




Communities Get Awards In Contests

The faculty of the Rising Star Public Schools was completed this week and plans were already being made looking toward the opening of a new term on Monday, September 2. Declining attendance, due to the influence of the drouth, cost the school another teacher, but there were indications that enrollment and average daily attendance would increase next year as good rains and the prospect of a good crop encouraged families who had moved away in search of employment, to return, and stimuated trade in farm lands.

J. M. Crump, who was with the Brady schools last year, will be the new principal of the Ward School. Mr. Crump, who came highly recommended to the board, will also assist in High School coaching and will coach the ward school athletic teams, He and Mrs. Crump have a son in the fourth grade.
