the exemption every year. 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
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

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

Chris Elkins, a former leader within the Unification Church described a cult as "counterfeit Christianity" in a recent visit to Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, Texas. As a bank teller he was trained to spot a counterfeit bill by knowing the real thing so well he's never be deceived by anything else. "The same principle applies in protecting ourselves against cults. we need to know the real thing so well that we'll never be fooled by anything less,' explains Elkins.

Presently an author and lecturer his ministry is primarily a positive one, dealing with preventive measures rather than hate and condemnation. "I'm not here to teach you how to hate," said Elkins. "I don't want you to step out of here and 'tar and feather' the next Moonie you meet."

During his half hour lecture Elkins took the HSU students step by step through the experiences which led him to join the Unification Church, allowing them to see, hear and feel with him what he went through. Fearing the general stereotype people tend to have of a cult member, Elkins describes himself as a normal, average college student. "I was raised in a Christian home, regularly attended church, and had a genuine conversion at the age of 10. In college I was a member of the honor society, a fraternity president and active in school life," added

Elkins. "So why me?" "Never let us forget we're talking about a 'counterfeit' Christiantiy," continued. "In order to be a successful counterfeit, it has got to closely resemble the real thing.

At his initial contact with the movement he was approached by a clean cut

our society today is an indictment on one group of people -- the American church, Elkins said. "Cults are not the problem, they're the result of a problem." Elkins added that nearly 70% of cult members come from mainline church denomina-

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

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



To earn the title "safety can," a container must pass certain tests conducted by Underwriters Laboratories (UL) or the Factory Mutual System (FM). To get a UL label a can must pass nine different performance tests. FM approval requires 11 tests. Each organization

Another FM test concerns the flame arrester, notes Nelson. A flame arrester is a screen placed within the spout which prevents flame on one side of the screen from reaching the other side by absorbing heat.
